

ADEE (Adie), John, Rye, N.Y., pre-Revolutionary settler (ancestors said to have come from Eng. to Providence Plantations), m.—, issue (of record): 1-Daniel, m. Jemima Hobby, and had William (1772-1846), dry-goods auctioneer, N.Y., m. Clarissa Townsend (A36).

ADELMAN, Wilhelm, came from Rotterdam to Phila. in the ship "Priscilla," and took oath of allegiance to Pa., Sept. 12, 1750 (P498).

ADEN, Luke, listed as a resident of Va. in census of Feb. 16, 1623 (H1249).

ADERSHIRE, —, a ranger, in pursuit of a raiding party of Indians that menaced Bath, N.C., gave testimony before gov. and deputies, Nov. 4, 1718 (N283).

ADEST, Falkert, came from Rotterdam to Phila. in the "Friendship" of Bristol in 1727 (P498).

ADEY, William, was at Plymouth, Mass.; fined in 1636 for work on Sunday (G164).

ADGATE Thomas (d. Saybrook, Conn., 1707); came before 1651, and settled at Saybrook, Conn.; removed to Norwich, abt. 1660; later returned to Saybrook, where he was deacon; 1st wife's name unknown; m. 2d, Mary, dau. of Matthew Marvin, and widow of Richard Bushnell; issue (by 1st marriage): 1-Elizabeth (b. Oct. 10, 1651), m. Dec. 7, 1672, Richard Bushnell; 2-Hannah (b. Oct. 6, 1653), m. Samuel Lothrop; issue (2d marriage): 3-Abigail (b. Aug. 1661), m. 1682, Daniel Tracy; 4-Sarah (b. Jan. 1663), m. Christopher Huntington the second; 5-Rebecca (b. June 1666), m. Joseph Huntington; 6-Thomas (b. Mar. 1670), m. June 15, 1692, at Norwich, Conn., Ruth, dau. of Benjamin Brewster; m. 2d, 1749, Elizabeth Morgan, widow of Jonathan Starr; 8 children by 1st marriage (A110-G164).

ADICH, Hans Peter (b. 1706), came from Rotterdam to Phila. in the "Friendship" and took oath of allegiance to Pa., Sept. 3, 1739; called on ship's roll "Peter Attick, age 33 yrs." (P498).

ADIE (Ady), John, mariner, of South Carolina, granted 210 acres of land, Feb. 18, 1680, which tract was described as "not yet laid out," when patented to William Elliott, Nov. 7, 1700 (S1173a).

ADKINS (Atkins), Joseph (b. Sandwich, Eng., 1680, bap. St. Clements, Nov. 4, 1680-d. N.E., Jan. 25, 1773), s. of Andrew Adkins (bap. St. Clements, Sandwich, Eng., June 1650), m. Sara —; was a celebrated capt. in sea service of French war and mcht.; came to America before 1728; m. 1739, Mary (1692-1774), widow of Francis Wainwright, and dau. of Hon. Joseph Dudley, gov.-in-chief of Mass. Bay, N.H. and Me., 1715-20), m. Rebecca Tyng; issue: 1-Hon. Dudley (1731-1767), grad. Harvard coll. 1748; rep. gen. ct. 1765; m. 1752, Sarah Kent (1728-1810), had 6 children, one of whom, Dudley Atkins Tyng, m. Sarah Higginson (C810).

ADKINS (Atkins). Josiah (d. Middletown.

dren; 8-Benjamin (b. 1682), m. 1709, Jane Stevens of New Haven, 2 daus.; m. 2d, 1716, Elizabeth Barnes, 10 children; 9-Ephraim (1684-Dec. 26, 1760), m. June 16, 1709, Elizabeth Whitmore or Wetmore (d. 1752), 8 children; 10-Elizabeth (b. 1687); (G164).

ADKINS (Atkins), Thomas, of Hartford (d. Oct. 23, 1694); prob. bro. of the first Josiah of Middletown; prob. another bro. Gabriel; wife's name unknown; issue: 1-Mary (b. 1672); 2-Thomas (1673-1709); 3-William (b. 1675); 4-Jane (b. 1678); 5-Sarah (b.1682); 6-Josiah (b. 1685); 7-Benoni (b.1690); (G164).

ADKINS, William, was granted 150 acres of land in Anson co., N.C., Apr. 7, 1749 (N283).

ADKINSON, James, living in Northampton co., Va., on Mar. 30, 1651 took oath of allegiance to Parliament (V248).

ADKINSON, Richard, living in N.C., 1698, was made overseer of highways in Perquimans precinct, July 1698, his territory being from the ford in Little River to Sutton's Creek bridge (N283).

ADLEY (Audley) Edmond (also miswritten in document "Edmun Anoley"); supposed to have been of English birth; at Gravesend, L.I., 1646, hired land of Anthony Jansen from Salee; bought plantation of Nathaniel Watson, Apr. 21, 1651; wife's name unknown; issue: 1-Ann (N203-N206a).

ADLEY, Edward, living in N.C., commnd. J.P. for precincts of Beaufort and Hyde, Apr. 3, 1733 (N283, vol. 3).

ADOLPH, Dirck, of N.Y., m. Sept. 27, 1693, Arientje Kierstead (see Clemens' "Marriages Before 1699," vol. 14).

ADOLPH, Jacob (b. 1719), came from Europe to Phila in the ship "Nancy," and took oath of allegiance to Pa., Sept. 20, 1738; on ship's list as "age 19" (P498).

ADOLPHSZEN, Dirck (known also as De Groof), in 1694 was settled in N.Y., where he had children bap. in Reformed Dutch ch., records including 1707 (N197).

ADRIANS, ADRIANSE, ADRIANCE or ADRIENCE—The immigrant ancestor of this extensive family was Adriaen Ryerson (b. Netherlands-d. Flatbush, L. I., or New York, Nov. 24, 1710); came from Amsterdam to New Amsterdam, 1646; m. July 29, 1659, Annetje Martense Schenck; issue: 1-Jannetje (b. July 25, 1660), supposed to have m. Jacobus Hegeman; 2-Elbert Adrience (b. Flatbush, Aug. 14, 1663-living in Flushing, L.I., 1698), m. Apr. 18, 1689, Catalina Remsen, dau. of Rem Jansen Vanderbeeck and Jannetje Jorese Rapalje (Cataline, m. 2d, before 1705, Cornelius Hoogland), had 3 or 4 children; 3-Marten (b. Flatbush, Mar. 9, 1668), m. Sarah Remsen (descendants named Martense, q.v.); 4-Margaret (b. Mar. 28, 1670); 5-Sarah (b. June 9, 1672 d.y.); 6-Reyer (b. May 28, 1673 d.y.); 7-Neltje, m. William Hoogland; 8-Reyer, again (b. Mar. 31, 1678 d.y.); 9-Abraham (bap. Nov. 21, 1680), m. Femmetje Van Cleef; 10-Sarah, again (bap. Nov. 21, 1680); 11-Reyer, again (b. May 6, 1683); 12-Gosen Adrians (bap. Apr. 20, 1685 or 86-living on Staten Island 1756), was judge of superior ct. of common pleas, 1751; m. Femmetje Van der Bilt, dau. of Jacob and Maria Van der Vliet; signed his name "G. Adriaent" (N200-N203-S52).

ADRIAANSZ or Adriaensen, Elbert, of New Lotts, L.I. (b. New Netherlands, Aug. 14, 1663-d. before 1705), s. of Adrian Reyerse or Ryerson qv); mem. Reformed Dutch ch., Flatbush, 1677; took oath of allegiance 1687; bought 20 morgens of land in New Utrecht, L.I., Jan. 9, 1692/93; m. Apr. 18, 1689, Catalina Remsen (b. Oct. 4, 1685), dau. of Rem Jansen Vander Beeck, m. Jannetje Jorese Rapalje; Catalina, m. 2d, before 1705, Cornelius Hoogland; issue (of record): 1-Rem Adrianse (1690-1730), m. Sarah Brinckerhoff (b. 1691), had issue, among others, Isaac (1722-1790); descendants call themselves Adriance; 2-Martin (descendants call themselves Martense (qv): 3-Elbert, m.—, 3 children; 4-Anneke (N200-N203-S52).
