Norman E. Yongue, 61, chief of the chemistry division in the District Health Department's Bureau of Laboratories, in Washington, D. C., died on June 9th at the Casualty Hospital following a stroke.

Born in Pickens, he was graduated from The Citadel and later did post-graduate work at Tulane University and the University of North Carolina.

After receiving his master's degree in chemistry from George Washington University, he joined the District Health Department in 1929 as a chemist. He served as a captain in the Army Chemical Corps in World War II and after the war rejoined the Health Department as chief of the chemistry division.

He was a charter member of the River Road United Presbyterian Church, where he had served as an elder and Sunday school teacher.

## Macfie Anderson, Fairfield Native, Dies in Columbia

James Macfie Anderson, 78, Fairfield native and mayor of Columbia from 1950 to 1954, died Saturday afternoon at the Providence Hospital after an extended illness. The former hardware merchant and prominent civic leader served as the first mayor under the capital city's council-manager form of government.

Funeral services, conducted by Dr. John Allen Wilson and Dr. Samuel H. Hay, were held Monday morning at Arsenal Hill Presbyterian Church and interment was in the First Presbyterian churchyard. Serving as active pallbearers were Edward A. McMaster, McGregor Macfie and Hampton Macfie of Winnsboro, Laird Anderson, Edward K. Anderson, Douglass Ruff, Paul Kerr and John M. Biggam.

Mr. Anderson was born Jan. 21, 1888, in Fairfield county at the Kincaid-Anderson home, now known as Heyward Hall. He was the son of Captain Thomas Kincaid Anderson and Agnes Morgan Macfie Anderson. James Kincaid, his ancestor, built the historic Kincaid manor, said to be one of the first brick homes in the South Carolina upcountry. He was also said to have been the original inventor of the cotton gin. On the plantation is a large expanse of granite, now the site of the Winnsboro Blue Granite Corporation.

Mr. Anderson received his education in the Fairfield county schools and at Draughon's Business College. He went to Columbia in 1904 at the age of 16 and his first job was with the T. B. Aughtry Company, a large hardware and merchandise concern. In 1911, he bought an interest in Ruff Hardware Company, then operated by its founder, Thomas D. Ruff, a Kearly, Asheville, N. C., and Mrs. Harry Caldwell, Bradenton, Fla.

## Colonel McMaster Dies in Virginia

Colonel Richard Hugh McMaster, 91, Winnsboro native, and a career officer in the United States army before his retirement in 1938, died Saturday in Arlington, Va. He had been in declining health for a number of years.

He was born in Winnsboro Dec. 18, 1874, the son of Richard Nott McMaster, a Confederate cavalryman, and Sarah Agnes Boulware McMaster. He was educated at the old Mount Zion Academy and was graduated from The Citadel in 1894. He was one of the oldest living graduates of the South Carolina Military College.

He enlisted in the then 40,000-man U. S. army as an "additional private" and was commissioned in 1898 after service in the Indian Territory, now the State of Oklahoma. During his long military career, which covered a span of 43 years, Col. McMaster served in the Philippines, Mexico and Germany.

Subsequently, he filled many assignments, both at home and abroad. He was the senior colonel in the U. S. Army at the time of his retirement.

Col. McMaster maintained a keen interest in Fairfield county and South Carolina and contributed many articles for publication throughout the years.

In 1904, he married Miss Elizabeth Keith Bass of New London, Conn. Survivors include four sons, Major Richard K. McMaster (USA, retired) of El Paso, Texas; Capt. Fitz Hugh McMaster, (USA, retired) of West Hartford, Conn.; Don Buchanan McMaster of Arlington, Va., and Hal C. McMaster, Wichita, Kansas; one sister, Mrs. Ormsby Bourke of Wesley Manor, Jacksonville, Fla., 15 grandchildren and six great grandchildren. Two sisters, Mrs. Rachel McMaster Kennerly and Mrs. Mary McMaster Stevenson, both of Winnsboro, predeceased him.

Miss Heyward was a longtime member of the National Society of Colonial Dames of America and was a past chairman of the Columbia Committee. In 1964 she was placed in the Society's Role of Honor in recognition of her outstanding contribution to the preservation of Gunston Hall, historic home of Virginia's George Mason, whose original Bill of Rights formed the basis for the First Ten Amendments to the U. S. Constitution. At the time of her death she was South Carolina Regent for Gunston Hall.

During World War II, Miss Heyward served with the Richland County Chapter of the American Red Cross as a Grey Lady and as a volunteer at the Columbia USO. She was a member of the State Board of the League of Women Voters of South Carolina from the time of its organization in 1951 until 1962 and she served as an officer of the League's Columbia chapter.

Miss Heyward was a member of Columbia's Trinity Episcopal Church and gave unstintingly of her time and talents to religious activities. She was a familiar figure in the sacristy of Trinity as a member of the Altar Guild, did needlework, contributed numbers of cloths for the communion silver and altar fair linens, not only to Trinity but to new missions as

they were organized. Also, she made many beautiful surplices and stolls for ministers of the church and instructed classes throughout the Diocese in altar work and in the making of altar linens. She was chapter worship chairman for the Daughters of the Holy Cross of Trinity Church.

On the Diocesan level, Miss Heyward served the Women of the Church as chairman of the Church Home for Women and she helped solidify support for this worthy organization.

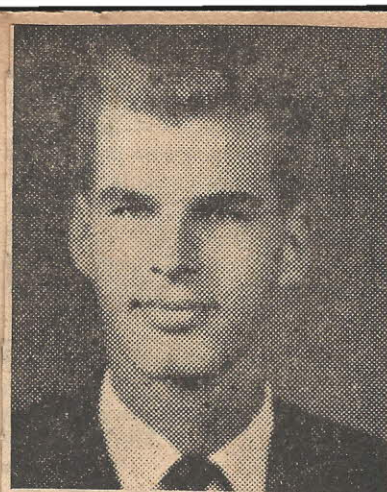

Douglas McKay Sr. was once entertained by the Queen of England, but the highlights of his life remained his work as a University of South Carolina alumnus and as an attorney.

These were still the dominant interests in his life when he died at 5 p.m. Tuesday in the Columbia hospital. Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed and will be announced.

Mr. McKay was praised Tuesday night by John M. Scott of Florence, president of the S. C. Bar Association, as "an outstanding man and citizen, as well as lawyer."



"He has just been a great man, a man we have always looked up to," said Scott. "Words just can't express our feeling for him. It is a tremendous loss for the Bar Association and for the people of South Carolina."

Mr. McKay was honored recently for his long legal service, but his first love, according to his family, has always been the University of South Carolina.

He was graduated from the University in 1906 with an A.B. degree. During his college career he was president of the student body, captain of the 1905 football team and member of Omicron Delta Kappa national honorary society.

Following his graduation, he began the study of law at the University and under Supreme Court Justice C. A. Woods. However, he took time enough to coach the University's football team to an undefeated season in 1907.

Mr. McKay was appointed to vention of the ABA in England when he received an invitation to have tea in the royal pavilion after a garden party.

## Man Fatally Shot In Struggle With Local Policeman

Frank Pauling, about 45, local brick mason, was fatally shot early Tuesday morning in a struggle with Winnsboro police officer Curtis Barwick. Pauling was pronounced dead upon arrival at the Fairfield Memorial Hospital.

The scuffle took place between 6:30 and 6:40 a.m., shortly before Barwick was to have gone on duty at 7 o'clock. Barwick's gun was discharged during the scuffle. According to reports, the son had returned to his father's car when the shooting occurred.

Officer Barwick, who is under temporary technical suspension from the police force pending further investigation, is said to have suffered a gash on his head, abrasions and a shoulder injury.

Coroner Boulware said the time of the inquest had not yet been set. In addition to local authorities, representatives from SLED investigated the matter. Officer Barwick has been with the local police force about a year. He came here from Kingstree.
