Most of this record came from the files of Susan Estes who married Dr. C. A. Crosby with additions contributed by Mrs. J. T. McBryde, a great aunt of Lois Chappell Shealy, Mrs. Pope Brooks Shealy, who was also related to the Crosby family and from whom we got the copy of the Coat of Arms.

<u>CROSBY</u> EARLY HISTORY

The name "Crosby" means "Town of the Cross", and originated by a cross being placed in the ground by a very devout body of worshipers, who went there regularly to worship God, as they at that time did not have churches as we do today. Folk who watched these "queer" people go to this place of worship so frequently, called them "Cross-by people", or sometimes spoke of them as "worshipers-by-the-Cross". Later, they were given the name Crosseby, then Crosslie, Crossby, and finally Crosby, as we spell it today.

There are eight towns or hamlets across the waters named Crosby. They are:

- 1. Crosby ----- in Lincolnshire, south of Humber
- 2. Crosby Garrett---16 miles east of Ulleeswater
- 3. Crosby----- Ravensworth
- 4. Crosby-----4 miles north of Carlisle
- 5. Crosby-----in Cumberlands
- 6. Crosby----- in Lancashire (Little & Great Crosby)
- 7. Crosby----- Kilbride (Scotland)
- 8. Crosby----- Small hamlet in center of Isle of Man

The first Grosby mentioned in history is Geoffrey de Crosseby, Lincoln County, England, in the hundred rolls or the tax lists for the year 1273. The next place the name is recorded is that Thomas De Crosseby was a poll tax payer of Yorkshire in 1379.

Following this, we have an endless history of the people of this name. Sir John Crosby's history of his life work is interesting. He was a man of great wealth and influence. He bought land from the Catholics in 1466, built "Crosby Hall"...one of the most beautiful buildings in London for years. Here royalty was entertained on many occasions. Sir John was first a woolman by trade, but was later made a knight. He was employed by King Edward many times to meet and decide important matters with the Duke of Burgandy, as it has been said that a Crosby is levelheaded in matters of great importance.

Crosby Hall is a medieval Gothic structure, built on Bishopgate Street, in London, and was the scene of a portion of Shakespeare's RICHARD III.

Sir Thomas Moore also wrote Utopia in Crosby Hall. Some of the original chambers still remain today, but are used as a restaurant.

In the Public Library of Philadelphia there is a description of Crosby

Hall, also Sir John's will, which is very fascinating. The will is the most elaborate document one could find and is very, very long, since he was a man of wealth. He died in 1475.

The first Crosby to come to America was Simon Crosby, who settled in Cambridge, Massachusetts in 1635. With him was his wife Ann and their young son, Thomas. Simon was twenty-six years of age and Ann twenty-five; little Thomas was only eight months.

They came over on the ship "Susan and Allyn", which only carried 94 passengers. It was said he brought a large amount of money with him and made wise investments.

He left three sons - Thomas, Simon, and Joseph Crosby.

The Crosbys have always been noted for their sobriety, honesty, and love of God. They are temperate, extremely quiet, deep thinkers, well bred and educated. Unusually talented, they have given to the world some of the greatest lawyers of this age. Many noted surgeons are also found in this family. They are strong, robust stock, very devout. Many are writers of marked ability.

The earliest authentic record of the Crosby family in South Carolina is the first above listed land patent to William Crosby in 1696.

(Chester County and Fairfield County were both originally Craven County)

WILLIAM CROSBY

The earliest authentic record of the distinguished Crosby family of South Carolina begins the latter part of the seventeenth century when William Crosby patented land in Berkeley County, December 5, 1696.

Dennis Crosby, a descendant of William Crosby, obtained a grant of 300 acres of land, on Thickety Creek, Berkeley County, South Carolina, August 18, 1765; also, two grants of 150 acres each on Broad River, Craven County, February 20, 1780, and November 24, 1767, and a grant of 150 acres on Beaver Creek, Craven County, November 24, 1760. (Chester County and Fairfield County were both originally Craven County.)

Dennis Crosby married Hannah Revels, and had the following children: William, John, Richard, Thomas, and probably a daughter, who married James Jeter. Also Lydia, wife of Benjamin Dove.

THOMAS CROSBY

Thomas Crosby, born about 1751, one of the four sons of Dennis and Hannah Crosby, and a descendant of William Crosby, married Margaret Davis in 1770, and died March 4, 1791. Thomas Crosby, father of the above 9 children, was probably born in South Carolina, about 1751, and died in Chester District, South Carolina, on March 4, 1791. His place of residence during the Revolutionary War was Camden District (now Chester County) South Carolina. He served in the South Carolina Militia as a soldier, and also furnished sundries to the Whigs in 1781 and 1782.

In addition to the Revolutionary War record as a soldier and patriot of Thomas Crosby, above, we also find that his mother, Hannah Crosby, also furnished supplies to the Whigs for militia use in 1781, as follows:

"Issued the 20th day of May, 1785, to Mrs. Hannah Crosby, for twenty-three pounds, sixteen shillings and three pence Sterling for forage for continental and Militia use in 1781, as per account audited."

RICHARD CROSBY - REVOLUTIONARY PATRIOT

Richard Crosby, son of Dennis and Hannah Crosby, and brother of William, Thomas and John. Estate appraised Jan. 4, 1791, Will Book A, Chester, South Carolina. Will dated 3/25/1790, indicates he died before 1/4/1791.

Witnesses were William Crosby, Dennis Crosby. His wife was living at this time.

Revolutionary War Record

WILL OF THOMAS CROSBY

IN THE NAME OF GOD AMEN: I, Thomas Crosby, of Chester County in the State of South Carolina, being weak of body but of perfect memory do constitute this my Last Will and Testament, and I Desire it may be Received by all as Such: first, I most humbly Bequeath my Soul to almighty God, Beseaching his most gracious acceptance to take me to Himself into that peace and rest and incomparable felicity who has prepared for all that Love and fear his holy name, Amen, blessed by God I give my Body to Earth from whence it was taken, in full assurance of its Resurrection from thence at the Last day as for my Burial, I desire it may be Decent, at the Discretion of my Dear wife, and my Executors hereafter named, who I doubt not will manage it with all Requisite prudence and as for such Worldly Goods wherewith it has pleased God to Bless me, I give and Dispose of in the following manner,

First, I lend to my Wife Margaret Crosby during her Life or Widowhood The plantation where I now live and two negroes named Limbrick, and Table and one feather bed and furniture and all my stock of horses, Cattle and Sheep and Hogs, and at her Death or marriage to be Equally Divided among all my Children, Except the Land which is to be mentioned hereafter. I give and Bequeath to William Malven and to his heirs and assigns fifty acres of land Where he now lives on the Waters of Bever Creek; I give and Bequeath to my sons Dennis Crosby and Thomas Crosby one tract of Land on the Waters of Bever Creek containing three hundred acres to be Equally Divided in two parts by a line and Each one to have an equal part and to Dennis one Negro named Will and to Thomas one negro named Amey; I give and Bequeath to my Daughter Nancy Crosby one Negro named Sylvia, and one Feather Bed and Furniture. I Give to my Daughter Margaret Crosby one negro named

I Give to my son John Crosby one hundred and fifty acres of Land Lying on a Branch of Brushy Fork and one negro named Zekel. I Give and Bequeath to my Sons Stephen Crosby and Allin Crosby this tract of land containing three hundred acres where I now live on Broad River, at their mother's Death or marriage, to be equally Divided by a Line from the River out to the Back Line. I Give to my son Stephen one negro named Moses and to my son Allin one negro named Patty. I Give to my Daughter Mary Crosby one negro named Rachel and one Feather Bed and Furniture; I do constitute and appoint my Trusty and well beloved wife, Margaret Crosby, and my Son Dennis, to be Executors of this my Last Will and testament, and Revoking all other wills by me made, do confirm this to be my last Will and testament, in Witness Whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this third day of March 1791:

Chester County, South Carolina, records, appears an instrument executed by Margaret Crosby July 18, 1834, stating that their son, John Crosby, died during his minority, and that other disposition be made of his part of the estate of his father.

COLEMAN CROSBY

Coleman Crosby, son of Stephen Crosby and Charity Coleman, married Adeline Walker on 8/15/1837. He was born 2/16/1807, and died at his home in Chester District on Monday, 1/30/1860. He was 53 years of age, and lived and died within one mile of his birthplace. The whole energies of his nature were worthily bestowed upon the performance of his duties to his family, his friends, his neighbors and his country.

He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Mary Adeline Walker, his wife, was born in 1822, died June 17, 1889.

After Coleman Crosby's death, his wife married Berryman Withers. Coleman and Adeline Crosby had seven children: John, Alexander, Louisa Josephine, Stephen, William Walker, Mary Arrabella, and Ida Crosby.

Stephen, the third child of Coleman and Adeline Crosby, enlisted with the Chester Blues in Chester County, with E. C. McLure as captain, at the age of 18, on April 18, 1861. He was in Company I, Sixth Regiment, S. C. V., Bratton's Brigade. He was wounded twice, once through the leg and once through his shoulder. He had a hole shot through his hat at Seven Pines, Va. He was captured after second Battle of Manassas in Leesburg.

The Court House was used during the war as a hospital. He escaped the morning after being placed there, and went to Winchester, Va., and joined the Confederate forces there. He was with Lee when he surrendered at Appomattox Court House. He received his discharge 4/8/1865.

Stephen Crosby spent his last days with his daughters, Mrs. L. B. Jeter and Mrs. Belle Crosby Spears-Goin.

STEPHEN CROSBY and his wife, Sarah Catherine Coleman Mason Druscilla Meador (everyone for whom she was named gave her a negro slave). She was born 8/18/1845, died 6/16/1925, married 11/9/1865. Resided a few years in Fairfield County, South Carolina, then moved to Union, South Carolina. (These are parents of Mr. W. H. Crosby, of Union).

ALLEN CROSBY, born 8/16/1787, died 5/31/1834, son of Thomas and Margaret Davis Crosby, married about 1820 Mary Hughes (born 9/24/1799, died 5/22/1867.

STEPHEN CROSBY

Stephen Crosby, son of Thomas Crosby and Margaret Davis, was married in 1801 to Charity Coleman, daughter of Thomas Coleman. Following are their children:

Stephen Crosby was a large land-owner, and always had a deep interest in the cultivation of his plantation. His home, which is still standing, was built on a high hill, the gradual rise of the hill prevents one's realizing the elevation of 700 feet, but once upon the summit, there is an unusual wild beauty in its far-reaching view. In the sunshine of this lovely home, their son, William Crosby, passed his boyhood days. Here at his Mother's knee, he learned to fear God and love his country.

William Crosbywas married 10/8/1829 to Martha B. I. Thomas, of Union County, South Carolina. Their children were as follows:

William Crosby owned 3000 acres of land in the northwest section of Fairfield County, between Sandy and Broad Rivers, and eighty-three slaves, at the close of the War of Secession. His home was one where the charm of plantation life was well illustrated, and where fat, contented negroes gave a living proof of happiness in their sheltered existence.

A frequent guest at his house is credited with the remark: "the best argument that Mr. Grosby could make for slavery was to invite his friends to his home." He controlled his slaves kindly, fut firmly, and required honest labor of all. He managed his large estate with practical ability. Agriculture, he called the "first pursuit", that is, the most important occupation among men. He introduced into this section "Egyptian Corn", which was so popular for many years.

William Crosby was one of the wealthiest as well as one of the most popular men of his time. Though descended from a distinguished family all reared in affluence, he had that love for his people that knew no caste or class. He was a civic and religious leader in his community. From a diary which he kept for many years, it was found that he gave the land and built the Cool Branch Baptist Church.

With the fall of the Confederacy came also the fall of his personal estate. Not only had he sacrificed much of that estate for the cause, but with slaves freed and demoralization on every hand, the very magnitude of his landed estate made more certain and even hastened its destruction.

His lands became a burden and soon after his death in 1868 his property

vanished under the intolerable conditions of Reconstruction. His memory will ever be revered as typifying that patriotic unselfishness that characterizes the noblest of South Carolina's sons.

William Crosby had five sons in the War of Sesession: Walter was killed at Gettysbury; Rufus died of pneumonia at James Island; James, Joseph and William Baxter, after the war was over, returned home to face debts incurred by, and in preparation for war, depreciated land values, and in demoralized labor. All industries were depressed, the negroes were idle, and the whole people seemed to have lost all their energy, taxes were ruinous, fields uncultivated, in thousands of instances farms were sold, too, to pay taxes, and the people felt degraded when they reflected that their beloved state was under the regime of "carpetbag and scallawag rule".

During this wretched condition of affairs, William Baxter Crosby married Georgia Brunson and moved from Crosbyville, Fairfield County, to Landsford, Chester County, South Carolina, and as soon as the state threw off the government of the radicals, business revived and industries flourished, Mr. Crosby made rapid strides, and, like his father, became a planter of unusual ability, and one of the most prominent men of his community.

He served as magistrate for the Landsford township for forty years. There is much evidence to show the love and esteem in which he was held. The active spirit which impelled the boy of sixteen to enter the Confederate Army (member of Captain John McLurkin's Company), and the daring with which he held his post is the same determined spirit which characterized his private life.

David Crosby (minor under 21 years of age) was Grandma's younger brother who visited her on numerous occasions. I remember him as a very young child. I remember Aunt Fannie Perry, mama's older sister, talking about her Aunt Artelicia Crosby Kelly, but if she ever visited Grandma I don't remember it. I have no recollection of ever hearing about or seeing any of the others in Grandma's family - they were probably all dead by the time she died.

Marker Dedicated at Ebenezer Old Brick Church

The inscription on the marker reads: OLD BRICK CHURCH, on May 9, 1803, the Associate Reformed Synod of the Carolinas was organized here at Ebenezer ARP Church, built in 1788 by a congregation dating from colonial days. The rock wall was added in 1852. Damaged by Union troops in 1865, the church was repaired and remained in active use until 1920.

Another historical marker was dedicated at The Century House in Ridgeway recently.
