1999 SCGS SUMMER WORKSHOP

The 1999 SCGS Summer Workshop will be held at the SC Archives and History Center on July 10, 1999. The main speaker will be Lloyd Dewitt Bockstruck, Supervisor of the Dallas (TX) Public Library Genealogy Section. Bockstruck has also been on the faculty of the Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research at Samford University in Birmingham, AL since 1974, and was the first recipient of the Institute's Outstanding Alumnus Award. He is the author of Virginia's Colonial Soldiers, Genealogical Research in Texas, and Revolutionary War Land Grants Awarded by State Governments. He received the Award of Merit from the National Genealogical Society in 1982, and was named a Fellow of the Society in 1993. He is active in numerous lineage societies and is featured in Who's Who in America. His column, "Family Tree," appears weekly in The Dallas Morning News. Other workshop presenters will include Brent H. Holcomb, C.G., John L. Andrews, Jr., and members of the staff of the S.C. Archives and History Center. FAIRFIELD'S HERITAGE

South Carolina is divided into two distinct geographical districts – the Low Country and the Up Country. Each has its own typical natural features and its own culture. The spirit of each is best expressed in its buildings, especially in its dwelling houses and its churches.

The Up-Country began as a frontier. In the northwest of this region were the villages of the Cherokee Indians. The east on either side of the river which bears their name were the tribes of the Catawbas. The land in between the Catawba and Broad Rivers were the hunting grounds of both tribes. It was into this section with its rolling green hills and fertile valleys that the white man came about the middle of the 18th century, after Glen's treaty with the Cherokee Indians in 1755. Small groups of Germans from Saxe Gotha moved up and settled along the Broad and Saluda Rivers. English and Hugenot settlers moved up from the Low Country. The largest group of settlers were the Scotch Irish who came down from Pennsylvania and Virginia. These Scotch Irish were poor, but were proud-spirited, religious and believed in education. It is natural that their culture and religion should dominate this section. Their homes were simple emphasizing the utilitarian aspects, rather than the elegance of the aristocratic mansions of the wealthy rice planters of the marsh lands.

As Fairfield became more prosperous from the culture of cotton, its plantations became larger, its homes more pretentious, and much of the Low Country influence became evident in its plantations and architecture of its houses, especially after the planters from the swamp regions moved into the hills because it was healthier. Perhaps there is no section of the state that can boast so wide a range in the architecture of its buildings as Fairfield, which range from simple straight lines of the early wood-framed houses to the picturesque homes which reflect Southern Architecture at its best.

The first buildings were built of logs, but were soon replaced by simple wood framed houses, the earliest of which had a "dog-run" through the center for the breeze. The typical "up-Country house" more than a hundred years old is the two storied wood-frame house built in an "L-shape" with a long piazza running across the front. The Up-Country house always faced the road. There was usually no basement only a small cellar with a cooling well to the rear. The kitchen of the larger dwellings was in a separate building. Servant houses, carriage house, and stables were in the back yard, and slave quarters a short distance away in the fields. The walls and frame and floors of these houses were of heart pine timber fastened together by wood pegs or hand wrought nails.

The churches were mostly rectangular in plan with a single tall steeple on front; a few had the classic Greek column and low roof. They were mostly constructed of wood. However, there were a few made from hand-made brick or stone. Nearly all the old churches had galleries for the slaves

Rich is our county in history and tradition, with its historical old dwellings from the log house to the elegant late colonial, its old churches, plantations, beautiful gardens reminiscent of the past, priceless antiques and family heirlooms. This is our heritage of which we are justly proud. We hope to share it with all who love beauty today and preserve it for the generations of tomorrow.*

EARLY HISTORY OF FAIRFIELD

Prior to 1740 what is now Fairfield County was a lush hunting ground of a number of Indian tribes. There was a trading path as early as 1729 which ran along the eastern border of the territory. It extended from Charleston to the Catawba settlement in what is now York County.

In 1740 a white man named Nightingale established a cow-pen, a sort of ranch, on Little Cedar Creek. Soon settlers poured in from many directions, principally from Charleston, Virginia, and Pennsylvania.

In the years before the Revolution the only law officers were located in Charleston. At first, when only law-abiding settlers came, this presented no problem. But at the close of the French and Indian Wars in 1758 disorderly soldiers came to Fairfield and created trouble. Local citizens, taking the problem into their own hands, organized a Regulators society whose members were known as Regulators. Their administration of justice soon made them famous in distant parts and peace was restored in Fairfield.

The early settlers of Fairfield wasted no time in establishing churches. As soon as they had erected their log cabin homes, they constructed log meeting houses for divine worship. Among the oldest of these churches were:

Fairfield was overwhelmingly loyal to the colonies in the Revolution. The names of only two prominent Tories have been handed down though it is believed that there were probably others. The chief event of the Revolution in Fairfield was the occupation of Winnsboro from October 1780 to January 1781 by the forces of Cornwallis. It was during this period that the Presbyterian minister, the Reverend William Martin, by virtue of his courage and his loyalty to the colonial cause, brought to himself lasting fame.

All records of land titles were made in Charleston prior to 1785. Fairfield citizens had a long journey to attend court or record a deed.

In 1792 "witches" were persecuted in Fairfield.

The early establishment of schools in Fairfield is a tribute to the love of learning possessed by the pioneers. Some of the early schools were:

The African-American Genealogical Research Institute, located in Matteson, Illinois, is a nonprofit organization created for the purpose of collecting and preserving African American genealogical materials. Founded by Lori Husband, the Institute has made portions of their collection available to other facilities, such as the South Carolina Historical Society. Researchers will find their task simplified because the institute has organized a Master Name Index, which includes all references to any individual listed in their collections. The institute is currently involved in completing several related projects, including a National Surname Index, a collections of Funeral Programs, a Year Book Collection and a series of vital records. Bossier Banner, June 16, 1866 3a

Died near Rocky mount, Bossier parish, Louisiana on the 5th June, 1866 of congestive chill, of only 48 hours illness, Mr. Thomas A. Wilson, brother of Dr. John D. Wilson and a native of **Fairfield Co., SC** but for the last 6 or 8 years a resident of this parish. He passed through all the dangers and conflicts of the last struggle for independence, unhurt; made a good and efficient soldier — was captured at the terrible battle of Sharpsburg; lay in prison several months; but soon after the surrender had an attack similar to the one that cut off his young life, from which he had not entirely recovered. He was in the 29th year of his age — Reader, "be ye also ready." B.

Chapter President, Mary Rice McMaster, called the meeting to order at 3:00 P.M.

Doris Odom read the January Minutes.

Charles Beach gave the 1998-Year End Treasure's Report as follows: Jan. 1998 checking balance of \$1,242.48. Total receipts for 1998: \$1,816.25 for a balance of \$3,058.73. Total disbursements: \$1,795.38 leaving a balance of \$1,263.25 for the start of 1999. Charles' January 1999 report showed a starting balance of \$1,263.25 with dues, interest and donations bringing the total to \$1,633.47. Paying out \$684.50 in postage, printing charges and SCGS dues left a balance of \$918.47 at the end of January 1999.

Mary Rice said she was not sure of programs for March or April but asked if any were interested in a visit to the new State Archives. When we were interested, she said she would check into it for a May visit.

The state July workshop will be at the new Archives.

After being introduced by Mary Rice as a Professor of History at Newberry College and it was mentioned in the minutes, Dr. Gaillard Waterfall said that he was a Professor of English.

Program by Dr. Waterfall:

Dr. Waterfall's program was on Civil War Photography and he brought along his collection to show us. His emphasis was on the South. He said that people usually collected for profit, as a hobby or for some inexplicable meaning that appealed to a person.

He said that he had started his photo collection as a young man when he in Charleston on King Street and went to an antiques shop. He was looking through a stack of twenty-five cent photographs labeled "Instant Relatives." One caught his eye and he bought it. He showed it to his mother and asked her who it was. She told him that it was a picture of his great-great-grandfather, Col. T.W. Barker, and the name Col. Barker was on the back. Since then he was hooked and his display and his background knowledge of the photos proved to us his expertise on his subject. He said that photographs permanently documents people and eras. He showed us a Telegram that had been sent to Col. Barker a few years after the war. Dr. Waterfall also has Col. Barker's Calvary sword.

The Civil War was a very sophisticated war. They had the first machine gun, first successful submarine, first use of aerial balloons, first use of trains for moving vast numbers of troops and equipment from battlefield to battlefield, the repeating rifle etc.

Photographs are important because it gives a permanent record of a person, place, and events and can be passed on to your descendents. Much of the continued interest in the Civil War is due to photographs. Among Dr. Waterfall's Civil War photographs are Daguerreotypes, images on a copper plate spotted with silver. These were usually too expensive for most people and it lost its image. That was all they had for about ten years and was invented by Louis J.M. Daguerre.

The Ambrotype was made on glass. These were clearer but the cost was still high and you couldn't clean them. Any cleaning would rub away the picture. The Tintype was cheap and you could get it matted, framed or in a case. It also came in different sizes. The soldiers could afford these and they became aware of their own immortality and would have them made with their loved ones. Locks of hair, a poem or other mementos might be placed behind the print. Ferrotype is another name for tintype pictures.

Another, even cheaper way of making photographs was the Carte de Visite or CDV's. This was a small mounted photograph with the person's name on it that was left as calling cards. Sometimes the individuals signed them on the back. They were popular even with well-known people of that time. Today, some of the signed ones at auction may bring \$6,500.00 and up.

Mathew Brady pictures were the "Hallmark" of pictures made during the Civil War but there were others. One of them was George Cook who was the Mathew Brady of the Confederacy. He made the first picture of the Yankee Armada attacking an Ironclad. Another photographer was Richard Werin (I think this is how Dr. Waterfall said this name.) who made pictures of Columbia after Sherman left. Werin was so depressed by all the devastating war pictures he made that he committed suicide.

Dr. Waterfall's photograph collection included samples of the kinds of photographs that he talked about as well as an old album with flocking on the cover and a double clasp to hold it closed.

We had a short question and answer period. The meeting was then adjourned.

PROGRAM:

Margie Richardson, A Staff Member at Richland County Library, told of the services offered at the library with the focus on the Walker Local History Room. The Walker Room contains selective historical and some current material focusing on the midlands and surrounding area. Genealogical materials are limited and materials may not be removed from the area. A copier is available to use in the LHR.

Highlights of the LHR include: The SC Vertical File; City, County, Church and SC general histories; local city and telephone directories; SC Legislative Manuals; The SC Historical and Genealogical Magazine; The Official Records of the Civil War; Mill's Atlas and Topographical maps; Biographies of famous South Carolinians and SC census indexes for 1790-1870.

The Vertical Files are the most used and with a Library card you can order material, up to 4 at a time, from the catalog from other Libraries.

There are historical displays that are changed about every six months, located in two cabinets. Also, there is a calendar of events that comes out every month. Every March there is a program on the women who lived in the Hampton-Preston House. The Library also has an Oral History Project and a Photo Collection where one can scan the photos and send them over the Internet.

The Cage has a collection from SC.

The Library, located at Assembly and Hampton Streets in Columbia, has list of Internet sites and a list of Genealogists who will do research for a fee.

At the end of the program we had a Q & A session with Ms. Richardson.

The meeting was then adjourned.
