Even though they are young, these students have formed their opinions of their favorite things. The choices and favorites of this class will affect their lives for years to come.



Sophomores Get Involved





Whatever the future holds for these twelve seniors, we wish them much success!







"Yes, because we have to pay for SAT, along with invi-


tations and caps and gowns," commented John Martin.

"It hasn't yet," replied Michelle Moody, "but I'm sure that it will since I still have to pay for graduation expenses and college application fees."





Aside from directing the middle and high school choruses, Mrs. Ellen Nicholson teaches middle and high school English and literature and is the junior class sponsor.


Mr. David Porter teaches high school business math, economics and government, S.C. history, driver's ed, and physical education. He also is an assistant J.V. football coach.

























The season began with high hopes for the Eagles, but inconsistencies and poor












