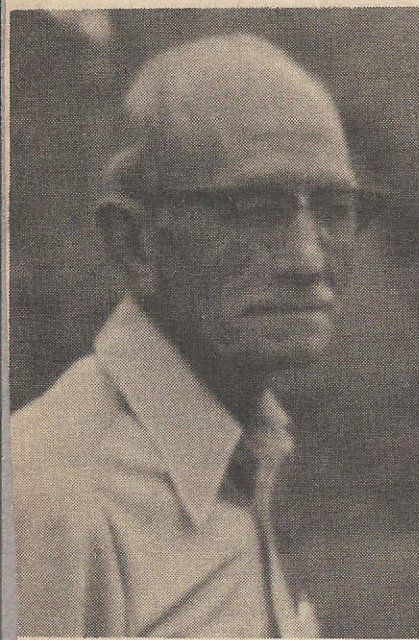

Dr. Cothran Killed In Accident

Fairfieldians reacted with shock and grief to the news on Friday of the death of the county's newest physician, Dr. Benjamin Alexander Cothran, Jr. Dr. Cothran, 33, was killed early Friday morning in a one vehicle accident on Secondary Road 19 in Fairfield County.

According to Fairfield Coroner Joe Silvia, Dr. Cothran was within a mile or so of his home when the accident occurred. He had attended a meeting in Columbia earlier. The time of the accident has been placed at approximately 12:30 a.m. Cothran apparently went to sleep, ran off the shoulder of the road, hit a bump and lost control of his AMC Jeep Wagoner. The jeep climbed an embankment and hit a tree, and Dr. Cothran was thrown from the vehicle. He is believed to have died instantly, although the wreckage was not discovered until 5 a.m. Friday morning, when Ms. Pearl Boyd came upon it as she was enroute to a Columbia hospital.

Dr. Cothran came to Winnsboro in October of 1980, when he assumed the practice of Dr. J.B. Floyd, upon Dr. Floyd's retirement.

He was born in Columbia on November 26, 1947, son of Benjamin

Alexander and Doris Murray Cothran. He attended high school in Sumter where he was an outstanding athlete, playing football, basketball and baseball. He was president of the student body during his senior year. He attended Clemson University before entering the Army, and he served in Vietnam as a 1st lieutenant. After completing his military service, he graduated magna cum laude from the University of South Carolina. He obtained his medical degree from the Medical University of South Carolina at Charleston and served a three-year surgery residency at Richland Memorial Hospital before deciding on a family medical practice.

Dr. Cothran was a member of the South Carolina Medical Association, the American College of Surgeons, the SAE Fraternity at Clemson University and was an Eagle Scout.

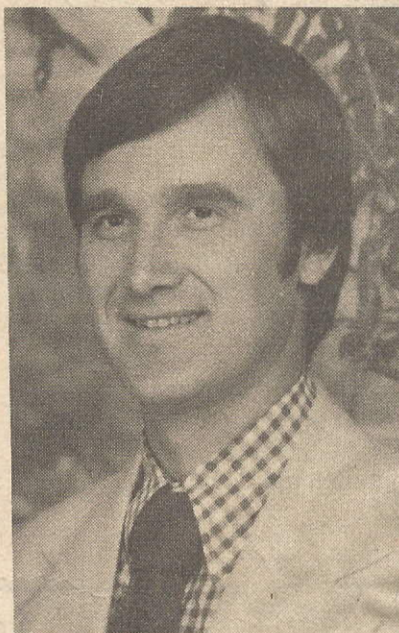

She taught for many years at Heathwood Hall Episcopal School and at the Mellichamp Music Studios
