





For the students wishing to prepare themselves for a job immediately after graduation or for worthwhile knowledge, programs are available.


First and second year and advanced agriculture are offered. Both theory and practical application are taught in classroom, laboratory, and field trips, and school work is supplemented by projects at home.

Two years each of Latin and French are offered as electives. Most students who expect to go to college find it advantageous to take one or possibly both of the available language courses.



PHYSICAL EDUCATION


