In the Name of God Amen

I Samuel Aston of Fairfield District State of South Carolina being Sick in Body but of Sound mind and Memory and Calling to mind the Mortality of my Body and Shortness of this mortal Life I do therefore make Constitute and ordain this my Last Will and Testament in the following maner and form, and principally first I Commit my Soul to God the Gracious Giver thereof, and Next my Body to the Earth to be Buried in an orderly Christian manner by my Executors, and as to my worldly Estate I Leave bequath and divide as follows I Bequath and Leave my Son William a Tract of Land Containing 100 acres more or Less Granted to Hugh Montgomery the 17th Day of March 1775 lying and being in the Destrict afore said, on Dumper Creek Watter of Little River I also Bequath and Leave my two Deantors Viz Peggy and Betty a tract of Land Containing 96 acres Granted to Joseph Harton the 1st Day of Aprile 1790) on the Watters of Little River and in the Destrict afore Said and the Same to be Equally Divided betwixt them I bequath and Leave all the Rest of my property Real and personal to my three Children Viz Peggy William and Betty Each to have an Equal part after all my debts are paid, and I do hearby Constitute and ordain James Blair of Little River. Hugh McQueston of Bullrun John Stirlen to be the sole Executors I Also desire you to Rent my Plantation for five years of this my Last ~~will~~ Will and Testament and I do hearby revoke and make void all other Wills, authoriseing and Confirming this to be my Last Will and Testament in Witnes whereof I have hearunto Set my hand and Seal this ^{day} forth; August 1808 one thousand Eight hundred and Eight and in the thirty third year of the Independency of the united States of America
