

Grave 3. Upright marble slab set in rock; headstone broken.

Upright footstone set in ground. Mary Cameron, relict of David B. Cameron, born 1801, died 1875. Be faithful unto death, The Lord is precious.

(NOTE: Mary was the daughter of Mathew Lyle.)

Grave 4. Cement slab on brick base.

In memory of Rebecca C., wife of J. A. Formby, born May 3, 1835, died June 29, 1887.

Grave 5. 3-foot high stacked rock grave with marble. Upright headstone set in ground.

Sacred to the memory of David B. Cameron, born May 29, 1798, died Sept. 13, 1849.

(NOTE: David Brown Cameron was a son of James and Sarah Brown Cameron.)

Grave 6. Marble slab on marble base, 18 inches high, 4-foot obelisk on square base, center of slab.

Thomas Cameron, born April 26, 1796, died Sept. 15, 1859. All Is Well.

(NOTE: Thomas, too, was a son of James and Sarah Brown Cameron.)

Grave 7. Marble slab on marble base; 5-foot obelisk on square base.

In memory of Mrs. Nancy (Stevens) Cameron, born July 30, 1796, died December 12, 1855, aged 59 years, 4 mos., 12 days.

Grave 8. Stacked flat rock, 2 feet high, with marble slab 4 feet high set in ground at head of grave.

Sacred to the memory of William S. Cameron, born Sept. 15, 1825, died Oct. 6, 1841.

Grave 9. Stacked flat rock, 2-1/2 feet high with marble slab set in the ground at head of grave.

Sacred to the memory of James T. Cameron, born March 9, 1833, died Oct. 2, 1841.

Grave 10. Stacked flat rock 2-1/2 feet high with marble slab set in ground at head of grave.

In memory of Elizabeth White, daughter of James and Sarah Cameron, born March 2, 1808, died Jan. 30, 1841, aged 32 years, 10 months, and 28 days.

Grave 11. Stacked flat rock, 2-1/2 feet high, marble slab set in ground at head of grave.

In memory of James C. Cameron, born April 24, A.D. 1764, and died April 17, 1840, aged 76 years and 23 days.
