

# The Rev. Arthur Martin, Presbyterian Minister

The Rev. Arthur Morrison Martin, of 4002 Kilbourne Road, died Friday at Richland Memorial Hospital.

Born in Savannah, Ga., he was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph B. Martin Jr.

The Rev. Mr. Martin served as executive secretary of the Presbyterian Synod of South

Carolina from 1953 until 1973. He helped organize the state's first bi-racial ministerial association and was the founding chairman of the state's first ecumenical council of churches.

The Rev. Mr. Martin was ordained in the old Independent Presbyterian Church of Savannah and was ordained to the ministry there in 1928. He studied at Davidson College, Louisville Seminary, the University of Edinburg and the Protestant Faculty in Paris.

As assistant minister of the Independent Church, he organized and served several churches in the Savannah area.

He served as pastor of Sion Presbyterian Church in Winnsboro from 1938 to 1953. He also organized and served three rural churches in the area — Mount Olivet, Simpson Chapel and Union Memorial.

In 1953, he was elected executive secretary of the Presbyterian Synod of South Carolina. After his retirement in 1973, he served a number of churches throughout the state as interim pastor, including First Presbyterian Church in Greenville, First Presbyterian Church in Florence, First Presbyterian Church in Rock Hill and Bethesda Church at McConells.

The Rev. Mr. Martin was a founding trustee of Presbyterian Home in South Carolina and served on the board of visitors of Davidson College, Queens College and Presbyterian College.

He was moderator of the Synod of South Carolina in 1961. He was active in young people's work, especially in scouting and in summer youth conferences. He received an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Davidson College.

Mr. Martin was married in 1932 to Mary Grubbs of Savannah, and now of Columbia. Their four sons are all graduates of Davidson College: Arthur M. Martin Jr., a pathologist in Meridian, Mass.; James G. Martin, U.S. Congressman from North Carolina's 9th District; Joseph B. Martin III, senior vice president of NCNB Corp.,

Charlotte; and Neal A. Martin, reference librarian at Francis Marion College in Florence.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Mary Grubbs Martin; his four sons; and 12 grandchildren.

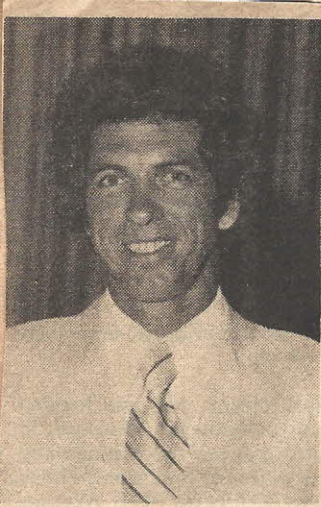

# Col. David St. Pierre Gaillard, Descendant Of Early S.C. Family

WASHINGTON — Col. David St. Pierre "Pete" Gaillard died March 26 at his home. *1982*

Born in St. Augustine, Fla., in 1890, Col. Gaillard was a resident of the District of Columbia for more than 60 years. He was a direct descendant of early Huguenot settlers in South Carolina, including Pierre Gaillard, who came to South Carolina in 1686, and Peter Gaillard of "The Rocks" plantation, after which Col. Gaillard's Washington home is named.

He was the son of the late Col. David duBose Gaillard, a native South Carolinian, and the late Katherine Ross Divis Gaillard of Fairfield County, S.C.

His father, a graduate of the United States Military at West Point, was a member of the International Boundary Commission between the United States and Mexico, 1892-94, and a member of the Isthmian Canal Commission in 1907. The family moved to Panama, where the elder Col. Gaillard was given charge of the Central Division of the Panama Canal. This work included

the excavation of the monumental cut across the continental divide which has borne his name since 1915.

Col. Gaillard entered the Massachusetts Institute of Technology from his junior year at Western High School in Washington at the age of 17. He graduated in 1911 with a Bachelor of Science degree in electrical engineering. For the next two years he worked on the construction of the Panama Canal, especially on the electrical machinery of the giant locks.

He joined the United States Army in 1917 as a first lieutenant and served on active duty until 1922, when he left the Army as a major. He was active in the Army Reserve during the years between the World Wars.

Recalled to active duty in 1940, he became an expert in ordnance analysis and the adaptation of enemy weaponry. He retired from active duty with rank of colonel in 1945.

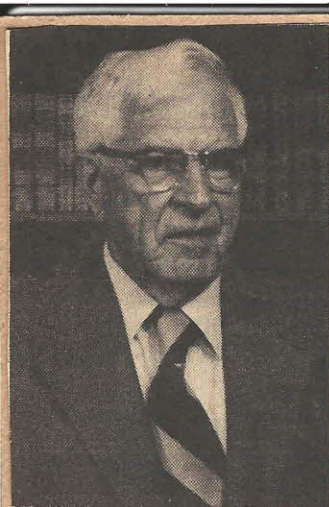

# Frank Hampton Built On Family Heritage

THOSE OF us who worked for and with the three Hampton brothers for many years viewed them as true Southern aristocrats in the best sense of the word.

They were propertied people with a long and colorful family tradition that is an important part of the history of South Carolina.

Many of their older employees always addressed them in an old Southern manner. Now all are gone — first, "Mr. Ambrose," the youngest; then "Mr. Harry"; and finally, just this week, "Mr. Frank," the elder brother.

With the passing of Frank Hampton, *The State* loses the last direct link with its roots. The Hampton brothers and their two sisters, both also deceased, were the children of a sister of the three Gonzales brothers, who founded *The State* in 1891 as a fiesty newspaper opposing Tillmanism, the S.C. political movement of the day. Only grandchildren of the Hampton-Gonzales family now remain.

N.G., Ambrose and William E. Gonzales came by their fighting spirits honestly. Their father, Gen. Ambrosio Jose Gonzales, who fought for his native Cuba's freedom in the middle of 19th Century, later came to this country and served as a Confederate officer in the Civil War.

The Hampton brothers' heritage on their paternal side was equally rich in history. Their grandfather, Frank Hampton, was the brother of Gen. Wade Hampton, the Civil War leader who later served South Carolina as governor and U.S. senator.

The death of Frank Hampton at 86 Tuesday deprived Columbia and South Carolina of a man who built on the family heritage.

He had a policy-making role with *The State*, its parent company and other subsidiaries for more than 55 years. He was chairman of the board at the State-Record Co. at the time of his death.

But he had other passions. One was the S.C. State Fair, which he helped nurture as president and in other roles for many years.

A large man who once played fullback for Carolina, Mr. Hampton loved the great outdoors and was an avid hunter. He also continued a family tradition by breeding and racing thoroughbred horses, including stakes races. This interest brought him

into contact with the late trainer Max Hirsch, now a member of racing's Hall of Fame. Mr. Hirsch, who wintered his horses for years on the old track at the State Fairgrounds, loved to hunt and swap stories with Mr. Hampton. He also trained the Hampton horses.

One cause Mr. Hampton fought for during his two terms as a state legislator (1931-34) was the legalization of pari-mutuel gambling on horse races to raise revenue and encourage the development of the thoroughbred industry in the state. That effort failed, but later he was a founder of the S.C. Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association.

The ravages of old age did not dim the wit that sprang easily from his tongue nor the sparkle that came to his eyes when he encountered a pretty woman.

Despite his background and accomplishments, Mr. Hampton was an unpretentious man who often drove around town in a battered, old red pickup truck. He was the kind of man who elicited affection as well as respect from his friends and associates.

During the week before his final hospital confinement, "Mr. Frank" touched base with three of his loves. Although in a wheel chair, he presided over a meeting of the State-Record Co. Board of Directors and attended the annual stockholders' luncheon, where he had his usual quip for the ladies. He visited the State-Record Recreation Center as head of the committee that oversees its operation. And he presented an award at the State Fair. It was a fitting wrap-

# 'Greasy' Medlin, Entertainer, Dies

Entertainer Julian "Greasy" Leonard Medlin, 71, of 4364 Augusta Road in Lexington, a long-time member of the popular musical group "Snuffy Jenkins and The Hired Hands," died Thursday at Baptist Medical Center of Columbia.

Known as a traveling entertainer, Mr. Medlin started in show business at the age of 13 working in vaudeville and medicine shows until he joined Snuffy Jenkins' group in 1941.

"Greasy played with us off and on for over 41 years on radio, television and on the stage and I can truthfully say he was the best comedian I've ever seen anywhere," Jenkins said Thursday.

Medlin's costume included the classic tramp clown face with a beard and a beat-up derby hat. He wore patched up clothes and a scruffy tie and carried his guitar around on a string, rather than a conventional strap. He would frequently walk on stage dragging his guitar with the string, Jenkins said.

Medlin liked to ad lib. "We'd have something planned but when we got out on stage something would happen in the audience and 'Greasy' would change the whole routine to fit," Jenkins said.

Medlin and Jenkins will soon be seen in a motion picture, *The Last Medicine Man*, produced by The Smithsonian Institute and filmed in Bailey, N.C.

The film is scheduled to be released for television to the Public Broadcasting System within the next six months, Jenkins said.

Medlin played the World's Fair in Nashville with "Snuffy" for a week in May and played a day and a night at the Bluegrass Festival in Cheraw last month.

"Greasy worked the Bluegrass Festival on June 12 and that was his last public appearance — he went into the hospital three days later," Jenkins said.

"He was an excellent mu-
