IT APPEARS FROM THE PAPERS IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR PENSION CLAIM THAT GEORGE AGNEW OR EGNEW WAS BORN 1762 + OR 1763- BOTH DATES APPEAR IN THE FILE, IN COUNTY ANTRIM IRELAND- EMIGRATED TO SOUTH CAROLINA WHEN AGE ABOUT 7 AND RESIDED NEAR WINNSBORO.

WHILE RESIDING IN FAIRFIELD DIST SOUTH CAROLINA NEAR WINNSBORO HE ENLISTED JUNE OR JULY 1779 AND SERVED UNTIL CLOSE OF THE REVOLUTION ON SHORT TOURS AMOUNTING TO TWO YEARS AND SIX OR 7 MONTHS IN ALL AS A PRIVATE AND LIGHT HORSEMAN UNDER CAPT EDWARD MARTIN AND JOHN GRAY, COLONELS WINN AND EDWARD LACEY IN THE SOUTH CAROLINA TROOPS AND ALSO UNDER COL WILLIAM WASHINGTON. HE WAS IN THE BATTLES OF FRIDAY'S FORT. ORANGEBURG AND EUTAW SPRINGS, WAS ALSO IN THE BATTLE AT MONK'S CORNER AND IN AN ENGAGEMENT WITH THE TORIES ON THE PEEDEE RIVER AND IN SEVERAL OTHER SMALL ENGAGEMENTS.

AFTER THE REVOLUTION HE CONTINUED TO RESIDE IN FAIRFIELD DISTRICT, SOUTH CAROLINA FOR SOME YEARS, THEN MOVED TO KENTUCKY WHERE HE LIVED FOR EIGHT YEARS; FROM THENCE REMOVED TO TENNESSEE AND RESIDED FOR 8 YEARS AND THEN TO MISSISSIPPI TERRITORY, THAT PART WHICH WAS LATER THE STATE OF ALABAMA.

HE WAS ALLOWED PENSION ON HIS APPLICATION EXECUTED NOVEMBER 27, 1833 WHILE RESIDING IN WASHINGTON COUNTY ALABAMA.

THERE ARE NO FAMILY DATA.

David Campbell applied 1832, November 6, under Act of June 7 1832 in GREENE COUNTY ALABAMA a resident of said Greene Co, Alaba: states he entered service under Col Richard Winn, Maj Pearson and Capt Edward Martin, all from Camden District South Carolina, now called Fairfield District S C, - first term of service was the the Congree fort in Richland County South Carolina. The second term of service under the before named Col Winn and Maj Person all from the before named places in South Carolina. The 2nd term of service was in CUMMISTO RIVER in hunting tories and furnshing beaves for the main army. The 3rd term of service was under Gen Marion in the low parts of South Carolina in hunting for tori tories and scouring the swamps for the same. Served about 9 months; --- affidavit by James Martin resident of Green Co Alabama stating "I am well acquainted with David Campbell, knew him during the Revolution and knew him to be in the same.

IN ANSWER TO QUESTIONS: HE STATES "I WAS BORN IN IRELAND 1760. Have no written records of my age, though believe my father did when I was young make a record of my age.

I was living in Camden District S C now called Fairfield Dist S C when called into service- in summer lived in Wilson and Giles county Tennessee and now live in Green Co Alabama.

Lucinda Campbell the widow applied in Greene Co Alabama 28 November 1854, age 65 states she is widow of David Campbell States she was married to him 1809 in GILES COUNTY TENNESSEE by John Moore, esquire, J P for said county and her maiden name was LUCINDA COOPER. and her husband died 15 April 1846 a witness and Justice of Peace of John M Walker...
