

UNION WITH R.C.A. OVER AND OUT

Final vote on the Proposed Plan of Union between the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. and the Reformed Church in America, approved by a three fourths majority of the Presbyterian presbyteries, failed to receive a two-thirds vote of the Reformed classes. The final vote was 59 to 18 of the presbyteries voting for union, two to the good. The final count of the classes (Reformed "presbyteries") was 23 for and 22 against.

In the Presbyterian Church, liberals and conservatives split among themselves, working for and ern classes voted against it.





W. B. Vaughn Claimed By Death

Funeral services for Mr. William Benjamin Vaughn, who died in a Charlotte, N. C., hospital about midnight Friday, were conducted at Bethel Methodist Episcopal church Sunday afternoon at three o'clock by his pastor, the Rev. (Pinckney) L. Bauknight. Interment was made in Evergreen cemetery. Mr. Vaughn's death followed an operation which he underwent Friday. After the operation his condition was pronounced as being satisfactory, but complications set in which caused his death.

Although not in his usual good health, Mr. Vaughn was at his post at Hardin and Vaughn's last Thursday before going to Charlotte for the operation, and it was not generally known that he was ill. The announcement of his death came as a distinct shock to his many friends throughout this section, for he was widely known throughout Chester, York, Fairfield, and Union counties, coming in contact with numerous persons in connection with his work at Hardin and Vaughn's.

Mr. Vaughn came to Chester to join the sales staff of Joseph Wylie and Company in 1908, and was for many years an official of this firm. Upon the retirement of Wylie and Company from business in 1930, Mr. Vaughn and Mr. James I. Hardin organized the Hardin and Vaughn Department store, which has become one of the most out-standing businesses in this section of the state.

Mr. Vaughn was a steward of Bethel Methodist church, and was one of its most active members, and was a Mason, a member of the Knights of Pythias, and of the Chester Lions Club. Mr. Vaughn enjoyed an enviable reputation for business integrity, and his dependability and courteous kindness to others were outstanding characteristics.

Mr. Vaughn was a son of the late J. M. Vaughn and the late Mrs. Janie Simpson Vaughn, being a native of the Ridgeway section of Fairfield county. He was sixty-three years of age.

Mr. Vaughn was married to Miss Cleo Wall, who survives, as do one brother, R. J. Vaughn of Simpson; four sisters, Mrs. Leightner Blair, Miss Mamie Vaughn and Mrs. P. H. Richardson, all of Simpson and Mrs. Strother Broom of Winnsboro.
