EARLY HISTORY

The name "Crosby" means "Town of the Cross", and originated by a cross being placed in the ground by a very devout body of worshipers, who went there regularly to worship God, as they at that time did not have churches as we do today. Folk who watched these "queer" people go to this place of worship so frequently, called them "Cross-by people", or sometimes spoke of them as "worshippers-by -the-Cross". Later, they were given the name Crosseby, then Crosslie, Crossby, and finally Crosby, as we spell it today.

There are eight towns or hamlets across the waters named Crosby. They are:

1. Crosby ----- in Lincolnshire, south of Humber
2. Crosby Garrett---16 miles east of Ulleeswater
3. Crosby----- Ravensworth
4. Crosby-----4 miles north of Carlisle
5. Crosby-----in Cumberlands
6. Crosby----- in Lancashire (Little & Great Crosby)
7. Crosby-----Kilbride (Scotland)
8. Crosby-----Small hamlet in center of Isle of Man

The first Gosby mentioned in history is Geoffrey de Crosseby, Lincoln County, England, in the hundred rolls or the tax lists for the year 1273. The next place the name is recorded is that Thomas De Crosseby was a poll tax payer of Yorkshire in 1379.

Following this, we have an endless history of the people of this name. Sir John Crosby's history of his life work is interesting. He was a man of great wealth and influence. He bought land from the Catholics in 1466, built "Crosby Hall"...one of the most beautiful buildings in London for years. Here royalty was entertained on many occasions. Sir John was first a woolman by trade, but was later made a knight. He was employed by King Edward many times to meet and decide important matters with the Duke of Burgandy, as it has been said that a Crosby is levelheaded in matters of great importance.

Crosby Hall is a medieval Gothic structure, built on Bishopgate Street, in London, and was the scene of a portion of Shakespeare's RICHARD III.

Sir Thomas Moore also wrote Utopia in Crosby Hall. Some of the original chambers still remain today, but are used as a restaurant.

In the Public Library of Philadelphia there is a description of Crosby Hall, also Sir John's will, which is very fascinating. The will is the most elaborate document one could find and is very, very long, since he was a man of wealth. He died in 1475.

The first Crosby to come to America was Simon Crosby, who settled in Cambridge, Massachusetts in 1635. With him was his wife Ann and their young son, Thomas. Simon was twenty-six years of age and Ann twenty-five; little Thomas was only eight months.

They came over on the ship "Susan and Allyn", which only carried 94 passengers. It was said he brought a large amount of money with him and made wise investments.

He left three sons - Thomas, Simon, and Joseph Crosby.

The Crosbys have always been noted for their sobriety, honesty, and love of God. They are temperate, extremely quiet, deep thinkers, well bred and educated. Unusually talented, they have given to the world some of the greatest lawyers of this age. Many noted surgeons are also found in this family. They are strong, robust stock, very devout. Many are writers of marked ability.

Humbly complaining shew unto your honors, your orators and Oratrixes Thomas Crosby William Crosby, Coleman Crosby, Alexander Hill. Eli C. Harden and Sarah Harden, his wife, Sarah Douglas, Stephen Crosby, William A. Kelly and Ailelicia Kelly, his wife, that Stephen Crosby, Senior of the District and state aforesaid departed this life intestate on or about the Twentieth day of March 1856 leaving surviving him as his only direct kin and heirs at law his children your orators Thomas Crosby, William Crosby, Coleman Crosby, Stephen Crosby and your Oratrix Sarah Douglas, who is a widow; his grandchildren your Orator Alexander Hill and oratrix Sarah Harden the children of a daughter named Nancy, who had intermarried with one William F. Hill and both of whom had departed this life, before the said intestate and of other following grandchildren your oratrix Asleticia Kelly and William Crosby, Sarah Crosby and David Crosby the children of a predeceased son David Crosby, son of intestate Stephen Crosby and of whom William Crosby, Sarah Crosby and David Crosby are minors, under the age of twenty-one. They further show unto your honors that Stephen Crosby, Senior at the time of his death was seized and possessed of a valuable plantation or tract of land lying and situated in the District of Chester and Fairfield, on the Sandy River containing SEVEN hundred acres more or less and bounded on the North by the lands belonging to Allen Crosby. Estate and on the East by lands of Coleman Crosby, and Chesley Crosby, on the south by lands of N.P. Meadows and on the west by lands of William Crosby. And your Orator and Oratrixes further shew unto your Honor that the said lands cannot be held and profitably used and enjoyed, by the interested thereof the said parties in interest, that by reason of the minority of some of the parties in interest, that the said lands cannot be sold or partitioned without the aid and intercession of this Honorable Court.

And your Orator Coleman Crosby to whom letters of Administration of all an Singular the goods and Chatels, rights and credits which were of the said intestate, have been Granted by the Court of Ordinary for Chester District, shews to your honors that the proceeds of the sales of

CROSBY FAMILY

The earliest authentic record of the distinguished Crosby family of South Carolina begins the latter part of the seventeenth century when William Crosby patented land in Berkeley County on December 5, 1696.

Dennis Crosby, a descendent of William Crosby, obtained a grant of 300 acres of land in Thickety Creek, Berkeley County, South Carolina, August 18, 1765; also two grants of 150 acres each of Broad River, Craven County, February 20, 1760, and November 24, 1767, and a grant of 150 acres, Beaver Creek, Craven County, November 24, 1760.

Dennis Crosby married Hannah _____ and had four sons: William, Richard, Thomas and John. In 1770 Thomas Crosby, one of the four sons, married Margaret Davis.

glen had lost the battle for their land and their homes, but they hadn't lost their pride or their desire to fight again.

Their battle still remembered today, the women of the glen have left their legacy in deed and word. Shortly after the battle, the following was written by an unknown member of the women's own army:

"Many a thing I have seen in my own day and generation. Many a thing O Mary Mother of the black sorrows. I have seen the townships and the big holdings being made of them, the people driven out of the countryside to the streets of Glasgow and to the wilds of Canada, such of them as did not die of hunger and plague and smallpox going across the ocean . . . I have seen the big strong men, the champions of the countryside being bound on Loch Boisdale Quay and cast into the ship as would be done to a batch of horses and cattle, the bailiffs and the ground officers and the constables and the policemen behind them, still in pursuit of them. The God of life, and He only, knows all the loathsome work of men on that day".

As a result of this and other disturbances the public's attention was focused on the plight of the crofters and a Royal Commission was appointed to investigate the situation. In 1886 a major change in the law gave the remaining crofters secure tenure and controlled low rents. While all of those who wanted to stay on the land were not able to find crofts further clearances were impossible but now 100 years later the crofter has virtually disappeared.

Bloody Banner

A covenanting banner inscribed "No quarter for the active enemies of the Covenant" is preserved in the Museum of the Cameronian Regiment in at Lanark.

There they were, these families of the Mull of Galloway in the Lowlands of Scotland, 1688 and here they are with names slightly altered in such typical American communities as Bloomington, Princeton and Madison, Indiana; Xenia, Ohio; Sparta, Monmouth and Paxton, Illinois. Still keeping in touch with one another and adhering to much of the old culture and religion and still bearing mute testimony to the land of the nativity in the 20th century by their names.

These names were compared with the spellings used in *Scottish Family History* by Margaret Stuart and have been but little changed as this listing shows: BLAIR, BONAR or EONNER (BONARE), BROWN, CURRY (CURRIE), DOUGLAS, ELLIOT and this brings to mind the old lines,

"The double L and the single T
Descend from Minto and Wolfelee.
The double T and single L
Mark the old race in Stobs that dwell.
The single L and the single T
The Eliots of St Germain's be.
But double T and double L,
Who they are, nobody can tell."

Other names were: FEA (FEA of Clertrain), FULLERTON, GOURLAY (see Men of the House of Gourlay, Rogers 1888), HENDERSON, JOHNSTON, McCALLA (Probably from McCAA of Galloway), McCRAW (McCRAW of Garrachty), McMILLEN, MILLEN (Mc dropped?), MOFFETT (Moffat of Moorbrock, lands in Galloway), MARTIN, MOORE, NEIL, RICHEY (RITCHIE), THOMPSON, WEIR and WILSON. These names all belonged to Scottish families who were part of the exodus to Colerain and Ballymoney in Ulster, but their stay was a scant one hundred years and by 1715 and continuing to 1775, the settlements grew in such diverse places as Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Newcastle, Delaware and Chester County, South Carolina.

However, though separated by hundreds of miles, the people in the North found their way South and those in the Carolinas kept up contacts with their brothers and sisters in the North. While a few men ventured back to Ulster from Pennsylvania,

took a wife and returned this time to Charleston and to Chester County, South Carolina. For instance, brothers, James, John and William Brice Blair arrived in Charleston, South Carolina in 1789. James remained and the brothers went to live in Pennsylvania.

The balmy atmosphere of Charleston and Chester County found the Scottish settlers with small land holdings and the system unprofitable for most as witness the letter that Samuel McCalla wrote to Indiana in 1831, "Folks here are getting more and more anxious to leave this state of sin and misery . . . money is harder to get here than you ever knew it and the price of labor is lower than in Indiana. Heavy debts and ruin to many families, I fear, will be the consequence of the present depressed state of business." So the community moved and this was the last big movement. The church which had held them together for so many years was now undergoing factional divisions and these divisions separated the community. Still the new settlers who came to Bloomington, Indiana named their church, "Unity" after the old one in South Carolina.

The first of these families to settle in Bloomington was John Thomas Moore in 1820 and in 1825 James Blair is noted among the ruling elders. The church was a log school house in the home yard of a Mr. McQuiston. By 1830 the congregation had left South Carolina in a body, among them, Rev. James Henderson, elders, Samuel Wylie, Robert Gourley, John McKissock and families of Brown, Martins and Neils. By 1833 William Fee, James Millen, William Curry, George Johnston, and Ebenezer V. Elliot and their families, along with others, arrived in Bloomington. By 1834, Andrew Bonar, Wm. Millen, John Weir, William Bonner, John Fee and others came. 1835 dates the arrive of the James Richey family, Mary Moffett, the John McCaw family, Thomas Bonner and wife and Sarah and Jane McCaw. After that date the influx of families continued to 1850-60.

After arriving in Bloomington, the

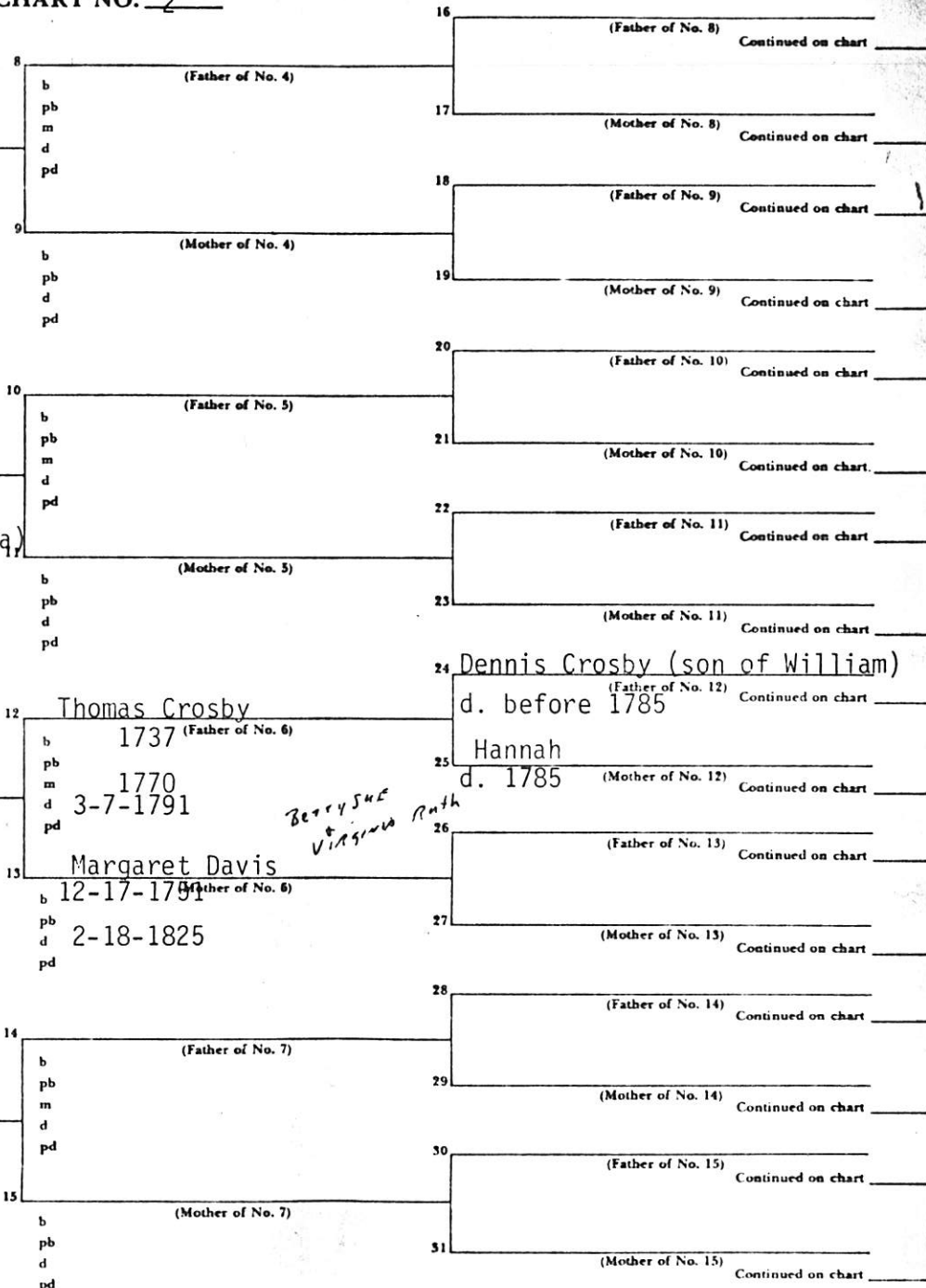
