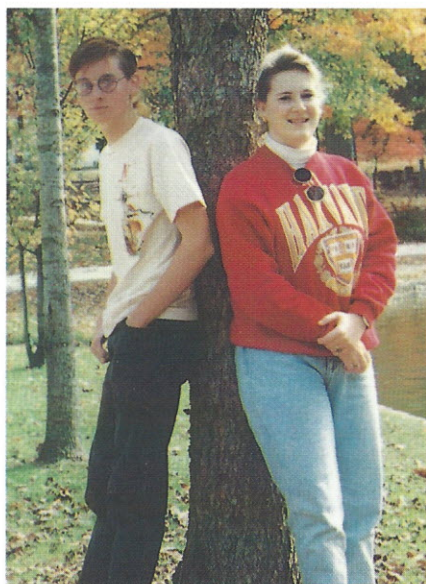


SENIORS AT LUNCH

Whether or not they eat here or away, everyone has a good time just being "TOGETHER AS ONE" for their last year at Richard Winn.

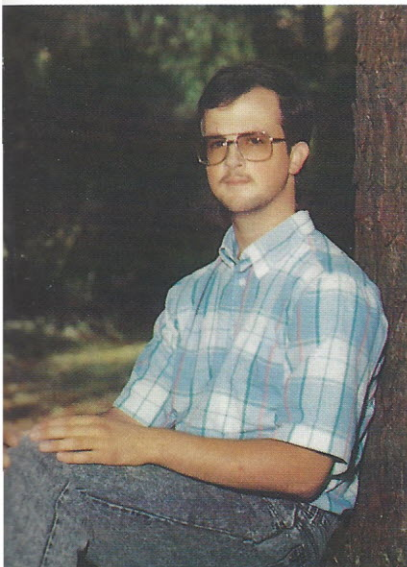

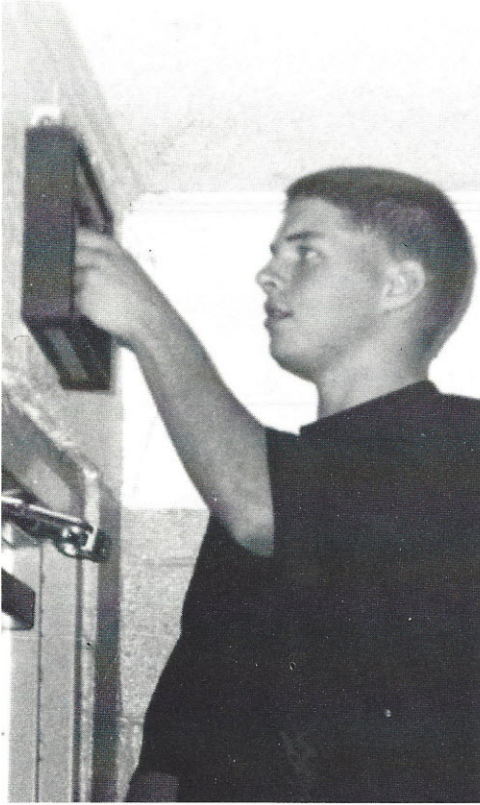

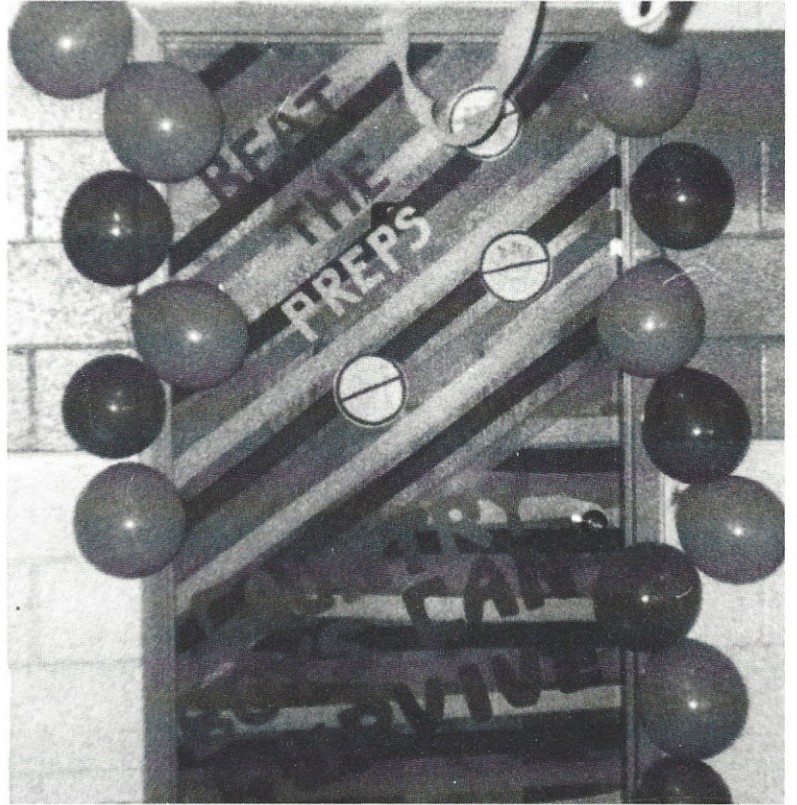

Juniors Transformed

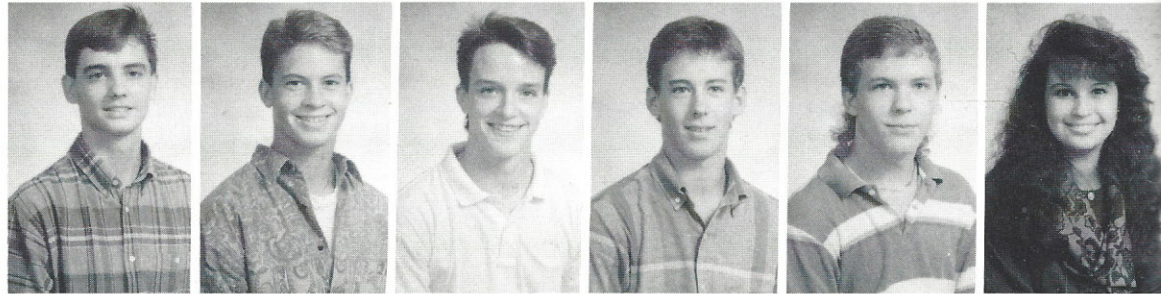

We were proud to have two new additions to our group. Chris Childers and Julie Evans. At Easter, we sold Easter baskets. That brought us up to the prom; Deco-

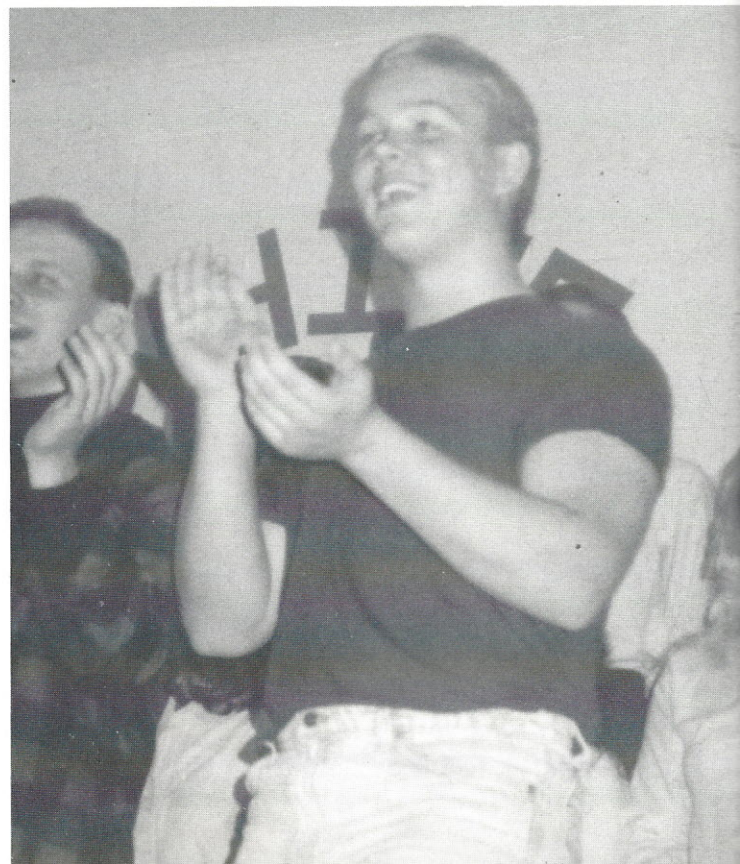

Tenth Grade On The Move

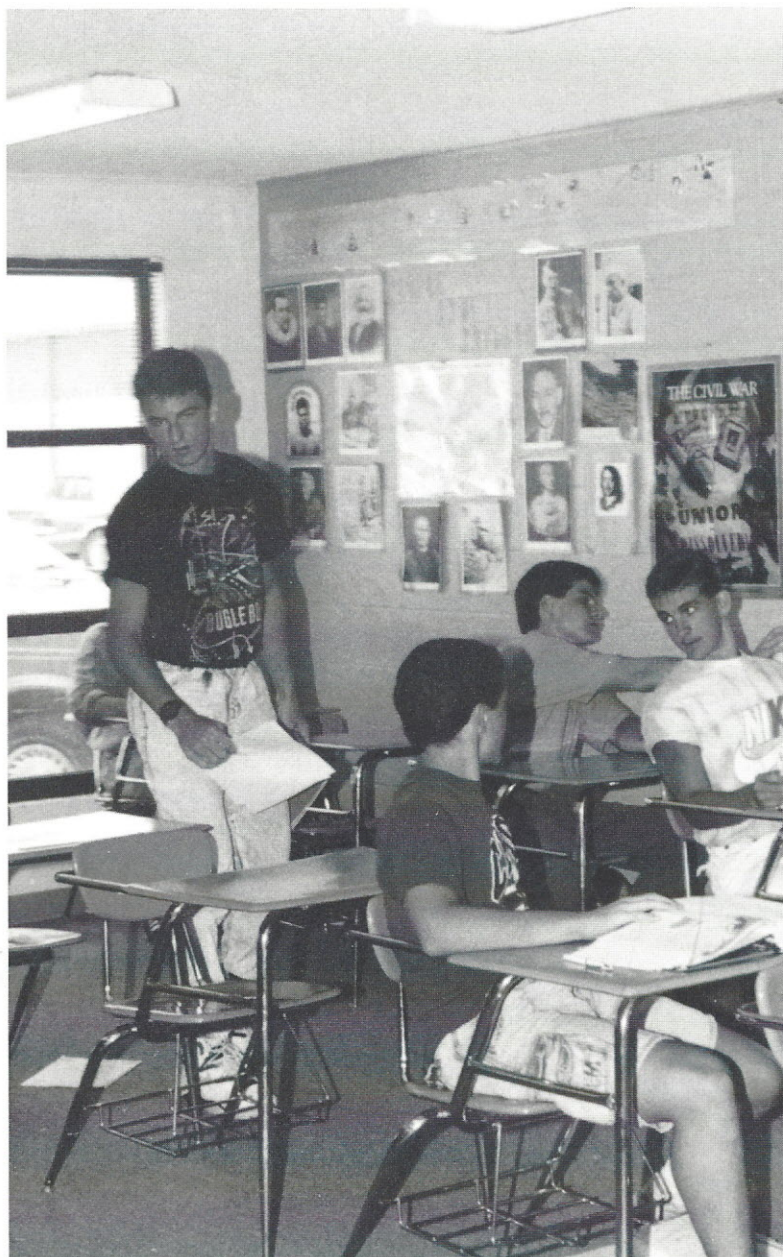
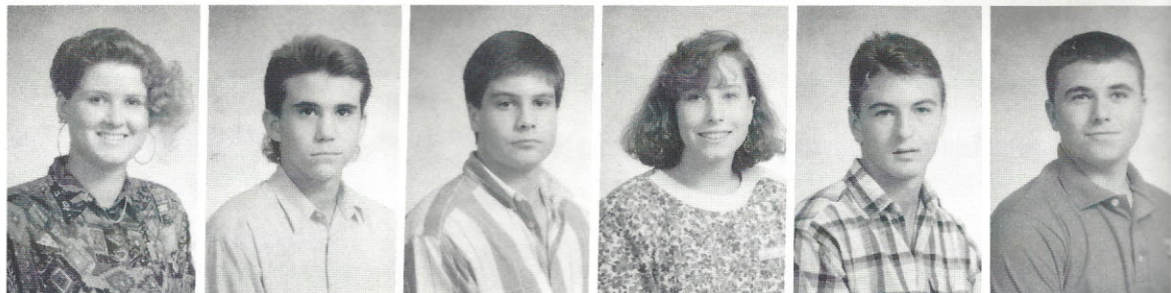

Springtime found us involved in Field Day sponsored by the PTO. Jennifer Brice literally ran away with the blue ribbons for each race event.

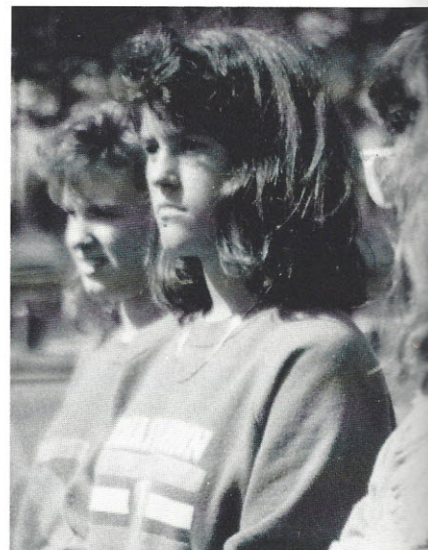

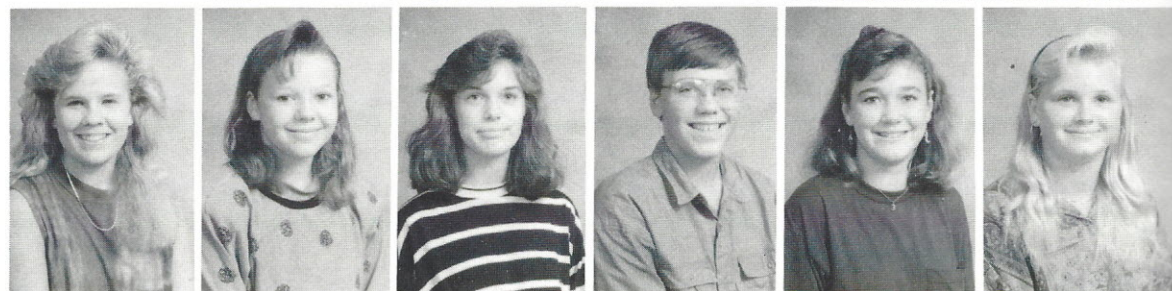

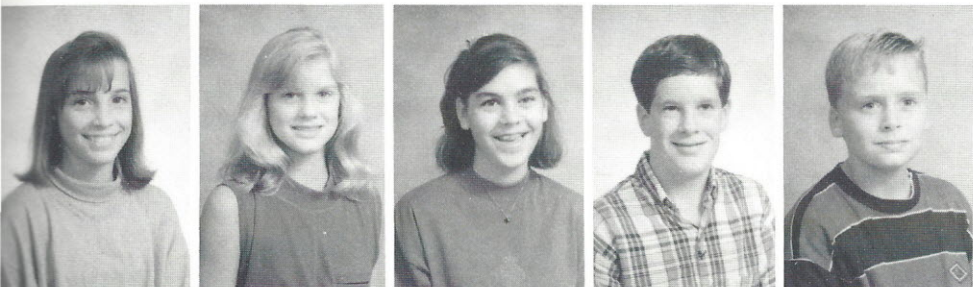

My Feelings About 6th Grade



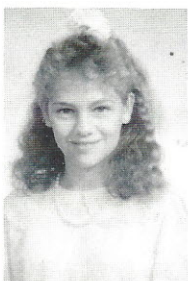

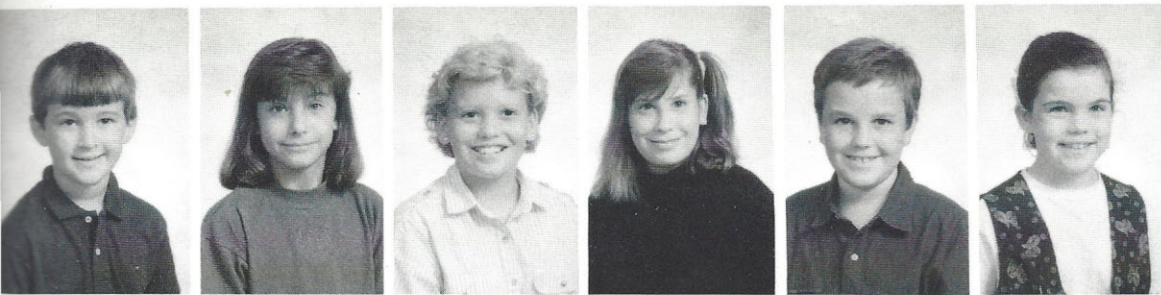

“Class of 2000”

Let us introduce you to the class of 2000. An exceptional class doing exceptionally well. In the classroom, these “thirsty” third graders have tackled multiplication tables, a huge reading vocabulary, and an interesting view into S.C. History. Although the Persian Gulf War rocked the entire world, it was an educational experience. The class wrote to several servicemen and received letters from them. Lt. Peter Rambo surprised the class one day when he dropped in dressed in his camouflage uniform. Peter, an RWA alumnus, answered many questions and corrected misconceived notions about the War in the Gulf. Lt. Rambo explained his job and his position in Saudi Arabia which was a nice lesson in geography. In March, music instructor, Laurens Livings, led the class in a S.C. History program. This was an exceptionally special program because it featured songs composed by Winnsboro’s own Mrs. Nelle McMaster Sprott. Mrs. Sprott is the sister of Mrs. Livings and the grandmother of class member Hall Sprott. Those in

attendance at this program were able to see the quilt made by the class. Each student was given a 12 inch square of muslin. On each piece was sketched one of our state symbols. The students painted, colored, or used markers to decorate his/her square. When all squares were completed, they were sewn together pieced by royal blue stripes. By participating in this project, students learned their state symbols, how quilts are made, and most importantly—teamwork. Out of the classroom, we took trips to Charleston, the Governor’s Mansion, and Adluh Flour Co. where warm biscuits topped off the tour. In May, the class was privileged to have Mrs. Hannah Phillips give us a tour of our county. The tour began in historic Winnsboro, progressed to the Old Brick Church, and stopped for a picnic lunch at Lake Monticello. From there, the class traveled to Blair and visited an old country store. In and out of the classroom, these third graders had a wonderful year!

2nd Grade Had An Exciting Year

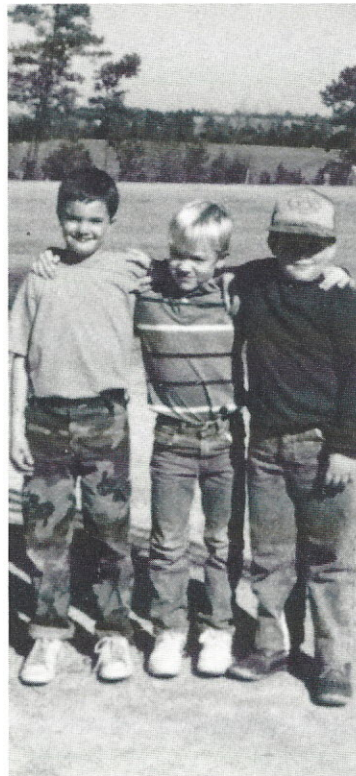
Several trips were enjoyed by the second grade: the ballet at Koger Center in Columbia and tours of the Adluh Flour Company and "the State Paper" headquarters.

Under the direction of our music teacher, Mrs. Livings, we sang songs and portrayed the characters in these songs for our end-of-the-year music program.

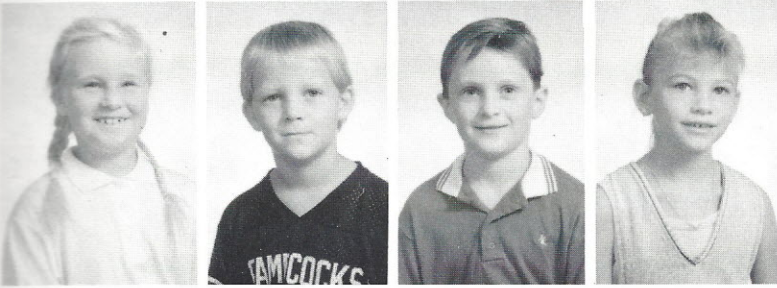

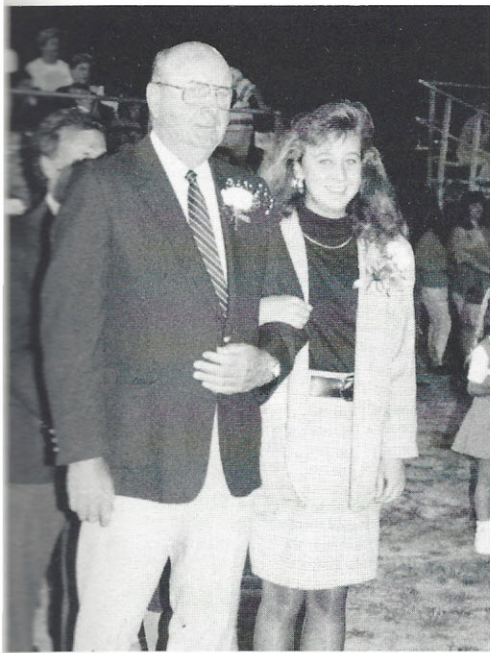

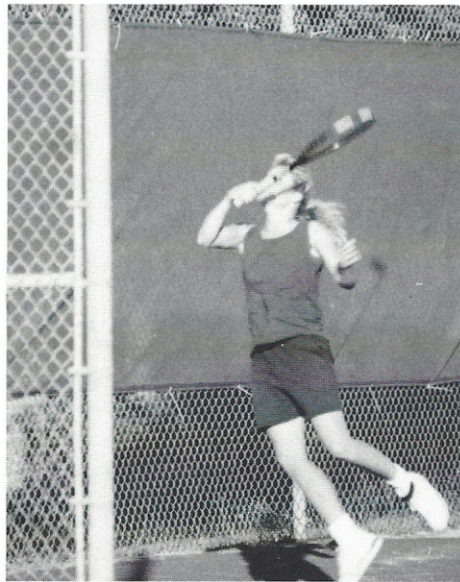

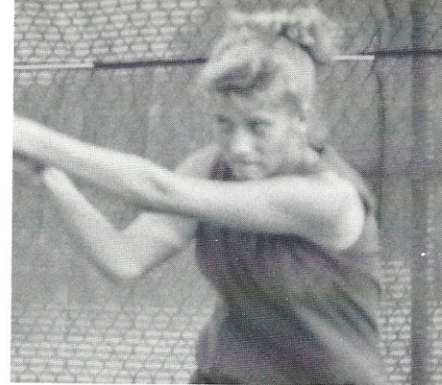

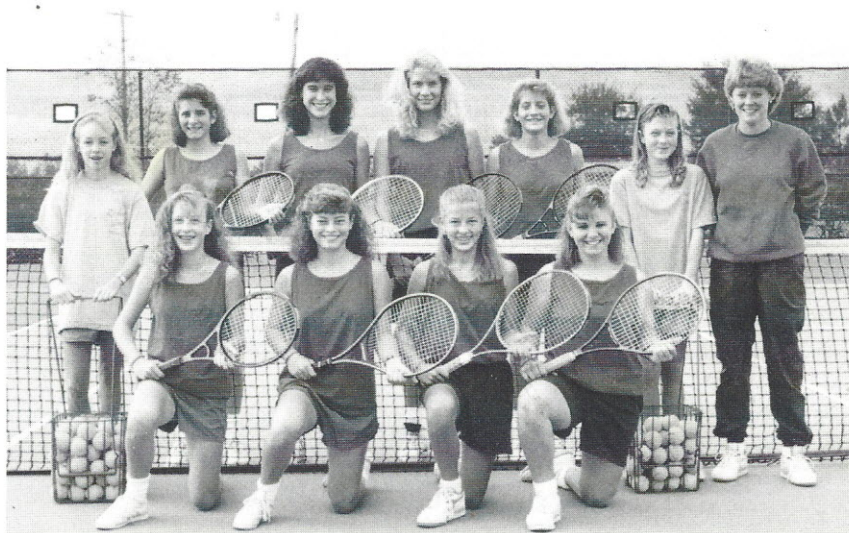

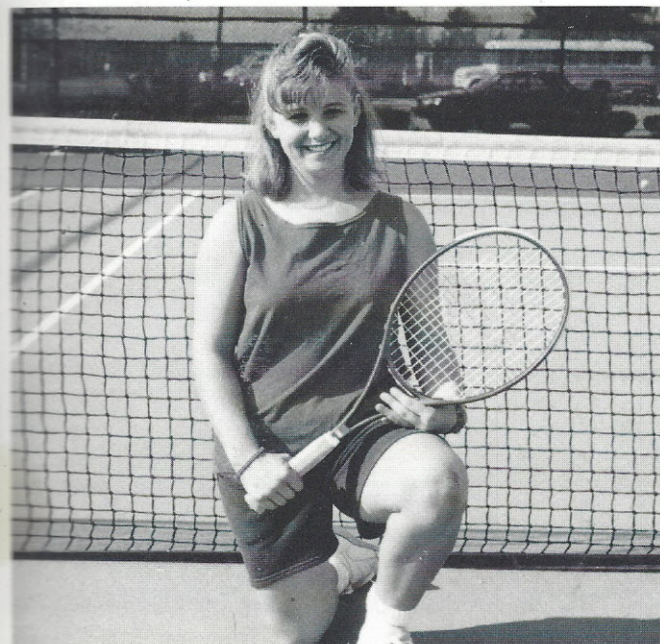

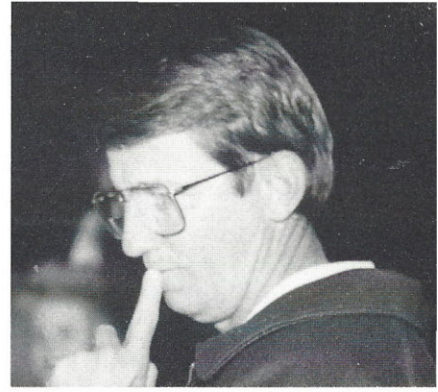

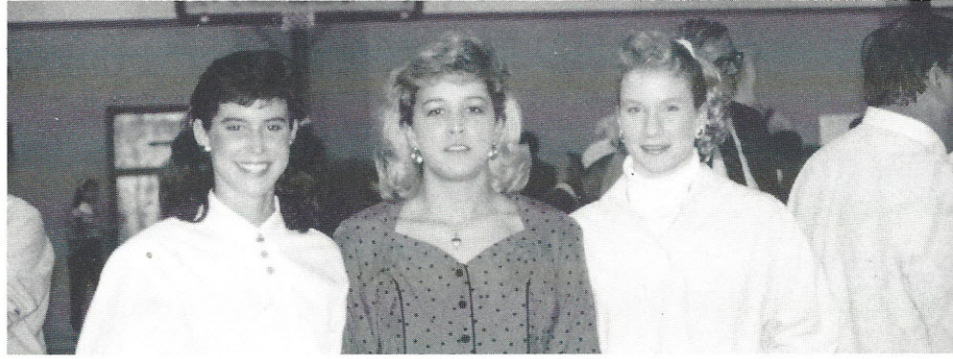

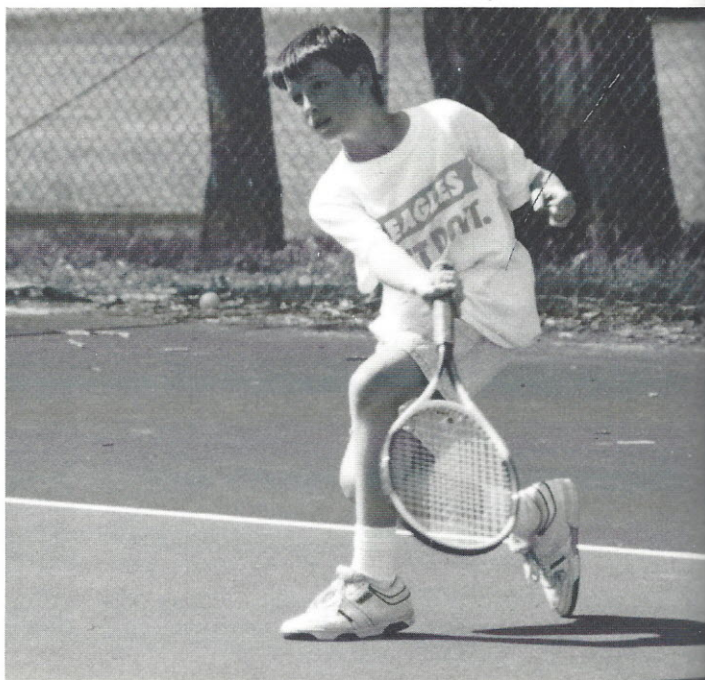

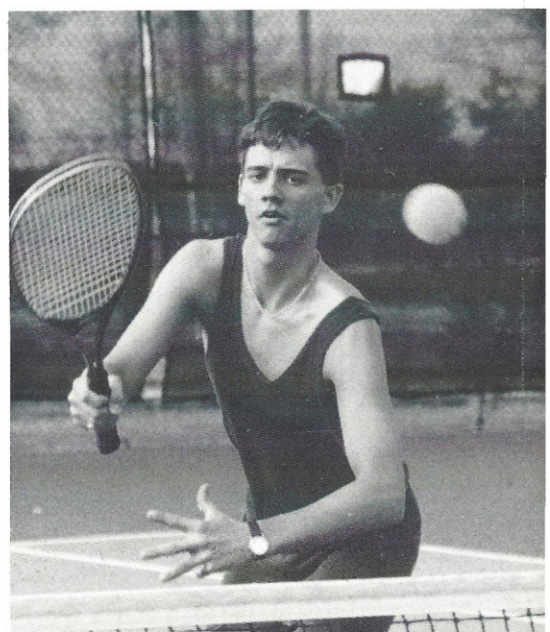

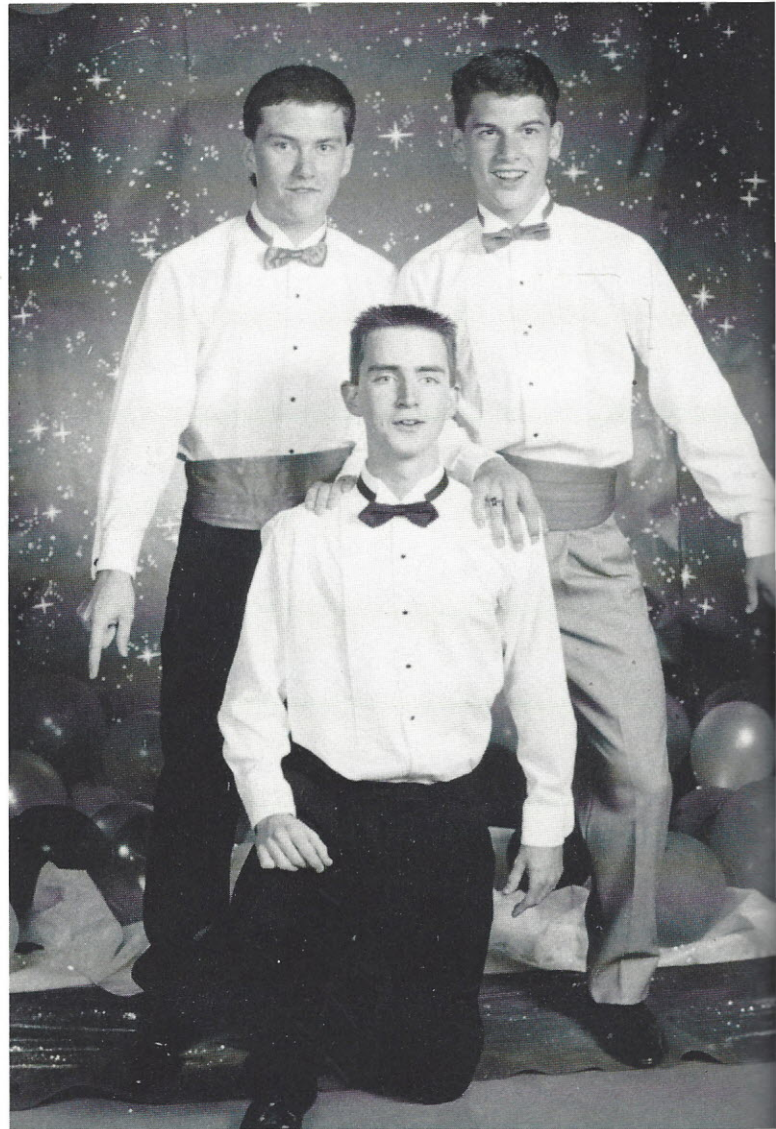
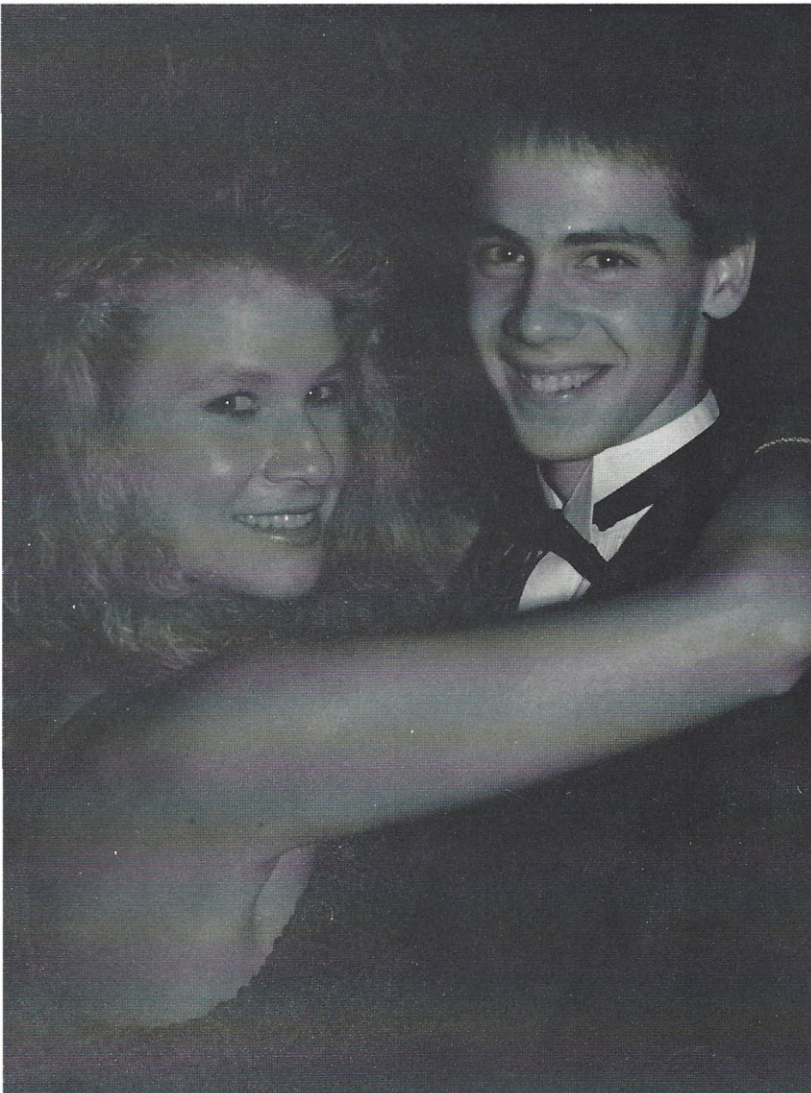
Jr.-Sr. Prom '91

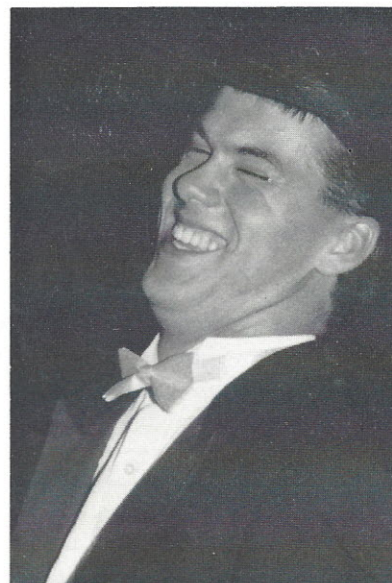

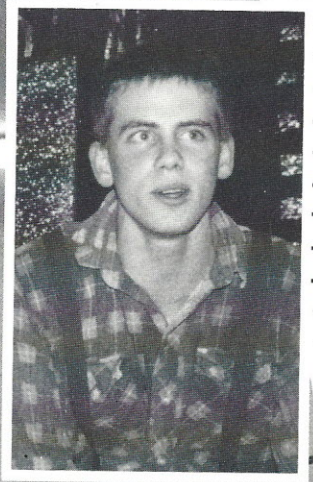

With all of the activities offered at RWA, everyone has the opportunity to participate.



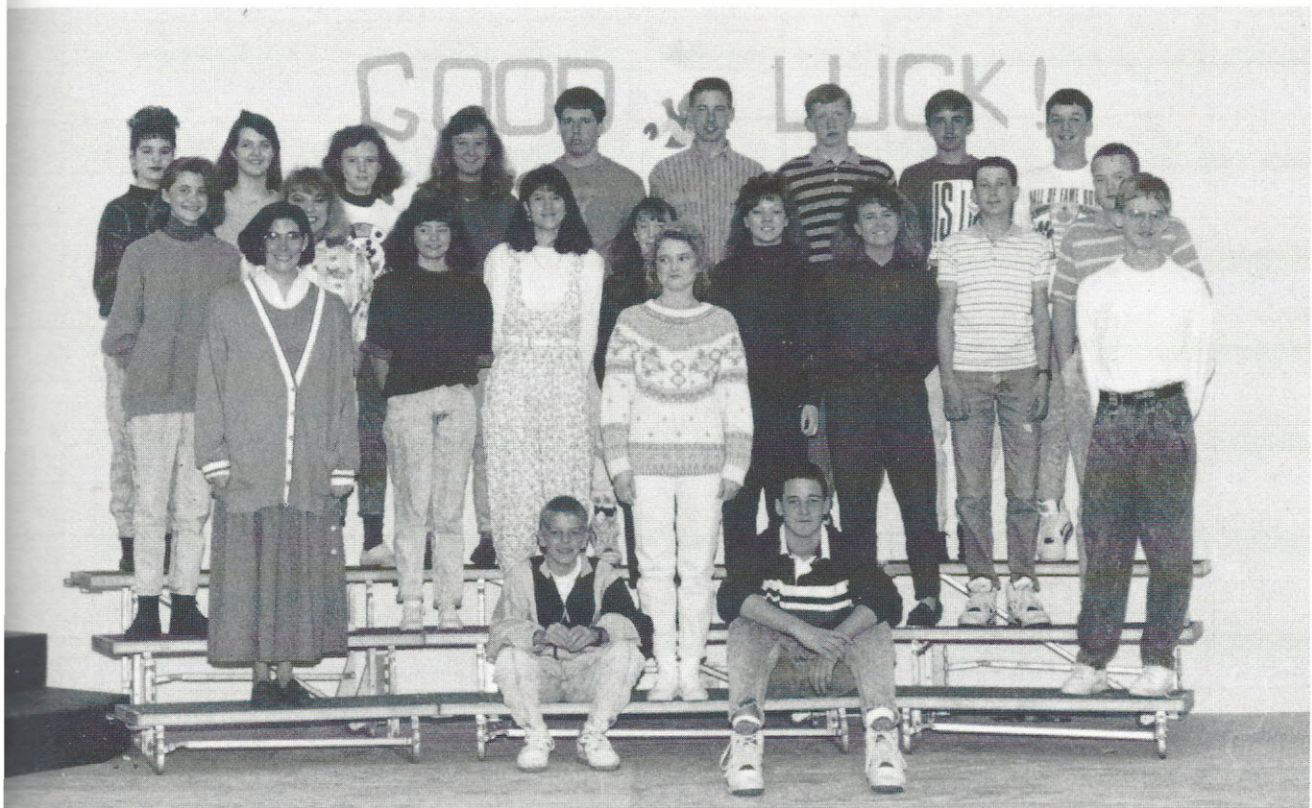
