

The 1964 graduating class has the unique distinction of being the first class to complete five years at Winnsboro High School. Looking back, we Seniors can remember our eight grade ratting year—the first year of consolidation. The completely new and up-to date facilities provided an environment conducive to learning and soon developed school spirit. In addition to the modern physical plant, improvements were made in academic departments. The faculty was enlarged, a guidance department added, the Commercial Department was expanded to include a greater variety of courses in office occupations, and forestry was added to the Agricultural Department. 




In this section are shown the extra-curricular activities at Winnsboro High School which give every person an opportunity to join a club of interest to him.

The French Club is composed of students who are taking first and second year French. The purpose of the French Club is to give students insight and knowledge into culture and customs of France.




The first bell rang for the '62 fall,




