The committee made a report through Bro. Senegys, which was received by the church and its consideration made the special order of the day. On motion of W. C. Trapp, the church in view of Bro. Cowley's penitence, resolved to retain him still in its fellowship. On motion ^{also} of W. C. Trapp, the church silenced him from preaching, indefinitely. A communication from sister Sallie Watt was then read before the church, in which herself and husband Bro. Thomas Watt, 'intending to join the Methodist Church, ask a letter of dismissal from our church. As this was not warranted by any precedent, on motion of Bro. Glenn, they were dismissed from our connection, our church not in any wise impugning their moral and religious standing.

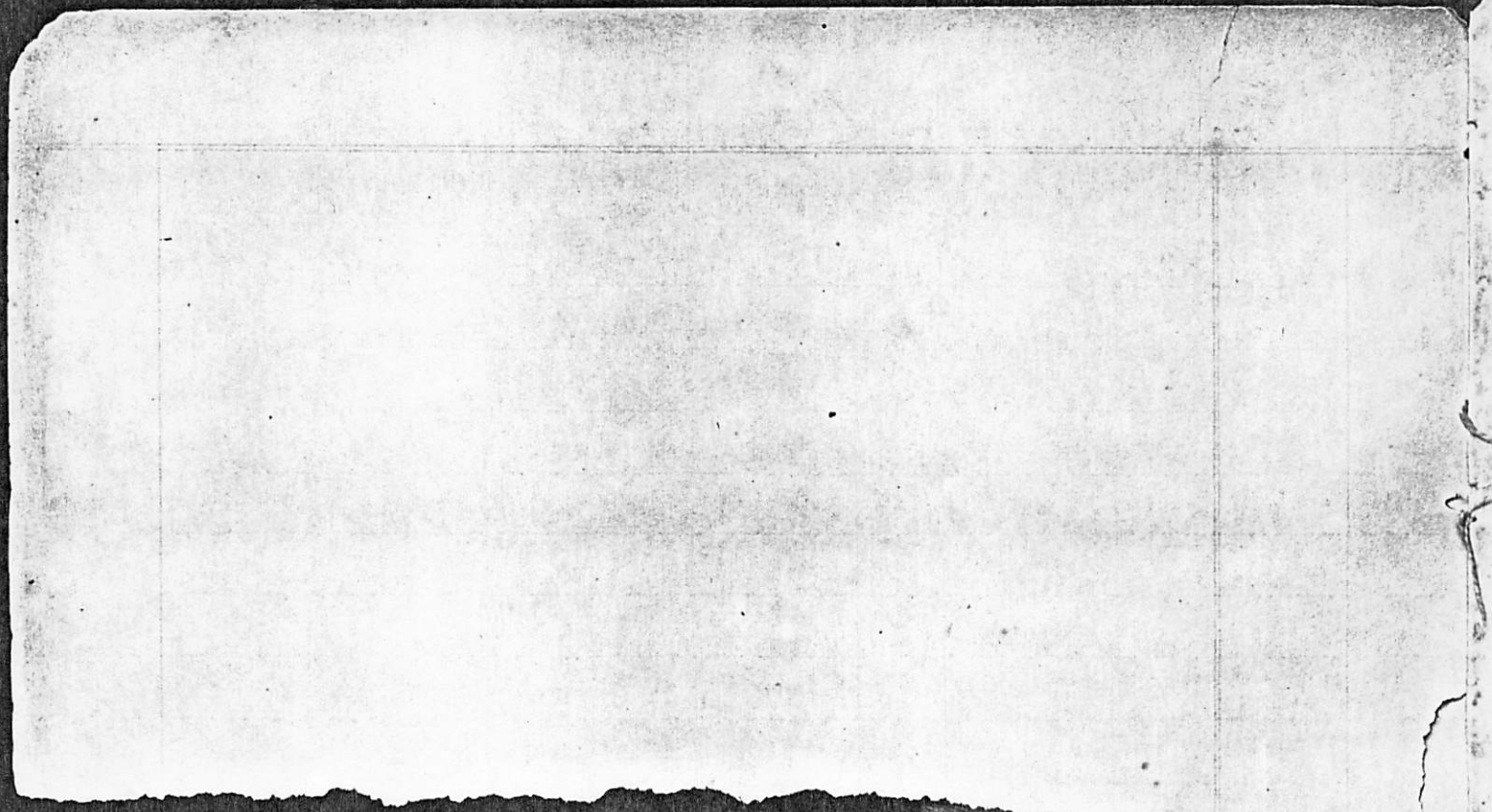
