



years very many people participated, this year was totally different. You probably coudn't pay the Griffins not to have their school spirit.


Before school, during lunches, and after school you'll find students socializing on the concourse. They find it a very nice place to relax and unwind. "I always find the concourse a






served it but I'm honored to have won. I guess I'll have something pretty interesting to tell my family when I get home."


What An Evening







The first day, all in all, was a new start. Friends were made, old records were thrown away, and new faces gave our school a new name.







A Spirit Lift





merican Education was designated as the week of November 13-19, 1994. The week's motto was "Building the Future, One Student at a Time".


Three suggestions for teachers to use during American Education Week were as follows:







With the help of all involved, it doesn't look like it will be difficult. Hats off to the Griffins and their effort to excel and take a look at their possible successes.


Iron Hands?






All That Research . . .




Yesterday's Influences Prepare Us For Tomorrow!

This year has been one of the most exciting and rewarding for art students. Hopefully, in the years to come, students will be able to succeed in art and know what succeeding really is.



Separating fact from opinion, the high steppers show they can "beat'em and bust'em because that's their custom."







Skills For Life


o matter which way you look at it, pre-vocational is a big part of our school's curriculum. Among the many courses that are a part of the pre-vocational programs are Keyboarding, Industrial Technology, Clothing and Textiles, Foods and Nutrition, and Education for Parenthood. These classes are always among the classes with maximum enrollment each semester. These classes teach students skills that they will use throughout adulthood.

In Industrial Technology, students learned how to program machines to cut wood, read and use metric rulers, and the basics of photography. As far as Foods and Nutrition goes, students learned how to plan and stick to a nutritional diet, and how to make various, and sometimes elaborate dishes.


In Clothing and Textiles, the main part of the class concentrates on putting together outfits and sewing the outfits together to make a pattern.

No matter what business or job a person takes in their life, the skills they learn in pre-vocation will have an impact on their life.






The center offers training in eleven trade and industrial areas, marketing and business, and agriculture. In the 1995-1996 school year, the center is planning to add an area in health care.


Special services are for students with special needs.






the field for the crowning of Miss Homecoming and Miss Sweetheart.








Social Studies Club

The students who were able to be a part of the Junior Achievement student companies were able to able to start and liquidate a company in 18 weeks. That's an experience of a lifetime.














memorable season. I'm regetting that this is my last season of high school baseball."










They Got Skills






























