

**AN OLD POCKET-BOOK.—**Dr. Thos. F. Broom has a pocket-book that was used a decidedly long time ago. It belonged to his great-great-grandfather, Mr. Charles Broom, and has come down from generation to generation. It contains a batch of private papers, from which we select the following as curiosities:

February ye 8th, 1774. Received of William Broom two Shilling for tacks by me Thomas Woodward.

I promise to pay or cause to be paid unto Jacob Free or his order the Sum of Eleven Bushels of Sound Indian Corn, properly shrunk, or that any Honest Reasonable persons shall allow it to shrink, it being for the rent of his Cornfield Lying on the Southwest Side of Little River, as witness my hand this 10th Jany. 1770.

Burr's Hill.

Received July 28th 1764 of Mr Charles Broom the Sum of Six Shillings and four pence proctn. Money by the hand of Mr. Nathan Rowland, in full of all demands from this date for James Young & Compy.

Resieved of Charles Broom his Levy for the year 1761 for one tithee 11/3 pence. Jas. Bowie.
