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Column 1:

A Fine Specimen--We saw a Specimen of fine granite from the Ragsdale quarry, at Blair's, which is wonderful in the manner of splitting. The slab was two feet by four and averaged in thickness about one inch to one and and quarter. The remarkable feature is that it was split without the use of drills, was done, we are informed, by hammers alone. Mr. Heath, who manages the quarry for Messrs. Ragsdale & Ragsdale, says he has never so even and uniform piece of granite, of its size, gotten out without the use of drills before. It is a very pretty specimen beyond a doubt.

Column 7:

An Ordinance PERTAINING TO THE GRAZING OF Cows.

Be it enacted and ordained by the intendant and Wardens of the town of Winnsboro in Council met and by the authority of the same: That the grazing of cows on the streets of Winnsboro shall be lawful, except as hereinafter provided.

Provided, That grazing shall not be permitted on Congress Street, nor on east Washington Street, nor on Zion street north of East Washington.

Provided, further, That each cow shall be securely haltered and held while grazing, and that the grazing of cows shall only be permitted between the hours of 6 A. M. and 6 p. M.

Provided, further, That any one offending against the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined twenty-five cents for each and every offense.

That all Ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this Ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

Done in Council this 15th day of May, 1895, and with the corporate seal of the town affixed.
