February ve 8th, 1774. Received o William Broom two Shilling for tacta by me Thomas Woodward.

I promise to pay or cause to be paid. unto Jacob Free or his order the Sum of Eleven. Bushels of Sound Indian Corn, properly shrunk, or that any Honest Reasonable persons shall allow it to shrink, it being for the rent of his Cornfield Lying on the Southwest Side of Little River, as witness my hand this 10th Jany. 1770.

Received July 28th 1764 of Mr. Charles Broom the Sum of Six Shillings and four pence proctu. Money by the hand of Mr. Nathan, Rowland, in full of all demands from this date for James Young & Compy.
