




Joseph Alsop, from England to New Haven. Arms: Sable, three doves volant argent, legged and beaked gules.

Crest: A dove volant holding in the beak an ear of wheat. (See A496-A499a-A502).




ALSTON

John Alston, from England to North Carolina.

Arms: Azure, ten estoiles of six points, four, three, two, one, or.

Crest: A crescent argent, charged with an estoile or.

Motto: Immotus. (See A36-A306-A496).



Arms: Azure, ten estoiles or; on a chief argent a crescent inverted gules, between two boars' heads couped sable.

Crest: A demi-swan wings expanded with a crescent reversed gules, on each.

Motto: In altum. (See A496).



- Arms: Azure, a fleur-de-lis between two stars of eight points in bend, and two increscents in bend sinister or.
- Crest: Out of a ducal coronet a vested and embowed dexter arm holding an anchor and cable.
- Motto: Verus et fidelis semper. (See A496).

ALPHRAMAN: 1—Local, of Alfarez, Spain. 2—An ensign. 3—According to Halliwell, this term is used by Ben Jonson and Beaumont and Fletcher; Nares, on the authority of Harl. M. S. 6804, affirms that it was in use in our army during the civil wars of Charles I; it is therefore possible that Alphraman may be equivalent to the old corrupt 'ancient,' or en-sign (see E398). sign (see E398).

ALPIN, ALPINE: Harrison says, "Pictish; Alpin is the oldest form; a pet name, with -in, diminutive ending; may be borrowed from, or, more likely, cognate with Latin, Albinus"; "Hills, streams, and the M'Alpines are con-temporaries, but when did the M'Arthurs come?"; Barber gives "Alpin, Scotish, elf" (see E374-E398-E400-E411a-E420).

ALPORT: 1-Local, belonging to Alport, Derbyshire. 2-Apparently the old port or gate. 3-English; Old English, (e)ald, old, and port; Latin porta, gate (E374-E420).

ALPRAM: 1-Local, of Alpraham, a parish in Cheshire (see E398).

in Cheshire (see E335). **ALRED:** 1—Personal. 2—(a) Temple-coun-sel; (b) old or sage counsel; (c) noble coun-sel. 3—(a) The Anglo-Saxon personal name (E)alhred; Old English, (e)alh, a temple and roed, counsel; (b) Anglo-Saxon, (e)aldred, (e)ald, old, and roed, as above; (c) Anglo-Sax-on, Aethelred, aethel-e, noble, and roed as as a shown (see E420). above (see E420).

ALS: 1-Local, from a place in Burian, county Cornwall (see E398).

ALSAGER: 1-Local, from a chapelry in Cheshire (see E398).

ALSCHUNDER: 1—Personal. 3—Supposed to be a corruption of Alexander, which in Scotland is, in common parlance, pronounced Elshiner (see E398).

ALSEPHRAN, ALSIFARN: 1-Local. 2-The hellish cliff, i.e., deep as hell. 3-Cornish (see E413a).

ALSFORD: 1—Local, belonging to Alsford or Alresford, Hampshire. 2—Dweller at the alder-tree ford. 3—Anglo-Saxon, alres, geni-tive of alr, alder-tree and ford (see E374-E398-E420).

ALSIFARN, see Alsephran.

ALSON: 1.—Personal. 2—Son of all. 3—All is a diminutive of Allen (qv), and Alexander (qv); also of the Anglo-Saxon personal name Aella, Aelle, etc. (see E420).

ALSOP, see Allsop.

ALSTAN: 1—Local. 2—The stone hall or old stone. 3—Teutonic; Norse, Hallstein; Flemish, Allsteens; Anglo-Saxon, Alstan, Ale-stan, Ealhstan (see E374-E413a).

ALSTEAD: 1—Local, of Alstead. See also Halstead. 5—1273, Henry de Alstead, county Essex (Hundred Rolls); 1273, Roger de Al-sted, county Lincoln (Hundred Rolls); (see E376).

ALSTON: 1—Local, of Alston, a parish in county Cumberland; a chapelry in the parish of Ashburton, county Devon; a township in the parish of Ribchester, county Lancashire and a chapelry in the parish of Overbury, county Worcester. 2—(a) The high-cliff hill; (b) the town of Alsi. 3—Als, alsa, halse, cliff, and dun, hill; see Alesdon; Harrison says, "Belonging to Alston; the second element is the common Old English, tun, estate, farm; the first represents an Anglo-Saxon personal name such as Aelle, Aegel-, Aethel-, Aelf-, etc., in the genitive case; Alston, in Staffordshire was e.g., Anglo-Saxon, Aelfw(e)ardes-tun. 5—1273, Henry Alston, county Cambridge (Hundred Rolls); 1216-1307, Ralph de Alleston, county E376-E398-E413a-E420).

ALSTONE: 1—(a) Local, belonging to Alstone, a hamlet in the suburbs of Cheltenham, and a chapelry in the parish of Overbury, county Worcester; (b) personal. 2—(a) All's

stone or rock; (b) elf-stone, temple-stone, or noble stone. 3—(a) The second element of this name is the Old English stan, a stone, rock, stone castle; the first represents an Anglo-Saxon personal name such as Aelle, Aegel-, Aethel-, Aelf-, etc., in the genitive case; Al-stone in Staffordshire was, e.g., Anglo-Saxon, Aelfredes-stan; (b) from the Anglo-Saxon personal names, Aelfstan, elf-stone, (E)alh-stan, temple-stone, or Aethelstan, noble-stone; Alstone is sometimes confused with Alston (qv). 5—1664, Clare Alstone and John Witte-wronge, marriage license (London, ii, p. 147); (see E376-E420). ALTENA, VAN: 1—Local, of Altena, Nether-lands. 3—Dixon suggests that Altena may be Alt hena, old hedge, or a place surrounded by a hedge; from hena, which may be the root of heining, a hedge (seeE374-E410).

ALTERNON, ALTARNUN: 2-(a) Dweller at the altar of the nun or (b) at the altar of St. Nonna, the patron saint of the parish (see E413).

ALTERWEN: 1—Local. 2—Dweller at the oak moor. 3—Cornish, hal, moor, and derwyn, oak (see E413a).

ALTHEA: 1-Occupational. 2-The Hunt-ress. 3-Greek (see E390).

ALTHORF: 1—Local, belonging to Al-thorp(e), Lincolnshire or Northamptonshire. 2—Dweller in the old village. 3—English; Old English, (e)ald, old, and thorp; Old Norse, thorp, village (see E410-E420). ALTMAN: 1—Personal. 2—Old man. 3— Anglo-Saxon, ealdman; German, altmann (see E374-E410-E418).

ALTMULLER: 1-P -German (see E410). -Personal. 2—Old miller.

ALTOBASSE: Bardsley says, "Nickname; possibly from the high and low range of voice; but see legal 'alto et basso,' the submission of all differences, high and low, to an adjudicator; Bailey's Dictionary, 1742." Peter Alto-basse is named in the Issues of the Exchequer (see E376).

ALTON: 1—Local, belonging to Alton, Staffordshire. 2—Dweller in the old farm, manor, or village. 3—Old English, (e)ald, old, and tun, manor, farm; however, Harrison gives also the following, "But Alston, Hamp-shire, was the Anglo-Saxon, Aeweltun, the farm by the spring; Old English, Aew(i)elm, spring, source, fountain; while Alton or Alve-ton, Staffordshire (the Domesday Elveton, would be the Anglo-Saxon, Aelfantun, Aelfa's farm; Anglo-Saxon, Aelfan-, genitive of Aelfa from self, elf)"(see E374-E398-E413a-E420). **ALTREE** (see also Alltrew): 1—Personal.

ALUM, ALLAM (qv), ALLOM, ALLUM: 1— Local, from Hallam (qv), The name of par-ishes in the counties of Derby and York. 2— Alla's home. 3—Ferguson says that Alum is probably a local name, from ham, home and the ancient name Alla, Ali, Allo (see E382-E396.E398) E396-E398).

ALURED, see Alfred.

ALUREDUS: 1—Personal. 2—Elf-peace. 3— Teutonic; Bannister says this name is in Domesday Book as a tenant (see E413a).

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ALLNUTT, see also Alnutt.

ALLNUTT, William, Calvert co., Md., 1748; was ensign in militia under command of Capt. Samuel Isaacks, at Upper Hundred or the Cliffs (M646).

ALLOM, Jeremy, brought from Eng. to Va., by Anthony Hoskins, Northampton co. 16 (V251).

ALLOTT, Adam (b. Eng. 1613), came from Southampton to N.E. in the ship "Bevis", 163S, and settled at Newbury; tailor in the service of Richard Dummer (G164).

ALLOTT, Peter, brought from Eng. to Va., 1655, by John Palmer, Northumberland co. (V251).

ALLOURON, Aaron, came in first fleet from Eng. to S.C., as one of the 12 servants of Capt. Florence O'Sullivan, to whom land grants based upon Allouron's importation were issued 1672 and 1675 (S1173a).

ALLSTADT, Martin, Oley tp., Phila. co., Pa., paid quitrent on 150 acres of land before 1734 (P492).

ALLSTON, see also Alston. ALLSTON (Alston), John (prob. b. Odell or Parvenham, Eng., 1666-d. St. John's, Berkeley, S.C., 1719), s. of William Alston of Strixton; came from Eng., prob. with Gov. John Arch-dale to Carolina colony, 1694, and settled in Berkeley co., S.C.; John Allston, Allstone, Aldston (all same individual), had land war-rants as follows: 400 acres, Berkeley co., May 3, 1698; 400 acres, Mar. 22, 1698/99; 500 acres, Feb. 2, 1704; 400 acres, Nov. 4, 1705 (S.C. Land Warrants); m. Elizabeth, widow of John Harris of Berkeley co.; issue: 1-John (d. May, 1750), planter, St. George parish, Craven co., S.C., m. Deborah Simons(?), 5 children; m. 2d, 1748, Sarah Belin, widow, no issue; 2-William (d. 1743/44), one time collector of customs for Georgetown; m. June, 1721, Esther La Bruce (1704-1781), dau. of Dr. Joseph La Bruce de Marboeuf, m. Esther Robins, 11 children; 3-Elizabeth, received 500 acres by will of father, 1719; 4-Mary, received land by will of father, 1719; 5-Peter (d. 1749) of St. Thomas parish, m. Sarah Bacot, 4 children; 6-Tomassin, re-ceived 500 acres by will of father (A306-S1173a). ALTE see also Alt S1173a).

ALLT (Ault, also Olt), John (b. prob. in Eng., 1606-living in Dover, N.H., 1679); sent out from Eng. to N.H. by the patentee John Mason, 1631; settled at Portsmouth, at Dover from 1640; m. Remembrance —; issue: 1-John; 2-Remembrance, m. John Rand; 3-____, a dau., m. Thomas Edgerly (G164).

ALLUMBY, George, resident in Va., 1653, brought out to the colony, Diana Allumby, his wife, in that year (V251).

ALLUMBLY, William, brought from Eng. to Va., 1637, by Arthur Smith, Isle of Wight co. (V251)

ALLUS, Peter, came from Rotterdam, via Plymouth, Eng., to Phila. in the "St. Andrew," and took oath of allegiance to Pa., Sept. 9, 1749 (P498). ALLVIT, Mary, brought from Eng. to Va., 1656, by Mary Lewis, Northampton co. (V251).

ALLYN, see Allen, Allin.

ALLYN, see Allen, Allin. ALLYN (often Allen), Matthew (d. Windsor, Conn., 1671), perhaps s. of Samuel Allyn of Chelmsford, co. Essex, Eng.; came from Eng. to N.E., 1632, settled at Cambridge; freeman, Mar. 4, 1635; rep. at March term general court ,1636; at Hartford 1637, removing a few yrs. later; rep., 1648-57, asst., 1658-67, commr. for United Colonies, 1660 and 1664; in Eng.; issue (perhaps all b. in Eng.); 1-John (d. Nov. 6, 1696), m. Nov. 19, 1651, Ann, dau. of Henry Smith of Springfield, and g.dau. of William Pynchon; had six daus., viz: Ann, m. Joseph Whiting; Mary, m. Col. William Whiting; Mar-garet, m. William Southmayd of Middletown; Martha, m. Aaron Cooke the third; Elizabeth, m. Alexander Allen of Windsor, m. 2d, John

Gardiner of Gardiner's Island; John Allyn, m. 2d, Hannah Lamberton, widow of Samuel Wells, no issue; he was sec. of the colony, successively lt. and col., asst. in 1662, and was of the council of Gov. Andros, 1687; left large estate; 2-Thomas (d. Windsor, Feb. 14, 1696), capt. in military service, m. Oct. 1658, Abigail. dau. of Rev. John Warham, had 6 sons, 4 daus.; 3-Mary, m. June 11, 1646, Benjamin Newberry, left issue (G164-M671i).

ALLYN, Robert (b. Eng., 1608-d. New Haven, Conn., 1683), bro. of William Allen of Man-chester, Mass. (qv); came from Eng. to N.E., 1637, and settled at Salem, Mass.; admitted to ch. 1642; removed to New London, Conn., 1657, and later to Norwich, at its first settle-ment, 1659; constable 1669; returned to New London where Allwy's Beint paraeturates his ment, 1659; constable 1669; returned to New London, where Allyn's Point perpetuates his memory; m. at Salem; issue: 1-John (bap. Sa-lem, May, 1642-d. New London, 1709), m. Dec. 24, 1668, Elizabeth, dau. of John Gager, 2 children; 2-Sarah (bap. Salem, May 1642), m. Feb. 17, 1659, George Geer; 3-Mary (bap. Sa-lem, Nov. 19, 1648), m. Thomas Parke; 4-Han-nah (b. New London, abt. 1651), m. Thomas Rose 5-Deborah, m. after 1683, John Gager, Jr. (E359a-G164-M669e).

ALLYN, Thomas (d. Barnstable, Mass., Nov. 1680, "at great age"), came from Eng. to N.E. and settled at Barnstable, Mass., before 1644; m. Winped (Winifred) —; m. 2d, —, a widow (name not given); issue (according to Savage): 1-Samuel (b. Feb. 10, 1644-d. Nov. 25, 1726), m. May 10, 1664, Hannah (d. Oct. 23, 1711), dau. of Rev. Thomas Walley, had 3 sons, 2 daus.; 2-John (bap. Sept. 27, 1646), m. abt. 1670, Mary Howland, had 4 children; removed from Barnstable with his family; 3-Mehitable (bap. Nov. 26, 1648), m. June 1, 1667, Samuel Annable of Barnstable. Hughes in "American Ancestry" (Vol. XI), names another son, viz: 4-Thomas (b. Barnstable, 1655-d. 1696), m. 1688, Elizabeth, dau. of John Otis, who had s. James (1691-1741), m. 1712, Susannah Lewis, and had issue (A317-G164-M669e).

M669e). **ALLYN (Allen), Thomas** (b. Eng., Apr. 1604-d. Middletown, Conn., Oct. 16, 1688), bro of Matthew (qv), with whom he had extraordin-ary legal controversy (Trumbull's Colonial Records, Vol. I, p. 211), came from Eng. to Wethersfield, Conn., 1636; freeman, 1652; rep., 1656; later at Middletown, where he was dea-con; m. Martha (d. Middletown, Conn., 1690), perhaps widow of Roger Jepson; in her will she refers as "cousin" to Obadiah Allyn (d. Middletown, Apr. 7, 1712); he was the son of Samuel and was adopted by Thomas who had no issue; he m. Oct. 3, 1669, Elizabeth Sanford; m. 2d, Mary, dau. of John Savage; had 8 child-ren; name now "Allen" (G164-M669e). **ALLYN. Willam** (d. Stonington, Conn., Sept.

ALMERSON, Heinrich (d. Bethlehem, Pa., 1777), came from Moravia to Pa., 1742, and settled at Bethlehem, where he was one of the Moravian brethren (P492).

ALMY (Almey or Almond), William (b. prob. at Dunton-Bassett or South Kilworth, Leices-tershire. Eng., 1600-d. Portsmouth, R.I., abt. Apr. 1677), only son of Christopher Almey of South Kilworth; executor of father's estate, 1624; came from Eng. to N.E. 1631; went home and returned with wife and 2 children in 1635,

ALSTON (Allston), John (bap. Felmersham, Bedfordshire, Eng., Dec. 5, 1673-d. Chowan co., N.C., 1758), s. of John Alston of Parvenham, Eng., and descended from a landed family of Suffolk and Bedford; he came from Eng. to Carolina colony, prob. in 1710; settled on Bennett's creek, where Gatesville, N.C., now stands, in 1711; land-grants to sons in 1713; juror, 1716, grand-juror, 1721-24; justice of the peace and associate justice, 1724-29; held military rank of capt., major and col. after 1725; was sheriff of Chowan co., several terms; vestryman St. Paul's parish; m. abt. 1700, Mary (b. abt. 1687-d. after 1758), dau. of John Clark, m. Mary Palin, of Pasquotank, N.C.; issue: 1-Joseph John (b. 1702-d. Halifax co., N.C., 1781), owned 150 slaves and over 100,000 acress of land at death; m. Elizabeth, dau. of William Chancy, Sr., m. Deborah Simons; 4 children; m. 2d, Euphan, dau. of Willis Wilson, of Norfolk co. Va., m. Mary —; 5 children; 2-Solomon (d. 1784), m. abt. 1729, Ann (Nancy) Hinton, 11 children; 3-William (d. 1743), m. abt. 1735, Ann Kimbrough, 2 daus. (Ann m. 2d, 1748/49, Jeconias Yancey, and by him had 5 more daus. named Yancey); 4-Philip (d. Warren ço., N.C., 10 children; 5-James (d. Orange co., N.C., 10 children; 5-James (d. Feb. 7, 1775), m. Miss Mell, 2 or more children; 5-Esther (b. Feb. 28, 1777), m. Michael Bear (d. Plainfield, Pa.), a Mennonite preacher, 2 or more children; 6-Susannah (b. Oct. 30, 1780-d. Mt. Rock, abt. 1840), m. 1800, Joseph Ritner (b. Berks co., Pa., Mar. 25, 1780-d, nr. Mt. Rock, Cumberland co., Pa., Oct. 16, 1869), s. of John Ritner, who emigrated from Alsace, on the Rhine; Joseph Ritner was rep. of Washington co. in the Pa. legislature for 6 yrs., speaker of house of representatives, 2 yrs., gov. of Pa., 1835-38; director of the mint at Phila., 1848; had 8 children; 6-Samuel (b. ALTHAM, John, gentleman, came from Eng. to Md. in 1637, and settled at St. Mary's Hun-dred; summoned to appear before the gen. assembly, excused his absence by reason of sickness (M632).

ALTHAUS, Abraham (b. Germany, 1707), came from Rotterdam to Phila, in the ship "Brittania" of London, 1731; name appears on original ship's list (P498).

ALTHAUS, Arndt, came from Rotterdam to Phila. in the ship "Fane," and took oath of allegiance to Pa., Oct. 17, 1749 (P498).

ALTHAUS, Joseph, was settled at Franconia tp., Phila. co., Pa., where he paid quitrent on 141 acres before 1734 (P492).

ALTHEAM, Simon, came from Eng. (per-haps) to Dover, N.H., abt. 1660; settled on Martha's Vineyard, 1690; rep. gen. court, 1692; m. Mary, dau. of Simon Butler; issue: 1-Jethro (bap. 1700), m. 1724, Mary, dau. of Rev. Ex-perience Mayhew, m. Thankful Hinckley perience (N140a).

ALTHEN, Peter (b.1714), came from Rotter-dam to Phila. in the ship "Lydia," and took oath of allegiance to Pa., Sept. 20, 1743; on ship's list as "Peter Alden, age 29" (P498).

ALTHER, John, Georgia, 1748; in partner-ship with Gaspar Holsteter (Aughester?), on Apr. 21, 1748, was granted a small island, com-prising 234 acres in Augustin creek, by court of pres. and assts. of Ga. (G192a).

ALTHONIUSS (Aldamos), Johan Fried (b. 1716), came from Rotterdam to Phila. in the ship "Lydia," and took oath of allegiance to Pa., Sept. 27, 1740; also called "Fredrich Aldamos, age 24"; he was a fellow-passenger of Peter Altonius (qv); (P498).
