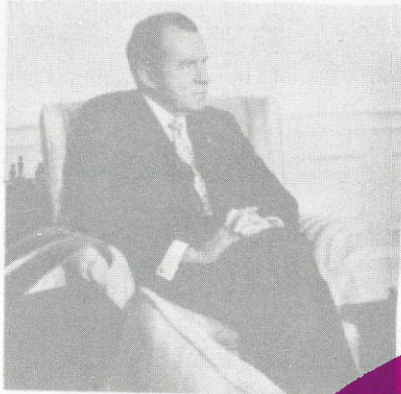

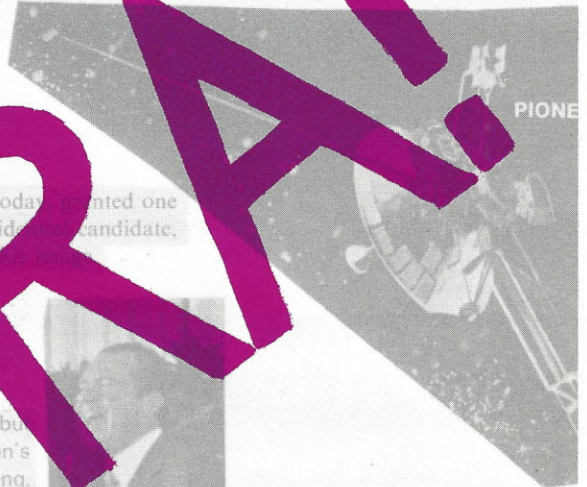
It may not quite be the Year of the Woman, but neither is this election season the women's movement going to go away. For the running, sometimes a precedent start in the late 1960s, the struggle for equality has caught in the national mind.

With President Nixon's week from China, two pictures seemed to define an extraordinary venture. One was taken during a banquet in Hangchow, which amplified the open warmth and amiability marking the public contacts between the Americans and their host, Chinese Premier Chou En-lai. The other, taken as Chou listened to Nixon speak (left), pointed up the private seriousness. Widely different needs and interests still separate the U.S. and China, and they were especially apparent as the presidential party returned home.

Through a desolate landscape of dried mud, stagnant water and gutted homes, the children of the Wilkes-Barre area in Pennsylvania's Wyoming Valley tramped back to school last week. They were 14 days late, but at least they were there. Last June, tropical storm Agnes left over 13,000 Valley families homeless and caused more than a billion dollars in property damage.

The Munich Games started in splendor, stopped in blood, and limped to a close in a jumble of anger, disillusion and blame-throwing. The tragic murder of the Israelis overshadowed everything, but the other confusion was profound enough to raise real questions about the future of the Games.

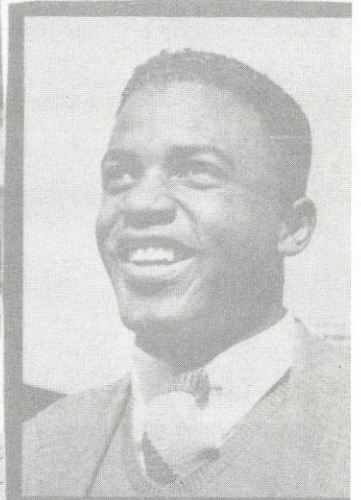
