Mr. Bolick was director of Laurens County Community Actions, Inc., and for more than 25 years had been resident engineer for Joanna Cotton Mills Co.

He served as a deacon of First Presbyterian Church of Clinton; was president of the local Kiwanis Club, was a member of the S. C. Tricentennial Commission, of the board of directors of the Joanna Foundation, the S. C. Historical Society, the South Caroliniana Society, the Winyah Indigo Society, and was a board member of Kappa Alpha fraternity of Presbyterian College, which he had attended. He was a graduate of the University of South Carolina.

Books written by him were "Georgetown Houselore," "Waccamaw Plantations," "Georgetown Ghosts," and "The Return of the Gray Man." "A Fairfield Sketchbook," the last one published (1963), dealt with historic homes and buildings in Fairfield County. At the time of his death, Mr. Bolick was preparing a book on old homes in Laurens County, which he hoped to finish in time for that county's Tricentennial celebration.

3 Of Family Held In Sumter Slaying

SUMTER (AP) — Three members of a Sumter family, including a father, his son and the son's wife, were held in Sumter County jail without bond Saturday charged with murder in the shooting death of a South Carolina highway patrolman.

Patrolman James A. Traylor was shot to death when he answered a call to assist another officer, Robert M. Falls, who was arresting the father and his son, a patrol spokesman reported.

Falls, who also was shot, was reported in "fairly good" condition Saturday in a local hospital.

Charged with murder were Maxie McFadden, 43; his son, Maxie Jr., 21; and his son's wife, Eleanor McFadden, 20.

The shootout occurred Christmas night when Maxie and his son drove into the yard of their home in a predominantly Negro neighborhood after they had been chased by Falls on a traffic violation charge.

Authorities said Falls radioed for assistance and Traylor came to the McFadden home. The son got into an argument with the two officers when a scuffle erupted and young McFadden grabbed Falls' .38 revolver, according to the patrol report.

Traylor was shot three times, twice in the heart and in the right chest. Falls was shot three times in the stomach.

Sumter County Sheriff I. Byrd Parnell said Falls got another gun out of his patrol car and shot the elder Mc-

Fadden in the arm and the leg. He also was hospitalized.

The father was arrested at the scene but his son escaped. Maxie Jr. was arrested about two hours later, hiding under a bed, with handcuffs snapped on by Falls before the shootout still dangling from one wrist.

Eleanor McFadden was arrested about 3:30 Saturday morning, Parnell said. He said Mrs. McFadden was arrested when it was discovered that at least one of the two highway patrolmen had been shot with a .22-caliber pistol or rifle.

Since the younger McFadden allegedly had used Falls' .38, Parnell said it is suspected that Mrs. McFadden may have fired some shots from the house.

Col. P. F. Thompson, commander of the State Highway Patrol, said it was his understanding that the younger McFadden had been living in the Washington, D.C., area and had returned home to Sumter for the Christmas holidays.
