Yes, the News & Herald made the statement in their Memorial Edition 1910, "Much valuable historical info. never before published will appear in the next 6 months." However Chronicling America only shows 1 issue of a Fairfield paper available in their inventory, for the remaining 7 months of that year. And actually, there's only 2 issues available for the entire year of 1910.

Looking further, there is only 1 or 2 issue's (Fairfield) in Chronicling America's database for many of the years in their block of 1901 to 1922 editions. 5 years of that block are skipped altogether.

I now wonder if this is the finished product for the C.A. site, as far as Fairfield papers go, or is it a work in progress? From the searches that I have done in the past couple of weeks, it has been apparent that the Newberry paper's have had many many more editions in the database than other papers. Now that I think about it, I don't know that I've seen a single issue available from Columbia.

Do you mean the newspaper promised more on the War during the 6 months following 25 May 1910, BUT you found no further articles? That would be a real labor to read 6 months of newspapers carefully looking for further articles.

The Samuel W Broom that you mention below is my grandfather Broom's 1st cousin. Samuel & his father William P. Broom b. 1813 are much older than my grandfather Walter Furman Broom Sr. b. 1864 and his father Pvt. Thomas Furman Broom MD b. 1834. Sam's daughter, Eunice Broom, married Dan Agnew Sr. and my dad bought the 110 acres I live on from Dan Sr.'s sons, Dan Agnew Jr. & Dave Agnew. The old unpainted house on the top of the hill in front of my home is the home of Sam Broom & then of his dau. Eunice, then her son Dave Agnew. I named our Road for these 3 Agnews: Dan Sr., Jr., & Dave. Sam's brother, Charles Powell Alston Broom is an ancestor of your (Bryan's) cousin, Mrs. June Oswald Marsh. Dan Jr. & Dave died without issue (childless).
