To the Legislature of South Carolina

The Petition of James Bealwell respectfully shows that he is now seventy five years of age and resides in the District of Anderson. That he lived near Saluda in what now belongs to Lexington District during the War of the Revolution. That he was a Soldier during that struggle on the side of Independence and now asks of the State a Pension on account of those services and his age and necessities.

His first service was under Captain John Kinler in a Regiment commanded by Colonel Charles Hely on a tour of one month the year before the fall of Charleston.

His second tour was under Captain George Taylor in the same Regiment though at that time commanded by Major Hart and Colonel William Thompson.

His third tour was under Captain Matthew Owens and again under the command of Captain Friday besides various scouting parties to which he had been attached though his principal service on his last tour was in the neighborhood of Orangeburg having been stationed there for some time in guarding the magazines at that place.

He owns a small tract of sixty three acres of Land worth about two dollars an acre or possibly a little more - one horse worth about seventy five dollars - Two cows and calves, & some sheep cattle six head in all. Small stock of Hogs 8 or 9 head some house hold kitchen furniture and plantation tools adapted to his condition in life.
