Sullivan

All of the Sullivan family were noted for their plainness and for their Spartan simplicity, no show of fine furniture or costly apparel about their houses. They had good stock and vehicles and plenty of home made provisions, were hardy feeders themselves and liked to place plenty before their friends. They were plain in dress and wore no beards on their faces. All of them accumulated good estates and left their children with good educations and plenty to start life on. They opposed secession as a unit and did all they could to avoid a war, but when theri native state cut loose, they went with her right or wrong and contributed their means and sons to her support.

Col. Benjamin Arnold (born July 30, 1769) married Kenib Camp (born May 1777). They lived on Horse Creek in Greenville County. He built Arnold's Mills (near Princeton) and farmed. They both are buried near the mills. Their daughter Ann Hendricks Arnold married Dr. John C. Sullivan (fifth generation).

Owen Sullivan (1673-1768) was granted land in Virginia. He married three (3) times: His first wife was Joan Sullivan. Next he married in 1693 Elizabeth Claiborne (1647-1685), the daughter of Sara Fenn and Col. Thomas Clairborne (he died 1768 in Carlotte Co. Va).

Third Generation

Charles Sullivan (1728-1808), son of Mary Margaret Hewlett and Owen Sullivan II. He was born in Charlotte County, Virginia and was buried in Lebanon Methodist Church Cemetary, Greenville County. Charles Sullivan lived near where Lebanon Church is now standing. Hewlett lived across the branch from the old graveyard. He built the first red brick house here. Clairborne moved from the Lick to Kentucky. When he left here, he gave the deer lick to Joseph Sullivan.

Fourth Generation

Hewlett Sullivan (1763-1830), son of Mary Charlton Johnson and Charles Sullivan of Sullivan Township, Laurens, S.C.. He married in 1787, Mary Dunklin (1772-1850), daughter of Joseph Dunklin. He entered the army at the age of 15. With his father's assistance, some four years later in the fall of 1781, he organized a company of Scouts or Rangers, composed of relatives and neighbors. They caught and hung many Tories and cleared their section of Red Coats. Revolutionary Soldier and he was also a Senator.

Hewlett Sullivan, Sr.

Emigrated from Ireland just before the Revolutionary War, settled in South Carolina and served as a private in General Frances Marions command. While a member of that command, he was once captured by the notorious "Bloody Bill Cunningham", but escaped and managed to rejoin his command.

Dr. John C. Sullivan (1793-1864), son of Mary Dunklin and Hewlett Sullivan married Anne Hendricks Arnold (1797-1879) of Fork Shoals in 1828, Greenville County, S.C.

Elizabeth Sullivan and Dr. Washington Agnew, had one daughter Lizzie and her infant brother were raised by her grandmother and Grandfather, Dr. John Sullivan & Anne Hendricks Arnold Sullivan. Sara Sullivan & her sister, Elizabeth, married Dr. Enoch Agner and Dr. Washington Agnew, who were brothers.

She was in the Cothran Literary Society and a member of the Dramatic Club. After she graduated, she taught school and music in Gray court, where she and her father lived. She wanted to go to New York and study music, but her father got sick. She knew that she would have to care for him, so she decided to give up going to study music further and got married instead. Alice and David got married in Gray court, July 25, 1906 and came to Ora in a buggy. She said that she never regretted her decision. Her father lived with them and died four years later. She also taught music in Ora.

Alice and David and her father are buried in Old Fields Cemetary, Ora, S.C..

Dr. Enoch Agnew, Sr. (1808-1871)

Samuel Agnew, born in 1738 in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania came before the Revolution to the Greenville Presbyterian Church area, and the Agnews of Abbeville and Greenville Counties descend from him.

Elizabeth Seawright and Samuel Agnew settled near Due West. According to family tradition, he was an ardent Whig in the Revolution and suffered heavy property losses from Tory activity in the war. He is buried in Greenville Church Cemetary.

Samuel Agnew was apparently the only one of his immediate family to come to South Carolina.

Dr. Enoch Agnew (1808-1871) married Letitia Simpson Todd of Laurens. He practiced medicine in Due West (1832-1851). He moved to Mississippi because of too much practice and bad health.
