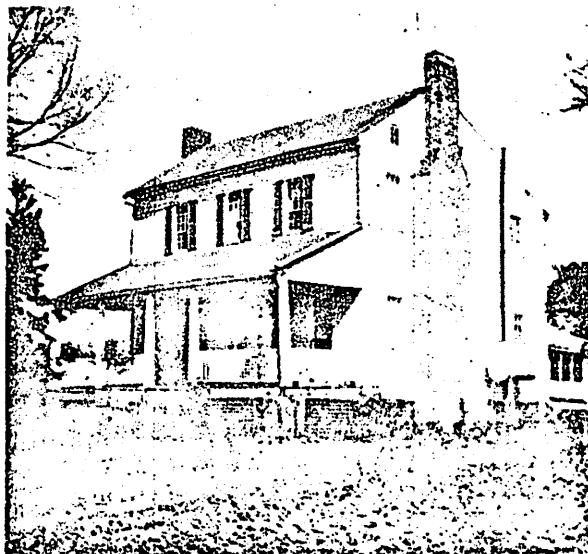

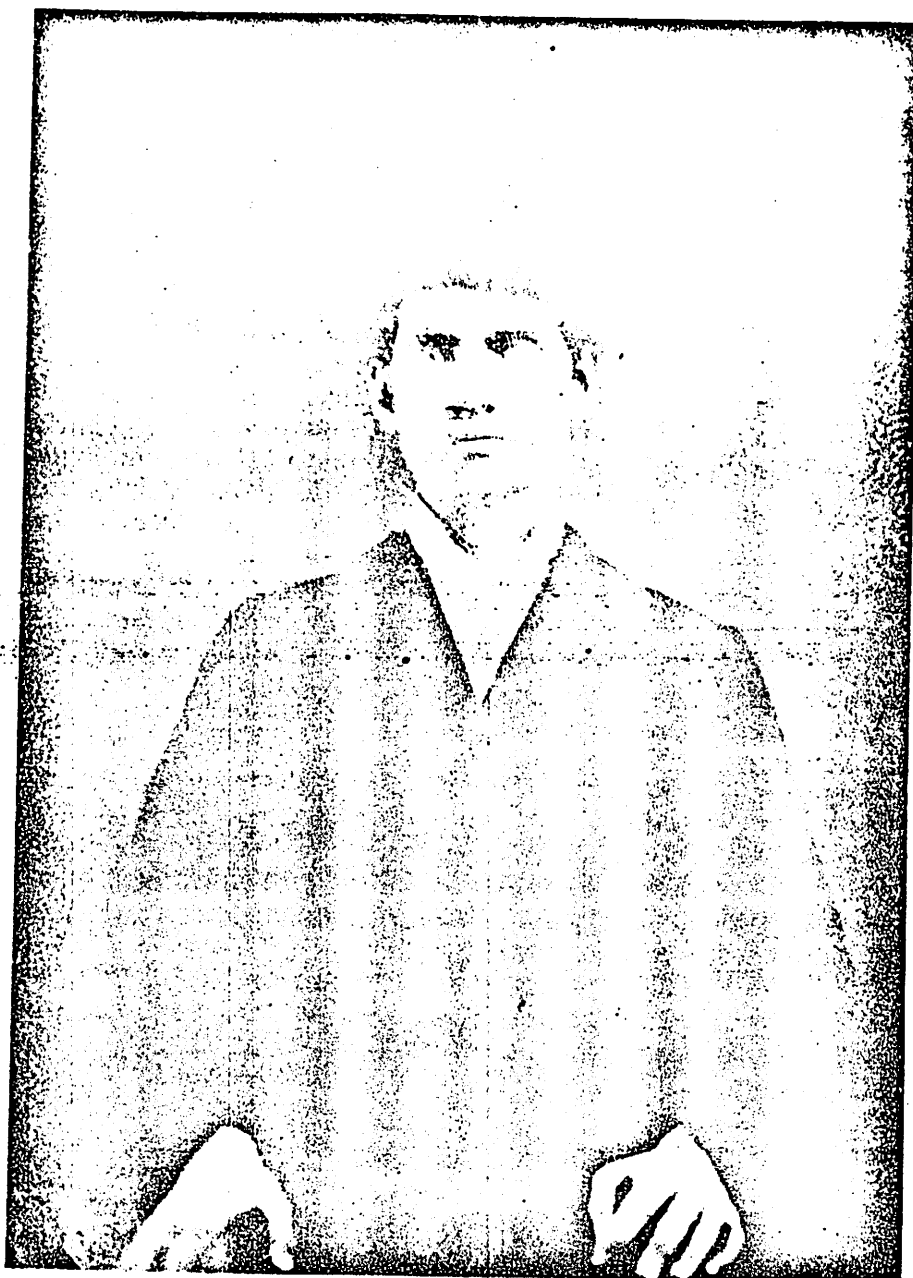

WHEREAS, I, NICHOLAS COLVIN, Chester District, have made and duly executed my last Will and Testament in writing, bearing date of the ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, and whereas I have directed in my said Will that all the residue of my property, not herein mentioned, consisting of between three and four hundred acres of land known by the name of the Taylor tract to be disposed of and Equally divided among my Heirs named in the Will. Now, I do hereby revoke and make void the same, and in lieu, thereof, I give to my daughter Patience Coleman the plantation whereon she now lives, containing one hundred and two acres, valued at one thousand and twenty dollars and no more till the rest of my Heirs named in the Will gets to the amount of one thousand and twenty Dollars.

I give to my son, MARTIN COLVIN, seventy-two acres of land, adjoining him out of the Taylor tract, valued at nine hundred and thirty-six dollars. I give to my son, NICHOLAS COLVIN, sixty-six acres of land out of the Taylor Tract, adjoining JOHN WRIGHT, valued at nine hundred and ninety Dollars. I give to my son, NICHOLAS COLVIN, in trust for my daughter, SARA WRIGHT, sixty-five acres of land out of the Taylor tract, valued at nine hundred and ten dollars. I give to my daughter, HANNAH COLVIN, one feather bed and furniture.

I give to my grand-daughter, ADALINE GRIFFIN, one feather bed and furniture. I give to my grand-daughter, POLLY GRIFFIN, one feather bed and furniture. I direct my Executors in my said Will named, to collect my money as soon as can be Convenient after my Decease together with what money I may have to pay my Just debts and all legal expenses out of the money collected and divide the Balance of my money Equally between my son, G. B. Colvin, my daughter, Mary Egger and my daughter Hannah Colvin, and whereas I have directed in my said Will the Estate left to my wife to be Equally divided among my sons and daughters. Now, I do hereby Revoke and make Void the Same. I direct my Executors above named as soon as can be convenient after my wife's Decease to Sell the Said rest and residue of my Estate and out of the proceeds of such sales to pay to my Son's and Daughters to G. B. Colvin with what he receives at my Decease to make him one thousand and twenty Dollars to Martin Colvin eighty-four Dollars, to Mary Egger with what She receives at my Decease to make her one thousand and twenty Dollars, to the Heirs of Elizabeth Griffin one thousand and twenty Dollars, to Nicholas

Martha Colvin, thirty Dollars, to the heirs of Martha Cockrell one thousand
and twenty Dollars, to Hannah Colvin, with what she received at my
cease to make up to her one thousand and twenty Dollars. When they
all Received the above amount, I direct my Executors to Equally
divide the Balance of my Estate amongst all my Sons and Daughters, they

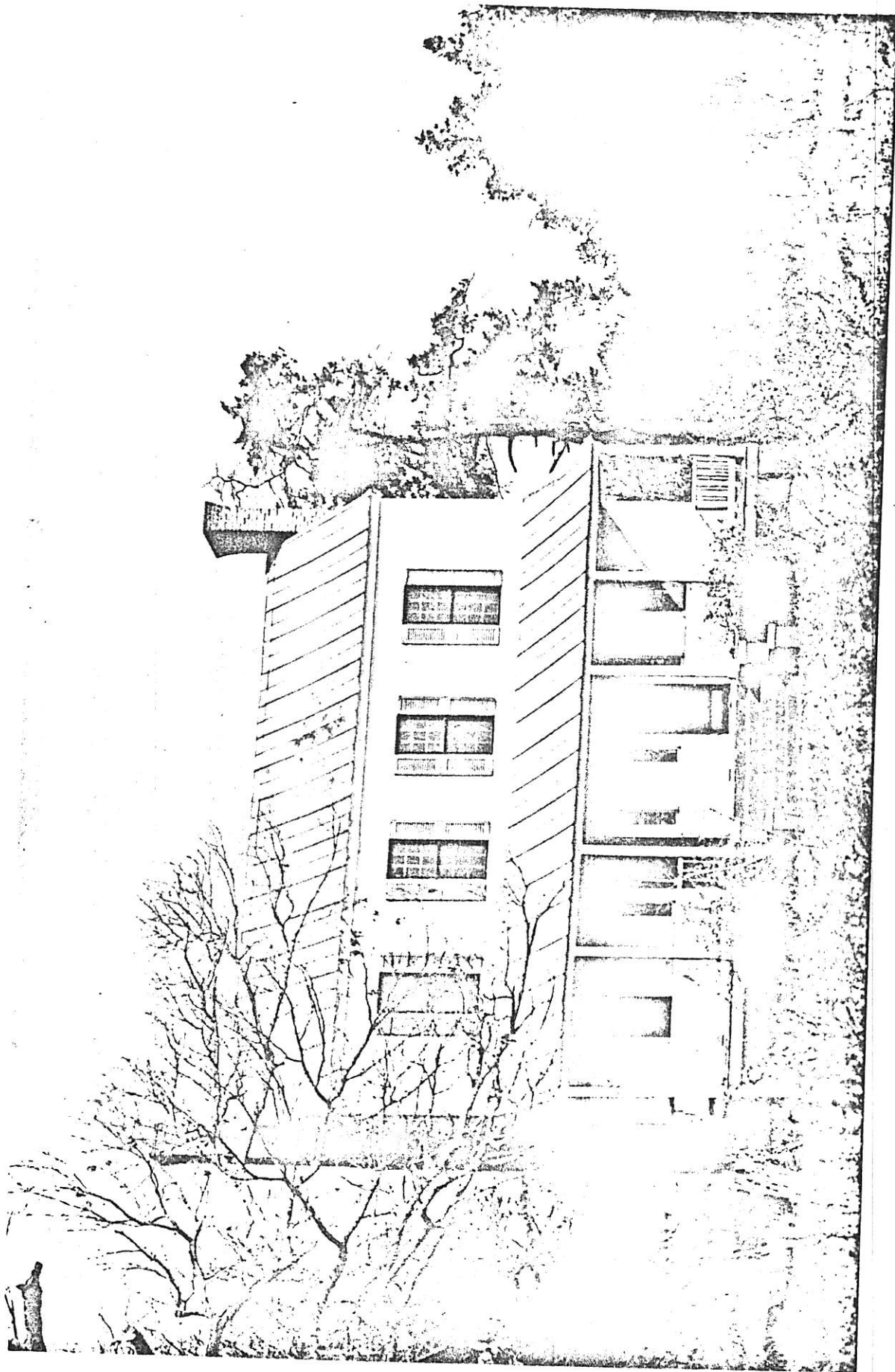

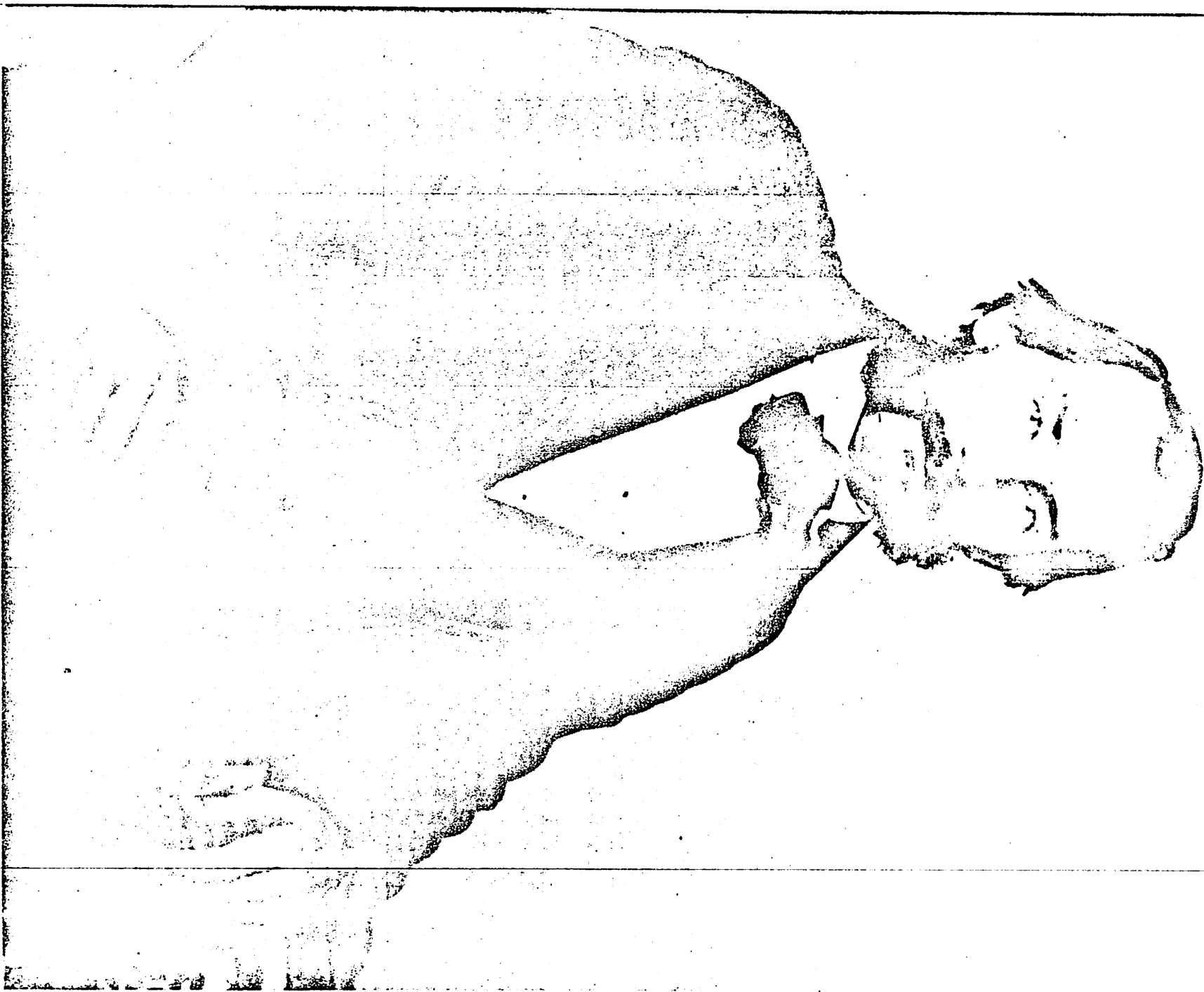

The most successful "career woman" I ever met was never employed
in an office in her entire life.

She didn't know the first thing about big business that is, the
business of buying and selling and entering figures in a big ledger.

She knew, though, all about the business of how to be happy and
how to get what she wanted from life, and as far as I know she got
everything a woman could ask.

She had a nice home, expensive clothes, servants, jewelry. Plus the great satisfaction that comes from being successful, and plus the love and adoration of a devoted family.

She didn't have to worry about "equal rights." She enjoyed special privileges.

She attended college, read hundreds of books, and could tell you

the "lesson" in every book she read. I know she was one of the smartest women I have ever seen.

She was my grandmother, Mary Virginia Cornwell Colvin.

My grandmother had a college education, but she had a master's degree in her community, though, and among her neighbors and me, "grandma's boy."

A lot of people worry about whether they are happy or not, I once heard her say, "but the easiest way to be happy is to make others happy for well adjusted people make good, kind and happy friends."

So, my grandmother specialized in making people happy. She graduated in high circles with more flowers during her life, and at death, than are given many a so-called "career woman."

Everybody, who knew her, admired her.

Her husband died when her oldest child, a daughter, was thirteen, and she had three younger sons. She planned skilfully, and directed the lives of her children well. When they came home defeated and pessimistic, she filled them with confidence.

She made them feel important - she let them play the hero role.

My grandmother had subtle little ways of making people feel important. People notice how she praised one for doing a good job. She never left church that she did not speak to the minister and tell him about his sermon. She knew and loved music, she always had a kind word for those who took part in this important phase of church work; and the flowers and how they added to the beauty of the sanctuary.

Yes, she looked up and out, beyond the confines of a small southern community and county, and kept her thoughts and ambitions high.

When people came to her for advice she would wait a while and then say, "Well, what is there about the job you do like?" From that she slowly found the cause of the unrest. Often came up with a wise solution. It, only after she had thoroughly gone in the thoughts, heart and desires of the individual.

She said, once, in advising a married lady, who had family problems, if you want to be a queen - help your husband to be a king!

"Build up his ego and self-confidence by letting him know you think he is a pretty swell person."

welry. Plus March 26, 1865 - an important date. Halsellville, Chester County, and plus this particular calendar day, was pursuing its customary routine of business, farming and pleasure, but at "Friendship", the family home of enjoyed spec. N. G. B. Colvin the usual house-hold duties were interrupted because of an uncereemonious visit of the proverbial stork. Before marriage could tell you wife was Mary Virginia Cornwall. The new arrival was christened

Margaret Virginia Cornwell Colvin, and shortly after the event the Colvin household returned to normal. It was a bright sunny day, free of the usual March chill, which caused the grandmother, Mrs. Margaret Crosby Colvin, to remark; "She was born on a sunbeam - she will become great." The parents had longed for an artist child and, as a good omen, placed a golden star over the infant's Cradle.

This home was one of culture and refinement. Colonel Colvin was a prosperous man of business and farming. His wife, Mary Virginia Colvin, a woman of unusual attainments, with both musical and artistic talents, which were discovered at Thomas Female Academy, where she was an honor graduate. She was outstanding in her studies, music and art.

Margaret (often called "Cornie" for Cornwell) Colvin had three brothers; John, the eldest, showed more interest in business and farming and became very successful in both; Arthur, the second brother, a handsome man and the possessor of a splendid singing voice, was successful in farming and in the livestock business; Earl, the youngest, was a very good pianist and often played duets with his mother or sister. He was the politician of the family and

served Chester County as Auditor for many years. Colonel Colvin died when his daughter was only thirteen years of age. So their mother became business woman and manager of the large farming interests.

"Cornie" Colvin was strongly impressionable. Light, tinted glass, Silks, flowers, sunsets - everything possessing color aroused her deepest interest. From six to sixteen she took music lessons and attended all good concerts that she could. In the home there was often music. Her mother was a fine pianist and singer and her father possessed a good singing voice and he played the violin very well. He had a particular ear for beautiful harmonies, so often found in a natural musical talent.

After Attending Thomasville Female Academy for two years, Margaret Colvin, heard of a fine music professor at Greenville Female College, so she decided to continue her education at this college. This was a wise decision as Professor Modeste G. DeCamps, a native of Blabais, Belgium, and who had studied in that country and in Paris, was a real artist-teacher of organ, piano and voice. After musical tests, Professor DeCamps accepted her as a student in all three courses. She proved one of his most talented pupils and he took her to appear on many programs in South Carolina and other states.

From a clipping in her scrapbook, which is from "The News & Courier" (Charleston, S. C., November, 1884) we read. "Professor Modeste DeCamps of the Greenville Female College, presented and outstanding program, The audience was delighted with the beauty of the young coloratura soprano, Miss Margaret Colvin. When she had finished

difficult aria, "Caro Nome", which she sang with such exquisite
 color and amazing technic, she was forced to sing an encore. This
 proved a greater vehicle for her lovely voice. Her selection was
 "The Last Rose of Summer". Her interpretation was so moving
 the audience rose and gave the young singer a rousing ovation."
 Margaret She was a favorite of all her teachers; and in her art studies,
 Hattie L. Davis, considered her an outstanding student. Many of
 her lovely oil paintings, china and pasteles, are treasured by her
 children and grandchildren. She died March 22, 1925.
 Miss Caroline Dawson was her French teacher; Miss Mary C. Judson
 her English, Botany and Astronomy; and Dr. Alexander Sloan Townes,
 was also President of the College, was her instructor in Shakespeare.
 Two of her outstanding college friends, returned later to teach
 Miss Carrie Williams, later Mrs. J. L. Langston, and
 Lucy Hoyt, who was one of her closest friends.
 Her college roommate, Miss Annie Laurie Ashley from Barnwell,
 is living in Little Rock, Arkansas. She often visited
 her late sister, Mrs. James M. Lathan, in Chester. Miss Ashley, now
 ninety-three years old.
 Margaret Colvin possessed the quality of getting outside herself
 of criticizing her work as if it were that of someone else; meet-
 difficulties instead of eliminating them. She never dodged trouble,
 it squarely, apparently went out of her way to find compli-
 cations and overcome them. She had within herself and adversary always
 guard and yielding only upon complete mastery gained. She was ever
 and faking new, rather than adjusting herself to old, paths. She acquired
 mastery of her art, such as is possible only by uninterrupted applic-
 on.
 Simple, unaffected, sincere, high intellectuality and true fem-
 ininity - that was Margaret Colvin. The aim and purpose of her life was
 to make others happy. This she accomplished in two ways - with music
 and with deeds. She resembled a rare lovely Italian portrait with a
 playful face, gentle and sympathetic. Gaiety she had an animation,
 also grace of movement with gestures, restrained but eloquent.
 Her love for people, animals and birds, for flowers, sunsets and
 boundless panoramas, made her a humanist of the higher order,
 concerned itself with human nature and its qualities. She found
 in benevolence and gentleness, in charity and kindness, and in
 glaspathy and tenderness.
 October 27, 1936 she married John E. Cornwall. He was a veter-
 an and also served Chester County as Sheriff for eight years and
 of Court for thirty-two years. They had five children; John
 Cornwell, of Chester; Mrs. Virginia C. Coogler, of Chester; who
 three sons, Lamar, Cornwell and Charles Coogler, who graduated from
 Mrs. Kathleen C. Kee, who taught in the Chester schools for
 twenty-two years. (She died June 22, 1956); Mrs. Marie C. Hatchell, who
 now living in London, England; and Arthur Cornwall, whose voice was
 covered by the famous Italian soprano, Madame Amelita Galli-Curci,
 was a student at the University of South Carolina. Both Mrs.
 Hatchell and Mrs. Hatchell are alumnae of Furman.

THOUGHTS FOR FATHER'S DAY

Along life's highway other men have had fathers who have possibly

attained greater heights of distinction and wealth than mine, as such are measured in the affairs of men, yet I have never known a son that could claim a father who was a more earnest warrior in the field of right, who labored more devotedly in the interest of his family and his fellow man, or who had a larger soul than my Father, Dr. John Eli Cornwell, who served Chester County for forty years - eight as Sheriff and thirty-two as Clerk of Court.

As far back as I can recall, I can see his friends, too numerous to mention, seeking his good offices when misfortune would overtake them - men who had lost their jobs, women who had been widowed by the death of their loved ones, all finding their way to our home or his office, there to receive his kind word of admonition and to seek his judgement in their hour of trial or distress.

His kindness was extended not alone to Masonic brethren and their families, but to Negroes and white people, alike, of almost every Creed and denomination. He truly lived to help his fellow beings.

My father's life was filled with many beautiful characteristics, and, as I look down "Memory Lane" into the years, I can see a multitude

of instances that would be well worthy of laudation. In his last days, broken in body, his motivating power impaired to the point of excruciating pain from cancer, he clung to the faith of his childhood, manifested the courage of a saint and relied upon the wisdom of the Master Builder.

I had many opportunities to be around my father and I learned much from him.

Every person we met spoke to him and smiled. People across the street waved or gave a nod of greeting to him and a smile.

The power of friendliness made my father more like a young man of thirty than his three score and ten. His friendliness did things to others, too. It drew people of all creeds together.

He did not wait to see if people would like him. He assumed they did like him. He did not wait for them to say "Hello" or smile first. He took the friendly lead himself, and everyone followed. That was one of his secrets, which I remember.

He did not question whether or not he would like a person or wait before deciding to be friendly. He took it for granted he would like everyone on first sight. This was another of his secrets.

He magnified others' good points, no matter how inconsequential. He overlooked the few annoying qualities or major bad points. This was another element in his contagious friendliness.

"Friendliness is very contagious", he would say. "The trouble is that many of us wait to catch it from someone else instead of giving the other fellow a chance to catch it from us.

"Start the friendliness yourself; don't wait for the other fellow", he would say.

Some people are tight-lipped with their words of considerate praise, because they feel that only the world's best deserve it. They neglect the opportunities that are always at hand. They praise the epic poem, but overlook the thousands of little couplets. They praise the fellow at the head of his class, neglecting the many accomplishments of the others.

"Praise for little things counts as much in stimulating one to do his happy best as does acclaim for the topmost accomplishments," he said. "So, forget looking for big things to praise; look for some little ones. Praise counts most when it comes from the boss or from a close relative. And, as the devil would make it, those are the very people who are most likely to neglect it."

Often the praise that reshapes lives or gives the push for better achievement has to come - if at all - from a stranger.

Remember the magic power of praise - praise for little things - even in your casual contacts with people you may never see again.

Don't imagine you are too big to notice - and praise - little things in little people. Many people are uncertain of themselves. They treasure the reassurance that they are doing well.

I remember on several occasions he talked with Dr. Tuggle, the cancer specialist at Memorial Hospital in Charlotte. I tried to keep notes of the many things I heard him say.

"If one wishes to live a long time, he must eat less and love his fellows more, have high ideals and do unselfish service. These are the goal I have held before me as I grew older. They actually help me grow younger while my body grows older. I have not done all I once dreamed. But who has? Even at eighty, one must be hopeful and look ahead to something better. I have had my most joyous laughter turned to hollow mockery, my deeds of kindness rewarded with ingratitude, my best-laid plans fail. But, There has been more sunshine than shadow.

"I now can live my life over any afternoon, enjoying it a hundred times if I wish, and not be hurried along as I once was. How necessary that one's life be full of things worth remembering! The years after

seventy are not for labor, but for memory and retrospection. And when a man passes eighty he can go fishing and not feel he is a deserter from the busy world."

Turning from the physician and looking out of the window, he continued: "I have learned patience and forbearance. I have become more charitable in my criticism of others. I have learned almost when to speak and when to keep silent. The frost of time has mellowed my countenance and softened my voice. I now see more happy faces under grey locks than under those of deeper hue. I have stopped worrying.

"What I am today began to formulate more than eighty years ago. I have loved to see my children grow to manhood and womanhood, and I have seen their children begin life. I now enjoy more real happiness than ever before. Life is cumulative, and the longer I live the more I have to draw from. These eighty years, filled with precious memories, are my years. They reveal to me my life as I have lived it; poor years, perhaps, but mine. I would rather have my mistakes than another's successes. To me, old age is not a regret, but a holy memory.

"The conditions of happy old age are found in being loyal to high ideals and true to the friends we have made. With me, it is harvest time now, more rewarding than seedtime. I am glad I sowed good seed. Others will reap some of mine, and that is now small comfort.

"At eighty, shadows dim life a bit. But shadows make things more beautiful. No one is afraid of the dark who loves the light. Evening is here, and I am resting. Let the gun boom when it will - I have reached the top of the mountain of life and am looking at a beautiful sunset."

ARTHUR CORNWALL, "CAROLINA'S LYRIC TENOR"

by John Cornwall Austin

It's a long jump, and often a futile one, from a small local church choir to a New York City musical success, but Arthur Cornwall was successful in the "jump".

He had received much encouragement in the South as to his splendid lyric tenor voice and its possibilities, but to go to New York City, where thousands are seeking careers-- unknown and with little money-- is no easy undertaking. He had studied voice, however under Dr. Mauri Matteson at the University and also Dr. Walter B. Roberts at Winthrop College, which is located just nineteen miles from Chester. Both were fine teachers and head of their music departments.

How far back in the family the singing ability goes is hard to tell but we are sure of this, his great grandmother, Hannah Colvin, possessed an unusually clear soprano voice. Her daughter, Mary Virginia Cornwall was very musical. She was a very brilliant young lady and graduated with high honors from Thomas Female Academy, where she gave a very successful voice recital. Her daughter, his mother, Margaret Virginia Cornwall Colvin, was outstanding in art, organ and voice at Greenville Female College, and appeared on many programs in South Carolina and other States. I believe there is an article about her in this book, also.

It was while he was a student at the University of South Carolina that the young tenor was sent to interview Madame Amelita Galli-Curci for The Charlotte Observer. It was her last concert tour of the South and she appeared in concert in Columbia, S. C., where the University of S. C., is located. He was a student in the School of Journalism and also in the School of Music, so he was a natural to interview the great soprano. However, he was also versed in the Italian language, which was a decided asset in the interview. The great diva took an interest in him and had her New York voice teacher to contact him about lessons. He remained a good friend of the celebrated opera singer until her death in California in 1964. She often wrote to him, and one of his treasures is a letter in which she advised him that she always considered his article about her one of the best that had ever been written about her and her career.

In New York City he was featured on Radio Stations WGBS and WHN and billed as "Carolina's Lyric Tenor", a title which had been affectionately given him by Dr. William Davis Melton, President of the University. At that time he introduced many new songs, the most successful being "When You're Smiling", which is still a favorite.

When Arthur E. Satherly of the American Record Corporation heard him sing he engaged the young lyric tenor to make ten recordings of lovely old gospel songs like "When They Ring Those Golden Bells", "The Old Rugged Cross", "Where We'll Never Grow Old" and others.

Asked his advice to young singers he thoughtfully replied; "No

singer can rise to any distinction without the severest kind of self-discipline and hard work. Work, work and again work! And, if you have gained even a slight foothold on the hill of fame, then you have to work harder to keep your place. No singer can adequately express the beautiful and pure in music, while cherishing at the same time, a bad heart and a mean nature behind it. Singing is a personal thing, that one's mentality, one's inner nature, is bound to reveal itself. Each one of us has evil tendencies to grapple with, envy, jealousy, hatred, sensuality and all the rest of the evils we are apt to harbor. If we make no effort to control these natural tendencies, they will permanently injure us, as well as impair the voice, and vitiate the good we

we might do. I say it in all humility, but I am earnestly trying to conquer the errors in myself so that I may be able to do some good with my voice."

While serving as a Congressional Secretary in Washington, D. C., he was featured in recital in Continental Hall and the same year at the Congress of the National Daughters of the American Revolution in Constitution Hall. He appeared as solist on the South Carolina Sunday in the Washington Memorial Chapel, Valley Forge, Pa. He also had the leading part in "Kapital Kapers", a lavish production staged at the National Theatre in Washington by a New York producer for the National Democratic Committee to raise funds. While in Washington he studied under Dr. Otto Simon at Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore, and also coached with Eugene Martinet, director of the Baltimore Civic Opera Company.

For several years he was featured over WBT, Charlotte, N. C., on programs of his own, and also appeared with "Old Wayside" (Harold C. Brown) who broadcasted from his wheelchair a special program for "shut-ins". Mr. Brown toured many neighboring towns and cities and Arthur Cornwall was his featured artist, meeting many of the people who had enjoyed his singing over Radio Station WBT.

For fourteen years he conducted his own radio program, "Memory Time" using as his theme "Memories" and closing with Meredith Willson's lovely song, "May The Good Lord Bless and Keep You".

In 1962 and 1963 he had a Government position, which required him to travel over the two Carolinas, Georgia and Florida. This gave him opportunity to use his talent in many places. He appeared at many Postmaster Conventions in these four States.

He served in the U. S. Navy from 1942 to 1945. He was in recruiting work part of the time, but served as a Chaplain's Assistant, under Capt. Truman W. Potter, at Brooklyn Naval Convalescent Hospital, and under Capt. Phil Shore, Jr., at the Naval Hospital at Camp Eustis, Va.

He has written many feature articles for newspaper, and his history of Chester County was published in bulletin form by the Extension Service of the University of S. C. He has had articles published in The Charlotte Observer, The State-Columbia Record, The Charleston News & Courier, The Atlanta Constitution and other large dailies.

He lives in Chester, South Carolina in his family home, "Friendship", teaches singing and speech and spends much time among his flowers. But, he always finds time to remember his shut-in friends in many thoughtful ways.

I am very glad, indeed, to honor my great uncle! You know, really, I think he's a great guy!
