According to documentation that I have I am related to descended from a William Aiken who, with other members of his family, landed at Brandywine Creek - near Philadelphia, Pa. - in 1775. Together with his son, William Aiken II, they both fought in the American Revolution with the American army. It is to this that female members of the Aiken family have membership in the D.A.R. William I and William II went to Charleston S.C. in 1785. Subsequently William I and some of his children began moving west. He died and is buried, along with others of his family, in a little cemetery somewhere northeast by east of Winsboro. A friend of mine, now deceased, located that cemetery but died before he could

get photographs of the stones or copies of the cemetery grave plots.

William II remained in Charleston, ran for political office, narrowly missed being elected Speaker of the House in the 32nd Congress, returned to S. Car. where he bought an island off the coast of Charleston and established a very profitable rice and cotton business. He also built and operated the first steam railroad line from Charleston to Hamberg (Aiken Co.) S. Car.

You may possibly have the material that I am enclosing. If you do, will you kind enough to show this material the Fairfield Co. Historical Society or the Genealogical Society there? If possible I would like to ask if some member of any of the three groups could make photographs of these old Aiken tombstones or burial records for these early ancestors of mine. If there is cost for the photography I would be happy to send my check for the same.

Dear Librarian (Drexel),

In the past I have sent
you material concerning my early ancestors —
the Aikens who moved there from Charleston
S.C. William Aiken II died in Fairfield Co. and
is buried in a cemetery somewhere northeast
of Winnsboro. I understand that some of his
children and other ~~adults~~ of his descendants are liberalize
buried there. I have repeatedly asked if you or
some other source there could provide me with
definite verification of this. I believe that in a
previous communication from you, you
indicated that there was some woman there
who could furnish this information.

Perhaps in exchange for this enclosed
material (one copy) she would be willing to
send the information I am seeking. William
Aiken I was killed in a battle with the British
near West Bradford, Pa., but apparently his

military records were destroyed by fire. Any information you can send me will be greatly appreciated.
