
#### In Appreciation and Dedication


#### JUNIORS STAY BUSY RAISING FUNDS

















#### "VERSATILE" DESCRIBES THIS LARGE GROUP


### Seventh Graders Arrive


eval castles were displayed in the school library for the whole student body to enjoy.






The laying of the wreath ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier was very memorable.

tomorrow.



















































