Miscellaneous notes on Colvin... Clark and other connected families, compiled by Arthur Cornwall, Chester, S.C., in his search for information to furnish Baker A. Colvin, El Dorado, Ark., who is writing a History of the Colvin family.

BOLICK PLACE -- the old house was built in the 1820's by the CLARK family, early settlers in the Old Jackson Creek community. This house was the home of Mrs. Martha Clark Bolick, and was bought by her husband, LEVI BOLICK, before the Confederate War. The WW Bolicks' only child was a daughter-Elizabeth-- who was betterk known as "Lizzie". She married William Stevenson. Her husband died shortly after their marriage. She continued to live with her husband's people until her death. Before she died she sold this place to Mr. Beverly Herbert of Columbia, South Carolina.

OLD JACKSON CREEK CHURCH -- John Phillips was among the first settlers in the Lebanon (Jackson Creek) section of Fairfield ounty. In 1796 Mount Olivet and Jackson Creek were again united with one pastor, the Rev. Samuel W. Yongue. Rev. Yongue died in 1830, having served Lebanon for thirty-four years.

JAME: CLARK(Lieut.) -- a na ive of the Lebanon section of Fairfield County, was killed at the Battle of Cherubusco in Mexico, during the Mexican War in 1847. Mrs. Levi Bolick's (Martha Clark) home adjoined the church property.
