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

ESSEX COUNTY COURT HOUSE.
TAPPAHANNOCK, VA.

"I feel as we stand in this court room, whose walls are hung with portraits, and tables to memorialize the worthy men of Essex, that we are standing on holy ground.

Look around and see R.M.T.Hunter, Statesman, senator and farfamed, and near him his nephew, Honorable Muscoe Russell Garnett, gifted orator, Speaker of the House in Congress; while that distinguished was in the Senate. - - - Look again if you will, and see Judge Muscoe Garnett of Ben Lomond, the tablet to him and to his seven sons tell its story.

Passing into the Clerks office, there you will find rich and rare history of 'yc olden tyme, the seventeenth centruy and on: wills that are unique as they are amusing: court order for celebrating marriages with rum, and sugar to sweeten the same, and so many pounds of tobacco to meet the cost of the festival; land grants, and other sundry documents."

BOULWARE --- BOWLER FAMILY

One of the original Bowler family emigrants in Virginia was Thomas Bowler who was living in Yorktown as early as 1653 and who later moved up the Rappahannock River to a place which still bears the name "Bowler's Wharf". It is believed that Thomas Bowler was married twice, his second wife being Tabitha Edlow, the daughter of Lieutenant Colonel Matthew Edlow, who came to Virginia on the Neptune in 1618.

The William and Mary Quarterly VI, gives the following: "Tabitha (born 1648) half sister of John Edlow) executrix of their mother, married shortly after 1670, Colonel Thomas Bowler of Rappahannock. Thomas Bowler first appears as a Headright (four adventures) in a patent to Colonel George Read, of York, 25 February 1658; and in his own right had a grant of 504 acres in Rappahannock County, 28th September 1674.

In 1674 he was commissioned a member of the Governors Council.

His will was proved in Rappahannock 2nd July 1679. It mentions his friends Colonel Nicholas Spencer and Captain Thomas Gouldman; a minor son James Bowler; daughter Elizabeth Bowler; Child Anne Bowler; wife Tabitha, Executrix."

There was a James Bowler, a contemporary and quite probably a half brother or nephew of Thomas Bowler, married Mary Gray, as shown in the Will of William Gray, which was probated in Rappahannock County, 3rd February 1673. This will names his son-in-law, James Bowler, grand child Elizabeth Bowler, and daughter Mary Gray; Executors, my wife Mandlin Gray and son-in-law, James Bowler.

The old Virginia records show the family name was spelled in various ways, such as, Bowler, Bowlere, Boulwer, Boulware, Boulwar, Bowlware and Boulwere. The Virginia Magazine of History and Biography says: "There is a deed of 4th June 1690, recorded in Essex by which William Bowler and Elizabeth, his wife pass lands ---- to Thomas Page. There are in Essex County numerous records of the Boulware family (pronounced Bowler) of the same origin".

The copies of wills mentioned in this volume come mostly from the Court House at Tappahannock, Essex County, Virginia. Essex County is narrow and long with its length the South bank of the Rappahannock. It is bounded on the South and West by King and Queen, and Caroline Counties,

to which many of the Boulware families moved. Unfortunately, the records of King and Queen were destroyed in the Confederate War. By the time of the Revolution some of the Boulwares had moved to Kentucky, and later they passed on to Missouri and other western states.

Preliminary to the American Revolution, a Committee was appointed in Essex County to protect American rights against the British. Two of its members were Thomas Boulware and Muscoe Garnett. Muscoe Garnett was a grandson of Salvator (or Sylvester) Muscoe, a planter and Justice who served as Sheriff of Essex and later was Burgess from Essex County. A copy of Salvator Muscoe's will is shown later on in the text.

There is a tradition in the Boulware family that Mary, the daughter of Salvator Muscoe, married William Boulware, said to be the father of Muscoe Boulware I, of Fairfield County, South Carolina. This is probably true, but there is no evidence in Salvator Muscoe's will, as this daughter was unmarried at the time of his death. Further research should be made in the land transfer records at Tappahannock Court House.

Judge Neil of Winnsboro, S. C., in his notes, says that shortly after the Revolution, Muscoe Boulware and two cousins came from Virginia to Fairfield County. One of these cousins is identified as Obadiah Boulware; the other cousin was probably a Pickett. The Boulwares and Picketts intermarried for several generations.

Members of the Obadiah Boulware branch may find a copy of the will of Thomas Boulware (father of Obadiah) which was probated at Tappahannock, Virginia, 18th April, 1785. Obadiah was executor of his fathers will.

The genealogical tables in this volume were prepared by James Richmond Boulware II, and Judge Thomas M. Boulware.

Most of the old Virginia wills were copied by Miss McKinney of Washington, D. C. who gave them to Colonel Richard H. McMaster.

Note by Author: Through the kindness of Colonel Richard H. McMaster, retired and now living in Washington, D. C. we are using his brief introductory remarks and other valuable contributions to this research work, from which we have gathered enough information to complete a "partial" history of the Bowler-Boulware family.

THOMAS BOWLER was born 1608 and died 1679. His will dated March 17th 1678, and recorded July 2nd 1679 in Rappahannock County, Virginia, mentions his friends Colonel Nicholas Spencer and Captain Thomas Gouldman, minor son James Bowler, daughter Elizabeth, and Anne Bowler, and wife Tabitha (Edlow) Executrix. See Will Book 2 pages 133-137 (later shown in this text) and copy.

This daughter Anne married Richard Cocke, the younger, of Bremer. She was born 1675 and died in 1705 - Reference William and Mary College Quarterly for January 1895 page 204.

An article by James Southall in Virginia Magazine of History and Biography says that Tabitha Cocke Adams owns that part of her Grand-father's estate where Bowler's Wharf is located.

There is a deed of June 4th 1690, recorded in Essex County, by which William Bowler and Elizabeth his wife pass lands in Rappahannock, originally granted to Thomas Page, and by him conveyed to William Bowler and his brother James Bowler February 26th 1688.

The will of William Gray, probated 1673, shows that his daughter Mary married James Bowler.

The will of James Boulware dated December 13th, 1713, and probated February 17th 1718, Tappahannock, Will book 3, page 77, mentions his widow "Maiory Boulware" and his children James, Mark, Benjamin, John, William, Mary and Grace. This will was executed by "Marg. F. Boulware". We note that each time, he wrote the name Boulware.

Benjamin Boulware of St Anne Parish. The will of Elizabeth Boulware dated 1772, Book 13 page 60, shows that she was the daughter of John Pitts, and married Benjamin Boulware, and had a son Muscoe.

Reference: Va. Magazine of History and Biography, Vol. 20 P. 76

Will of Michael Sparke, Citizen and stationer of London, Parish of Sepulchres, without Newgate, 22d October 1653. "I give the remainder - - - with the money owing to me by Mr. Thomas Bowler and Mr. Anderson, of Yorktowne, in Virginia, to the rest of my grand-children equally between them."

Comment by the editor: Thomas Bowler was, no doubt, Thomas Boler, afterwards of Rappahannock County, who was appointed to the council in 1675 and died in 1679.

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Same ref. as above, Volume 29 page 353.

Will of --- Ludlow: "To George Webster, son of Captain Richard Webster of Jamestown, the silver tankard that Mr. Bowler bought in the year 1655."

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Note: From the above it will be seen that Thomas Bowler was in business in Yorktown as early as 1653. A study of the passenger lists of the boats might give the exact date.

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Note: The original Bowler settlement was at Bowlers Wharf, in Rappahannock County between the Rappahannock and York Rivers. Afterwards, I believe, Essex County was formed, then King and Queen, and Caroline Counties. King and Queen County was formed in 1691. At King and Queen C.H. is St. Stephens Church; no records there since 1865. St. Johns Parish was in this county. St. Margarets Parish was established in 1721.

The key to the Boulware Genealogy is in the county records of Essex, King and Queen, and Caroline Counties, - such as records of marriages, wills, land transfers.

After Thomas Bowler was established in business in Virginia and had gained prominence, there were two others with him, whose success was also noted, namely James Bowler and William Bowler. We know that Thomas Bowler was from England, but we cannot say for a certainty when and where James and William Bowler came from. It appears that these men were closely related. These brothers we believe, were half brothers or nephews of Thomas Bowler, thirty or forty years younger, as we can see from dates of their wills.

The wills of contemporaries of Thomas Bowler (1678) are as follows: William Lane 1662, William Gray 1673, Thomas Bland 1678, Warnock Gray 1696, and Robert Ply 1696. Then come wills of a later generation; James Bowler, 1713-18, John Bowler 1714, and John William 1714, 35 years after the death of Thomas Bowler in 1679. These men lived to an old age, at that time 70 years, and that would make the birth of James Bowler I about 1643-48.

We see from William Gray's will that in 1673 there was a James Bowler who was mentioned as son-in-law, and whom we believe was born about 1643-48, and the records show that Thomas Bowler married Tabitha Edlow "after 1670", and his will in 1678 mentions a minor son, James, whose birth was about 1672 or 73; and from then there were two James Bowlers.

In 1696 Warnock Gray, in his will bequeathed to Sarah Bowler, daughter of James Bowler.

#1 JAMES BOWLER the ancestor was born about 1643 or 1648. His will of Dec. 13th 1713 was recorded in Essex County, Tappahannock, Virginia Feb. 17th 1718, and mentions his wife Mariory Bowler and probated as Marg. F. Bowler, Executrix, was Mary Gray, as mentioned in William Gray's will probated 1673. Children (See page 4)

William Bowler, brother of James Bowler (Sr.) married Elizabeth Gray, --- See deed of William Bowler and wife Elizabeth to Timothy Davis Feb. 26th 1690, and a division of land between William Boulware and James Boulware in 1674. Also a deed of William Boulware and brother James to Thomas Page in 1688. There is no record of children.

SALVATOR MUSCOE FAMILY

SALVATOR MUSCOE born 1674 d June 16/1741. Age 67. Appears first as a lawyer, 1702. He emigrated from England as shown by his will. Lived forty years in Essex County, Virginia, and served his country successfully as Justice, Sheriff and Burgess from 1736 to 1740.

Essex County records show that he had six daughters:

Muscoe Boulware born 1758, married Nancy Pickett, migrated to South Carolina about 1790.

Salvator Muscoe, the emigrant, was the son of Salvator Muscoe, a stone carver, of Monmouth Street, St. Giles-in-the-field, London. He had a sister Mrs. Jane Collingwood of England, who bequeathed to him her stock in the Royal Exchange Assurance Company to the value of 400 pounds sterling. (Reference Va. Magazine History & Biography Vol. XXX11-251).

Salvator Muscoe left no son to carry on his surname, but through his six daughters he has numerous descendants in Virginia, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Louisiana, Texas and other states. In each generation to the present one, Muscoe appears as the given name of male descendants of this verile old ancestor, particularly is this true among his descendants in Fairfield and Chester Counties, S. C.

William and Mary Quarterly Vol. XVIII-4 gives the following: "Salvator Muscoe first appears as a Lawyer living in Essex County; he represented his country as Burgess. He died in 1741, and in his will, proved June 16th 1741, he tells us that he was born 1674; that his wife was Mary; (probably a sister of Colonel Beverly whom he made Executor of his will). He names his grand-son Muscoe Garnett and daughters Mary, Frances, Tabitha, Jane, and Sarah Muscoe."

The Essex County quit rent roll of 1704 shows that Salvator Muscoe then owned only 100 acres, while his neighbor James Boulware owned 1000 acres. However, when he died he was a man of prominence in his county, and a large land holder.

The Virginia Council Book, Minutes of April 29, 1730, shows him as appointed Sheriff of Essex County on that date. At the time of his death he had been a Burgess for about six years.

The following references to him in the Virginia Council Journal were recently published in the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography Vol. XXXII pages 251 and 255:

" A petition of Joseph Smith of the County of Essex, Gent. complaining of Salvator Muscoe one of the Justices of the said County, being read at the board, it is ordered that the further examination thereof be deferred till the sixth day of February next, at which time, both the said parties together with such witnesses as they think necessary for proving their respective allegations, are directed to attend this board, and that the Sheriff of such county is ordered to summon such persons as either party shall desire, to give evidence in the matter of the said complaint."

The disputants apparently, compromised their differences, for action seems to terminate here.

Among Salvator Muscoe's descendants in Virginia may be noted his grandson Muscoe Garnett of "Elmwood", who was a member of Congress, and of the Virginia State Convention to amend the Constitution; also his great-grandson Muscoe R. H. Garnett, who was an alumnus of the University of Virginia, and a distinguished member of both the U.S. and Confederate Congresses.

In the states farther to the south, the line of descent passed through Muscoe Boulware and his wife Nancy Pickett who moved to Flint Hill, Fairfield County, S. C. after the Revolution. Among their descendants in Fairfield County were, Musco Boulware II, III and IV, Musco Pickett, Muscoe Robertson, Musco Raines, Musco Higgins, et al.

Of this Fairfield line of the present generation in (1926) seven are now officers in the Regular Military service of the United States, viz: one Colonel of the General Staff, one Colonel of Field Artillery, one Major of Marines, two Lieutenants of Field Artillery, and two Lieutenants of Infantry. (This does not include the officers of the Second World War.)

According to family tradition Mary Salvator Muscoe, daughter of Salvator Muscoe, is buried within the Boulware Walls at Flint Hill, Fairfield County, but there is no tombstone or record of this.

Note: The above compilation was made by Colonel Richard H. McMaster, of the Field Artillery, U. S. Army, retired.

We have no definite record that William Boulware, the son of Mark Boulware, was the William Boulware who married Mary Muscoe, but we follow the line of succeeding generations from James Bowler to determine which William Boulware it was, whom tradition says married Mary Muscoe.

From statements in Wills, and the names of members of the different families, we firmly believe that our conclusions are correct; namely, that the line comes down from JAMES BOWLER, and through his son MARK -- then through Mark's second son WILLIAM. This is the only William Boulware who was a contemporary of Mary Muscoe, as we figure it.

The earliest traces we have of him in Fairfield County, S. C. refer to him as Captain Bowler and Captain Boler. We find further items of interest from some early letters of research from Colonel McMaster stating that in the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography Vol. 20 page 205 the following, "May 11th 1750 - William Boulware, Gentleman, as Lieutenant of a troop in a Militia qualified." And in Googlers Gleanings of Virginia History, Page 187, William Boulware is listed as serving in Colonel Theoderich Blands First Virginia Regiment in 17--.

There were references as to "Tudor Hall" at Newton and to Travelers Rest", where William lived, and where he was known locally as "Lord Boulware". His house was burned, but a modern brick home was built and is still standing. They call it "Lord" Boulware's place. A letter from Col. McMaster in 1933 said he had seen the place near Fredericksburg, Va. which Dr. James R. Boulware(I) first described in his war diary, as Jack Boulware's place.

It is a very old two-story brick building, eight miles southeast of Fredericksburg, and was built originally by the Brooke family. He says John Esten Cooke was living at one of the Muscoe family houses when he wrote "Surrey of Eagle's Nest", suggestive of the name of Musco Boulware's home in Fairfield, South Carolina.

"The Boulwares in Virginia had been Episcopalians, but in the absence of this church in the new home, they affiliated with Mount Olivet. They became devout Presbyterians, and took on the inhibitions as to dancing, card playing, etc., but which did not exclude conviviality and the flowing bowl".

Benjamin Boulware and wife were members of Mount Olivet Church and she is buried there, but he was taken back within the Boulware Walls at Flint Hill.

There were both before and after the war between the states, still occasional visits with the relatives in Virginia. Some of the Virginia Boulwares had places in Florida, and in driving through, made stop-overs in Fairfield. At intervals there were visits made to King and Queen, and Caroline Counties, and to the Boulwares near Frederick.

They were proud of their Muscoe relatives. Muscoe Garnett became a Congressman from Virginia, and his son Muscoe R. H. Garnett was in Congress at the same time his distinguished Uncle H. M. T. Hunter was a U. S. Senator.

Muscoe R. H. Garnett was the proponent of slavery and led in the Secession movement in Virginia. He was afterwards in the Confederate Congress.

The Will of Salvator Muscoe shows that he came from England; and the contemporaries of Thomas Bowler indicate that he also was from England.

Judge Thomas McC. Boulware, of Allendale, S. C., reports having seen an article in The State, (Columbia, S. C.) several years ago quoting a Hollywood authority to the effect that the "derby" hat was originally known as the "Bowler", having been designed and first produced by a Thomas Bowler, a hatter in London.

In Burk's Enc. of Heraldys, there appears no coat of arms for the Bowler family, but in Fairbain's Crests of the leading family of Great Britain and Ireland, appears on page 67 "Bowler", a boar's head, etc. with plate.

Here are a few other items from the research manuscripts of Col. McMaster. Quoting one of his findings from "Virginia Magazine and Biography, which reads as follows: "Reverting back to the South Carolina records, it was found that Dr. Edrington in his Historical notes of Fairfield, mentioned Muscoe Boulware of Virginia who settled near Horse Creek. Of course this identifies our original Boulware 1758, who lived near Flint Hill in the "Eagle House", and who built the walls of the old Boulware cemetery". They came from King and Queen County, of Tidewater

The following quotation is from Mrs. Ella Boulware Beaty, of Charleston, S. C. "Eagle House", Flint Hill, got its name from "a large golden eagle, with wings outspread, measuring six feet from tip to tip, which was over the great door to the house. It was said to be a very impressive sight". This tradition had come down by word of mouth through the years, and I have never seen any disposal of it in a will, but it may have been considered a part of the house, and stayed there as long as the house remained. Nor do I know what became of "Eagle House". Mrs. Mary Wylie Strange of Chester, S.C. says the house was burned by Sherman's Army in the war between the states.

"Again the archives of Virginia in the volume entitled 'list of the Revolutionary Soldiers of Virginia' also the Muscoe Boulware reference to war service being Auditors account XXVII-II8." This record merely states the name of Muscoe Boulware as being in the Militia, and that he was paid in so many pounds and shillings. However this is all that is necessary to enable any descendants to join the "sons and daughters" of the Revolution.

Colonel McMaster states further that "satisfied of the identity of the families, I attempted to work back from the original Carolina ancestor, Muscoe Boulware I. No records being available, I gathered a few of the family traditions obtained verbally or by correspondence with relatives, were about as follows:

(A) Muscoe Boulware (1758-1825) and his wife Nancy Pickett 1762-1836) came to South Carolina at the close of the Revolutionary War from King and Queen County, near Rappahannock River. They brought slaves with them, and built the cemetery walls near the old house. These walls are very massive and are still standing, They are 150 feet each way, and are two and half feet high. The gate-way is in good condition, the columns two and half feet square, seven feet high, and with an iron door.

(B) The father of Muscoe Boulware was William Boulware who married Mary Salvator Muscoe.

(C) According to Cousin Mary Woodward Boulware these parents of Muscoe Boulware are also buried in the old cemetery at Flint Hill. She says that as a young girl, she saw the tombstone with the inscription "Mary Salvator Bowler". That the tradition is that in their old age they came to South Carolina and died here.

(D) That Muscoe Boulware I, had a brother Gray, who came from Virginia in 1802 to visit him.

(E) That the family connections in Virginia were the best, that there were well known statesmen among them, including one Minister to a foreign country.

THE BOULWARE WALLS

This burying ground was established shortly after the Revolution by Muscoe Boulware (1758-1825) and his wife Nancy Pickett, and they rest within its walls. They came from King and Queen County, of Tidewater Virginia, bought land on the Flint Hill ridge, and built a home which they called "Eagle House".

When Muscoe Boulware died, in 1825, he made bequests in his will to ten children, leaving the home place to his unmarried son Doctor William R. A. Boulware, but providing that his wife, Nancy Boulware should continue to live there.

When Dr. Boulware died in 1832, he devised the home place to his oldest brother, Thomas Boulware, but made legal provisions for the cemetery by stating, "I do hereby reserve one acre of land which I appropriate and set apart as a family burying ground, with a suitable way of access to same."

His mother continued to reside at the old home place until her death in 1836. Three of her daughters married Pickett Cousins, and both Picketts and Boulwares are buried within the old walls. The walls are quite massive, of rubble stone construction, about two feet thick, and extend nearly two hundred feet each way. The gateway pillars are of dressed stone with wrought-iron gate.

There is a tradition that the first burial in the cemetery, was that of William Boulware, father of Muscoe I, but there is no tombstone; neither is there a monument to Muscoe I, nor to his wife, Nancy Pickett. The earliest monument is that of Muscoe II, dated 1832. The latest is that of Sallie Raines Robertson dated 1889. There are a number of other monuments, among them one carrying only the inscription "My Mother". (Judge Neil's mother)

It is proposed now (in 1946) to raise sufficient funds to set up a respectable marker to the memory of Muscoe Boulware I, and Nancy Pickett, who following the custom of the times, laid out this family burying ground.



TRANSCRIPT of an article published in the
Winnsboro News and Herald. Signed Antequarian
in 1926.

Ten miles east of Winnsboro on the Flint Hill ridge sloping toward the Wateree River, is situated one of the antiquities of Fairfield County, "Boulware Walls", the old cemetery of the Boulware family.

This old cemetery is of unusual extent for a family burying ground, and its walls are of such massive construction that trees of considerable size are growing from the tops of the walls, which are still in good state of preservation.

In addition to the Scotch-Irish and French element, which constituted so much of the original settlement of the County, there was a considerable inflow of settlers from the Tidewater region of Virginia. Muscoe Bowler (Boulware), the pioneer of his family in Fairfield, belonged to the last named contingent. At the close of the Revolution, he with his wife, Nancy Pickett, moved to S. C. from the vicinity of Bowlers Wharf on the lower Rappahannock River where the family had settled more than a century before. He established his home near the site of the old cemetery, and lived in what was known as the "Eagle House".

Thirty years ago the brick piles of the old chimney were still standing, and there were a few of the old fruit trees remaining from the home orchard.

Muscoe Bowler (Boulware) was a descendant of Thomas Bowler who was living in Yorktown, Va. as early as 1653, and who later moved to Rappahannock and represented that County on the Governor's Council in 1675, and died in 1679.

Thomas Boulware's wife was a grand-daughter of Colonel Matthew Edloe who came to Virginia on the Neptune in 1618, and who was a member of the house of Burgess in 1629. Muscoe Boulware acquired his rather unusual first name from his mother who was the daughter of Salvator Muscoe, a Lawyer, a justice, and a Burgess from 1736 to 1740, for Essex County, Va.

Edington's historical notes of Fairfield County mentions Muscoe Boulware as a soldier of the Revolution. This is confirmed in the Va. State Library where his name appears in the "List of Revolutionary Soldiers of Va." The reference being in the Auditors account XXVII-118.

His father who was a Revolutionary soldier in Col. Bland's first Va. Regiment is also reputed to be buried in this cemetery, but this cannot be verified, as there are no tombstones at the present time.

There are numerous unmarked graves of which there can only be surmise; the most recent tombstone is that erected to the memory of the mother of the late John J. Neil, which bears only the inscription "my Mother".

In all, four generations of the name Muscoe Boulware lived in Fairfield County. The descendants of Musco Boulware I, moved to Chester County, and the name Musco has come down through Musco, son of Thomas McCullough and grandson of Musco I, and his son Gray who has two sons, Gray and Musco. These two sons are now living in Memphis, Tenn. Also through Musco W., son of Benjamin Boulware, #1-2.

It is rather characteristic of the Boulware family that their migrations were along of longitude instead of latitude, and that they were all River family, living first along the York River and then the Rappahannock, the Wateree and the rivers and Lakes of Florida. At least one branch has returned to Virginia, in the persons of the family of the distinguished Engineer Thomas McCullough Boulware who was born and raised in South Carolina.

There are still many members of the Boulware name still living in Fairfield County and through inter-marriage; there are also numerous descendants among the families Buchanan, Woodward, Neil, Hall, Stokes, McMasters, Matthews, Picketts Kennerly, Stevenson, McDonald and others.

The excuse for this article is to bring this old graveyard to the attention of these younger descendants in the hope that adequate steps be taken for its preservation.

The land upon which it lies is at the present time in the kindly possession of Mr. Robert C. Gooding.

Dear Sir:

Your letter of the 8th inst. has been received. The oldest member of my family connections that I know of are George T. Boulware, New London P.O., Caroline County, Virginia, and Gray Boulware of Missouri, whose post office I do not know now, but will try and procure and send you. He is much the oldest member of the family I know of. He moved from Caroline County, Virginia, to Missouri about 18 or 20 years ago.

I have never attempted to keep the run of the collateral branches of my family. My great-grand father was Andrew Boulware of Caroline County. My grand-father, LeRoy Boulware was his only son, and my father was A. M. Boulware. My great-grand father had several brothes whose names I do not now recall. Dr. Muscoe Boulware of Caroline County, who died some years ago, a bachelor, and a talented and prominent man, was descended from one of these brothers, and Gray Boulware, whom I have mentioned above, from another one.

Just before the war Mr. Tom Boulware of S.C. visited Mr. Gray Boulware's and was at my father's house. He was a relative of ours but I do not know in what degree. The records of Caroline Co. are destroyed and I am sorry I can not help you more. Any data you have on the subject I would be glad if you would give me the benefit of it.

WILL OF JAMES BOULWARE, of St. Anne Parish, Essex County, Virginia, dated December 13th, 1713.

Mentions his wife Margaret F. (or Margery) Boulware; his three oldest sons James, Mark, and Benjamine; his sons John and William; his two daughters Mary and Grace. he gives to his sons James and Mark the land on which they now live and to them also one half of the land upon which he now lives; to his son Benjamin he gives the other half of the land upon which he (James) now lives. He gives to his sons John and William the seat of land which he bought from Warick Gray; also makes provision for his widow and minor children and for the division of his servants. His wife is named as Executrix.

The will was presented in court by his widow on February 17, 1718. Witnesses: James Noell and Richard Edwards.

Ref. Will Book No. 3, Page 77, Tappahanook, Essex County, Virginia.

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THE WILL OF SALVATOR MUSCOE, GENT., on file at Tappahannock, Va. gives:- To my grandson Muscoe Garnett, son of Elizabeth, the plantation whereon I now live.

To my daughter Mary, the plantation called Robins Quarter, and half of the adjoining land purchased from William, Richard, and Robert Stokes, and Captain James Garnett.

To my daughter Frances, the other half of the land at Robins Quarter purchased by me as above.

To my daughter Tabitha, one half of the land purchased by me from John Moss, where my Quarter is called Rogers Quarter.

To my daughter Jane, the plantation whereon John Driver now lives, and adjoining land.

My Wife MARY MUSCOE to have the use of the plantation whereon I now live for her natural life,- my unmarried daughters also to continue to live there.

To my daughter Mary, four negroes,- Joe, Robin, Hagar, and Sarah.

To my daughter Frances, four negroes,- James Bowing, Harry Jacob Bowing, and Lucy.

To my daughter Tabitha, five negroes,- Monmouth, Roger, Winny, George and Nancy.

To my Wife Mary, the use of seven negroes during her life, Bristol, Joyce, Essex, Candillah, Daphne, Mingo, and Jenny; and after her death, all to my daughter Sarah, except Mingo, whom I give to my daughter Mary.

The Royal Exchange Assurance Stock, given me by my sister Mrs. Jane Collingwood, of the Kingdom of Great Britian, to be divided among my children Mary, Frances, Tabiths, Jane, and Sarah Muscoe, and my grand-son Muscoe Garnett.

Executors,- my beloved wife Mary Muscoe and my kind and loving friend Colonel William Beverly.

Signed on the 10th June, 1740; proved on the 16th June 1841.

LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT OF MUSCOE BOULWARE (1758-1825)

In the name of GOD amen:

I, Muscoe Boulware, Senior, of the District of Fairfield and State of South Carolina, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, and being desirous of disposing of all such worldly estate as it has pleased God to help me with, do make and ordain this, my last will and testament, in manner following, that is to say,- after the payment of my just debts and funeral expenses,

Item 1st: I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife, Nancy Boulware, the seven following negroes, namely, Matilda and her five children, Judy, Adeline, Archey, Hannah, and Charlotte, and a young negro woman known by the name of Young Esther,- absolutely and forever and at her death to dispose of them according to her own will and pleasure. I also give and bequeath unto my said wife all my household and kitchen furniture, all my farming utensils, including my wagon and cotton gin, all my farm stock of every kind, consisting of horses, hogs, and cattle, etc., and all my crop consisting of corn, cotton, and every kind of produce that may be on hand at the time of my death.

I further give unto my beloved wife, the use, benefit and services of the following eleven negroes, viz: a mulatto boy named Daniel, a boy named George, a woman named Riner, a boy named Moses, a man named Dick, two other boys named James and Squire, a woman named Milly, another woman named Lucy, and her son Dave, and a man named Ephriam, for and during the term of her natural life.

My will further is that my funeral expenses and all my just debts be paid out of the money in hand, and the debts owing to me at the time of my death, and out of the profits and earnings of the above property.

Item 2d; I give, devise, and confirm unto my eldest son, Thomas Boulware, and to his heirs and assigns forever, all that parcel, piece, or tract of land, containing 307 acres more or less, situate in the district and state aforesaid, on the South side of Wateree Creek, water of Watteree River, for which I gave him a deed of gift, bearing the date the 9th day of April 1823; I further give unto my said son Thomas Boulware, (at my wifes death) a mulatto boy named Daniel, to him and his heirs and assigns forever.

Item 3d: I give and bequeath unto my three grand children, Kisannah Pickett, Musco Pickett, Micajah Pickett, children of my daughter Elizabeth Pickett, deceased, the three following negroes, viz: a woman of the name of Minney, and her two children Riner and Esther, equally to be divided between them, to them and their heirs forever.

Item 4th: I give devise and confirm to my daughter Nancy Pickett and to her heirs and assigns forever, all that piece, parcel, or tract of land, containing 100 acres, more or less, situate and being in the district and state aforesaid, for which I gave her a deed of gift, bearing date the 9th day of April 1823. I further give and bequeath to my said daughter Nancy Pickett, and to her heirs forever, the six following negroes, viz: a woman by the name of Fanny, and her five children, namely, Eady, Dublin, Abram, Esther, and Washington; and also at the death of my wife, a negro boy named George, to her and heirs forever.

Item 5th: I give, devise, and confirm unto my son Reuben P. Boulware, and to his heirs and assigns forever, all that piece, parcel, or tract of land, containing 248 acres and $\frac{3}{4}$, more or less, situate and being in the district and state aforesaid, on the waters of Dutchmans Creek, for which I gave him a deed of gift, bearing date of the 9th day of April 1823. I further give and bequeath unto my said son, Reuben P. Boulware, (at the death of my wife) a negro woman by the name of Riner, to him and his heirs forever.

Item 6th: I give, devise and confirm unto my son Benjamin Boulware, and to his heirs and assigns forever, all that piece, parcel, or tract of land, containing 247 acres, more or less, situate and being in the state aforesaid, for which I gave him a deed of gift bearing the date the 9th day of April 1823. I further give and bequeath unto my son Benjamin Boulware, (at the death of my wife) a negro boy by the name of Moses, to him and his heirs forever.

Item 7th: I give and bequeath unto my daughter Sarah Pickett, and to her heirs forever, the three following three negroes, viz: a woman by the name Lidia, and her daughter Riner, and a girl by the name of Chloe; and also (at the death of my wife) a negro man by the name of Dick, to her and heirs forever.

Item 8th: I give, bequeath, and confirm unto my son, Musco Boulware, Jr. and to his heirs, assigns forever, the several parcels or tracts of land, to-wit: one tract containing 199 acres, more or less, situate and being in the state and district aforesaid, on a branch of the Wateree Creek; the other containing 63 acres, more or less, situate and being in the district and state aforesaid, on the south side of the Wateree Creek, for each of which, said tracts of land, I gave him a separate deed of gift, both bearing date of the 9th day of April 1823. I further give, devise, and confirm unto my said son, Musco Boulware, Jr. and to my son William R. Boulware, and to their several heirs and assigns forever, equally and as tenants in common, a certain other parcel or tract of land,

situate and being in the district and state aforesaid, on both sides of Dutchmans Creek, containing 172 acres, more or less, for which I gave my said sons Musco, and William, a joint deed of gift bearing date the 9th day of April 1823. I further give and bequeath unto my said son Musco Boulware Jr. (at the death of my wife) two negro boys, one by the name of James and the other by the name of Squire, to him and his heirs forever.

Item 9th: I give and bequeath unto my daughter Catherine Rains, and to her heirs forever, the four following negroes, viz: Abby, and her three children, William, Henson, and Cudjo; and also (at my wife's death) another negro woman by the name of Milly, to her and her heirs forever.

Item 10th: I give, devise and bequeath unto my son, William R. Boulware, (in addition to his part of the above mentioned tract of land given to him and my son Musco Boulware jointly) all that plantation or tract of land where I now reside, situate in the district and state aforesaid, containing 346 acres, more or less, for which I gave my son William R. Boulware, a deed of gift, bearing date of 9th of April 1823; he permitting my wife, Nancy Boulware, to live on and have the use of the said plantation for and during the time of her natural life, as mentioned above in the first item of this, my last will and testament. I further give and bequeath to my said son, William R. Boulware (at my wifes death) a negro woman named Lucy and her son Dan, to him and his heirs forever.

Item 11th: I give and bequeath unto my daughter, Eliza Ann Boulware, and to her heirs forever the following five negroes, viz: a negro woman by the name of Esther, and her two children Saul and Gusty, a negro girl by the name of Ann, and another by the name of Venus; also (at my wifes death) a negro man by the name of Ephraim, to her and her heirs forever.

And I do hereby appoint, nominate, and constitute, my said beloved wife Nancy Boulware, together with my sons Thomas Boulware, Benjamin Boulware, Musco Boulware Jr., William R. Boulware, with My trusty friend, Colonel Jesse Havis, Executors of this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills by me made, whatsoever. In witness whereunto, I have here set my hand and seal this 15th day of December A.D. 1824.

Last Will And Testament of NANCY PICKETT BOULWARE, of FLINT HILL.

The State of South Carolina.

I, Nancy Boulware, of Fairfield District, of the state aforesaid, being weak in body, but sound and disposing mind and memory, do make, publish, and declare this my last will and testament, that is to say,-

Item 1. I give and bequeath to my son, Thomas Boulware, two negroes, John and Milly his wife, for and during the term of his natural life, and at the decease of my said son, I give and bequeath said negroes and their future increase to his two children, Musco Boulware and Nancy Boulware, equally to be divided between them. I also give to my said son two other negroes, Amster and Randal, to be equally divided between their two sons, William Boulware and Thomas Boulware, at his death. I also give to my said son one round table, one couch, one bedstead, bed and furniture, my barouche and white horse.

Item 2. I give to my son Benjamin Boulware, a negro girl called Charlotte, and a negro boy called Kendal, for and during the term of his natural life, and at his decease I give said girl Charlotte and her increase to his daughter, Nancy Boulware, and said boy Kendal to his son, Musco Boulware. I also give my son, Benjamin Boulware, three other negroes, viz: Flora and her two children Ella and Tom. I also give to my said son my large dining table during his natural life, and at his death, to go to his son Musco Boulware, if living, otherwise to be disposed of as my said son shall see fit. I also give to my said son my cupboard, my small folding table having one drawer, one bedstead and furniture, and my sorrel mare.

Item 3. I give to my daughter, Sarah Pickett, wife of John B. Pickett, two negro women Lucy and Adeline, for and during her natural life, and at her decease to be equally divided among all her children.

Item 4. I give to my daughter, Catherine Raines, wife of William G. Raines, my negro woman Fanny and her two children, Ann and Sarah, for and during the term of her natural life, and at her decease is to go to her daughter Nancy Raines; Fanny and Sarah and their natural increase to be equally divided among all her other children of my said daughter Catherine Raines. I also give and bequeath to my said daughter, Catherine Raines, during the term of her natural life, and at her death, to her children equally to be divided among them, the tract of land joining the plantation where said William G. Raines now lives.

Item 5. I give to my daughter, Eliza Barber, wife of John G. Barber, a negro woman called Judy, for and during the term of her natural life, and at her decease said negro woman and her increase to be equally divided among the children of my said

said daughter, Eliza Barber. But in case my said daughter should die without leaving issue at the time of her decease, I give to my said daughter power to dispose of said negro woman and her increase, by will or by any writing under her hand and signed by herself, to all or any of her brothers and sisters, or children of any of the brothers and sisters of my said daughter, to any one or more of them as she shall see fit; and in case of her failing to make such disposition of said negro woman and her increase, then the same is to return to my estate, and be equally divided among my children who shall then be living.

Item 6. I give to my grandson, Micajah Pickett, my young negro man called Archey.

Item 7. I give to my grand-daughter, Nancy Pickett, daughter of John B. and Sarah Pickett, one bedstead, bed, and furniture.

Item 8. I give to my grand-son Musco Pickett, and to my grand-daughter, Kissannah Feaster, four hundred dollars, each, to be paid to them after the payments of all my just debts.

Item 9. I give to my grand-daughter, Nancy Allen, a negro girl called Hannah, for and during her natural life, but not to be liable to the debts, contracts, or incumbrances of her present, or any future husband, and at the decease of my said grand-daughter, I give said negro woman and her increase to the children of said Nancy Allen, equally to be divided among them.

Item 10. I give to my two grand-daughters, Elizabeth Ford and Sarah Pickett, children of Nancy Pickett, deceased, two negroes, a woman called Katy and her child Maria, to be equally divided among them.

Item 11. I give to my two grand-daughters, Catherine and Kissannah Pickett, children of my daughter, Nancy Pickett, deceased, two negroes, viz: a negro girl called Julia and a girl called Jinny, to be equally divided amongst my two grand-children, Catherine and Kissannah Pickett, two grand-daughters of Nancy Pickett, when they become of age or married.

Item 12. I give to my grand-sons, Reuben Pickett and Jephtha Pickett, children of my daughter, Nancy Pickett, deceased, each three hundred dollars.

Item 13. Not with a view to add to their property, but merely as a token of affection, I give to my two grand-children, Thomas Boulware and Nancy Boulware, children of my son Muscoe Boulware, deceased, each five dollars.

Item 14. In case my estate shall be sufficient to satisfy the foregoing bequests, after payment of my just debts, and have

funds sufficient for this item or any portion of it, I give to my grand-daughter Kisannah Pickett one hundred dollars, to be paid to her when she becomes of age or married.

Item 15. All the rest of my property not specifically devised or bequeathed, including the crop of cotton now on hand, and all the crop which may be made this year, and my stock of every kind of farming utensils of ever kind, household and kitchen furniture, is to be sold by my executors, and should any funds remain after satisfying the foregoing devisings and bequests, I give the same to my two sons, Thomas Boulware and Benjamin Boulware, share and share alike.

Item 16. In all cases where any property is devised by this will to be divided between two or more persons, and any of these persons interest in said property as co-tenant, is under the age of 21 years, and if a female, also married and her husband under the age of 21 years, so that the portion can not legally make partition among themselves, I do hereby empower my executors, hereinafter named, or such of them as shall justify, with the assistance of three disinterested men, to be approved by the ordinary of Fairfield District, for the time being, to make such division, or if a division be impracticable, to order a sale of such property, or any part, for the purpose of effecting partition/

Item 17. I nominate and appoint my sons, Benjamin Boulware and Thomas Boulware, and David McDowell, executors of this my last will and testament. In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fifteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirtysix, and in the sixtieth year of the Independence of the United States of America.

Last Will and Testament of BENJAMIN J. BOULWARE (1793-1860)

I, Benjamin J. Boulware, of Fairfield District, in the State of Couth Carolina, being weak of body, but of sound and disposing mind and memory, do make and declare as and for my last will and testament, the following.

Item 1. I will and direct that all of my property be kept together on my several places, and worked during the present year, as we have commenced, and that the proceeds of the crop raised, or so much thereof as may be required, applied to the payments of my just debts.

Item 2. I give and bequeath my home place, or plantation whereon I now reside, to my son Musco W. Boulware and my daughter Sarah A. Boulware, to them and their heirs forever.

Item 3. I give and devise my plantations, lying on the north fork of Big Wateree Creek, to my son James R. Boulware and my daughter Eliza Jane, wife of William Stokes, to them and their heirs forever.

Item 4. I give and devise to my son Benjamin F. Boulware my other tract of land containing about 556 acres, lying in Fairfield District, adjoining lands of Mrs. Mogess, Edward P. Mobley, and others, to him and his heirs forever.

Item 5. I will and bequeath to my son Musco W. Boulware, the following negroes, namely, Moses and his wife Eliza, little John, Lucy, her two children, Lydia and Moses, Dennis, Dave, Brodes and Squire, also the man Kendall.

Item 6. I give and bequeath to my son James R. Boulware, my negroes Margaret and her four children, Martha, Sam, Edmund and May, and Tuba, and his daughter Fanny and Mitchell, Mary-Ann and Eliza.

Item 7. I give and bequeath to my daughter, Eliza Jane, wife of William Stokes, my negroes Mary and her children Betsy, Anthony, Jim, and Ralph, Olly, Bob, Ginny, and Chloe, and Andrew and Martha, to her sole and separate use for and during her life, and at her death to such issue as she may leave living, at the time of her death.

Item 8. I give and bequeath to my son Benjamin F. Boulware, my negroes William, Bob, May, and her two children, Major and Jane, Rose and her child, Betsey, Hilliard, Jim, Judy and Edmund.

Item 9. I give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah A. Boulware, my negroes Isbel, and her two children Noah and Lee, and George, Lewis, Judy, Minn, or Moses, Louisa (the latter three being children of Moses and Eliza) and Louisa, the mother of George, to her sole and separate use for her life and at her death to such issue as she may have living at the time of her death.

Item 10. I will and direct that my sons shall divide among them such of my old negroes as may be of no value, and take care of them. The rest and residue of my property, including my land in the state of Georgia, not herein specifically disposed of, I direct and empower my executors to sell and apply the proceeds of such sales, first to the payment of my debts, and the remainder, if any, to be equally divided among my six children, share and share alike.

Item 11. I direct that my wearing apparel be equally divided among my three sons.

Item 12. I give and bequeath my watch to my son, Benjamin F. Boulware.

Lastly, I nominate and appoint as executors of this, my last will and testament, my three sons, Musco W. Boulware, James R. Boulware, and Benjamin F. Boulware.

Witness my hand and seal, this 3rd day of February, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty.

WESTERN FAMILIES

There are some five or six BOULWARE families in the West Central states, whose ancestors migrated from the same section of Virginia where our forefathers first settled when coming to America. in King and Queen, Culpepper, Essex, and Caroline Counties.

With what information we have been able to get, we do not know in what way these families were connected, but the name is the same, Boulware, and pronounced the same, "Bowler".

The name Boulware is to be found in most of the states West, beginning with Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio, Louisiana, Texas and several others.

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THE MISSOURI BOULWARE FAMILY

We learn from letters in 1924 and later, from T. Ansel Boulware, Atty. in Fulton, Mo. that his Great-grand parents Richard Boulware and Esther Ramsey were from England, and settled in Virginia. Richard Boulware was one of three sons, John, Richard and Hardin, Whose father was John Boulware.

"My Grandfather, Theoderick Boulware was born in Essex County, Virginia in 1780. The family moved to Kentucky in 1784".

BOULWARE

Captain Robert G. Barber died in 1829, and the home place at Elbow Hill passed to his sisters Eliza Wilmore and Jane Barkley. They held it until March 1, 1830, when they sold it (308 acres for \$3,773.00) to Benjamin Boulware, who on September 14, 1829, had married Sarah Richmond, daughter to Eliza.

Benjamin James Boulware (Bowler) was born in 1793, at the Eagle House, Flint Hill. He was the second son of Muscoe Boulware and Nancy Pickett. Muscoe Boulware, his father, was a Revolutionary soldier of Virginia who moved after the war to South Carolina from his home in King and Queen County. The original Boulware settlement in Virginia had been a few miles to the east on the Rappahannock river, now indicated by Bowler's Wharf, a summer residence place for Richmond people. Thomas Bowler (or Boulware) the emigrant lived there, and represented Essex County on the Governors Council. He died in 1679. The name Muscoe comes from Salvator Muscoe, who lived in the northern section of Essex County and who died in 1740. He was a planter and lawyer who served as sheriff and as burgess from Essex County.

When Muscoe Boulware came to Fairfield he located on the Flint

Hill Ridge, overlooking Wateree River. His home, which he called Eagle House, was six miles East of Mt. Olivet Church and four miles from Peay's Ferry. Nearby he built the massive cemetery walls which are still standing, and which inclose most of his family and many of the Picketts. His family was large; in his will he disposed of 2,000 acres of land and many slaves.

When Sarah Richmond, in 1829, married Benjamin Boulware she was seventeen and he was about thirty-five. They lived all of their married life at their Elbow Hill place. It was high tide in the lifetime of this plantation, as well as in that of the system of slavery. They enjoyed all of the pleasures of the regime of slavery and suffered none of the consequences. She died in 1858 and he in 1860. It was left for their children to suffer the deluge.

Elbow Hill was not in itself a productive place, but it was healthy; and it was pleasantly located six miles from Winnsborough and one mile from Wateree (Mt. Olivet) Presbyterian Church. The home was built on an oak covered spur on the Western side of the road. The late Judge John J. Neil, who was a nephew of Benjamin Boulware and who lived there for a while as a boy, said that it was two storied with inclosed glass porches, and had the conveniences of the times. A carriage and coachman was maintained and the usual retinue of house servants. "Aunt Ollie," as the nurse of two generations, was the best known and most loved of these servants.

Mr. Stewart was overseer at the home place. A white man known as "Scotch" Johnson also worked there and opened up a small granite quarry which produced dressed granite for steps, wells, and springs.

When a home happens to be in the path of war, and is destroyed, with pictures, letters and records, it is difficult to revitalize the owner seventy-five years later when all of his children are dead. Old Micajah Pickett, who in his young days was coachman for the J. B. Pickett's says, "I drove often up to Mr. Boulware's house. He was a chunky man." His grandson Benjamin M. Hall, of Atlanta, who as a small boy knew him, says, "He was not an especially good man but he was a hustler." He took an interest in his church, for he and Elijah Gayden gave several additional acres to "Mount Olivet" when the time came to rebuild it and change its site.

With the instinct of the old slaveholder he increased his land holdings. The General Turner Starke place, of about 600 acres was added to the home place, so that it extended north to beyond the church. Seventy-seven acres on the west side was bought from Robert Harper to give additional bottom land. The Moore plantation on Wateree Creek, north of the Gayden's, was purchased. To the 247 acres at Flint Hill, given him by his father, he added about 900 more and constructed a quarter for the negroes. He also bought land in Georgia.

The Boulwares in Virginia had been Episcopalians, but in the absence of this church in their new home they affiliated with Mount Olivet. They became devoted Presbyterians and took on the inhibitions as to dancing, card playing, etc., but which did not exclude conviviality and the flowing bowl. Benjamin and wife were members of

Mount Olivet and she is buried there. He went back within the Boulware Walls at Flint Hill.

There were in this generation still occasional contacts with the relatives in Virginia. Some of the Virginia Boulwares had places in Florida, and in driving through made stopovers in Fairfield. There were at intervals visits made to King and Queen, and Caroline Counties, and to the Boulware's near Fredericksburg. There were references to "Tudor Hall" at Newtown and to "Traveler's Rest" where William Boulware lived, and where he was known locally as "Lord Boulware." He was a friend and neighbor of Edmund Ruffin, and it was perhaps through his influence that he was appointed as representative of the State Department to the Kingdom of Sicily. They were proud too of their Muscoe relatives. Muscoe Garnett had been a Congressman from Virginia, and his son Muscoe R. H. Garnett was in Congress at the same time that his distinguished uncle R. M. T. Hunter was United States Senator. Muscoe R. H. Garnett was a proponent of slavery and led in the Secession movement in Virginia. He afterwards was in the Confederate Congress.

The children of Benjamin and Sarah Richmond Boulware were Nancy, Muscoe W., James Richmond, Eliza Jane, Sarah Agnes, and Benjamin Franklin. The three girls finished their education at Salem Academy, the Moravian School for girls at Salem, North Carolina. The boys went to Mount Zion College. James graduated at the Medical College in Charleston and Frank at the University of South Carolina. Nancy married Dr. Nathaniel Hall, who moved to Georgia, and was later a Confederate surgeon. Muscoe W. married his cousin Mary Pickett. He moved with his family to Florida in the Eighty's. Eliza met William Stokes, a "low country" student at Mount Zion College, and later married him and lived in Orangeburgh. He was a Lieutenant Colonel of Cavalry in the Confederate Army. After the war he lived in Hampton County and was Brigadier General of Militia.

James Richmond married Eliza Milling. He was surgeon of the Sixth South Carolina Regiment; and his war diary is in the Confederate archives at the Statehouse.

Frank was a boy soldier in the Sixth Regiment and later in Colonel Stokes' regiment of Cavalry. He was captured at the battle of Trevillian Station in Virginia and imprisoned until the end of the war. He married Mary McMaster.

Sallie, the youngest, after her mother's death lived with her Aunt Jane Gamble in Winnsboro. After her father's death she lived with her sister Eliza. She went to school at Salem Academy. She married Richard Nott McMaster.

In his will made in February of 1860, Benjamin Boulware directed that all of his property should be kept together on his several places "and worked during the present year as we have commenced," the proceeds to be applied to the payment of his debts.

To his oldest son, Muscoe W. and his youngest daughter Sarah he left his home place; to Muscoe the negroes Moses and his wife Eliza, little John, Lucy and her two children, Lydia and Moses, Dennis, Dave, Brodes, Squire, and Kendall; to Sarah the negroes Ishbel,

and her two children Noah and Lee, and George, Lewis, Judy, Minn, or Moses, Louisa (the latter three being children of Moses and Eliza), and Louisa the mother of George.

To his son, James R. and his daughter Eliza he bequeathed his plantations lying on the north fork of Big Wateree Creek; to James also the negroes Margaret and her four children, Martha, Sam, Edmund, and May, and Tuba, and his daughter Fanny, and Mitchell, Mary-Ann, and Eliza; to Eliza also the negroes Mary and her children Betsy, Anthony, Jim, and Ralph, Olly, Bob, Ginny, and Chloe, and Andrew and Martha.

To his son, Benjamin F., he left his plantation containing 556 acres adjoining lands of E. P. Mobley and Mrs. Mogess, and also the negroes William, Bob, May, and her two children, Major and Jane, Rose and her child, Betsy, Hilliard, Jim, Judy, and Edmund.


He also directed that "my sons shall divide among them such of my old negroes as may be of no value, and take care of them;" the rest and residue of his property, including his Georgia lands to be sold and the proceeds equally divided among his six children; his wearing apparel to his three sons; his watch to his son Benjamin; his three sons as executors.

No specific bequest was made to his oldest daughter Nancy, indicating perhaps that she had already received her share when she moved to Georgia.

During the period of the Confederate War, the affairs of the home place were administered by Muscoe Boulware. When in 1865 Sherman's Army moved from Winnsboro to Rocky Mount, the Boulware plantations were in the center of the path of destruction. On the night of February 20th, part of the 20th Corps (General Williams) was camped there. On the night of February 22nd, General Geary and his division were at the church, and General Morgan with the trains and the reserve artillery were in the neighborhood. General Sherman passed through on the 22nd.

The residence, barns and other out-buildings were burned, the carriage and wagons chopped up, and the livestock killed or driven away. When the army had passed there was nothing standing west of the road. The fine old oaks were killed by the fire also. On the east side of the road the overseer's house was left; apparently the Starke house near the church was left also.

In the division of the plantation between Muscoe and Sarah, it had been contemplated that Muscoe, as the oldest son, should have the part on which stood the big house. However, after Sherman's visit, Muscoe elected to take the portion near the church which included the Starke house, and Sarah Boulware was given title to 472 acres, more or less, which included the old home site. On June 12th, 1867, she was married to Richard Nott McMaster, and they started house-keeping in the overseer's house at Elbow Hill.



South Carolina

At the request of Dr Jas Boulware & No W. Boulware twin of Benjamin Boulware Sr &c. I have divided off unto said Sallie A. Boulware the above delineated tract of land which I find to contain Four Hundred & Seventy Two (472) Acres, being composed of parts of several tracts containing 700 acres, situated in Fairfield Dist. on both sides of the road leading from Wimbrow to Rocky Mount in the head waters of Little Wateree Creek West end of Wateree River, and has such found, marks, boundaries &c, as the above plat more fully represents.
