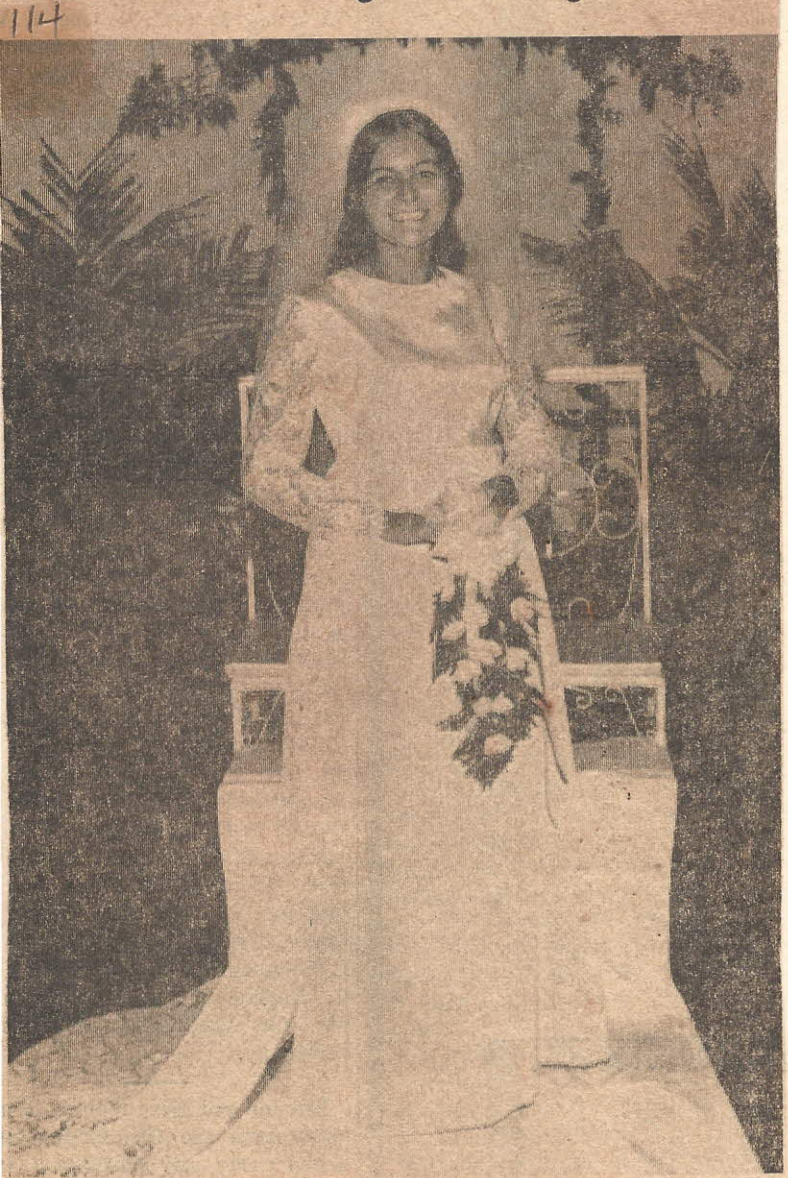


Miss Pamela Susan Longshore Is Wed To Mr. Haltiwanger on August 26th



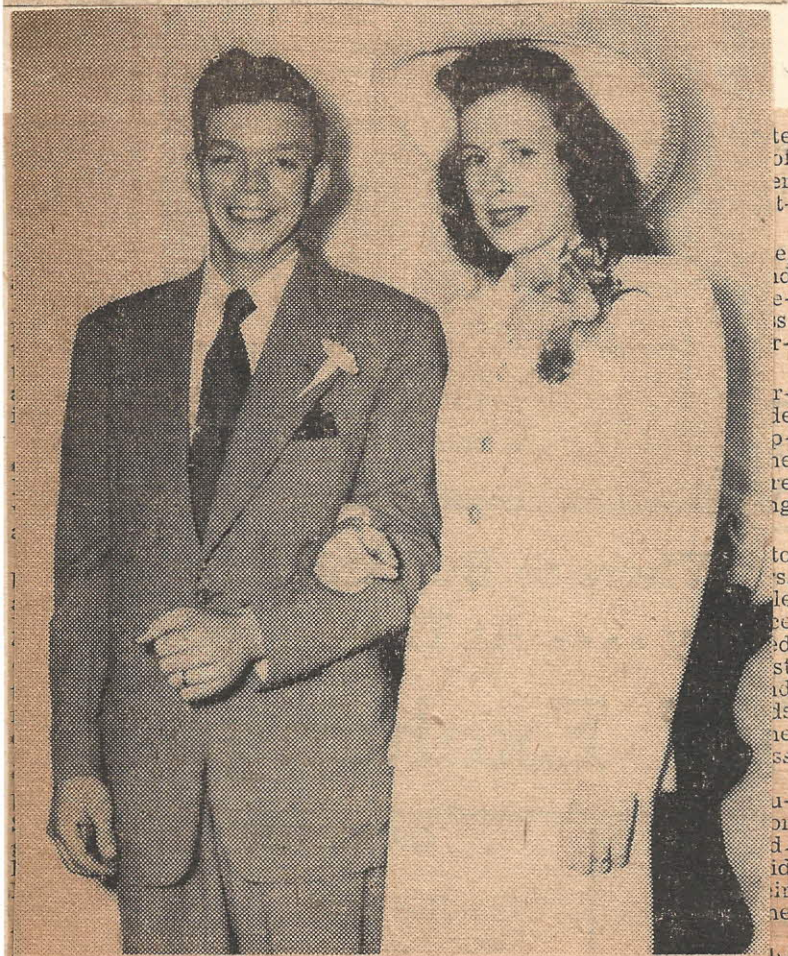

Characterized by charm and dignity and of cordial interest to a large assemblage of relatives and friends was the wedding of Miss Judith Lee Lyles of Winnsboro and Charles Edgar Glover of Rion which took place on Saturday, September 2, at 8 o'clock at the Greenbrier Methodist Church, with the Reverend Robert M. Wofford and the Reverend Samuel Coker officiating, using the double ring ceremony.

The sanctuary of the church was effectively decorated with palms, candelabra holding lighted tapers and one large floor basket of white gladioli.

Mrs. Gerald Chapman of Winnsboro, organist and Harold Ray Brooks, of Winnsboro, vocalist, furnished the wedding music. Prior to the ceremony, the pre-nuptial program consisted of "Evening Star from Tannhauser," "O Promise Me," "My Heart At Thy Sweet Voice," "Bridal Chorus from Lohengrin" was used for the processional, and "Wedding Prayer" (Dunlap), "Whither Thou Goest" (Singer) were sung by Mr. Brooks, concluding with "The Lord's Prayer" (Malotte). "Mendelssohn's Wedding March" was used as the recessional.

The candles were lighted by James Durham Lyles, nephew of the bride, and J. W. (Skipper) Sheely, cousin of the bridegroom, both of Winnsboro. Ushers were Carl Lyles, brother of the bride, Harrison Sheely, uncle of the bridegroom, both of Winnsboro, Walton Wicker, Pomaria, Don Wingard, Davis Robinson, both of Winnsboro and Johnny Miner of Rion.

Miss Marian Stewart, cousin of the bride, of Anderson, was the maid of honor and Mrs. William M. Knight, of Winnsboro, the bride's sister, was the matron of honor, and the bridesmaids were Mrs. John

Eddie Harrison of Trenton, cousin of the bridegroom and Miss Eva Ann Orr of Gastonia, college classmate of the bride.

All the attendants wore dresses of delustered satin with empressed pleated skirts, tucked bodices, and cap sleeves. The headpieces were bows of the dress material with handkerchief veils attached. They wore opera pumps dyed to match the dresses and their flowers were Hogarth arrangements of white palms and white grapes.

The flower girl was little Miss Patricia Estelle Knight, niece of the bride, of Winnsboro. Her dress was identical to those of the honor attendants and she carried a white flower basket of petals with a bunch of white grapes attached at one side.

Honorary bridesmaids were Misses Sarah Potts of Loris, a college classmate, Martha Ann Stewart, Mary Wilson, Joyce Walsh and Raye Hagood, all of Winnsboro, and high school classmates.

The bridegroom had as his best man his father, Charles Edgar Glover, Sr., of Rion and the ring bearer was Master James David Lyles, nephew of the bride, of Richmond, Virginia.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was lovely in her floor-length wedding gown of French imported silk Chantilly lace over taffeta. The fitted bodice was designed with long sleeves ending in calla lily points over the hands, with a scalloped neckline outlined with pearls and iridescent sequins. The design of the neckline was repeated in the lace bouffant skirt which was tiered. Her fingertip veil of imported bridal illusion fell from a bandeau of satin with pearls and sequins. She carried a white Bible topped with a white orchid and

showered with tuberoses.

Mrs. Lyles, mother of the bride, wore a street length dress of navy taffeta and lace with matching shoes and white gloves, and a cymbidium corsage.

Mrs. Glover, the bridegroom's mother, wore a street length dress of champagne lace, matching shoes, long white gloves and a yellow cymbidium corsage.

Immediately following the ceremony the bride's parents gave a reception in the Blair Fellowship Hall of the church which was decorated with palms and smilax. The serving table was overlaid with a floor-length linen cloth with a candelabra arrangement of tuberoses, snow princess mums and white tapers as the centerpiece. Punch bowls were placed on either end of the table.

The bridal couple was assisted in receiving by their respective parents and the attendants. Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Castles directed the guests to the reception hall where they were greeted by Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Stewart. The bride's register was kept by Mrs. Pete Gustafson. Mrs. Carl G. Lyles and Mrs. James F. Lyles dispensed punch and assisting in serving were Mrs. Annie Castles, Mrs. Bertha Jones, Misses Emily and Emma Jean Castles, James F. Lyles and W. M. Knight. Little Misses Mary Elizabeth and Margaret Estelle Lyles passed the napkins.

During the evening the couple left for their wedding trip. For traveling the bride wore an early fall suit dress in black and blue hounds tooth check, using patent leather shoes and bag and a white velvet rosette hat with veil. Her corsage was the orchid from her Bible.

Mrs. Glover is a graduate of Greenbrier High School and received a B. S. degree in Home Economics from Columbia College. She was a member and vice-president of Sigma Tau Sigma, the Home Economics club. She is now employed in Laurens as assistant home agent with the S. C. Extension Service.

Mr. Glover is a graduate of Jenkinsville High School. He will continue his studies at North Carolina State College, Raleigh, where he will graduate in June, 1962.
