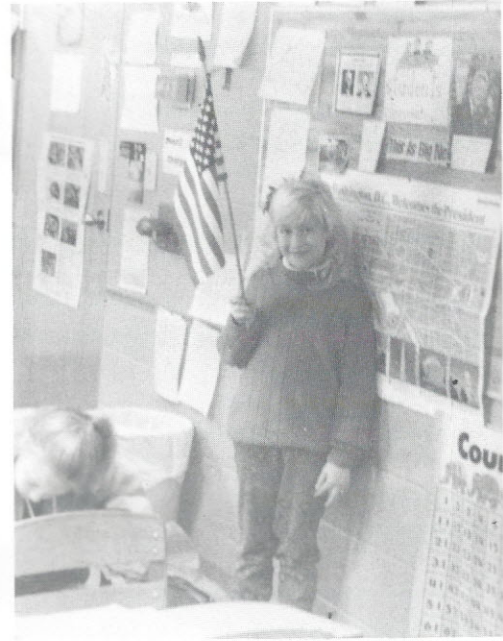
My Favorite Things . . .

Even though they are young, these students have formed the opinions of their favorite things. The choices and favorites of this class will affect their lives for years to come.

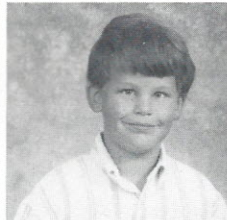

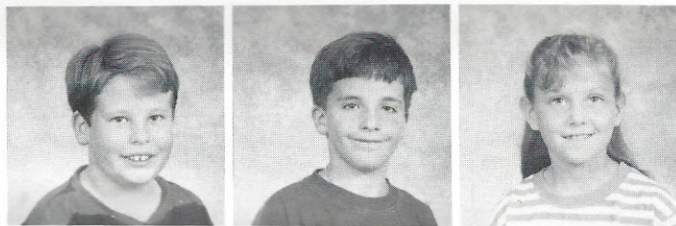
fishing and watching television.

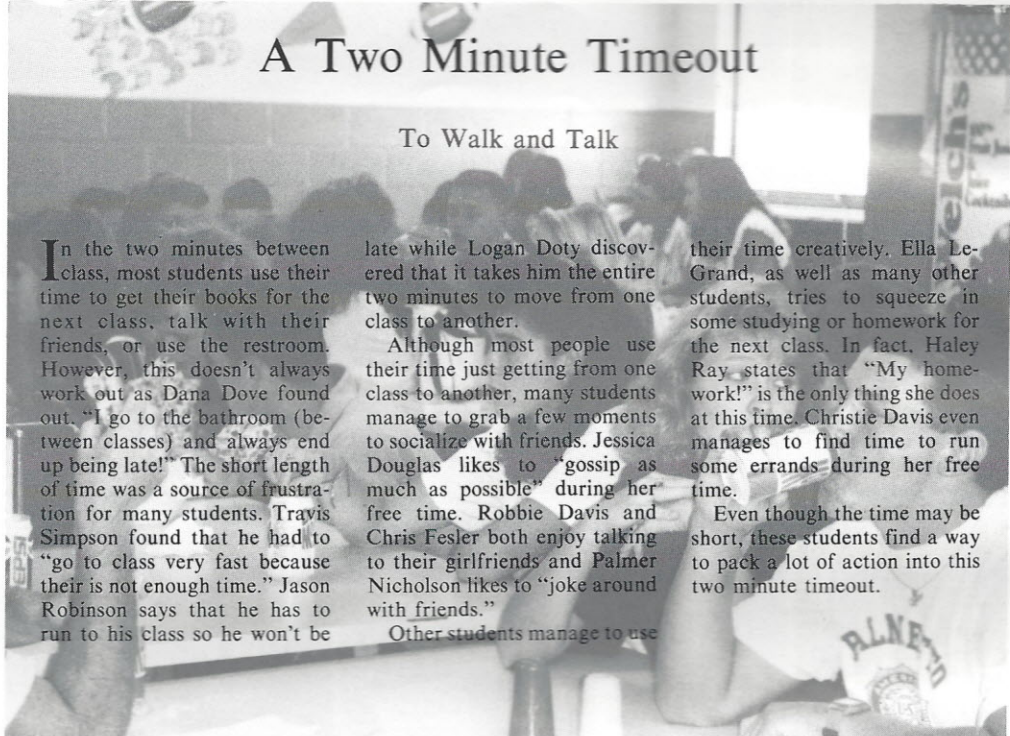
late while Logan Doty discovered that it takes him the entire two minutes to move from one class to another.

lings fight?" was another question. Believe it or not, most replied they don't argue with brothers and sisters.

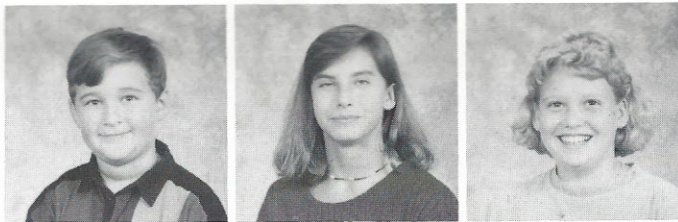
Nearly all of the group said they use the two minutes between classes to chat with friends and prepare for the next class.

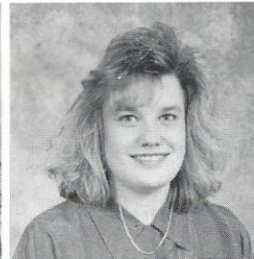
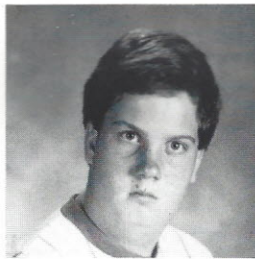
Sophomores Get Involved



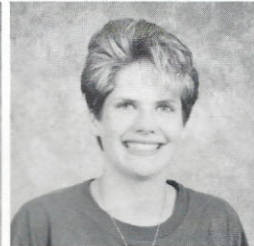

Whatever the future holds for these twelve seniors, we wish them much success!

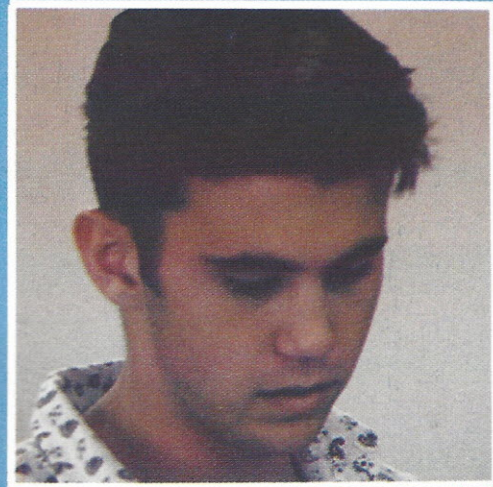
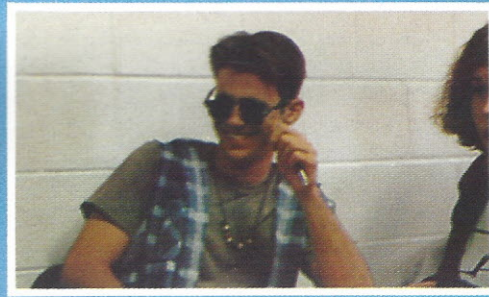

tations and caps and gowns," commented John Martin.

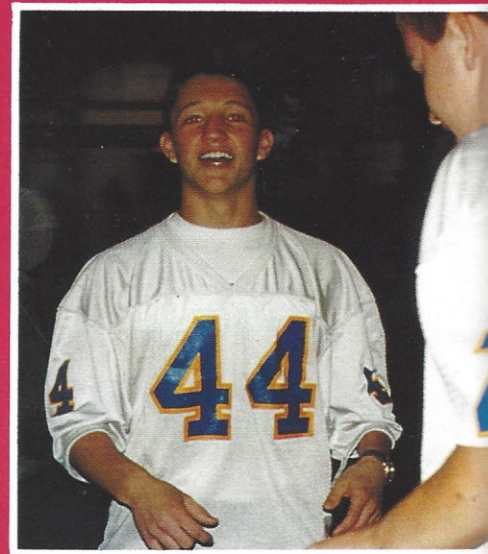
Camak Blair seemed to have a different opinion. "So far my senior year hasn't been any more expensive than any other year."

Mr. David Porter teaches high school business math, economics and government, S.C. history, driver's ed, and physical education. He also is an assistant J.V. football coach.

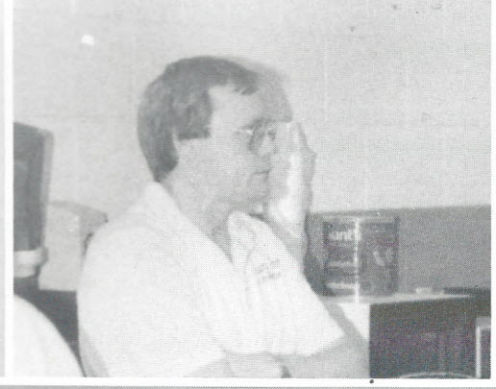

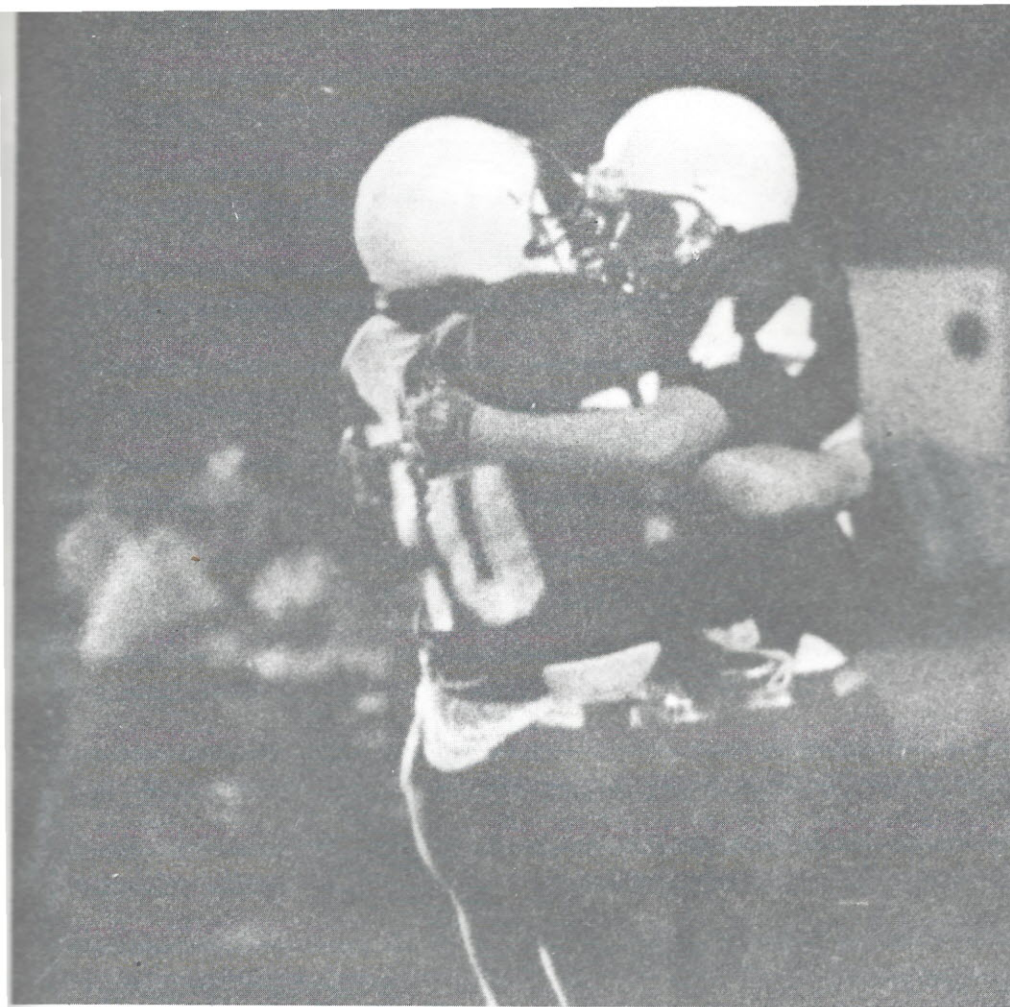

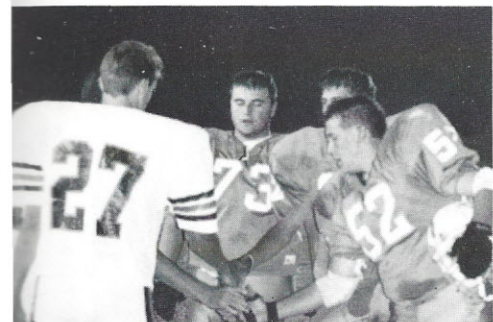

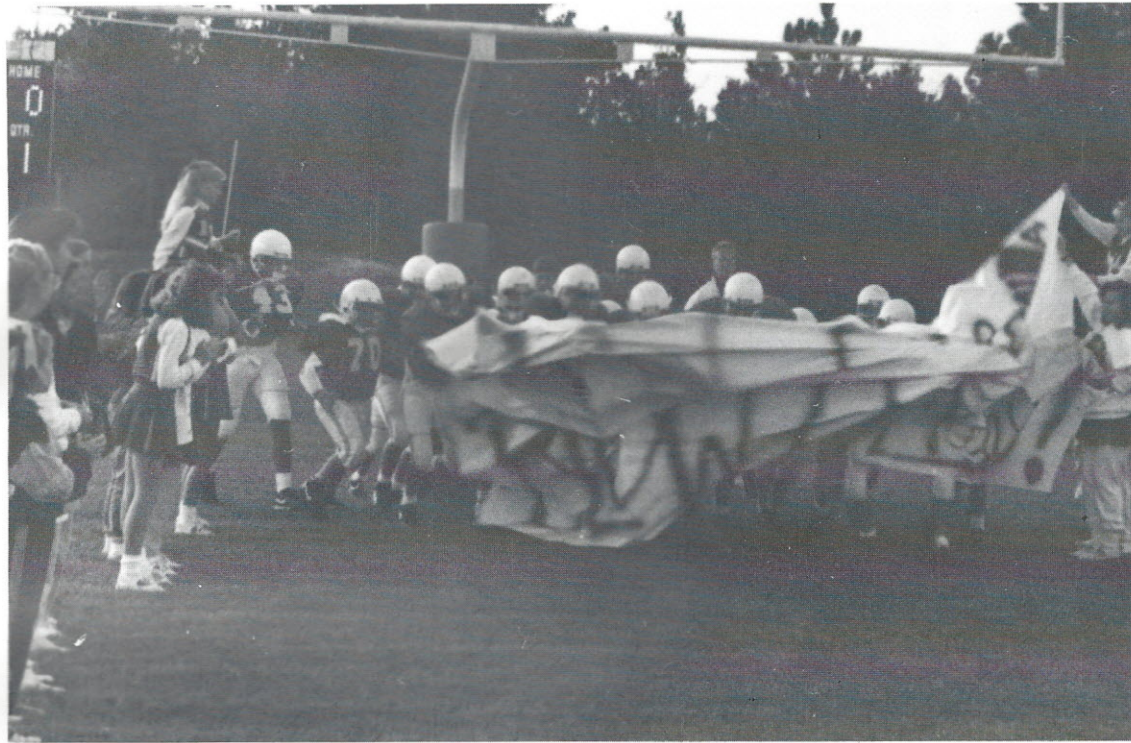

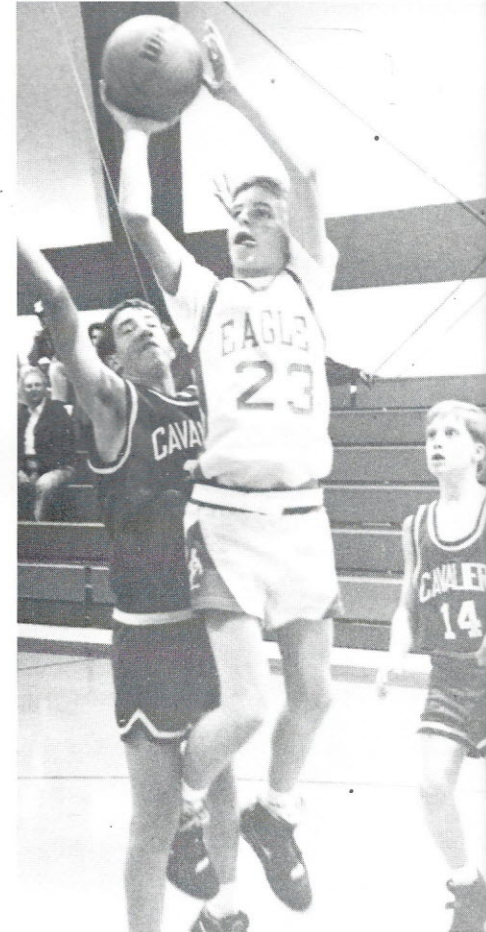

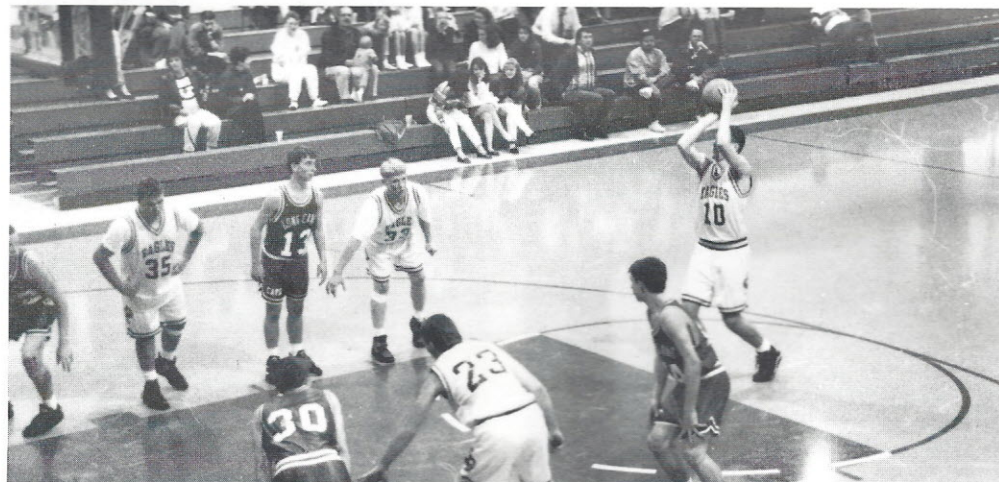

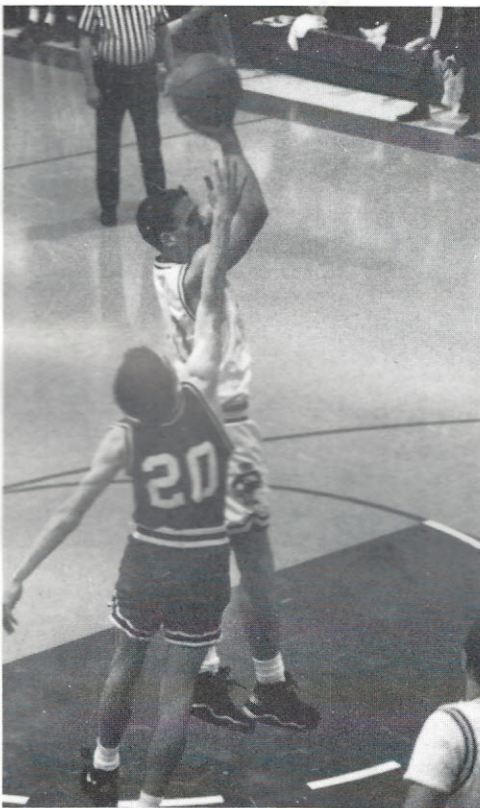

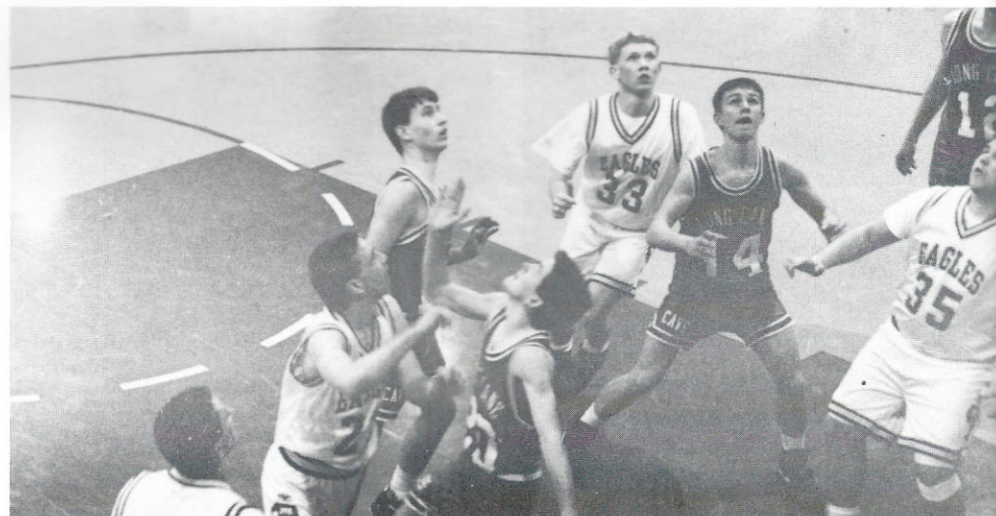

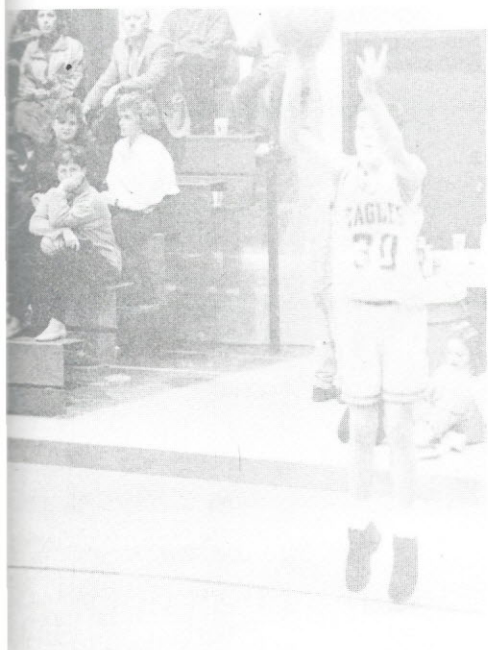

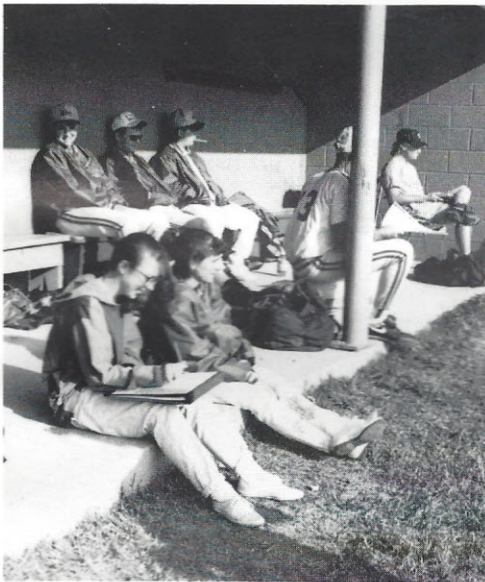

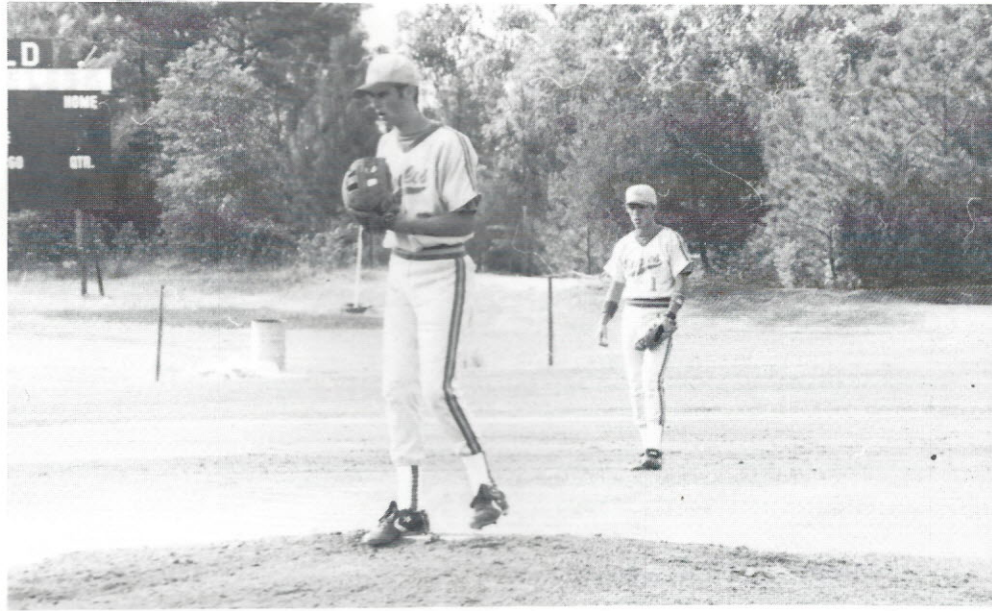

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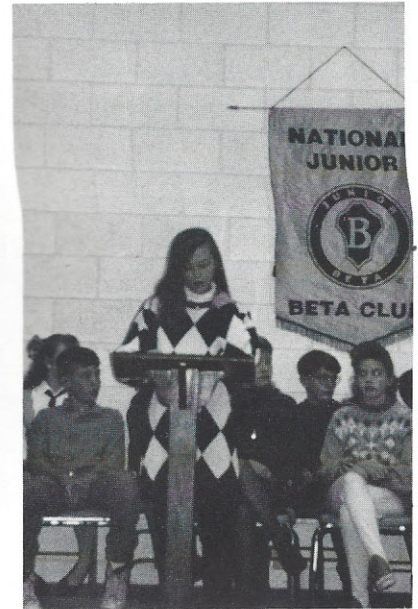

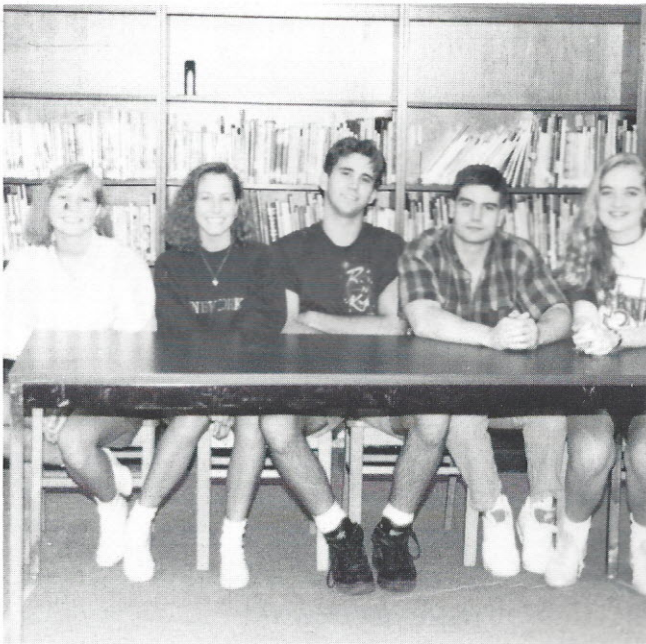

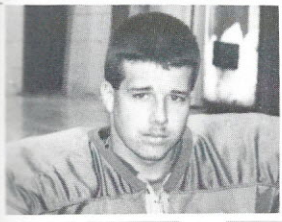

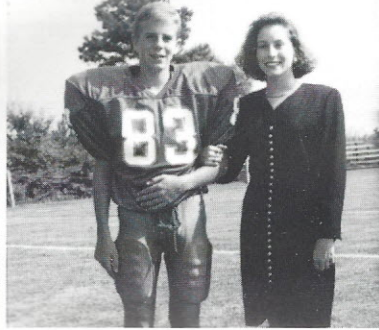

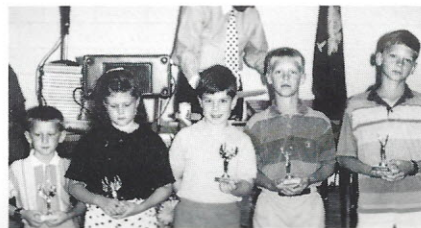

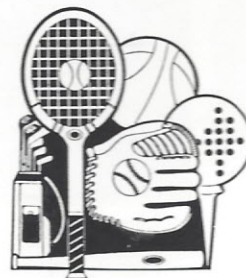

Once again this year, RWA participated in the Nationwide Insurance Prom Promise Program. This is a special program held across the nation that teaches young people the dangers of drinking and driving.

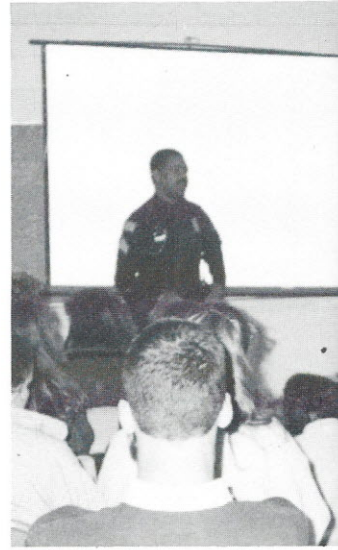

ise pledge cards were distributed. By signing these pledge cards, students promised, in front of their peers, not to drink or do drugs on prom night.

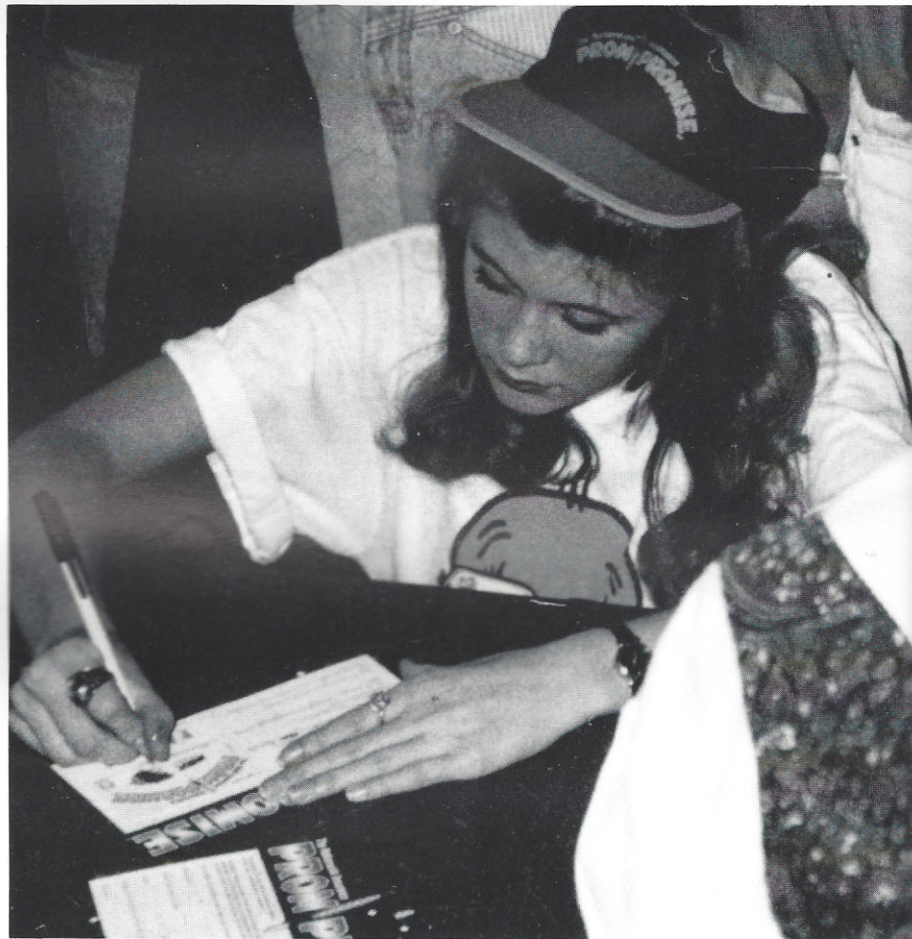
