## Student strives to make county a lovable community

Phillip Davis of Winnsboro was one of six students chosen to attend the Lovable Communities Conference held recently in Charleston.

The students had the unique experience of attending as "reporters" covering the conference sponsored by the S.C. Downtown Development Association. The six were expected to attend all sessions, tours and other events of the three-day meeting.

The students' and their chaperones' expenses were paid by the S.C. Department of Education. All were lodged at the Francis Marion Hotel, where the conference sessions were held.

The students were chosen by application screening from those who participated in the Downtown As A Classroom program. The state Downtown Development Association is one of the sponsors for the program that places eighth graders for a day in downtown businesses and professional offices.

The Lovable Communities Conference was designed to bring together people and organizations concerned with making their communities a better place to live. About 300 people from several states attended the sessions that covered rebuilding, restructuring and improving communities.

Davis and the other students participated in the wrap up session moderated by Charleston Mayor Joe Riley. Each student discussed the conference and his or her views on community. The session was broadcast by Educational Television to schools in the state.

Each student focused on one aspect of community. Davis chose architecture.

"I've always been interested in architecture," he said. "I use anything I can get my hands on to build models. I like combinations of the traditional and contemporary styles. I think that looks good."


Davis sees community at work in Winnsboro in the rallying of agencies, businesses, the Chamber of Commerce, school district and organizations to meet the needs of citizens.
