Dear Pelham,

Enclosed you will find the research forwarded to me on the names written in the Coleman bible. As you can see, these names speak mute testimony to a family's and a county's sacrifice to their state. Mark is rather familiar with the bible, as are the Coleman descendents. I have sworn I'd never let the piece go but I have since reconsidered.

The bible has been valuated by several Civil War dealers and assessed with a value that really shocked me. It seems this piece of Fairfield County history is quite valuable. Y'all are the only folks I'd consider turning it over to. All I am asking is that the family provide enough donations to your establishment as to meet my asking price. Be aware that all of these donations will be tax deductible because the funds will be used solely for historic preservation & living history projects, not my personal "bottom line".

The SC Palmetto Battalion has a new educational "arm" to it called the Palmetto Living History Association. This group is tasked with educating school children and the public at large around SC and the southeast to the sacrifices of the common Civil War soldier. Funds generated from this bible will be used to buy original cooking implements, period stationary, rations, and display equipment. To me at least, it sounds like a great cause for public education.

I am offering the bible for acquisition at \$350, which, I believe, to be very reasonable compared with what similar items are going for on the private market. As stated before, you are the only institution at which I would want this item to reside. It is unfortunate the family let this piece escape during the "great sale" but it happens. Please let me know what your and the family's feelings are on all this. I look forward to hearing from you soon.

They raised their nephew, Jones McLane. Jonathan "D" owned many slaves and land, carried on much business, was a successful farmer, and his land and money caused dissention in division.

David Andrew Coleman 9-16-1823--12-15-1863

It is my understanding that he was not in the army, but taken ill as he went to care for a brother who was injured. I need to do more research to be sure who, but I'mpretty sure that it was Henry Alexander. David Andrew Coleman is my great-grandfather, his son, William Yongue Coleman is the father of my mother, Nancy McConnell Coleman Ross.

Charleston, S. C. His body was recovered, brought home and buried in our graveyard (Coleman)., He was very small, but handsome, curly black hair and black eyes, He was the pet of the family. The last time I saw him just before he left for Charleston was playing his violin, and I remember he played "Annie Laurie." I was a very small girl then. (Jennie Isabella Daughter of J. A. F. Coleman and Julia Stevenson born 12-22-1856.) My father was at the same place. The soldiers were many of them his cousins and friends. They hunted for his body for days. When found at last, my father was not allowed to see him. He brought him home to the parents, their baby, who could mot have a last look at their loved one. I just can remember them bringing the coffin in the house. My grandmother told me that for years after she expected him to return to her, as she had a feeling that the body may not have been his, but that in some way he was alive and must come back. But his comrades knew it was his body. I imagine the rapture of the meeting with her lost boy when she reached the spirit world. All her children are with her now.
