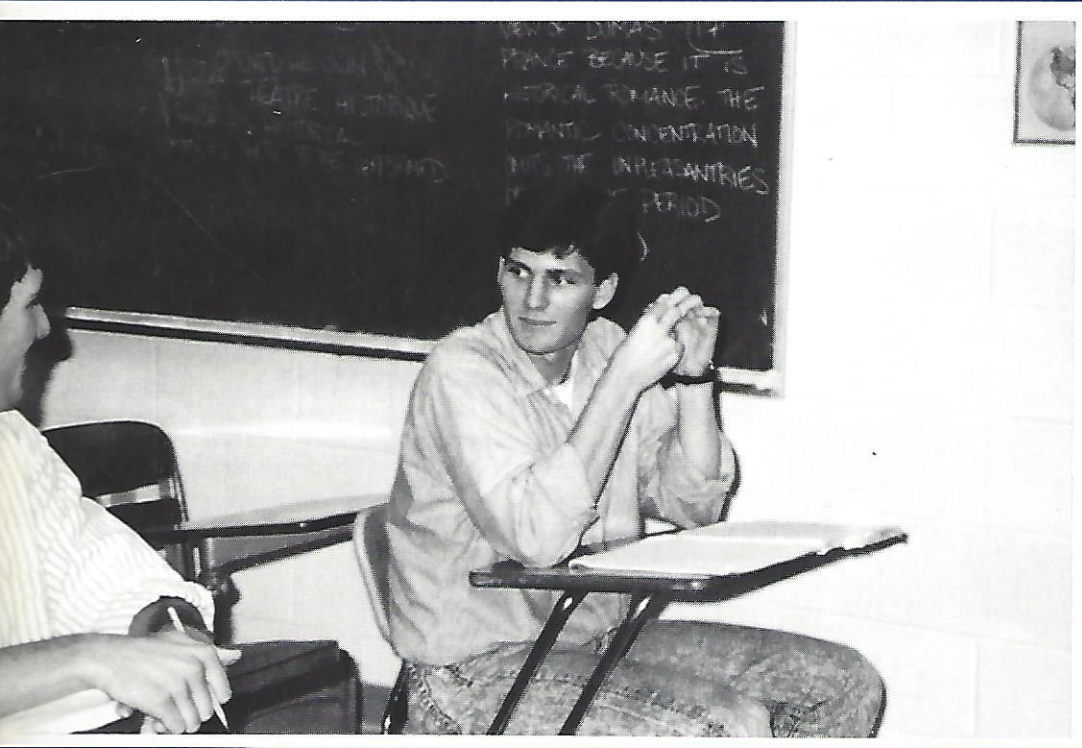
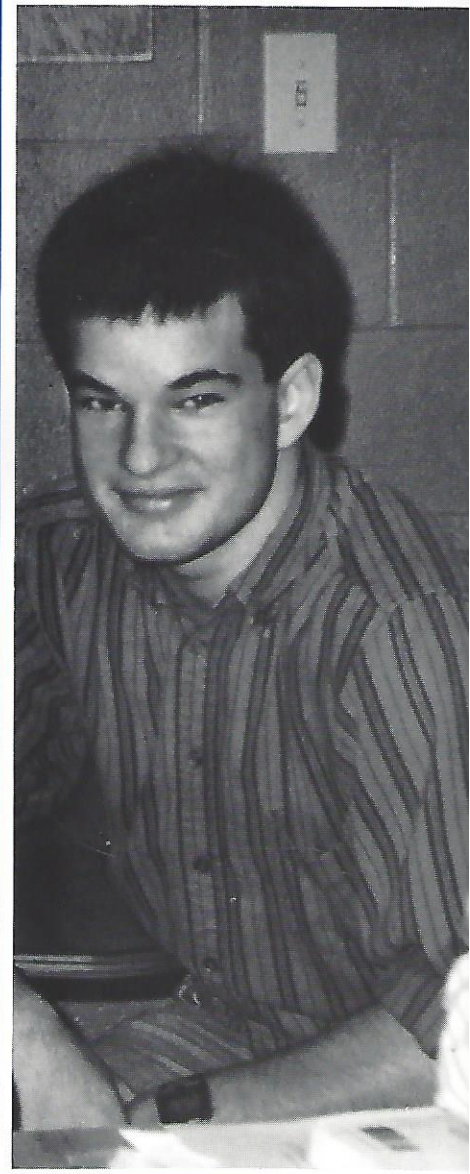


Friends Count For the Class of 1990

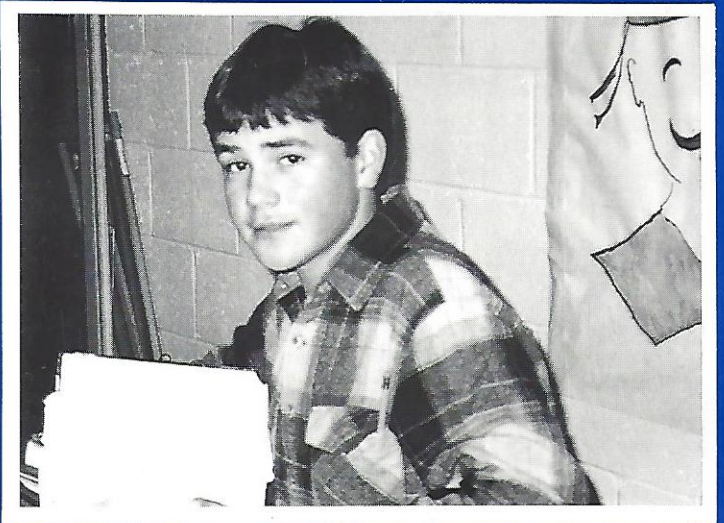




Senior Priorities Are Important

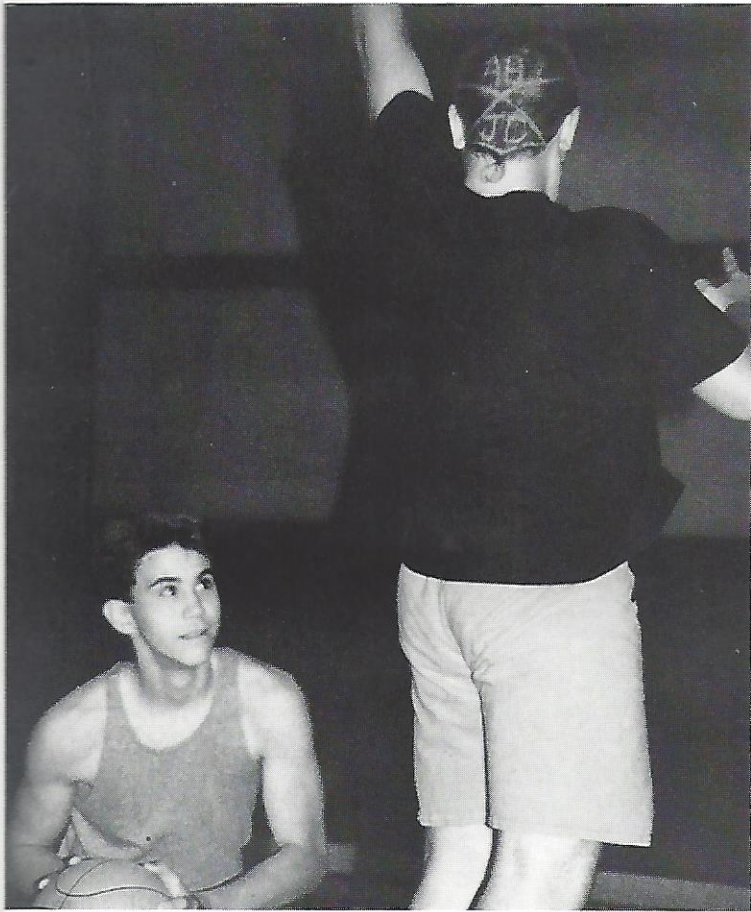

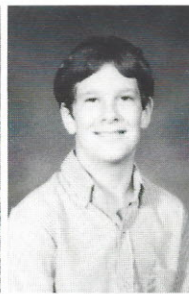
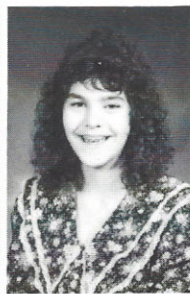


Seventh Grade Action

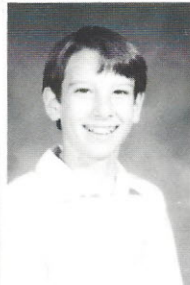

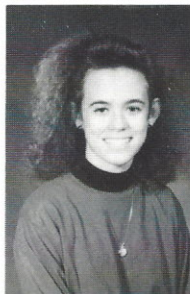

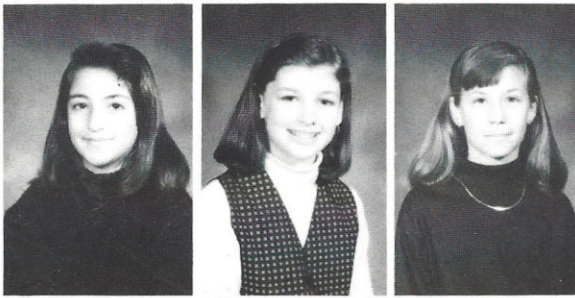
6th Grade is a Challenge

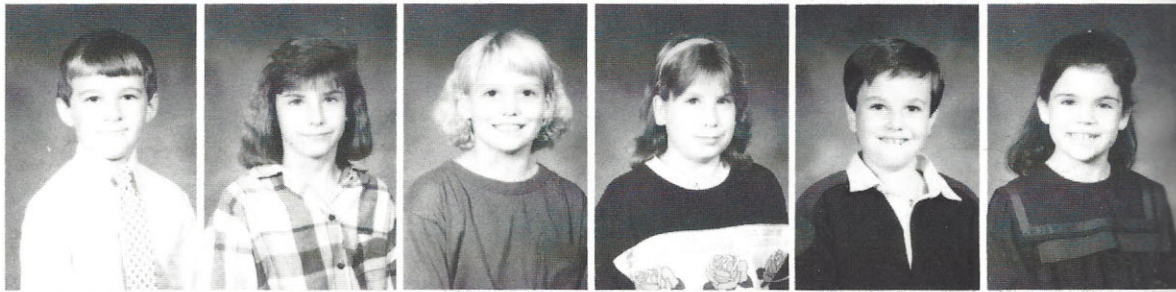
Fourth Graders Are WellRounded

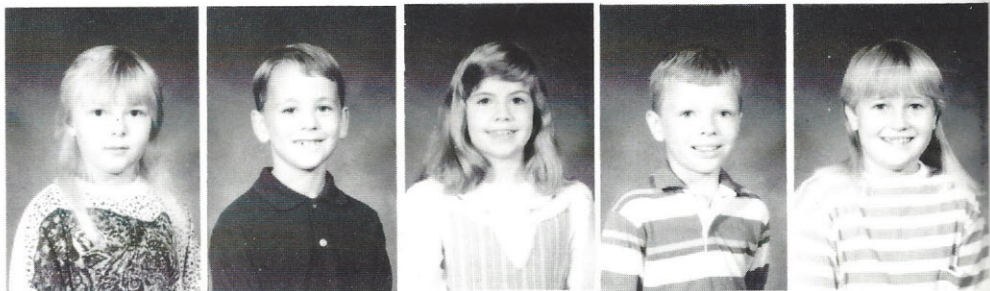

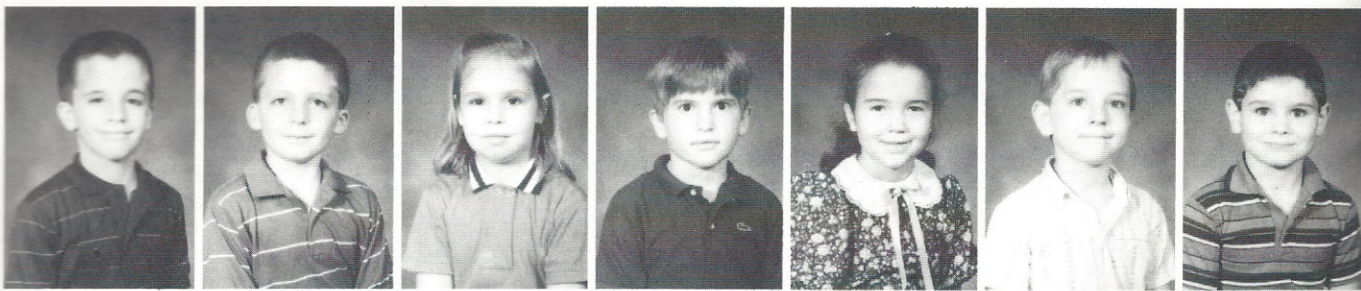

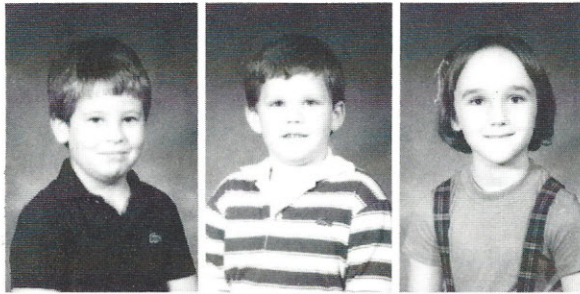

First Grade Enjoys Learning

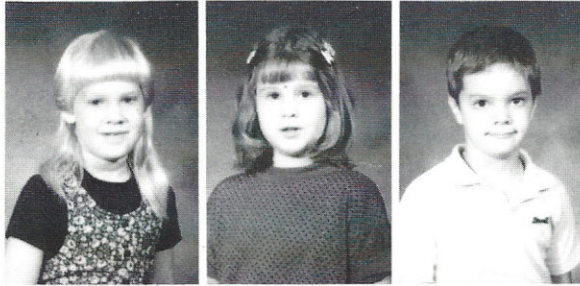

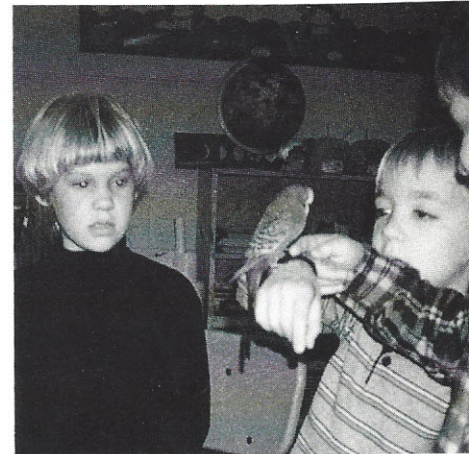

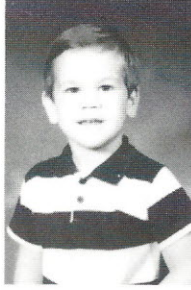
Four Year-Olds Make Learning Fun

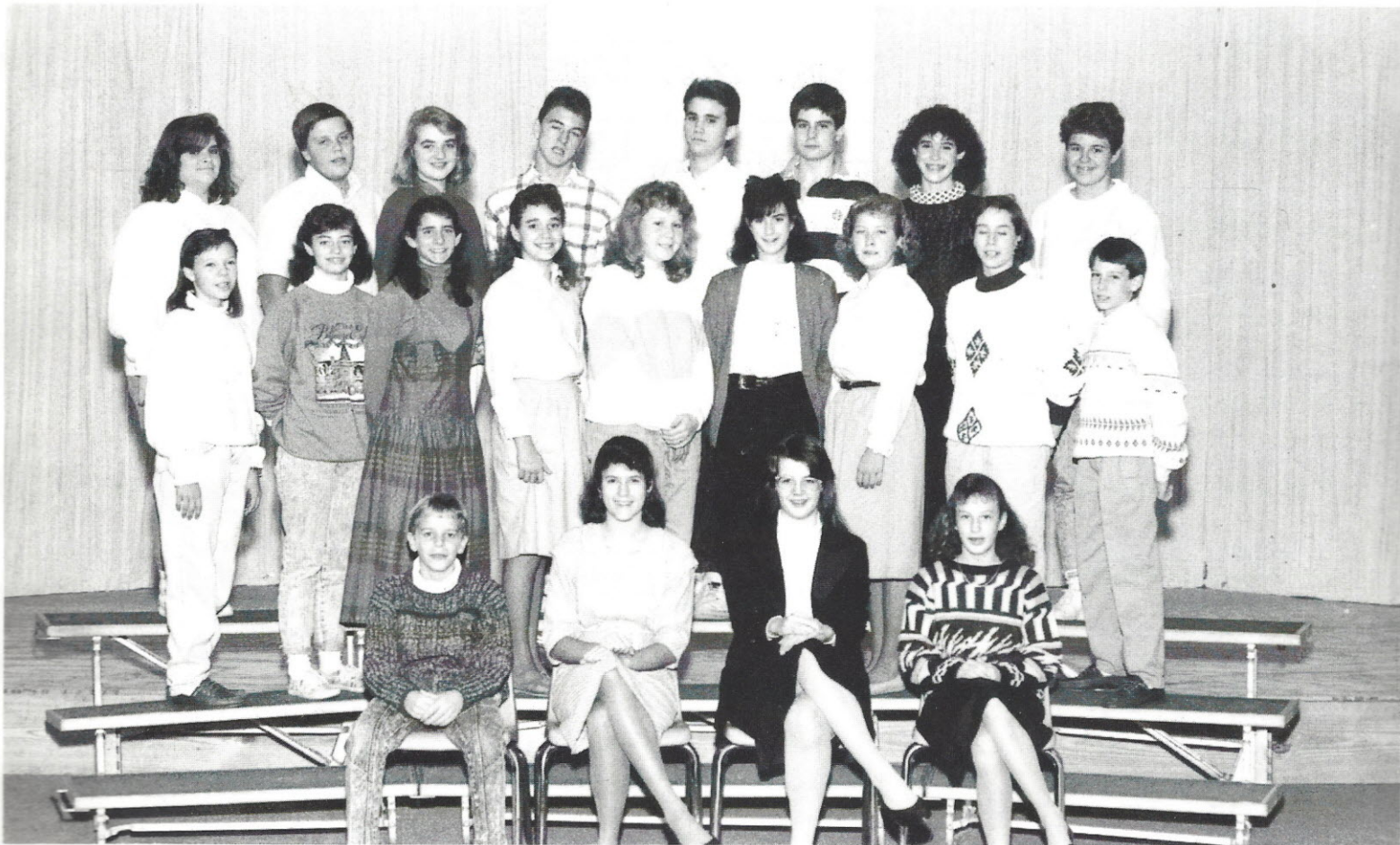

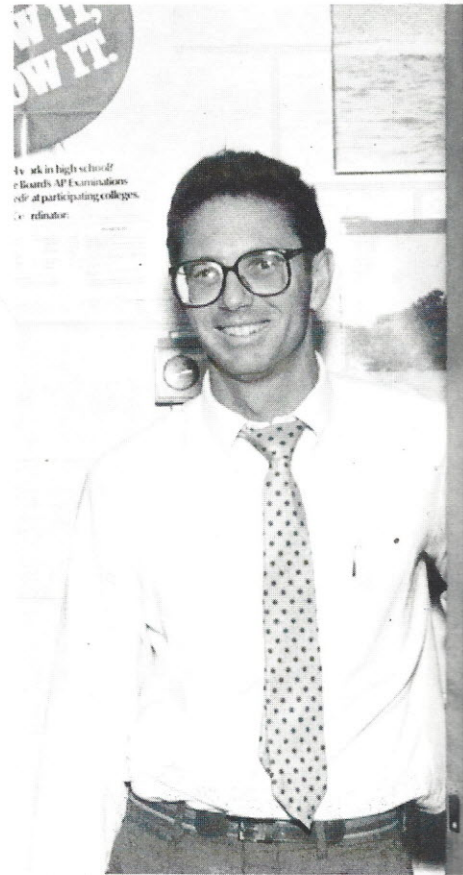

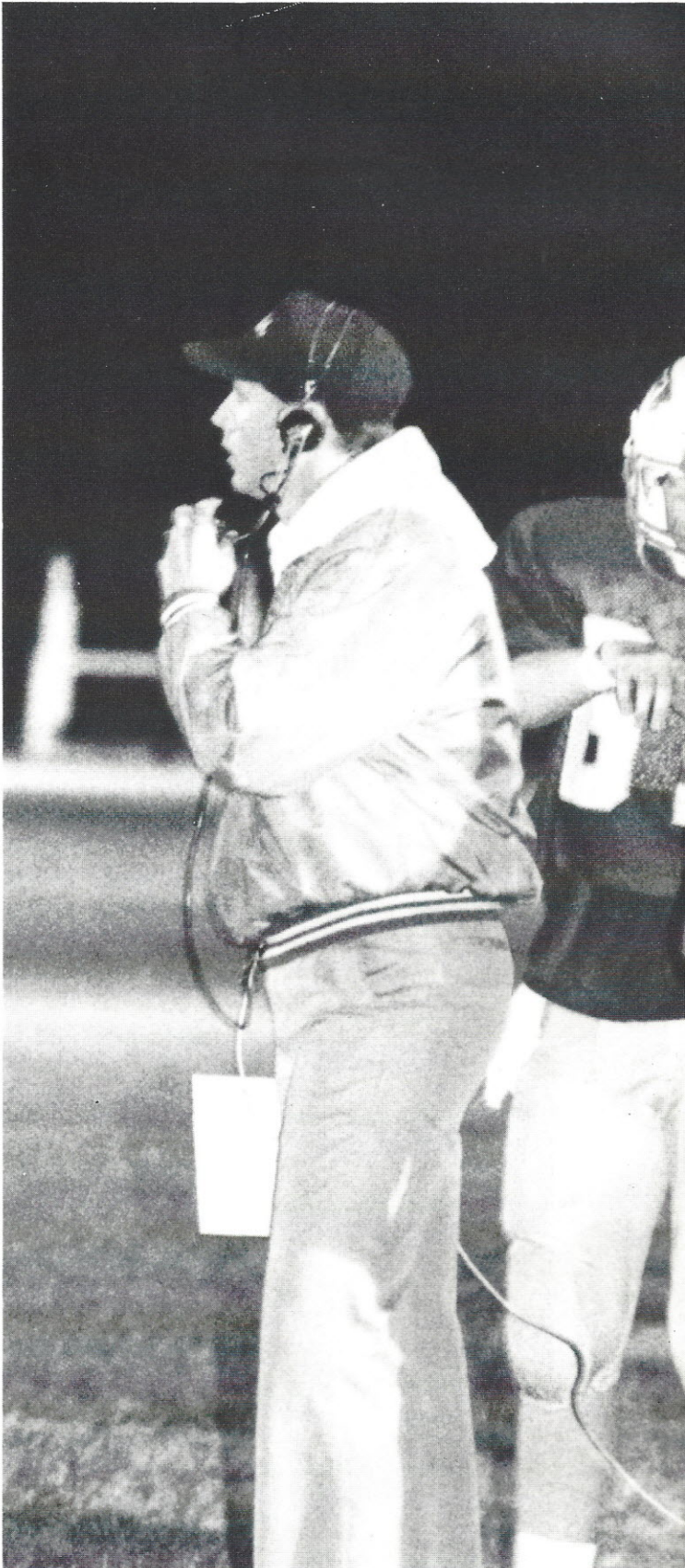

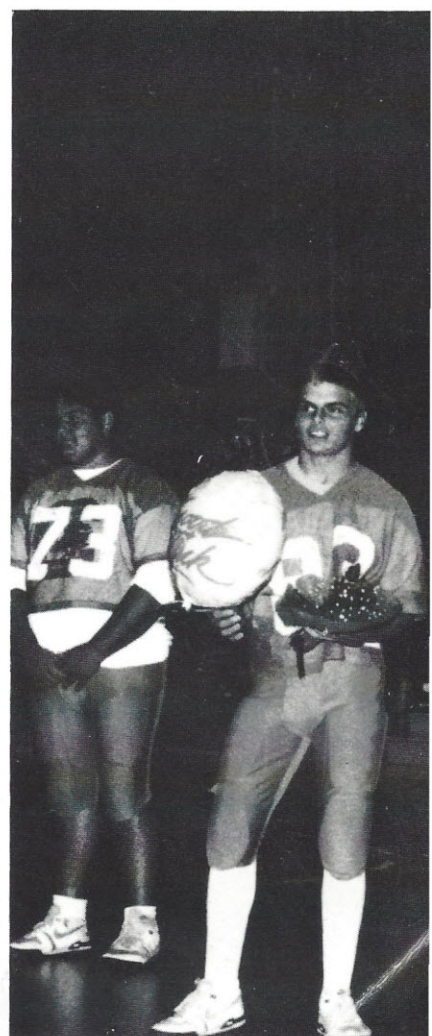

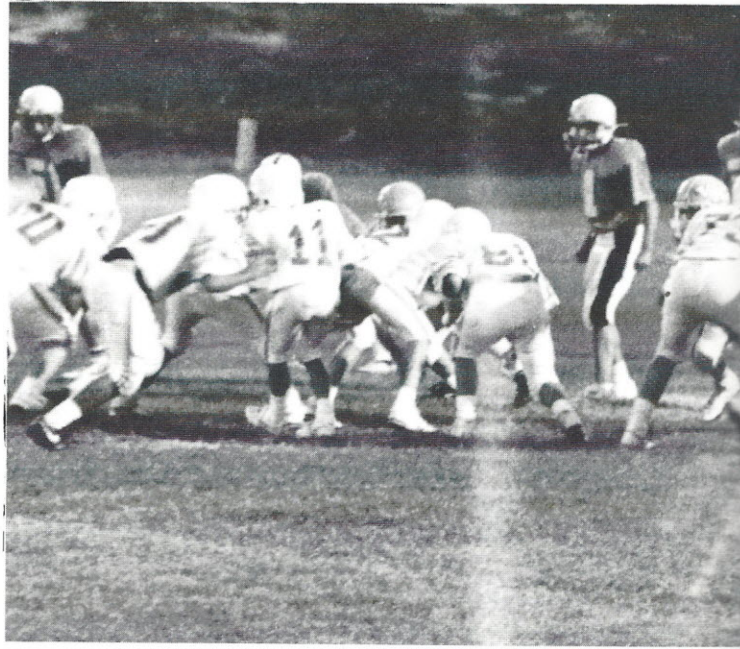

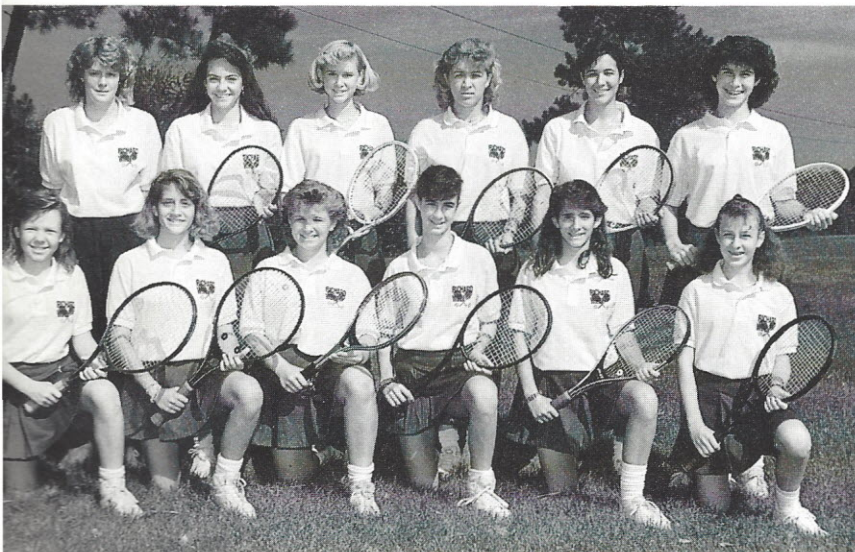

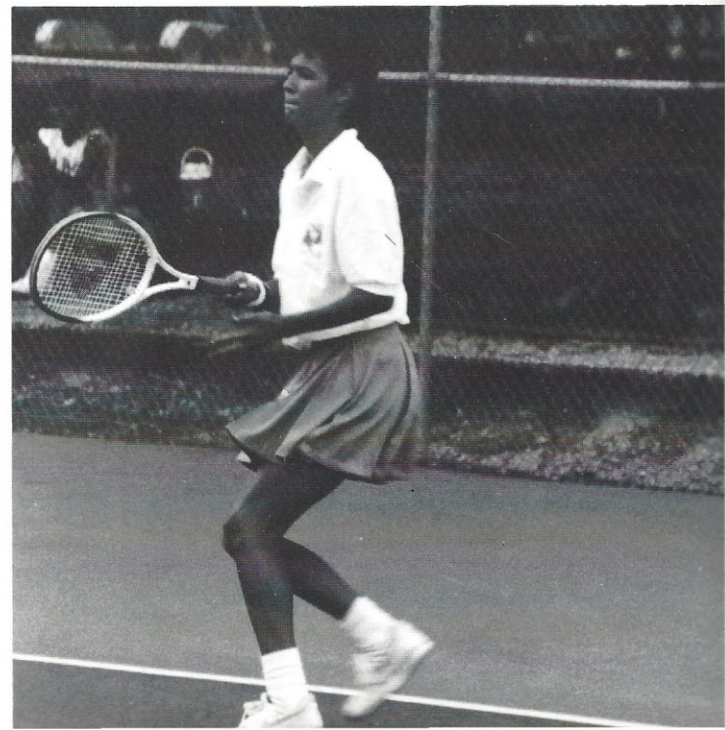
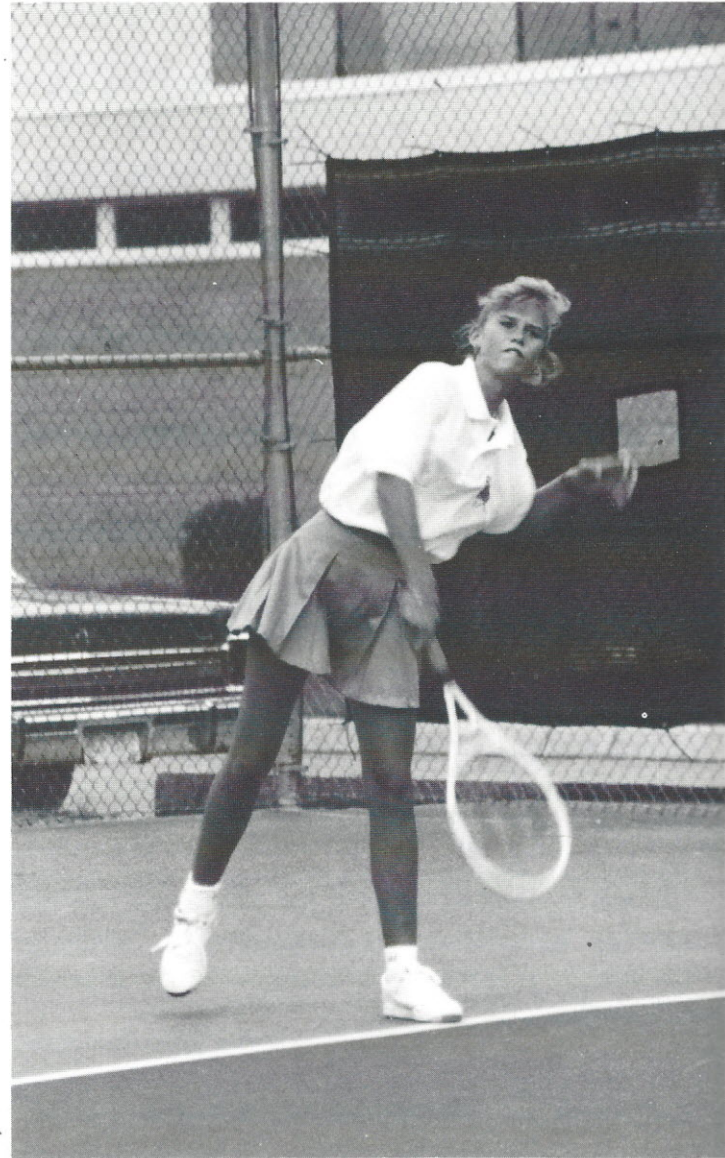


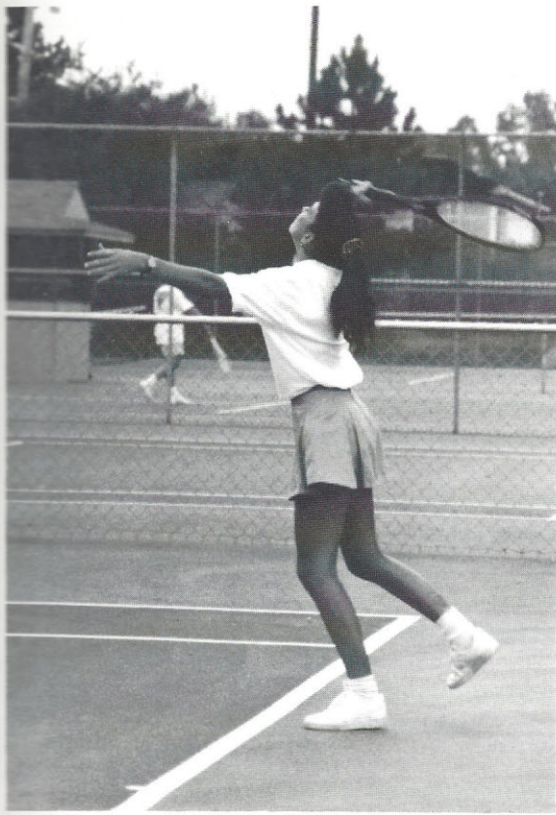

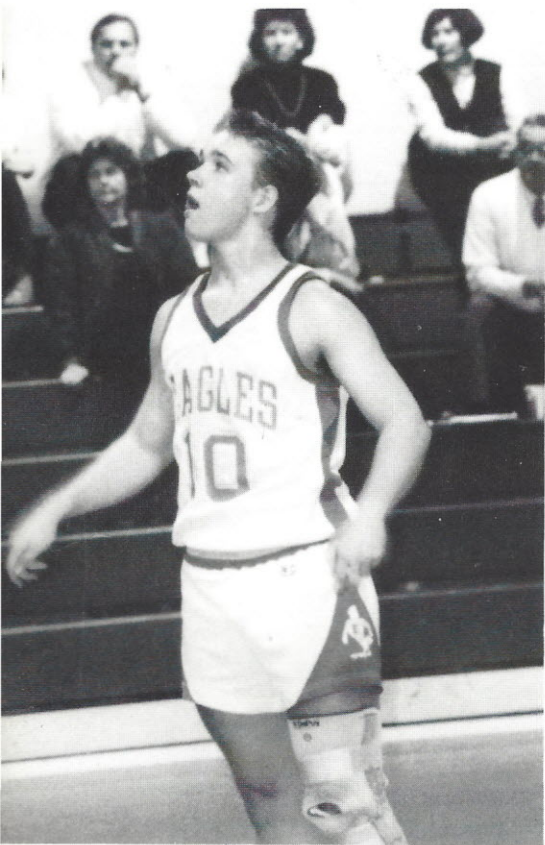

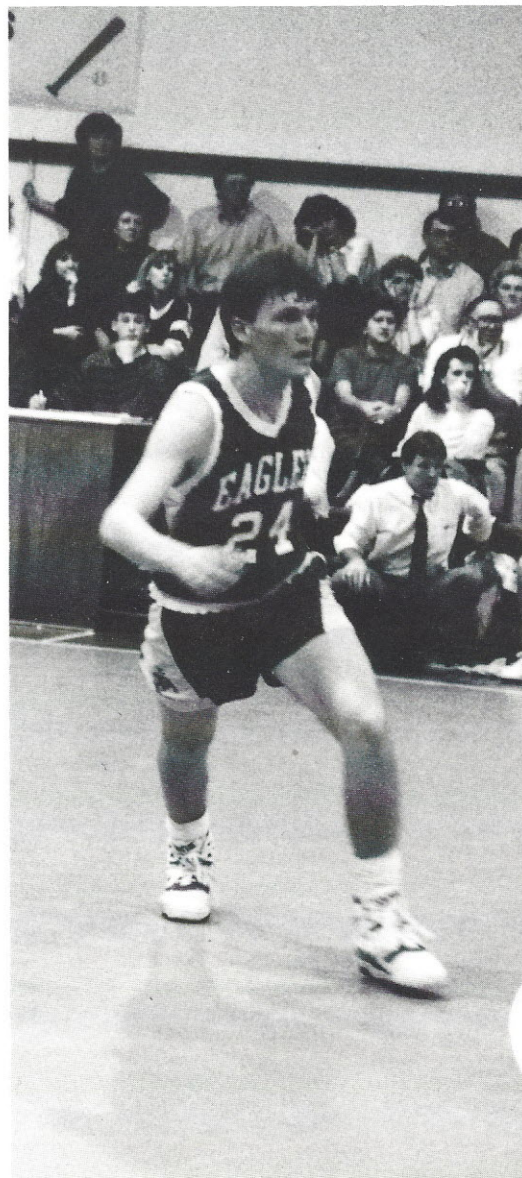


Shooting for the Top

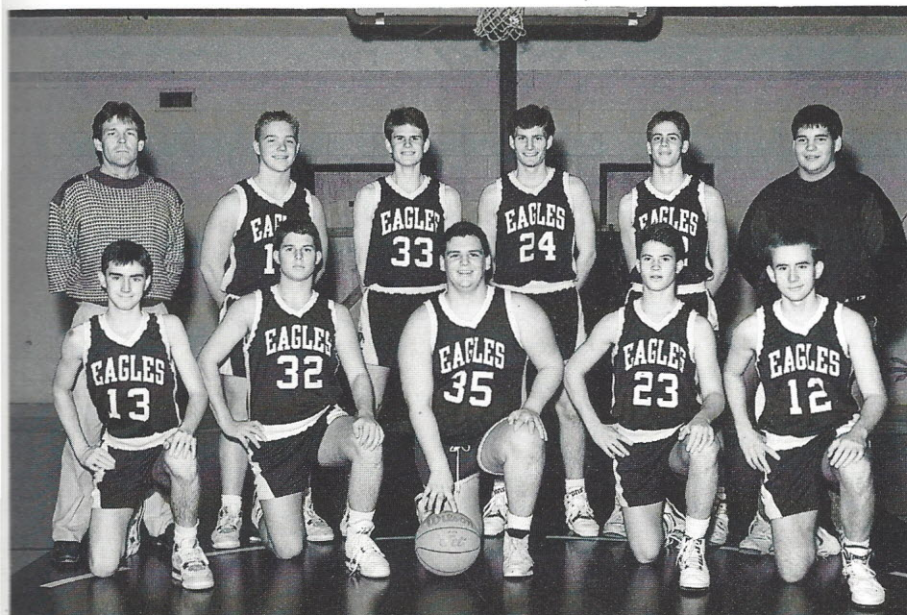

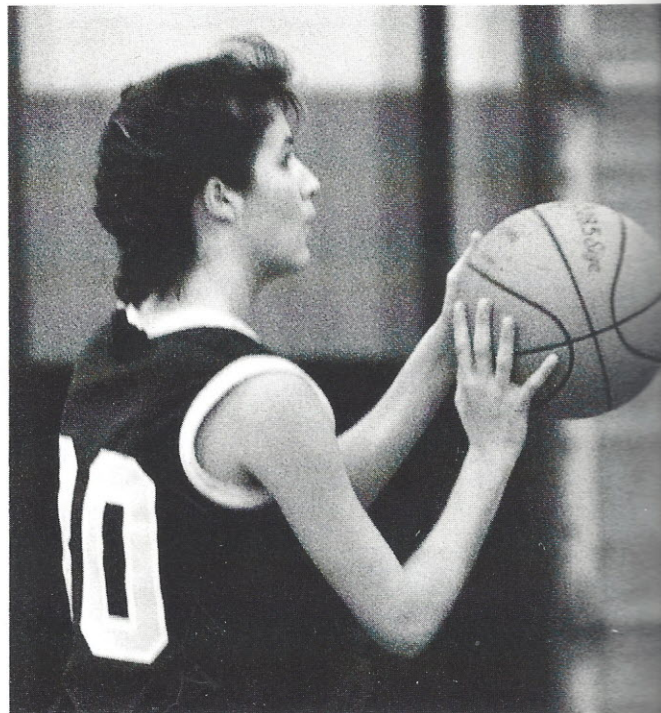

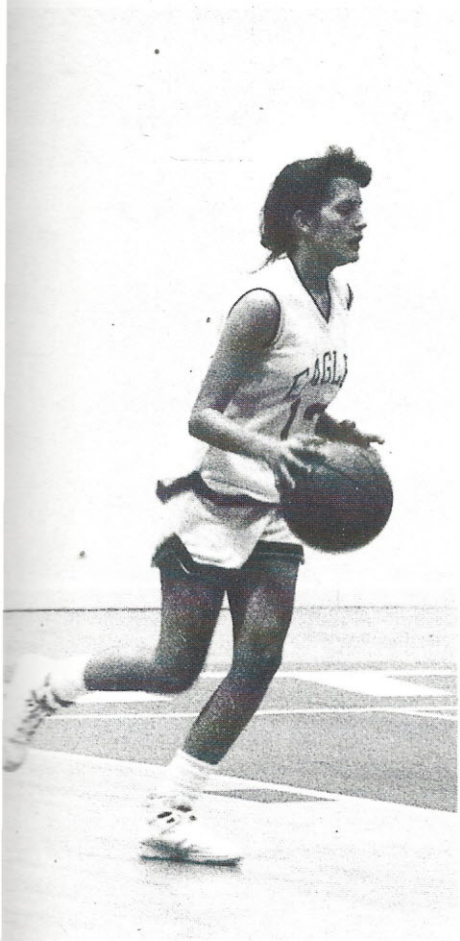

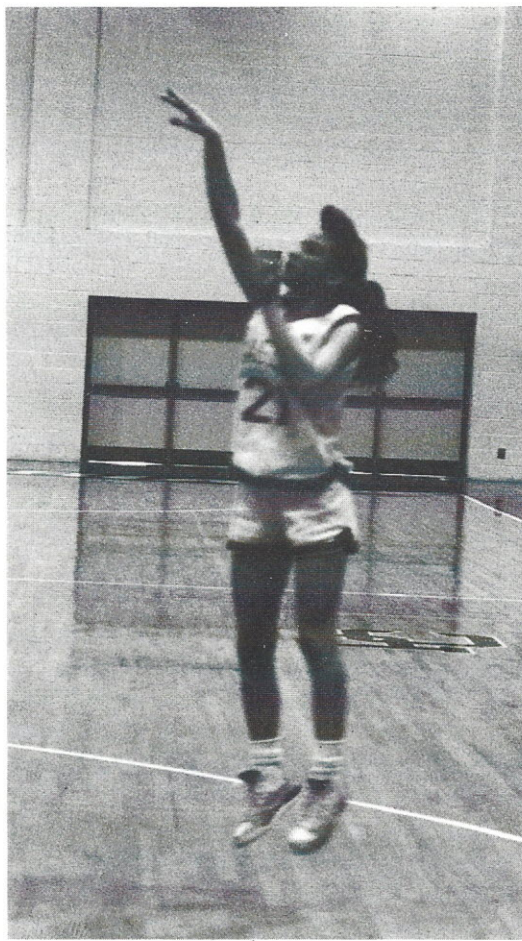

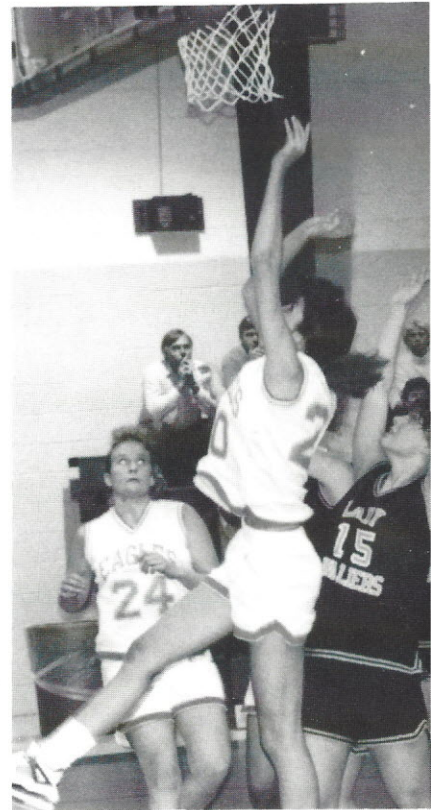

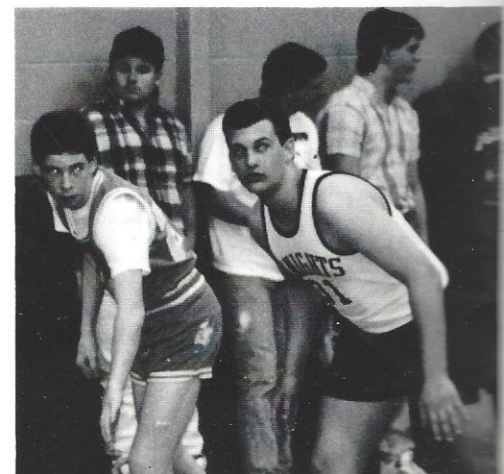

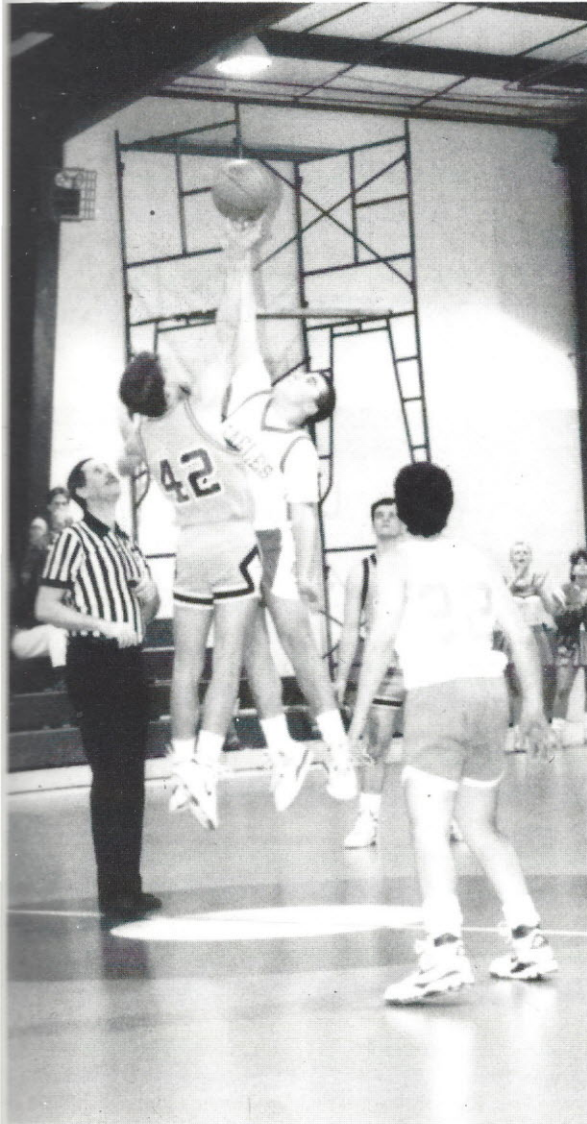

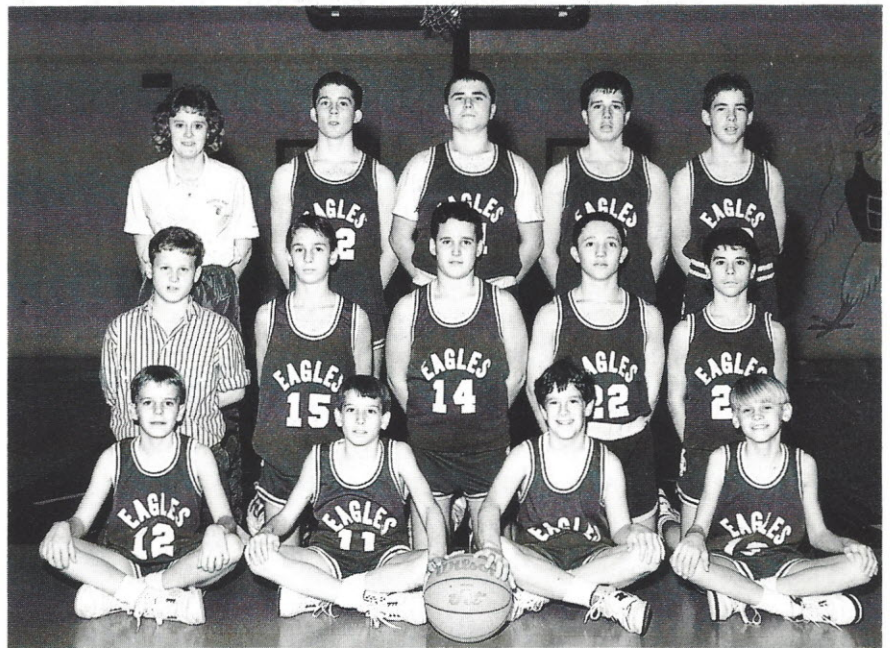

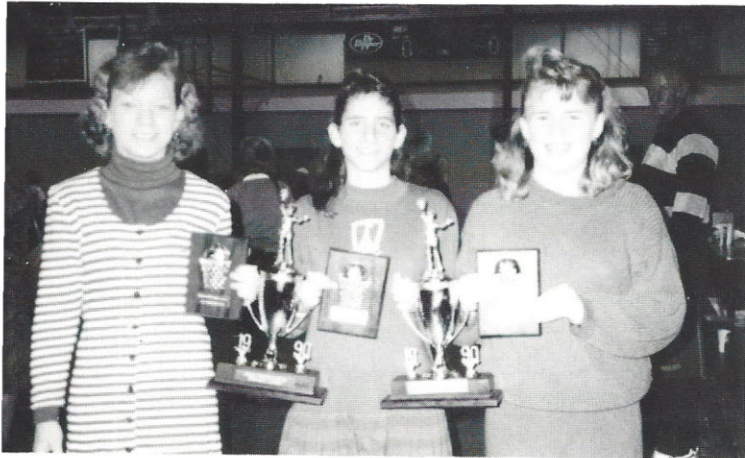

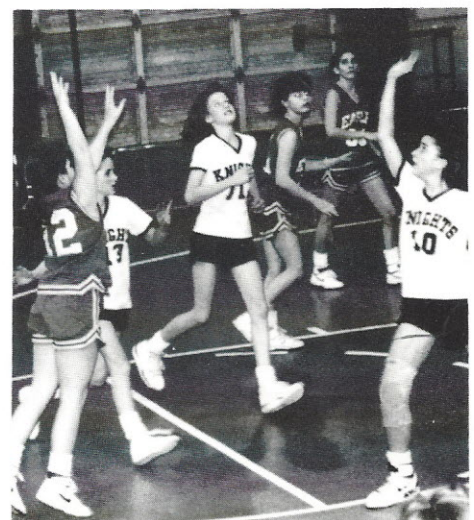

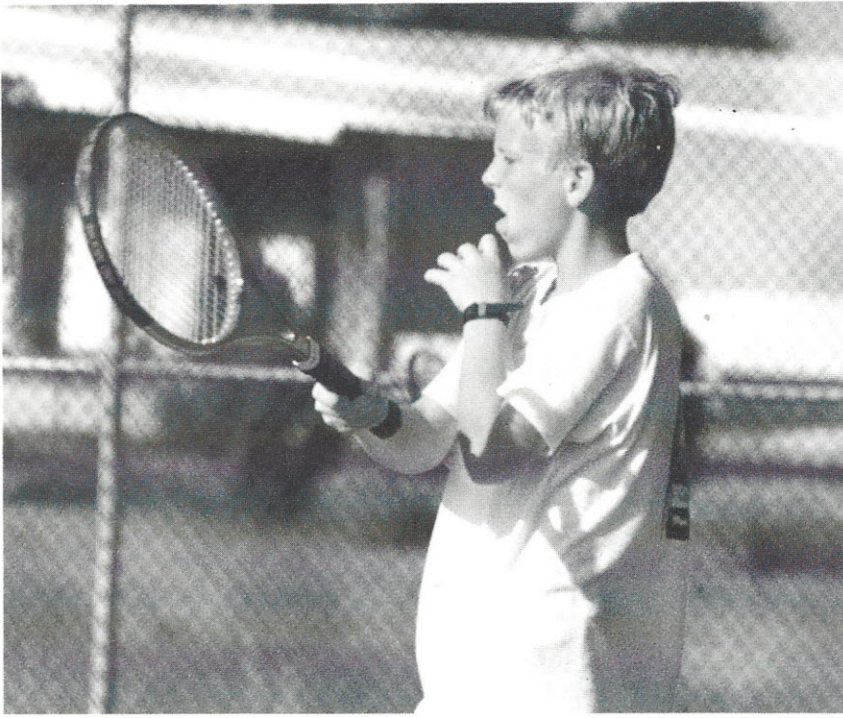

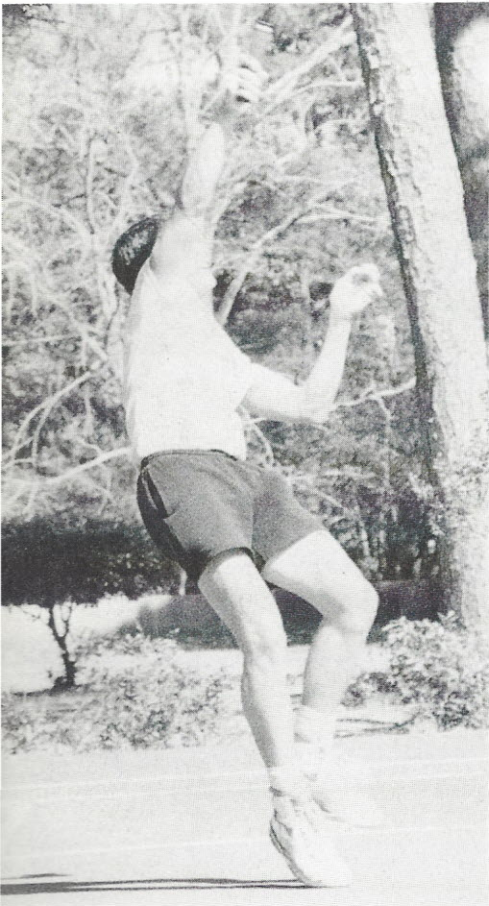

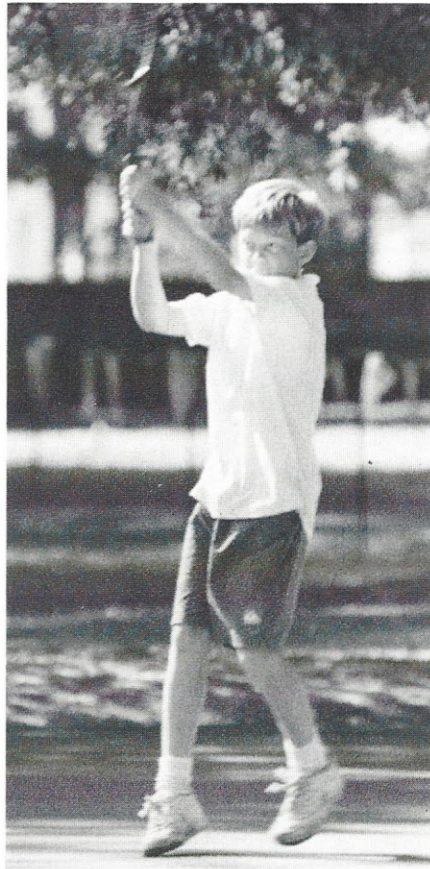

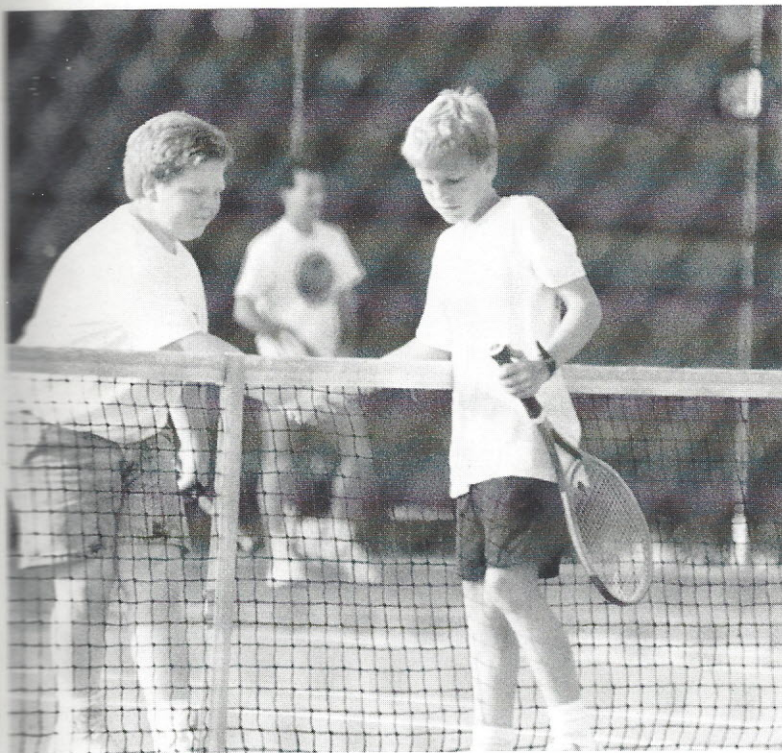

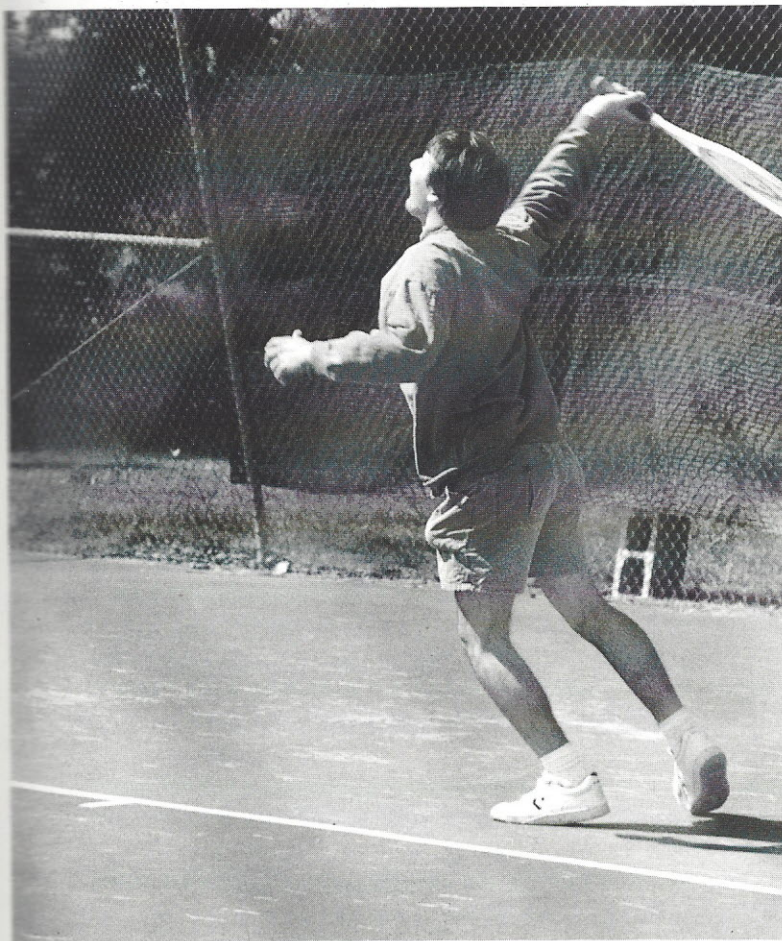


Hard Work Will Pay

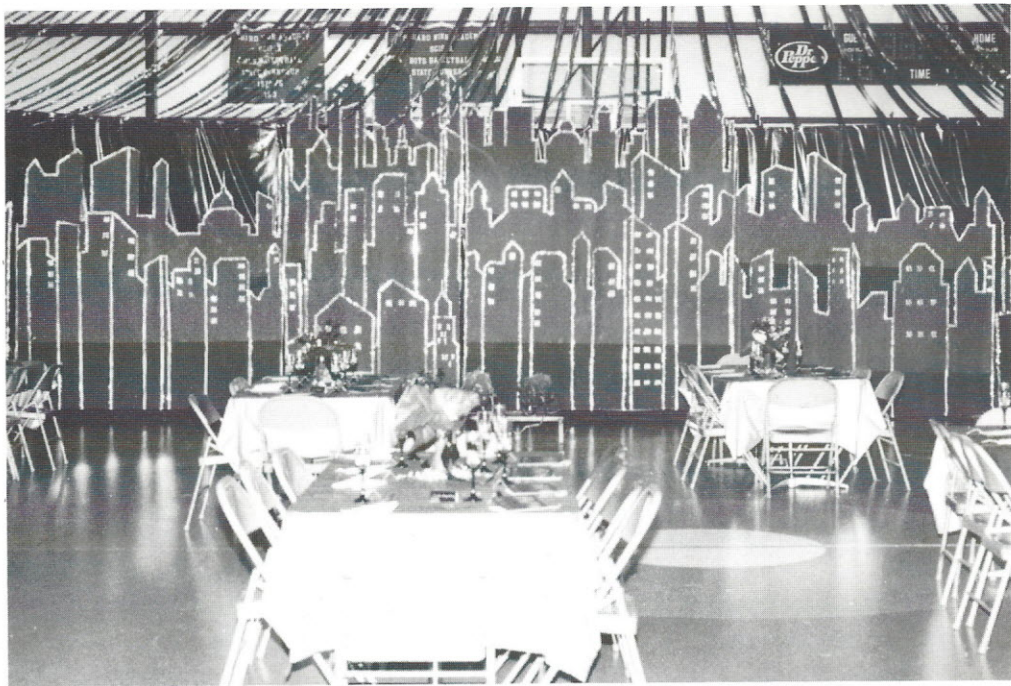

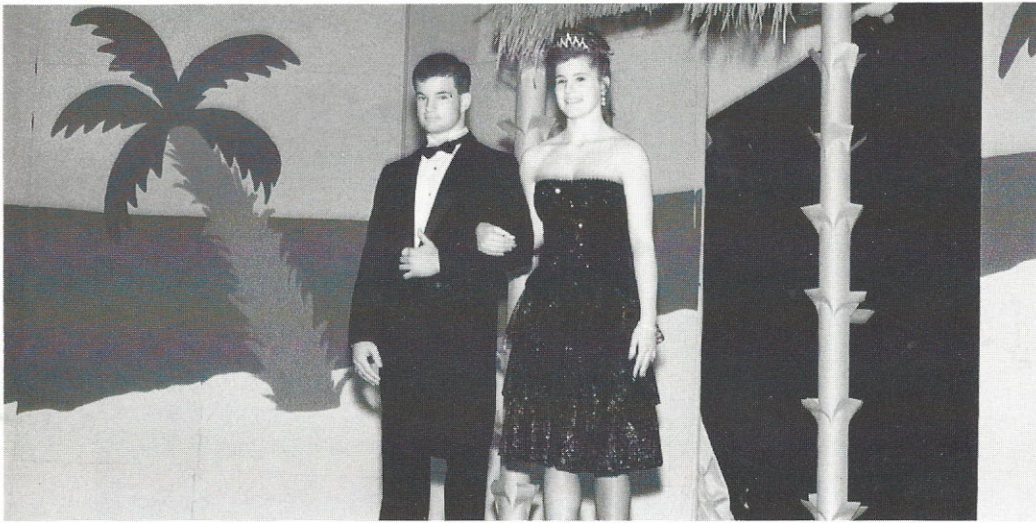
