(166) Died, on August 21, 1839, of a protracted fever of 27 days, at his residence in Edgefield District, S.C. Thomas H. Nixon, Esq., in his 42nd year. He filled several important public offices in this State. He had long been a member and Deacon of the Baptist Church, at the Red Oak Grove. He has left a wife and nine children. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," August 29, 1839)

(167) Died, at his residence in Dunstable, Massachusetts, aged 84 years, Mr. Zebedee Kendall, father of the Postmaster General. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," August 29, 1839)

(168) Died, in Edgefield District, on August 23, 1839, of a long and severe fever, Henrietta C. Holloway, daughter of Lewis Holloway, aged 2 years, 6 months and 16 days. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," September 5, 1839)

(169) Died, in Augusta, Georgia, on Saturday, August 24, 1839, Henry Robertson, aged about 37 years. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," September 5, 1839)

(170) Died, on Sunday morning, August 25, 1839, James Leverich. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," September 5, 1839)

(171) Died, on Sunday morning, August 25, 1839, James Lang, about 22 years of age. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," September 5, 1839)

(172) Died, at Washington, D.C., after a lingering illness of two months, Colonel Samuel H. Thompson, a native of New Jersey. He was an aide to General Andrew Jackson at the battle of New Orleans, and bore a distinguished part in that engagement. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," September 12, 1839)

(173) Died, in Charleston, on September 6, 1839, of the prevailing epidemic, Benjamin C. Cady, in the 21st year of his age, a native of Greenville, S.C. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," September 19, 1839)

(174) Died, at Hamburg, S.C. on September 1, 1839, Mrs. Catharine R. Aughtry. She has left a young and helpless family to lament their loss. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," September 26, 1839)

(175) Died, in Edgefield District, on September 24, 1839, in the 35th year of her age, Mrs. Mary Bland, consort of Mr. Avory Bland. She has left a husband and six children. She was a member of the Baptist Church for the last seven or eight years. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," October 10, 1839)

(176) Departed this life, at the Village of Edgefield, on the morning of September 26, 1839, in the 27th year of his age, William Moore Butler. He left a wife and three children. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," October 10, 1839)

→ (177) Died, at Georgetown, S.C., the place of his nativity, on October 1, 1839, John Chapman, President of the Bank of that place, of country fever, aged 37 years. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," October 10, 1839)

(178) Died, at his residence in Edgefield District, Major Henry W. Garrett, in the 40th year of his age, after a severe illness of many days. He was a member of the Baptist Church for several years. He was a kind and affectionate parent and husband. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," October 17, 1839)

(923) Died on July 11, 1854, at Roswell, Cobb County, Georgia, Mrs. Susannah Jennings, wife of Hastings Jennings, in the 43rd year of her age. She was raised, and lived in Edgefield, S.C., until a few years back, when with her husband and children moved to Georgia. Being not permanently settled, she had never moved her membership from the Pleasant Grove Baptist Church in Edgefield District. (S.W.N.) ("The Edgefield Advertiser," July 20, 1854)

(924) Died at his residence in Edgefield District, on July 7, 1854, Mr. J.E. Cartledge, in the 25th year of his age. He left a wife, parents and brothers. (E.M.M.) ("The Edgefield Advertiser," July 20, 1854)

(925) The Reverend Samuel Dunwody, one of the oldest members of the South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, died at his residence in Cokesbury, on Sunday, July 9, 1854. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," Thursday, July 27, 1854, Editorial)

(926) Departed this life on July 12, 1854, Mrs. Martha Scott, consort of Samuel C. Scott, at Colliers, S.C., aged 40 years, one month and one day. She left eight children and her husband. She had been a member of the Baptist Church for 20 years. She had been a member of Red Oak Grove and the Red Hill Baptist Churches. She was interred at the Republican Churchyard and her funeral was preached by the Reverend D. Bodie. (D.B.) ("The Edgefield Advertiser," July 27, 1854)

(927) Died, June 16, 1854, at her father's residence, G.C. Robertson, Esq., in Edgefield District, Mrs. Sarah Ann Blackwell, in the 23rd year of her age. From early life she has been a member of the Baptist Church. (B) ("The Edgefield Advertiser," July 27, 1854)

(928) Mrs. Ridley Gray died at her residence in Edgefield Village on July 8, 1854, after a protracted illness of eight years, in her 84th year. She was a native of Edgefield District and she had a large number of offspring. She has been a member of the Baptist Church for 48 years. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," August 3, 1854, Editorial)

→ (929) John Chapman, Esq., died at his residence in Edgefield District, on Tuesday, June 21, 1854. He learned his trade from his father-in-law, John Abney, Esq. Mr. Chapman was one of the older members of the community. He left a large family of children and his wife. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," August 3, 1854, Editorial)

(930) Died on June 27, 1854, at his residence in Edgefield District, Lewis Asbill, Sr., in the 69th year of his age. He was a native of North Carolina, but for many years a citizen of Edgefield District, and a member of the Baptist Church. ("The Edgefield Advertiser," August 3, 1854)

(931) Died on May 7, 1854, in Muscogee County, Georgia, Mrs. Mary Harrison, aged 77 years, 2 months and 26 days. She was born in Brunswick County, Virginia, where in early life she joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, and afterwards moved to Edgefield, S.C., where she lived until 1852 when she moved to Georgia to spend her last days in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Meachum. For 56 years she walked with God. (P.R.C.) ("The Edgefield Advertiser," August 3, 1854)

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
