Thurmonds accustomed to life in the spotlight

Television camera lights, stage lights, sunlight: There is no difference in warmth to the skin. For a child born into the bright circle of celebrity, even the warmth is hardly noticeable.

In 1971, Nancy Moore Thurmond's arrival into this world was news. Daughter of a beauty queen and the powerful Senator Thurmond from South Carolina. A small knot of reporters gathered in the hallways of Self Memorial Hospital in Greenwood and flashbulbs popped outside the nursery window. The proud father posed and cracked jokes ("She has more hair than I have right now") and the reporters scribbled in their notebooks.

By all accounts, young Nancy Moore, mere hours old, was remarkably unimpressed by the commotion. Five days later, when it came time for her to leave the hospital, although cameras whirred and newsmen called out questions to her parents, she slept.

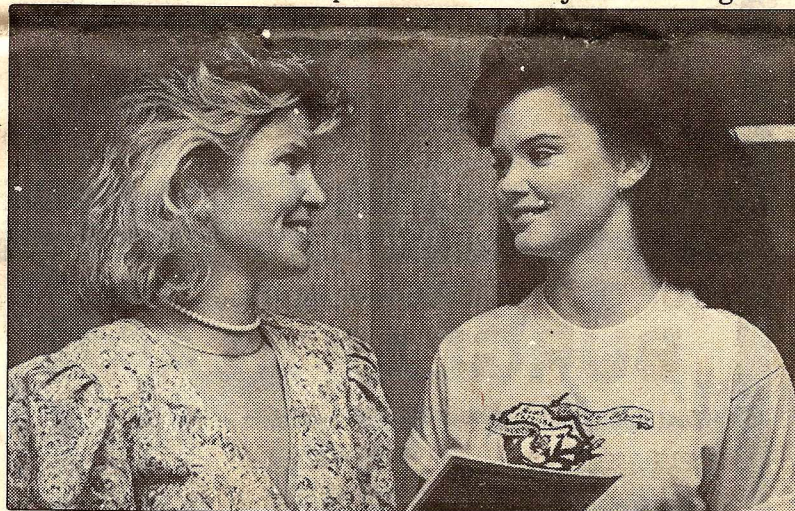
She hit the campaign trail the summer she was 7 years old, dressed in a T-shirt with her name across the front and "Vote for my daddy" across the back. Her whole family — her parents, her two brothers and her sister — piled into a camper nicknamed

"Strom Trek" to cover, her mother remembers, "10,000 miles in 10 weeks."

The weather was 90-plus-degrees. The white camper with blue and white stars and stripes

painted on the side gleamed in the hot sun when it stopped alongside the railroad depots and hardware stores and courthouse lawns of rural South Carolina. The Thurmond children demonstrated they knew how to shake hands and meet the people.

She enjoys movies, eating out, watching sports. She's a varsity cheerleader and on the teen advisory board of a local department store.

But her autograph collection includes such stellar signatures as Victoria Principal, rock star Debby Harry, country pop singer Eddie Rabbit, British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and

(spoken matter-of-factly) "all the presidents, from Nixon up."

She was blessed by the Pope himself. And she recalls meeting President Ford when she was five. The encounter provoked some anxiety. That's because she'd brought some honey in a jar to show the President.

"I didn't mean for him to keep it," Ms. Thurmond explained in a recent telephone conversation. But to five-year-old eyes Ford's intentions seemed alarmingly clear. Before she left the Oval Office, "I remember asking for it back."

Ms. Thurmond is fully aware that meeting the President of the United States and having reporters follow you and your parents around are not standard rite-of-passage experiences. On the one hand, she points out, she was growing up in the nation's capitol, where a good percentage of the children had well-known political fathers.

"Up there," life was — relatively speaking — "normal. There were a lot of political families. Nobody really thought a thing about it."

On the other hand, having frequently found herself in a spotlight over the years, she has learned to be comfortable there. "Due to the unique situation of

Mother and daughter. They share the same name. Nancy Moore added Thurmond when she married Strom Thurmond in 1968. A couple years later, the new father named his daughter after his wife. They go by Nancy and Nancy Moore, mother and daughter respectively. There are also predictable references to Nancy senior and junior; little Nancy, big Nancy.

Comparisons come easy. Both are pianists. Beauty contest winners. Noted for unfailing Southern manners.

But 23 years ago, in 1965, when the elder Nancy Moore became Miss South Carolina and thus stepped squarely into the intense illumination of public and media attention, the experience was new to her.

Her daughter was born to it. Last week, the younger Ms. Thurmond placed first runner up in Greenwood's Festival of Flowers. She had received support, but no coaching from her mother.

In fact, her mother says, "I have bent over backward not to offer her advice or be a stage mother. I didn't ever want it to be my re-living the past through her."

On occasion, holding of the tongue has been difficult. When the younger Ms. Thurmond entered the Aiken Junior Miss contest, for instance. She announced she would play the piano for her talent.

The contest was just a few days off by the time her mother realized, "I had not heard her playing her piece." When she couldn't stand it any longer, Mrs. Thurmond mentioned this to her daughter. With studied casualness. "I don't think I've heard you practice."

Her daughter said she didn't think she needed to practice. Not what a mother, pianist, former beauty contestant wanted to

hear.

Mrs. Thurmond says she sat in the audience the night of the contest, fingers crossed, fervently wishing the talent portion done with.

Needless worry. Mrs. Thurmond remembers, with some amazement, her daughter "played flawlessly."

Concentration, is how Ms. Thurmond explained it later.

This past spring Ms. Thurmond was creator/anchor of Teen Tempo for WAGT-TV in Augusta, Ga. According to Lee Sheridan, station manager, the show has covered such serious topics as teen-age pregnancy and alcoholism.

Ms. Thurmond feels her show provides a voice for teen-agers in the community. "It basically deals with issues that concern them."

She came up with the idea, she recalls, when "My mom said, 'Get an after-school job.' I went around to the different TV stations and explained to them about the need for a show like this." Channel 26 hired her.

Ms. Thurmond is planning on majoring in political science and communications when she goes off to college. After graduation, she'd like to be a news anchor-woman fulltime.

Her name is Thurmond, and she grew up in a political world. Her daddy throws a long shadow, as the saying goes. Thurmonds do not pass unnoticed in South Carolina.

Her mother worries. "I don't know if she has an advantage or a liability because she is maybe singled out a little bit because her last name is a household word."

Successes and failures don't come privately. Still, Ms. Thurmond's resume is a full page long. One thing for sure, she's not afraid to try.

The light of public scrutiny is familiar to her: only an old floor lamp, the one that stood in the corner all the years of her childhood and lit up her family's day-to-day life. She isn't squinting.

Ms. Thurmond states without hesitation that she is very proud of her mother and father. But, she adds in the next beat, "I would like to be judged more for myself than for my parents."

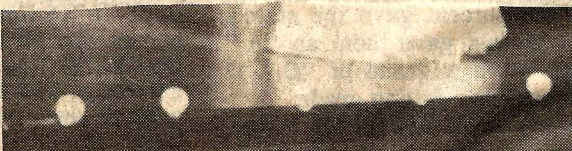
