History of The Anderson Family

It has been difficult obtaining our family history. We have begun to search the Archives, Courthouse, and the Department of Health. Most of our information has been obtained by word of mouth. We know that Great-grandmother Mattie and Grandma Alberta lived in Fairfield County. They worked on farms as sharecroppers and did domestic work, washing and ironing for white people. We were told that Grandma Alberta lived on the Davis place in Fairfield County, which is now near the site of the Mack Truck Company.

As a young lady, Grandma Alberta conceived her first son, Frizell, whose biological father was a white man. An old lady informed my mother, Marjorie, the Frizell's father was a policeman they called "Red." They said his last name was Gladden. Alberta Anderson was married to Hyram Anderson. Grandma Alberta had three other children, Mattie, Henry, and Leroy. She lived in Fairfield County her entire life. Grandma Alberta had several strokes. She was confined to a chair. She died in 1952 from another stroke. She lived and died in Winnsboro in a house on Highway 213 across from the Shiloh Presbyterian Church. The house has since been torn down.

Grandma Alberta's daughter Mattie died at an early age, leaving a daughter, Bertha, whom she raised. Grandma Alberta attended the Blackjack Baptist Church. She was laid to rest at Blackjack. Her son, Frizell, had her buried next to his first wife, Blanche. We do not know where Great-grandmother Mattie, Aunt Mattie, or Grand-daddy Hyram are buried, but we think they are in the Blackjack cemetery. We were informed by one of the oldest living members of the church that they were, indeed, buried at the Blackjack Baptist Church. Their graves were not marked. Apparently, it was very difficult to purchase gravestones for graves during that time.

Frizell had his brother, Henry, buried in his plot at Blackjack. Uncle Henry's wife, Olivia, was also buried there. Uncle Leroy died in Connecticut and was laid to rest in that state.

Frizell died on September 24, 1993, and was interred in the Blackjack Cemetery.

He was the father of twelve children, of which two died at a young age. Ten grew up to be grandparents. Uncle Henry's family consisted of eleven children. They all live in Connecticut. Uncle Leroy had two children, and they too, lived in Connecticut. Aunt Mattie had only one child, Bertha. Bertha had five children, and is the grand and great-grandmother of several.

Our family has grown large. Let us not drift apart. Let this family reunion spark a desire for continued closeness and many more reunions.

We will continue to search for our "Anderson Family History."

An Ordinance

To Raise Funds and Supplies for the Year Commencing May 1, 1952, and Ending April 30, 1953, and to Provide for Assessment and Collection of All Taxes Covering Said Period:

Be It Enacted and Ordained by the Mayor and Council of the Town of Wimborsboro in meeting assembled:

Section 1. That for the purpose of raising supplies and funds for general purposes and for retiring notes and indebtedness of the Town of Wimborsboro for the year commencing May 1, 1952, and ending April 30, 1953, and to raise funds with which to pay all other obligations of said Town, including principal and interest on sewerage notes or obligations, a tax of forty (40) mills ad valorem is hereby levied and assessed upon every dollar of the value of all real and personal property within the corporate limits of the Town of Wimborsboro, said tax to be paid into the treasury of said Town.

Section 2. In addition to the tax above provided for, the sum of three (\$3.00) dollars is hereby required to be paid by every male inhabitant of said Town between the ages of 18 and 50 years in lieu of working the streets of said Town.

Section 3. All taxes and sums assessed and payable under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be paid in legal currency and tender of the United States of America.

Section 4. All taxes and sums herein assessed and provided for shall be due and payable between November 1, 1952, and January 1, 1953, shall be subject to a penalty of fifteen (15%) and shall be collected by distress or otherwise, as is provided by law.
