Former attorney general McLeod dies

Daniel Rogers McLeod, South Carolina's attorney general for almost a quarter of century, died Wednesday in Baptist Medical Center at Columbia.

The soft-spoken but feisty man affectionately known as "General" had been hospitalized since mid-April. His death, shortly after 8 p.m., followed a series

McLeod was the state's chief legal officer for 24 years, from his election in 1958 until his decision not to seek another term in 1982, encompassing a time of

profound social change that reshaped McLeod's personal views and those of many other citizens.

Ten years into his tenure, he was named the nation's outstanding attorney general - the only South Carolinian to achieve that recognition from the National Association of Attorneys General.

When he left office, McLeod was the senior state attorney general in the United States as well as South Carolina's senior elected constitutional officer.

McLeod's successor, Travis Medlock said Wednesday, "In a sense it's a personal loss. I worked for him

as an assistant in 1961 and enjoyed that relationship and I developed an admiration for him personally and as attorney general.

"His death is an obvious loss to the state. History will write that he was a truly great attorney general."

Gov. Dick Riley said, "I have lost a true friend, a valuable colleague and a lawyer who was a great inspiration to me. His keen legal judgment coupled with

his professional but always practical manner made him a joy to be associated with."

Chief Justice C. Bruce Littlejohn said, "My friendship with Dan McLeod dates back to the early Thirties at Wofford College. In his passing, the state loses one of its most dedicated public servants. . . . His reputation for law and order extended far beyond the borders of South Caroli-

Retired Chief Justice Woodrow Lewis said McLeod "was a good friend of mine. He was a very courageous individual. He believed in the Constitution and upholding it, as was evidenced many times by his bringing actions when he thought the Constitution was being violated."

State Treasurer Grady L. Patterson Jr., an assitant attorney general during McLeod's first term of office, said, "The state and the nation has lost a great lawyer and a great public servant. We are all better off because Dan McLeod has walked

Columbia lawyer William L. Pope, who also served on that staff, said, "Dan certainly meant a lot to the stability and character of the office.

That was in 1963. During the preceding five years, the state had gone through the angst and upheaval of desegregation.

McLeod, himself a product of South Carolina tradition, helped guide the state through the period, denouncing as "political buzzardry" campaigns based on racial hatred, and once refusing to defend a state apportionment plan that he said was unconstitutional and wrong.

One of a Methodist minister's nine children and a nephew of former Gov. Thomas McLeod, he was once described as a "low-key" man who preferred to play with his grandchildren or tend his bees in his spare time.

Yet McLeod stirred up several political beehives during his quarter century in office.

He participated in the defense of the state's policy of "separate, but equal," schools for blacks and whites, which was declared unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1954.

In 1963, state parks closed for two years after McLeod issued an opinion challenging the way they were funded, and in 1966, he said in federal court that the state's Senate apportionment was "manifestly unconstitu-

In 1979, he advised college athletic teams not to participate in a tournament at a private country club in Orangeburg because of a 1978 antidiscrimination law.

McLeod pushed for legislation to regulate coastal development and create a uniform judicial system.

He once even attacked the constitutionality of the powerful state Budget and Control Board. In his last year in office, McLeod successfully argued that the Joint Appropriations Review Committee was unconstitu-

By then, however, the challenges of public office had paled.

"Twenty-four years is enough," McLeod said in announcing his decision to retire after a seventh term.

When he was elected attorney general, Jim Crow was the law of the land. Martial law was declared so frequently, McLeod once recalled, that the form from the last declaration was kept so the places and dates could be changed when the next time

At the time, the state's public schools were in turmoil over integration, adjusting to voluntary plans or court-ordered ones. Four years earlier, the U.S. Supreme Court had declared unconstitutional the state's historic policy of segregated schools.

McLeod said the toughest decision he ever had to make as attorney general occurred during the turbulent years that followed.

In 1963, the General Assembly funded state parks but tacked on a tricky condition to keep them segregated. If the parks were subject to any lawsuits or court orders, they lost the funding.

"It's obvious they were aiming at fighting integration," he said during an interview before retiring.

In 1966, when the U.S. Justice Department attacked the state Senate's voting districts - one senator per county - McLeod found he could not defend the state. "It was manifestly unconstitutional," he said. "I stood up in federal court and told them so."

When McLeod first took office, the attorney general's office had a staff of six who worked primarily on the legal interests of the state and its

Under McLeod, the staff grew to a legal firm of 76, handling civil and criminal prosecutions, criminal appeals, child support cases, environmental suits and consumer fraud.

Although many of his opinions were unpopular, McLeod was seriously challenged in only half of his six races, including his initial election victory against Columbia lawyer

Four years later, he was opposed by state Sen. Ralph Gasque, and the controversial former state senator, Tom Turnipseed, made a strong bid against him in 1974.

McLeod liked his job, and he considered higher office only briefly during his first term, but never again.

"The governor's office didn't appeal to me," he said. "I had two young children and their mother had died right before I went into office. I couldn't see going into the governor's office and coming out at loose ends after four years,'

He was past president and past secretary and treasurer of the York County Medical Society and also a consultant at the York County Hospital and a former member of the board of trustees. He served on the staff and was instrumental in the planning for the York General Hospital which is Piedmont Medical Center in Rock Hill.

Community doctor in capital, James B. Watson, dies at 75

Dr. James Babcock Watson, 75, died Tuesday.

Born in Columbia, he was a son of the late Dr. Joseph Jenkins and Elberta China Watson.

Dr. Watson graduated from the College of Charleston in 1932 and from the Medical College of South Carolina in 1936. He served his internship at Roper Hospital in Charleston.

Dr. Watson maintained a private practice of general medicine in Columbia for 40 years. During his medical career, he served the community in various ways. He was employed by the S.C. State Board of Health for diagnosis and treatment of venereal disease in the early 1940s and was the physician for the city of Columbia from 1940 to 1947. During this time, he received a Selective Service Medal from Congress for his volunteer service to the Armed Forces.

From 1940 to 1949, Dr. Watson served Epworth Orphanage to provide examination, care and treatment of the children. In the early 1950s, he was director of health for the city of Columbia and also served as civilian examiner for the Army and Navy draftees.
