4. Nathan Coleman b. 12/21/1 d, 4/7/1858 M. Elizabeth Glen

 She was the daughter of William Coleman Glen  
 b. 5/16/1761 - d. 4/13/1827 buried at Fish  
 Dam, Carlisle, S. C. with Revolutionary marker.  
 He married Mary Elizabeth Wright 7/16/1788 in  
 Cumberland Co., Va. William C. Glenn was the  
 son of Nathan Glen and his wife, Lucy Coleman.  
 and a brother of Sytha Glen. Nathan and  
 Elizabeth were first cousins.
5. Mason Glen, <sup>Coleman</sup> b. 3/3/1788 M. Moses Crosby.  
 In 1846 was a widow  
 living in Alabama.
6. Sarah Coleman b. 1/14/1790 - d. 9/16/1860 M. Benjamin Ellis,  
 or 1792 b. 11/19/1783  
 d. 12/31/1847.
7. Mary Coleman b. 1/14/1790 Twin - died single
8. Daniel Coleman b. 4/5/1793 No record at present.  
 He probably moved to Kentucky as both Thomas  
 Sartor and Benjamin Ellis, sons-in-law of Joseph  
 Coleman, released to Daniel land that had been  
 granted to Joseph by the State of Virginia for  
 Military Service. Daniel sold land to Rubin  
 Rice 8/14/1834, so it is also possible that he  
 may have remained in S.C.
9. Ann Coleman b. 5/5/1795 M. Thomas Sartor  
 B. 1787 D. 1858.  
 They both lived and died in Union Co., S.C.  
 See DAR No. 118004
10. Sytha Coleman b. 5/25/1797 She died single
11. Susanna Coleman b. 11/22/1800 M. John Anderson  
 They moved to Georgia.
12. Pamila Coleman b. 11/22/180 - d. 9/1894 M. Nathan Glen, a  
 cousin. They lived  
 in Union Co., S.C.

JOSEPH COLEMAN  
Cumberland Co., Va. - Union Co., S.C.

From records in the Courthouse at Union, S.C., County seat of Union County, and from the papers filed as a result of the application of Joseph's son, Nathan Coleman, for a pension due Joseph, (W 9738), we gain the following data. It is filled in from other authoritative sources.

Joseph Coleman was born in Cumberland Co., Virginia (~~date unknown at present~~) <sup>1760</sup> ~~1857~~. He was raised in that county and was enlisted (date unknown) in the 6th Virginia Regiment, from which he was discharged after serving three years - after being private and sergeant - on January 12, 1780. On January 24, 1782, he married Sithy or Scytha Glen, also born and raised in Cumberland County, Virginia, the daughter of Nathan Glen and Lucy Coleman. *Sithy Glen 1762 - dies July 17, 1844*

Joseph and Sitha moved to Union County, S.C. in 1786, and in 1791 Joseph purchased land on Broad River from Bernard (or Barnett) Glen. Joseph's will is in the Union County Courthouse Box 4, Package No. 45. Affidavit of the Executor dated 8/30/1806. The will gives the names of some of the children only, but the others are covered by the Pension Papers. One daughter joined the DAR on Joseph's record and is covered by DAR No. 118004.

After the death of Joseph, his widow Scytha married about 1820 to John Bowles, and they signed a marriage agreement regarding the distribution of their properties in case of death. This agreement was dated February 1, 1820. Scytha died July 16, 1844 and John Bowles in February, 1836. They had no children, and there is no record of the burial place of Joseph, Scytha, or John Bowles, though it may be that Scytha is buried in the Glen Cemetery a little southeast of Carlisle, S. C. (Fish Dam) where Benjamin Ellis and his wife Sarah Coleman Ellis are buried, as she died in the Ellis home.
