
The Deitz House ca. 1820 Hart Square Village 2017



The Steamer Columbia - a.k.a. "The Killian"

At the University of West Florida, we proud of our history, very anthropology, and archaeology programs. The maritime archaeology track is especially unique, and is one of the best in the country, for it provides students with the opportunity to study nonrenewable, cultural submerged, resources firsthand. To put it plainly, we dive on shipwrecks! In March of 2013. while surveying the Blackwater River with side-scan sonar equipment, fellow students and I discovered a large anomaly that was previously unknown to the UWF archaeology department. Typically, it is rather difficult to know exactly what you are looking at when analyzing side-scan sonar images.

However, these particular images showed a very obvious shipwreck approximately 100 feet long in about 20 feet of water. An exploratory dive was done soon after. Even though the visibility for divers in the Blackwater River is very poor, we were able to find a paddlewheel hub, some propulsion machinery, and evidence of burnt wood in just a 15-minute dive. With just these few pieces of evidence I was able to infer that it was probably a late 19th century to early 20th century sidewheel steamboat that most likely sank while burning. I jumped at the opportunity to become the project supervisor and to take on the new site as a thesis project.

I had proposed a few goals for the project, though the most important goal was to positively identify the shipwreck. I utilized many historical documents, newspapers, journal articles, and images, and combined this research with multiple field seasons diving and recording each part of the shipwreck, and examining artifacts to make my conclusion. It feels great to be able to call this shipwreck by its true name, the *Columbia*, though this was not discovered until years after UWF started working on the site. For years, students and I referred

to the site as the *Killian*, or "Killian Wreck". The working title for the site came from hundreds of bricks we found underneath the boiler in the midship of the vessel that all had the name "KILLIAN" impressed on them. I pulled one brick from the wreck to bring to the lab to analyze and conserve since it is a very helpful identifier, and it also gave clues relating to the time period the vessel was built, where it was built, who built it, and what it was used for.

After years of historical research, speaking with Mr. Hinds, and even a personal trip to South Carolina to visit local libraries and learn some local knowledge, I believe the bricks on the shipwreck of the *Columbia* are actually from the historic Killian's Mill in Killian, South Carolina. The 1890's saw the Killian mill begin to flourish in fire-brick production, and the Carolina-Portland Cement Co. was their sole selling agent shipping throughout the south eastern U.S. The selling company had offices in Charleston, Atlanta, Birmingham, and New Orleans, and even shipped bricks to Mexico out of Gulfport, Mississippi. With all this coverage, it is definitely possible for Killian bricks to be in Pensacola where the *Columbia* was built. There is some evidence that of a company called "Killian 20th Century" that called Pensacola home. However, this company seems to have begun later than the date the *Columbia* was built – which leads me to believe the bricks on the shipwreck are indeed from the Killian Fire Brick Co. in Killian, South Carolina.

In the end, I determined the wreck to be that of the steamer *Columbia*. The *Columbia* of Pensacola was a sidewheel steamboat built in 1900 by the W.B. Wright Mill Company to assist in their lumber business. She was 104' long, had beam of 19.8 feet, and a depth of about 6 feet. Around 1904, she was sold to the Dunwoodie-Aiken Tow Boat Company where she continued similar tasks. She was also used as an excursion vessel in the summer months and would ferry passengers from the Palafox wharf, in downtown Pensacola, out to the Santa Rosa Island beaches, or just out around the bay for a sunset cruise complete with fish chowder and tea. On the evening of March 13th, 1911, the *Columbia* steamed up the Blackwater to bring a tow of lumber back down river. The crew decided to moor to its tow in the river overnight and

continue the job in the morning. However, the *Columbia* suddenly caught fire between the hours of 12 a.m. and 2 a.m., burned to the waterline, and sank where she was moored. The Pensacola Evening News reported that her crew "barely escaped with their lives" and the \$15,000 worth of steam engine propulsion machinery would not be saved.

Discovering and identifying this previously unknown shipwreck for my graduate thesis work has been tough, but knowing that my research has helped link ship brick production, boat production, and the lumber industry of the early 20th century makes it even more rewarding.



Killian, South Carolina

We spent over an hour with him and his wife. He gave me an oral account of the Killian Brick company, their history and why they were no longer in business. Then he gave me two bricks (which I still have). One he identified as being made in the early years, clearly etched with the name "Killian", and the other that was made after 1900.

All this is relevant because Chris Dvorscak, sent me pictures of the identical bricks I had, which he found in the wreckage of The Steamer Columbia. He was attempting to identify the ship at that time. Apparently, they now know that it was the Columbia and it is also called "Killian Wreck".

Having not heard from him this year, I followed up with an email. His answer included three photos. His brick is identical to the one given to me in Killian, SC.

What One Andreas Killian Descendant Is Doing



I Can Make a Difference

The AKDHA yearly scholarship application requires an essay entitled "I Can Make a Difference". I have often thought writing the article would be difficult to write; until a few months back.

One Saturday night, I received a phone call asking me to teach the Sunday morning Pre-Teen Bible Class (Sunday School). These children like coloring pages and wordsearch games with their lessons. I wanted a lesson on "The Valley of Dry Bones" (Ezekiel 37:1-14). Instead, I was lead to a throne scene coloring page. Isaiah 6 would be their lesson.

At class, I realize the lesson was teaching me something about myself. I received a call and I answered "Here am I. Send Me" (Isaiah 6:8b). I then realize that many times in my life, the call was answered. In 2000, George W. Killian, Dr. William "Bill" Killian and his brother, Robert L. Killian retired from publishing The Killian Family Newsletter. Charles and I were newbies to the Killian reunions. Our first reunion was 2002 and by 2005 Charles was the Killian Family Newsletter editor. Among the numerous newsletters we have published, we also had a hand in publishing "The Family of North Carolina Pioneer Andreas Killian" (2009) and "The Forefathers of North Carolina Pioneer Andreas Killian" (2011). We answered the call.

There are many AKDHA members who answer "The Call". AKDHA became a 501(c)(3), a nonprofit organization in 2009 because members, Dan Sipe, and Sandy Phillips with the help of many others answered the call. Each year there is a AKDHA Reunion Planning Committee (what a job they do!), they answer the call. AKDHA has Association Officers that keep our association going. On August 22, 1935 the first officers to answer the call were John Carpenter, President; Raymond Hefner, Vice President; and Yates Killian, Secretary and Historian.

We need more AKDHA members to answer "The Call." Last year, not one student applied for the 2017 AKDHA Scholarship Award. If just one descendant of Andreas Killian had applied, that student would have received \$1,000 paid toward tuition. I am trying to make a difference this year by putting out "The Call."
