On Keeping the Sabbath Day

In America it is becoming more and more commonplace to find businesses open "as usual" on Sunday. For the Christian who believes in keeping the Lord's Day, it is becoming a constantly more vexing problem, both in his own practices, and in his concern for his fellow citizens who gradually are being lured into completely secularizing Sunday.

The Christian who honestly faces the problem recognizes that modern society cannot exist without certain minimum services on Sunday. But what these may be, and how far the Christian may go in patronizing those which must function on Sunday, is a personal, perplexing problem. The proper attitude toward unnecessary businesses which stay open on Sunday simply to seek a profit is easier for the Christian to define. But even here the Christian is led to ask himself: "Where draw the line?"

We often hear the worn-out, weak-kneed excuse: "Others do it." But twoor more-wrongs don't make it right. In city after city, however, we see that profit-hunting pressures are gradually crumbling the rules of life established in the past by God-fearing men. Precedents are being set that mold the future of America, and mold it in a pattern that ignores God's direct word: "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy." Not even "legalizing" Sunday opening of non-essential businesses can make profaning the Lord's Day morally right.

The answer seems to lie in two rules governing Christian living. One is that we belong to God, and will do what He tells us, including keeping His day holy. The other is that we are our brother's keeper, and are therefore responsible in our example and in our speaking to do what we can to protect our brother from temptations to forget God's law and violate His commandment. If modern society makes it difficult for us to live by clear-cut rules, we must, as Christians, be all the more vigilant to find the Christian answer to each challenge to the sanctity of the Sabbath.

We are under obligation to God—and to Him alone. We are under His judgment. There is no doubt that God means us to use His day to worship Him, and for the good of our bodies and souls. Do you and yours still keep the Sabbath holy?

The Sanctification of the Lord's Day

It is the duty of all persons to remember the Lord's Day, and to prepare for it before its approach. All worldly business should be so ordered, and seasonably laid aside, that they may not be hindered thereby from sanctifying the Sabbath, as the Holy Scriptures require.

The whole day is to be kept holy to the Lord, and to be used for worship and rest. It is requisite, therefore, that the people abstain from all unnecessary labor, and from recreations which are not in keeping with the sanctity of the day.
