THE TORCH AND ITS WORK

SOME FEW OF THE INCENDIARY FIRES IN SOUTH CAROLINA.

From the Columbia Register; Vol. II. Columbia, S. C.

Sunday Morning, Dec. 24, 1876

Note: These events occurred during the hotly contested fight for the Governorship of South Carolina between Daniel H. Chamberlain and Wade Hampton in 1876.

- January 1. The corn crop and fodder house of Mr. Gray, in the fork of Orangeburg
- January 16. The residence of General M. C. Butler, at Currytown, Edgefield County. Loss
- January 12. The stables and barn of Mrs. Cornwell, York County, 6,500 bundles of fodder,
- January 26. Barn of General John Bratton, Fairfield County.
- February 10. The residence of F. B. Grier, Sumter County, destroyed by fire.
- February 11. The barn of Frank Witherspoon, colored, Mount Cleo township, Sumter County. 100 bushels of corn, two stacks of fodder, rice straw, & c.
- March 1. Barn and stable and all the live stock and provisions of Mr. D. E. Gilchrist,
- March 3. Residence of S. Marco, in Darlington County.
- March 18. Two churches belonging to colored people, near Knights Hill, Kershaw
- March 23. The gin house of John Lorick. Lexington County. Nine bales of cotton burned
- March 24. Residence of J. P. McElhaney, near Ellington, in Barnwell, County,
- April 20. Store burned at ninety-six by William Pressley, ex-school commissioner,
- April 22. Gin house of W. T. Smith in Laurens County.
- April 23. Kitchen of William DuBose burned at Timmonsville.
- April 28. Mills of O. O. Barr, near Edgefield court house, destroyed by fire. All the
- April 30. The residence of Captain J. Thomas Lowry, near Yorkville. Furniture nearly all
- May 14. Great fire in Darlington. Loss, \$70,000. Supposed to be Incendiary.
- May 15. Fences of J. P. Mounzon, in Williamsburg County, Destroyed
- May 19. Wheat and corn mill of John Moors, in York County. Loss, \$2,500

- May 20. Gin house of Wills Rowell, in Marion County.
- May 20. Fences of J. P. Monzon, Williamsburg, a number of Panels destroyed.
- May 22. Turpentine distillery of Mc Kay, Mc Neil & Horton, near Cheraw, with twenty barrels rosin and spirits.
- May 26. Wagon shop W. A. Gaines, in Chester. Loss \$700.
- June 2. Barn and stables of P. M. Carson, near Fort Motte. Loss, corn, fodder, two horses, four mules; also cotton house and one negro house.
- June 3. Residence of Dr. H. M. Steuart, in Beaufort. Loss, \$600
- June 24. Mill buildings, railroad platform and track in the town of Winnsboro, S. C. loss \$6,000.
- June 26. Six stores and dwellings in the town of Orangeburg Loss, about \$10,000.
- June 26. Tank and pump at Mount Holly, Northeastern Railroad.
- July 4. In manning one block destroyed. Loss, \$30,000.
- July 20. The store of James B. McGary at Clinton . Loss, \$3,500.
- July 21. House of John Carlos, Jr., (colored,) in Camden.
- July 28. Residence and storeroom of a. P. Lindsey, at Lowrysville, and stock of goods belonging to Williams & Lindsey. Loss \$2,000.
- August 17. Two fires in Lexington. Loss \$2,300.
- August 24. Offices of Messrs. R. Aldrich and James M. Ryan, in Barnwell.
- August 31. Fire at Shoe Heel. Loss, \$5,000 to \$6,000.
- September 1. The Darlington Fair Company's building consumed by fire.
- September 8. An attempt to fire the dwelling of Mr. Isaac Alexander, Georgetown.
- September 9. The residence of C. D. Brown, near Grahams.
- September 11. Clines workshops in Greenville. Loss, \$8,000.
- September 18. The store of Mr. E. T. Roberts, Genesis Cross Roads, Beaufort.
- September 20. The gin houses of Messrs. H. B. Barker and David Legetto, a lot of cotton lost.
- September 21. N. B. Farr, colored tailor, of Union, burned out.
- September 26. Mr. Turner Osborn, of Anderson, burned out, saved nothing.
- October 2. An attempt to burn the town of Darlington. Discovered by the young men on guard.
- October 2. The store of Mr. Theodore Kaplan, near Dove's Depot in Darlington. Loss \$2,000.
- October 2. The store owned by Mr. G. Richards, at Mechanicsville. None of the contents saved.
- October 6. The store of E. J. Moody, near Marion. Loss \$1,300.
- October 7. The residence of Mr. J. H. Oppenheim, on Sullivan's Island. Loss \$1000.

- October 9. A building in the city of Charleston, owned by the South Carolina Railroad Company, and occupied by the Great Southern Fire Kindler Company, with it's contents burned.
- October 11. The residence of L. B. Lewis, twenty-four miles from Aiken. Inmates barely escaped with their lives. Loss \$1,200.
- October 14. Gin house and mill of Mr. Emanuel White, near Batesburg.
- October 14. Cotton house of Mr. J. C. Wright, of Chester County; Also a considerable amount of cotton.
- October 16. The residence of Mr. John Baker, on Sullivan's Island. Loss \$1,700.
- October 16. A house belonging to Mr. Cannon, in Lexington.
- October 20. An outhouse containing 2,000 pounds seed cotton, provisions, & c., owned by S. Corley, in Lexington.
- October 20. Gin house of captain W. J. Davis, in Marion County. Loss, \$1,000.
- October 20. The gin house of Mr. John Phillips, near Sumter, with all it's contents.
- October 26. Sheriff Berry's gin house in Marion . Loss \$1,200.
- October 27. Mr. F. S. Ream's gin house, near Bishopville, Sumter County, containing twenty-five bales of cotton and a quantity of bagging and ties.
- October 27. An attempt to fire the residence of Dr. W. E. Aiken, In Camden.
- November 3. Gin house of W. J. Netties, in Williamsburg County. Loss \$1,200.
- November 3. Flour and grist mill and gin house of Captain D. S. Hair, six miles from Blackville. Loss \$2,000.
- November 3. Dwellings and outbuildings of T. W. Dawson, railroad agent at Gadsden.
- November 4. A second attempt to fire the town of Darlington.
- November 13. The corn crib and smoke house of Mr. R. H. Earle, in Greenville. Loss \$1,000.
- November 13. The cotton and gin house of Israel Sullivan, colored, near Pine House.
- November 16. The storehouse and stock of goods belonging to W. A. Ancrum, near Camden.
- November 17. An attempt to burn the gin and cotton house of L.J. Moody, in Marion.
- November 17. Gin house of Mr. P. S. Wilds, with five bales of cotton. Loss \$800.
- November 17. A small building of W. T. Hill, in the suburbs of Timmonsville.
- November 17. The store of W. A. Ancrum, on swift creek. Loss \$2,000.
- November 17. The house of Mr. Charles Folk, on Broad River. Mr. Folk's wife and their child barely escaped with their lives.
- November 17. While Captain R. Z. Harllee was at court his dwelling and kitchen were set on fire. He was shot at twice when attempting to put out the flames.

November 24. Jim Stuckey and John Anderson, two colored Democrats, living southeast of Camden, burned out.

November 24. Attempt to burn gin house of W. J. Tedder, four miles north of Timmonsville.

November 27. Cotton gin, saw and flouring mill belonging to Messrs. James and William Johnson, in Union County, with fifteen bales of cotton. Loss \$1,000.

December 1. Gin house and contents of Mr. N. P. Devlin, near Abbeville. Loss, \$ 1,000.

December 2. Gin house of Mr. James W. Hill, near Society Hill.

December 4. Barn and stables of E. M. Wells, in Cheraw, burned. Loss \$ 1,000.

December 4. Barn of C. H. Wilcox near Lawtonville. About three weeks before the gin house and contents were burned.

December 4. Barn belonging to Miss Anne L. Gomillion, in Edgefield, with seven bales cotton, 200 bushels wheat and other produce.

December 4. Mr. Westley Hawkins' gin house, in Edgefield, Destroyed by fire.

December 6. J. I. Trantham, flat rock, Kershaw County, barn and Stables. Loss, \$ 600.

December 7. Gin house and stables of Mr. Richard Singleton, at Acton.

December 7. The fodder house of Mr. J. R. May, near Mechanicsville, burned.

December 7. Gin house of Dr. W. W. Smith, at Williston, burned. Loss \$ 1,000.

December 8. Gin house of Augustus Covin, in Abbeville County. Total loss.

December 6. Mr. James Harper's turpentine sheds with contents. Loss \$ 1,500.

December 11. Gin house of W. W. Miller, at Saluda old town with twenty- five bales cotton. Loss \$2,000.

December 11. Gin house, three bales of cotton and forty tons of seed, of A. E. Gregg, of Darlington.

December 12. Fifteen stacks of fodder of a. F. Edwards, of Darlington.

December 12. Gin house and three bales cotton, of John Parrot, of Darlington.

December 12. Steam mill and fixtures of Mr. D. M. Bradham. Loss \$2,500.

- December 12. Richard Humphries, (a colored democrat at Batesburg,) cotton house burned.
- December 14. Steam mill of Mr. D.M. Brabham, at Manning, destroyed by fire. Loss 2,000.
- December 14. Gin house of Daniel White, in Darlington, with a lot of cotton seed and farming utensils.
- December 15. A large portion of the town of Blackville laid in ashes. Loss, \$40,000.
- December 15. Disastrous fire in Florence. Loss, \$10,000.
- December 15. Attempt to burn the store of J. P. Clements, in Darlington County. Incendiary.
- December 15. Gin house, saw, wheat and flour mill of George Anderson, of Williamston. Supposed to be accidental.
- December 15. Cherry Hotel, at Pendleton.
- December 15. Gin house, three bales of cotton and large quality of cotton seed, of Mrs. James Hatcher, pine house, Edgefield.
- December 15. W. P. Cullum's gin house near Batesburg, in Lexington, with twelve bales of cotton.
- December 15. Cotton house, warehouse and stable of J. J. Dale, of Beaufort
- December 16. Barn belonging to Joseph E Glover, of Walterboro, with contents, corn, rice and other produce.
- December 16. Gin house of O.W. D. Russell, in Chester, with fourteen bales of cotton.
- December 16. Gin house of Mr. Blewet Worthy, in Chester, with eight bales of cotton and 800 bushels of cotton seed.
- December 16. House near F. M. Gibson's mill, destroyed by fire. Loss, \$1,050.
- December 17. Store of J. & D. McCullough, and store of W. J. Brock, at Honea Path, Anderson County.
- December 17. Barn, stables and a horse and a mule of Asa Godbold, five miles north of Marion.
- December 17. Gin house of E. J. Rembert, of Sumter, together with twenty-five bales of cotton and 2,000 bushels of cotton seed. Two weeks previous he lost his mill and gin by incendiarism.
- December 19. The gin house of Mr. J. M. McCall containing seed, cotton and cotton seed.
