

The Sea of Galilee

Second in the series of scenes of the Holy Land is the Sea of Galilee, pictured on the front of today's bulletin. This is one of the most famous sites spoken of in the Bible because of the numerous occasions Christ was mentioned in connection with it.

It is a fresh-water lake, fed by the River Jordan. Originally (Num. 34:11) it was known as the Sea of Chinnereth, later (Luke 5:1), the Lake of Gennesaret, and the Sea of Galilee or Tiberias (John 6:1; 21:1).

Except for the locations where the Jordan enters and leaves the Sea of Galilee, the sea is enclosed by hills. It is known as a "sea" because of its size, though its water is fresh. At the greatest width, it is 7½ miles, and extends a length of 12¾ miles. The surface of the Sea of Galilee is 682 feet below the level of the Mediterranean, therefore it has semitropical climate—and with ice-covered Mt. Hermon nearby, climatic conditions cause sudden and violent storms to come down the mountain and focus on the lake.

Fish abound in the Sea of Galilee, and of course fishing was one of the most profitable industries in Christ's time. The most eatable fish found there today are the sheatfish, similar to America's catfish, and the barbel. The most abundant fish is the "Chromis tiberiadis." The same kinds of fish are also in the Jordan and its tributaries.

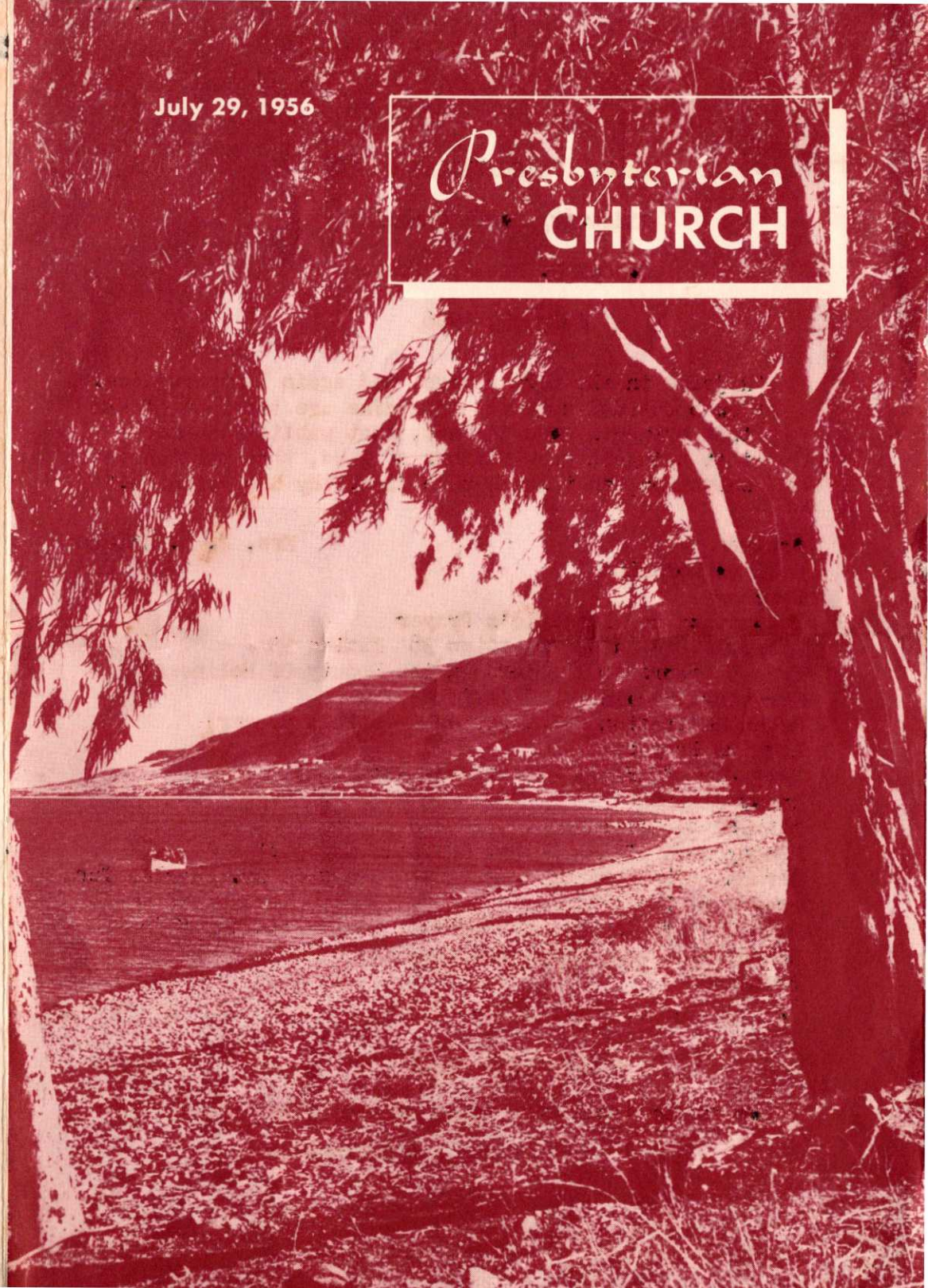
Christian Colleges Give Hope for a Better World
