Mr. Bill Davies was born in Greenwood, SC; graduate of the Citadel & University of South Carolina Law School; served 5 years in the U.S. Army; afterwards worked for a law firm in Columbia, SC; a member and on the board of the SC Historical Society.

Robert Mills

- Robert Mills was America's first native born architect
- Fairfield County is fortunate to be one of the few remaining recipients of his courthouse designs in SC
- In 1820, Robert Mills was appointed as acting commissioner of the Board of Public Works in SC
- In 1823, he was the superintendent of public buildings
- In the next few years, he designed numerous buildings in <u>South Carolina</u> including court houses, the campus of the University of South Carolina, jails, and the <u>Fireproof Building</u> in Charleston
- In 1825, he authored an Atlas of the State of South Carolina.[1]
- One year later, he published Statistics of South Carolina [2][3]
- He reputedly designed the <u>Old Horry County Courthouse</u>, <u>Union County Jail</u>, and <u>Wilson House</u> listed on the <u>National Register of Historic Places</u> [4][5]
- Robert Mills' proposed design for the <u>Washington Monument</u> in <u>Washington, D.C.</u>
- In 1836 Robert Mills won the competition for the design of the <u>Washington Monument</u> on the future Mall of the National Capital, Washington D.C., which is his best known work; construction began in 1848, but was interrupted in 1854; construction of the monument resumed in 1879 and was dedicated in 1885, thirty years after the architect's death
- He also designed the <u>Department of Treasury</u> building, east of the Executive Mansion (<u>White House</u>) and several other federal buildings in <u>Washington</u>, <u>D. C.</u> including the <u>U.S. Patent Office Building</u>, patterned after the <u>Parthenon</u> (now renovated into two adjoining museums of the <u>Smithsonian Institution</u>, the <u>Smithsonian American Art Museum</u> and the <u>National Portrait Gallery</u>) and the old <u>General Post Office</u> [6][7]
- In South Carolina, Mills designed county <u>courthouses</u> in at least 18 counties, some of the public buildings in <u>Columbia</u>, and a few private homes
- He also designed portions of the Landsford Canal, Chester County, on the Catawba River in South Carolina
