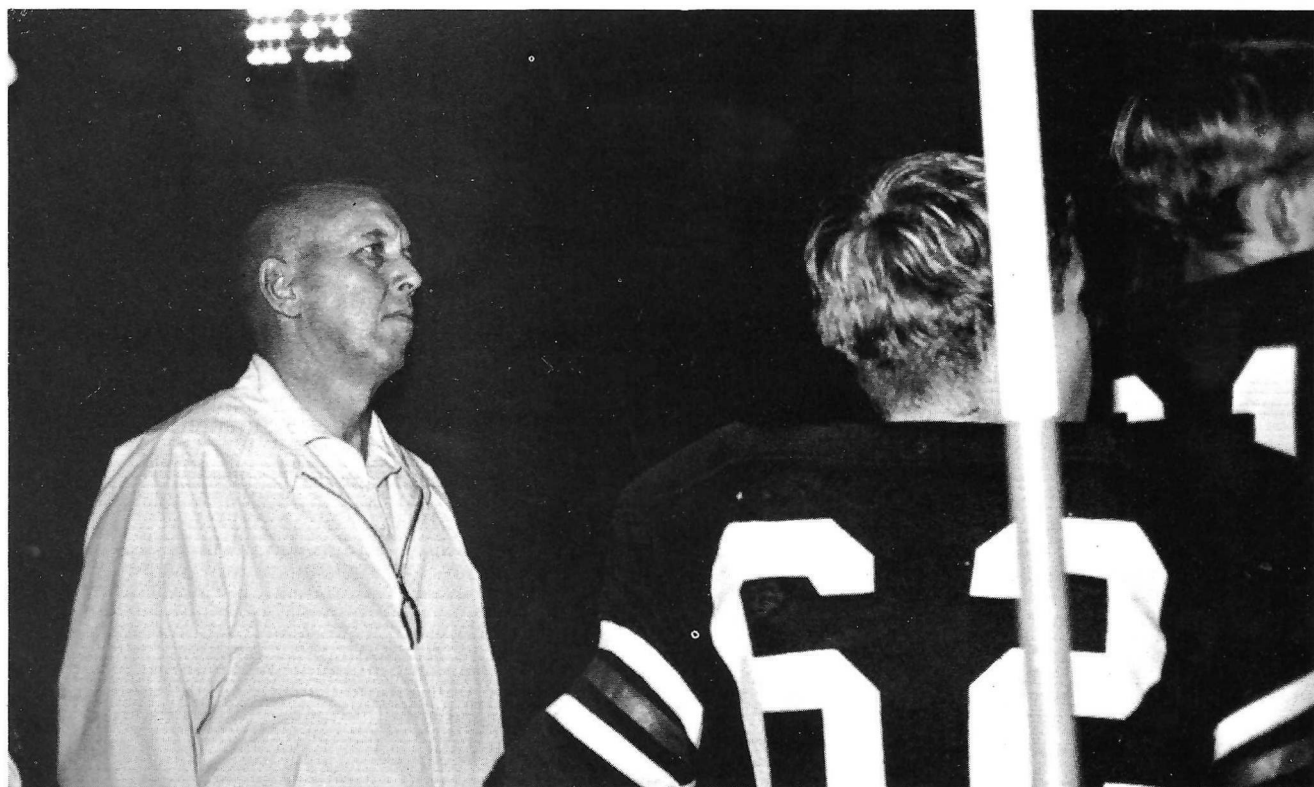




DEDICATION

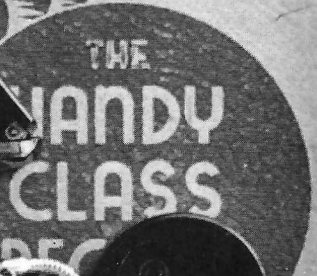
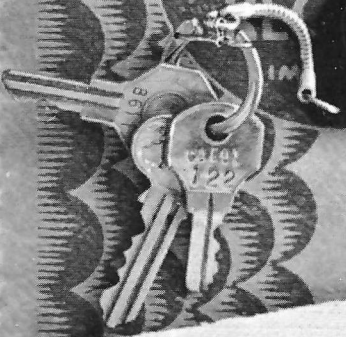
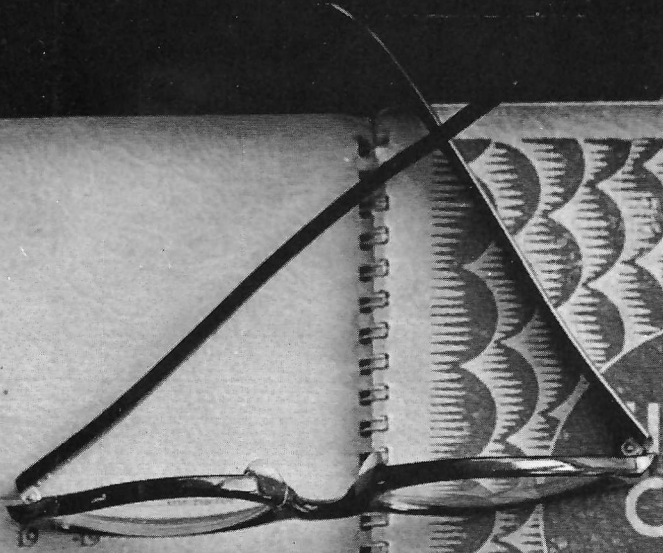
FACULTY AND ADMINISTRATION

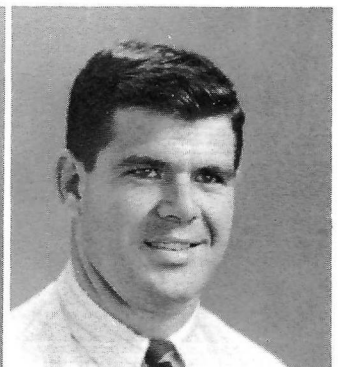
other countries, choosing a vocation, or in achieving international friendship. To promote these aims, the language department at Winnsboro High School offers courses in both French and Latin.

Physical education is required for both boys and girls in grades eight, nine, and ten.

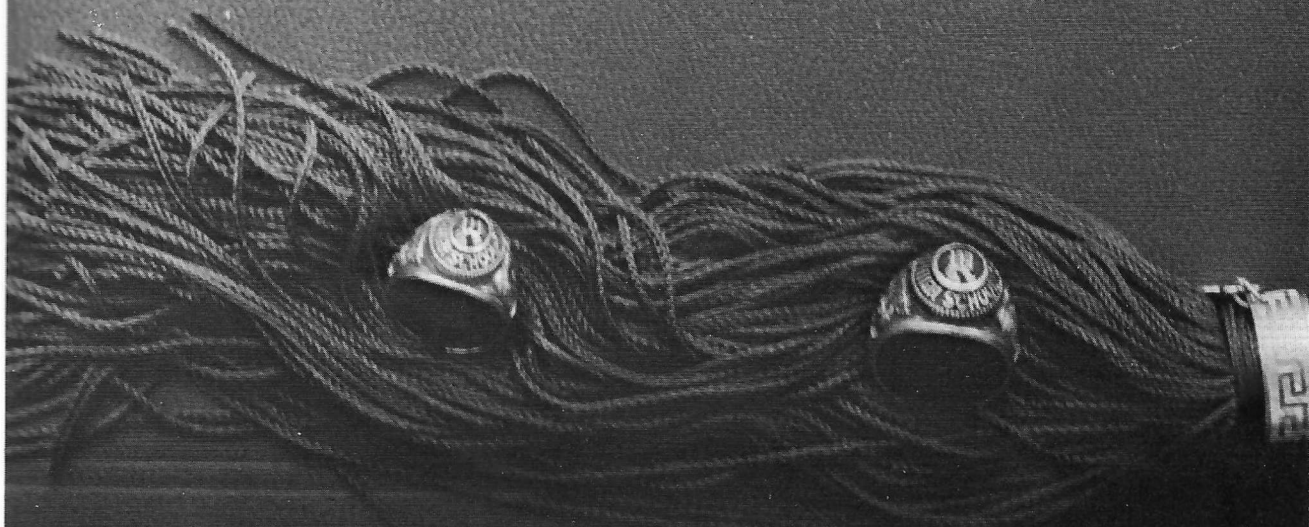

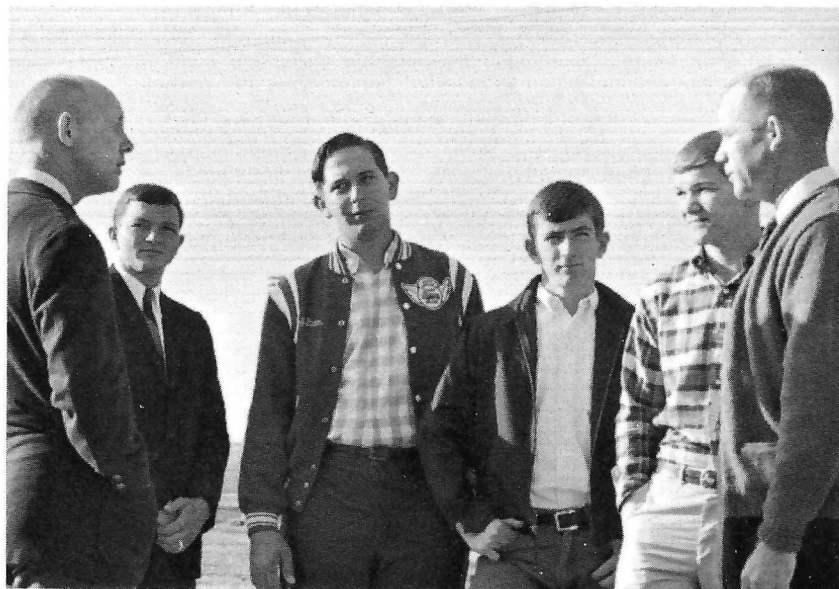
FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA

first works, which was our own class poem. After talking to Mary for a while we move on to the next display.

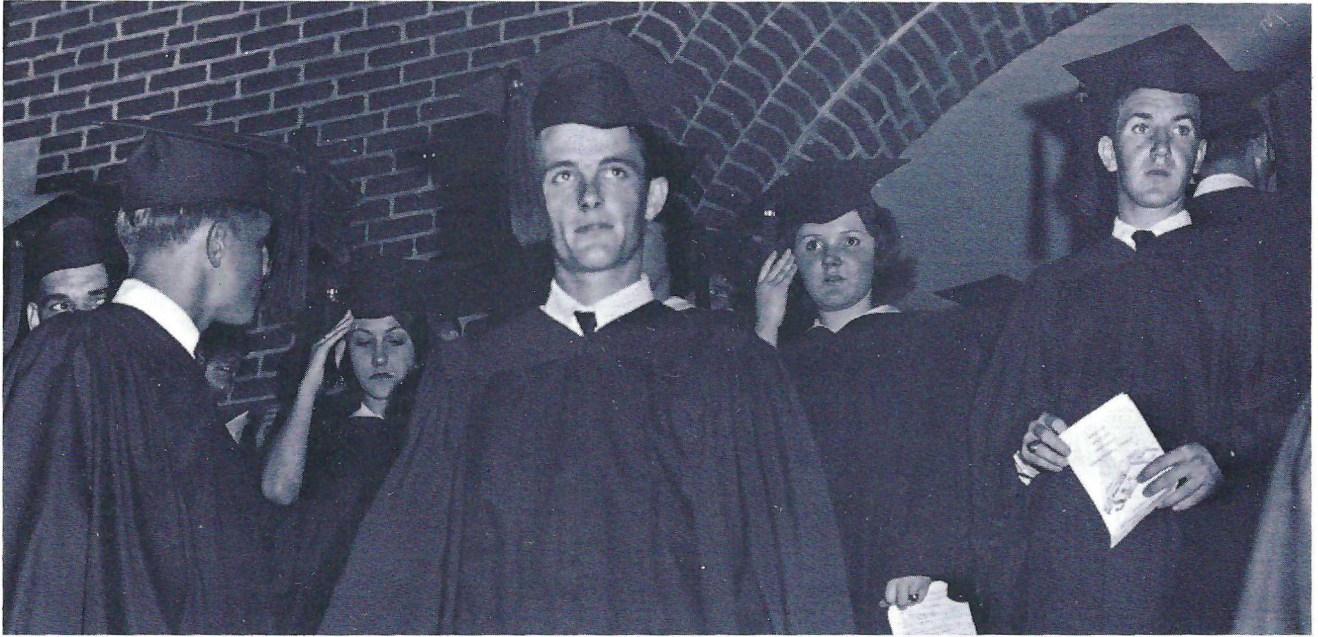

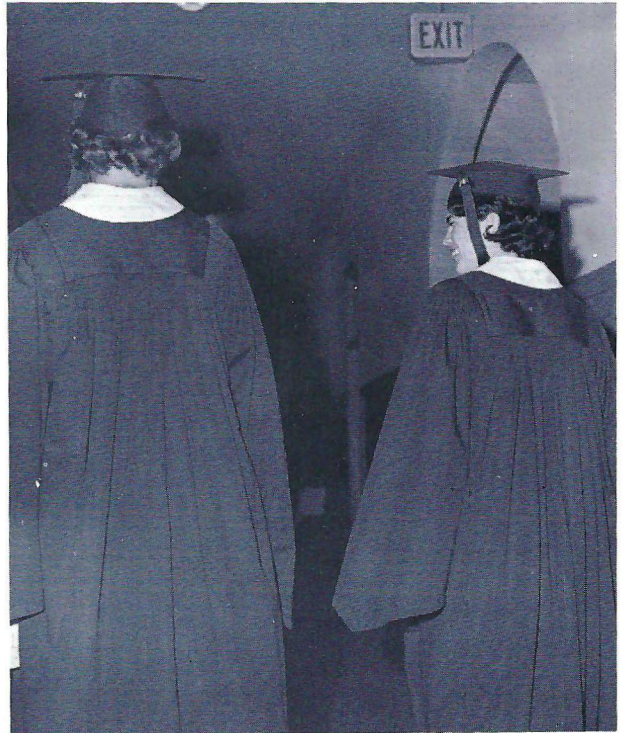
