

Purpose

St. Gile's Needs Our Help

The High Kirk of Edinburgh enshrines the spirit of Scotlands colorful history and no building more clearly symbolizes the faith of our fathers. Throughout the world men and women regard her with affection and pride. Our generation must preserve and use this great sanctuary.

Once in a century restoration, repairing things well used, tired and broken. The state of the building needs urgent attention. Last restored in the 1880's, largely with a view to Sunday services and great occasions. St. Giles now needs to respond to the thousands of visitors who come throughout the week. The needs are to repair the stonework and roofs; renew decaying glass; build a new organ; replace antiquated heating and lighting and sound systems, lay new floors and clean the whole interior.

The work has started, repair of the roofs and restoration of external stonework began in 1979. A severe winter storm loosened the crown spire and urgent repairs began this summer.

Grandfather Mountain Highland Games

Grandfather Mountain Highland Games, the largest Highland Gathering in the world, will take place on 11 and 12 July 1981.

The Clan Buchanan Society in America holds its annual meeting in conjunction with this gathering each year and it will be holding its annual meeting this year on Friday evening 10 July at the Ramada Inn in Boone, North Carolina. Make your plans row to attend.

A GMHG Information Tent will be located at the Pixie Motel in Linville, North Carolina. Its hours of operation will be from 1200 noon until 5:00P.M. Monday, 6 July through Friday 10 July. Tickets and programs may be purchased here.

If the postage and handling are not included the tickets will be held at the Game's field headquarters at MacRae Meadows. No order will be filled after 15 June 1981.

Shuttle Buses - Buses will operate from the parking area opposite the riding stables on N.C. 105 at the junction of U.S. 221. The Crossnor Volunteer Fire Department operates these buses and will charge \$1.00 each way.

Roseboro Road - All attendees are urged to use Roseboro Road to MacRae Meadow thus avoiding the conjestion at Linville. This paved road is off U.S. 221, (passes in front of the Esecola Golf Club entrance). Follow it to the end, turn left on the Blue Ridge Parkway to U.S. 221, turn left to Grandfather Mountain entrance and MacRae Meadow.

Camping - Limited camping is available. Advance Reservations may be made by calling Mr. Guy Soule, Area Code 704-588-0884. No advance reservations will be accepted after 15 June 1981.

Clan Competition - The clans will compete again this year in the "Kilted Mile" foot race and the Tug-O-War.

Trophies - Clan Buchanan Society in America and Friends will again present The Minnie H. Watson Memorial Trophy to the winner of the Amateur Grade II Piobaireachd (Pibrac), Bagpiping competition.

Opening Ceremonies. On Thursday evening 9 July, at dusk, or in the gloaming as the Scots say, a ceremony to raise the Clans for the Highland Games will be held on MacRae Meadows. The ceremony will begin at about 8:45 P.M. and will last approximately a half hour. The view from either side of the reviewing stand should be spectacular as well as inspiring. Harolds Heraldic Corner

What is the "Bar Sinister"?

There is no such thing in heraldry. "Bar sinister" is a popular phrase used by novelists with whom it probably originated. By them it is used as an expression denoting illegitimacy. "He started life with the bar sinister on his shield" is the common remark in novels, meaning that the man in question was a bastard. There is a term in French heraldry - barre sinistre - which is a translation of the English heraldic term, bend sinister. The French "barre" translates "bend" but it is not the equivalent of the English "bar". Sinister in heraldry has no unpleasant connotation but is simply a term of Latin origin which means "left", and is the opposite of "dexter" - right. What about the bend sinister? Has some mistake been made and is this the sign of bastardy which the popular writers have mistaken in ther bar sinister? No, although a bend sinister has sometimes been used to denote illegitimacy, it is merely one of the marks or "charges" on the coat of arms, a band which runs from the top left corner of the shield down to the bottom right.

It should be added that a baton sinister is often used as a sign of bastardy. This is particularly the case with royal bastards, and anyone who looks at the arms of the Dukes of Buccleuch, of Graton, or of St. Albans will see the baton sinister "debruising" the royal arms of the original dukes father. "Debruising" sounds pretty bad, but has nothing to do with any bruising. It merely means a mark or baton set right across the royal arms.

Septs of Clan Buchanan (Continued from Fall 1980 Issue)

The names of Buchanan which will be covered in this issue include the Septs of Yule, MacAldonich, and MacIndeor.

The Sept of Yule includes the following variations of this surname:

Youel	Yool	Yuile
Yuill	Yuille	Zuill

Buchanan of Auchmar states in his Ancient Scottish Surnames "It is pretended that the Yuilles are descended from a son of Buchanan of Drumikill, born upon Yuildog". George Fraser Black, Author of The Surnames of Scotland says that the usual explanation of this name as "one given to children born on Christmas day", does not satisfy him, but he goes on to say that he is unable to offer a satisfactory interpretation in place of it. He confirms the fact that the Yules were members of Clan Buchanan. The name is an ancient one, dating into the 14th century. It is interesting to note that the latinized version of the name is Julius. The bearers of this patronym spread far and wide however the name seems to radiate from the Sterlingshire area which supports the contention that this is a strong name of Buchanan.

The Sept MacAldonich contains only one surname and Buchanan of Auchmar contends that this family is descended from the second cadet of the Buchanans, Lord of Lenny. The name derives from the Gaelic name Mhaoldomhnaich which means "Sundays servant". The anglicized name is Muldonich. Auchmar further indicates that the name became quite scarce in Scotland primarily because the bearers were inclined to assume the name Buchanan.

The Sept MacIndeor consists of the following patronyms:

This is a Gaelic name which may be interpreted to mean "son of the Dewar". Buchanan of Auchmar says that this name was given to a Buchanan who accompanied the Laird of Buchanan's daughter to Argyle when she married Campbell of Ardkinglass. Due to the fact that there were no other Buchanans in the territory this man was called a "deoradh" which is gaelic for "alien" consequently his posterity were called the MacAndeoirs or the "sons of the sojourner or alien". Black, tends to question this and suggests that the name could come from the Gaelic-MacIain duihb "son of black John". It is of interest to note that the M'Indeors or Dewars of Islay often called themselves MacArthurs.

President Buchanan's Log Cabin

Near the gymnasium of the Mercersburg Academy at Mercersburg, Pennsylvania stands the one room log cabin in which James Buchanan, fifteenth President of the United States, was born. This small building has had a history of moving.

Originally it was located at Stony Batter, near Cove Gap, a few miles northwest of Mercersburg. A stone memorial pyramid now marks the sit in the Buchanan State Park. James Buchanan was born there on April 23, 1791. His father, aged 23, came from County Donegal, Ireland in 1783 to Stony Batter where he worked in a little country store. In 1796 when James was five years old the family moved to Mercersburg where his father started a general merchandise store. When old enough young Buchanan attended the old Stone Academy at Mercersburg. Here he learned Greek and Latin with English. He picked up mathematics while working at his father's store. The Buchanan home on North Main Street is marked by a sign indicating his residence there until 1829. From here in 1807 he entered Dickinson College at Carlisle, in 1809 to Lancaster for the study of law and in 1812, at age 21, was admitted to the bar.

In 1850 - when Buchanan was Secretary of State - his old cabin homestead was brought to Fayette Street, Mercersburg and converted into a weaver's workshop. Businessmen of Chambersburg bought the cabin in 1925 and moved it to that community some 30 miles away. There it served successively as a Girl Scout headquarters, an antique shop, and later Democratic Headquarters. In 1963 due to sale of the property on which it was situated, the cabin was sold to the Mercersburg Academy. It was dismantled log by log and transported to its new sight where it was felt that the cabin as the birthplace of Pennsylvania's only President would be an inspiration to the students.

A second tie of the President with the Academy is a bedroom in North Cottage, residence of the Headmaster. This is known as the Buchanan room in memory of a night the President spent as guest there when school was known as Marshall College.


