Virginia Bratton 92, York Civic Leader

YORK — (Special) — Mrs. Virginia Mason Bratton, 92, a leader in the Daughters of American Revolution and the United Daughters of the Confederacy, a friend of governors and legislators and a prominent member of a pioneer York County family died Thursday night in Divine Saviour Hospital in York after a long period of declining health. She was the widow of Robert Moultrie Bratton of York. "Miss Virginia", as she was known, was born at Brattonsville Plantation near York, the ancestral home of the Bratton family in the historic Revolutionary house where her confederate Home and the Ur Revolutionary house where her grandfather and great-grandfather grandiather and great-grandiather and great-grandmother, Col. William and Martha Bratton, lived at the time of the Revolutionary War. It was her pride that Miss Virginia recalled she had lived in all three historic homes at Brattonville.

She was a charter member of Kings Mountain Chapter, Daughters of American Revolution, of which she served as local and regent. Miss Virginia was also a charter member and president of the Winnie Davis Chapter, United Daughters of the Confederacy.
