

After James Adger died, his widow married Robert Rodgers, and after having financial losses in Ireland, they came to America, coming into New York City, bringing their own children and the other Adger children. The Rodgers children were: Esther, who married William Herron and lived in Winnsboro; Margaret, who married Charles Whiting, and lived in Kinderhook, New York; Mary, who married James Clark and lived in Kinderhook, New York; and Isabella, who died soon after coming to New York.⁴

CHAPTER TEN

ADGER FAMILY HISTORY

Five Adgers married Ellisons in South Carolina, and the two families had similar backgrounds, both coming from County Antrim, Ireland to America. In Ireland, the name was spelled several different ways, Adger, Adgar, Edger, and Edgar, but it was evidently always pronounced the same. Having been told by his father that the family originally came from France, John Bailey Adger believed them to be descendants of French Huguenots who came to Ireland with the armies of William of Orange. James Adger owned a bleaching green and linen factory in the town of Duneane, which is in Duneane Parish of the Barony of Upper Toome, County Antrim, Province of Ulster. It is six miles from Randalstown on the road from Belfast to Londonderry. James Adger II was born in Moneynick, a small hamlet in the Parish of Duneane. The gravestone of James Adger I was found in the Episcopal cemetery at Duneane, by a member of the family who visited Ireland in 1896. Next to his grave were stones of John Edger, who died 1701, aged 63; and Robert Edger, who died 1702. These were evidently of an earlier generation of the same family.

William Adger was the first to come to America. He owned a large plantation near Winnsboro (there was a little settlement a few miles north of Winnsboro, called Adger Station) and at the time of his death, he was a wealthy man.
